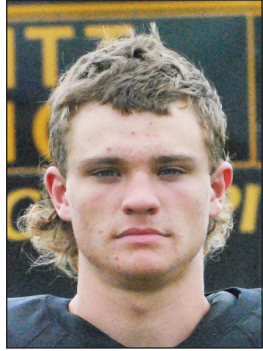

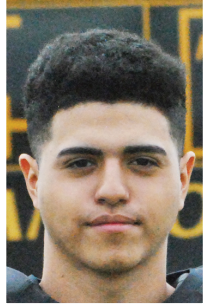

The Rookie of the year is awarded to a first-year card member who is the highest money earner at the end of the rodeo season. Zach obtained his PRCA card when he turned 18; he has been rodeoing as a permit holder the past two years, qualifying for the permit holders finals in Las Vegas, NV. In 2018, his goal was to pursue the Rookie title. Zach attended rodeos all over the United States, sometimes hitting two rodeos in a day. Sales Tax Revenues Nearly \$3 Million

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.998 billion in November, 7.7 percent more than in November 2017. "While slower than the double-digit pace of recent months, state sales tax revenue growth in November was strong," Hegar said. "Increased tax collections continue to be led by remittances from oil- and gas-related sectors, but at a slower pace than in recent months. Growth from retail trade and restaurants, the sectors most dependent on consumer spending, was positive, but comparatively modest."
 Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in November 2018 was up 9.8 percent compared to the same period a year ago. The sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.
 In November 2018, Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes:
 motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$405.1 million, down 2.5 percent from November 2017;
 motor fuel taxes — \$311.4 million, up 1 percent from November 2017; and
 oil and natural gas production taxes — \$529.6 million, up 49.4 percent from November 2017.

E.P.A.'s Methane "Roll Back"

 When the Environmental Protection Agency issued a proposal last month to ease Obama-era restrictions on methane emissions from oil and gas facilities, green activists turned bright red with anger.
 Unfortunately, their biggest worry seems to be the effect the proposed methane change will have on Obama's legacy, not the environment. If they were actually interested in keeping the earth green, environmentalists would be championing the EPA's proposal, not protesting it.
 Why? Because the amended rule would at last give oil and gas firms adequate time to prevent methane leaks via thorough inspections and repairs.
 Methane is a greenhouse gas released from oil and gas equipment -- like tanks, wells, and pipelines -- during fossil fuel production and transportation. Current methane rules require oil and gas firms to test wells for methane leaks every six months and fix detected leaks within 30 days. The EPA's proposal would require annual inspections and allow 60 days for repairs.
 Green activists were quick to accuse the EPA of "gutting" environmental regulations. But the revised rule simply accommodates the physical realities of energy production. The proposal would give firms the time they need to adequately repair their infrastructure and avoid future leaks, rather than rushing a repair through to meet an arbitrary deadline. The extra time is especially important for facilities in remote locations.
 Even without government intervention, energy companies would be working to reduce methane leakage. When properly captured, methane is a marketable commodity. Leaks

the group has grown to 43 members.
 And just last month, Exxon, Shell, Aramco, and 10 other energy companies pledged to reduce their methane emissions to less than .25 percent of their total natural gas production by 2025.

Medicare Open Enrollment Season

Medicare's Annual Election Period is here. Beginning October 15, seniors will choose their Medicare plans for 2019. They'll have to make their selections by December 7 for coverage that takes effect January 1.

The enrollment process will be different than previous years. This time, seniors will

have the chance to "test-drive" plans at the beginning of the year -- and select a different plan if their initial choice doesn't meet their budgetary or healthcare needs.

That flexibility will ensure that Medicare meets the needs of its beneficiaries better than ever before.

Medicare covers about 60 million Americans. Seniors become eligible for all of the program's components -- Parts A, B, C, and D -- when they turn 65.

Part A pays for hospital stays. Part B covers doctor visits, same-day surgeries,

and potent medications administered in physicians' offices. Part D is Medicare's optional prescription drug benefit.

Part C, also known as Medicare Advantage is administered by private insurance carriers and places a cap on the out-of-pocket expenses not available on Parts A and B of Original Medicare. Part C typically includes the prescription drug benefit at no additional cost.

More than 20 million Americans are enrolled in 2,300 different Medicare Advantage plans, each with its own mix of benefits, monthly premiums, copays, and out-of-pocket spending.

Deciding on a plan can be tricky. Beneficiaries must consider lifestyle factors, how much they can afford to spend, and what their future health needs may be.

In recent years, Congress didn't make those decisions easier. Since 2011, seniors who chose a Medicare Advantage plan had 45 days to "disenroll" if it wasn't right for them. But their only alternative was enrolling in traditional Medicare.

Thankfully, that won't be the case anymore. Next year, beneficiaries who enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan will have the ability to switch to another Advantage plan at any point within the first three months of 2019. The change gives seniors much more flexibility and can make open enrollment less stressful.

Seniors may find all these options empowering -- and overwhelming. Fortunately, help is available.

These industry efforts are working. Between 1990 and last year, a period during which natural gas production rose 50 percent, methane emissions fell 19 percent. And despite its status as the top oil and natural gas producer in the world, America's energy-related methane emissions represent only about 10 percent of the global total.

Most of that progress can be attributed to new energy industry technology. "The decrease in production emissions is due to increased voluntary reductions, from activities such as replacing high bleed pneumatic devices, regulatory reductions, and the increased use of plunger lifts for liquids unloading," according to an EPA analysis conducted during the Obama administration.

Easing regulations surrounding natural gas production will help lower emissions of other harmful gases as well. Advanced hydraulic fracturing techniques have yielded an abundant domestic supply of natural gas, which burns twice as clean as coal. We have America's adoption of natural gas to thank for a 25-year low in carbon dioxide emissions.

Flexible, incentive-based and voluntary initiatives like the Environmental Partnership lead to real solutions in the real world; burdensome regulations, by contrast, only compound problems.

Despite the green movement's reactionary rhetoric, the EPA's methane proposal will be a boon for the environment.
