Jorge Lopez-Garcia Mass Is March 19

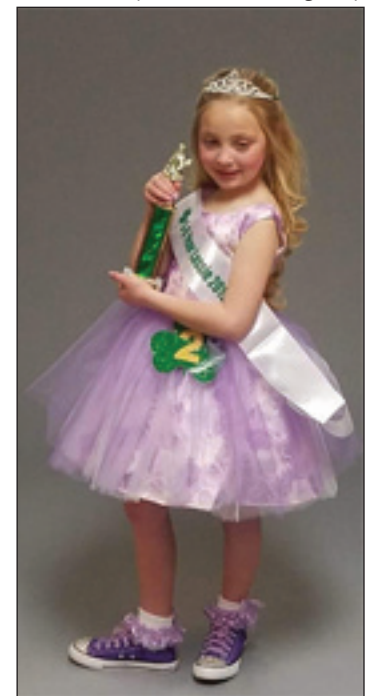
Jorge Lopez-Garcia, 74, of Wheeler, died Saturday, March 16, 2019, in Wheeler, Texas.

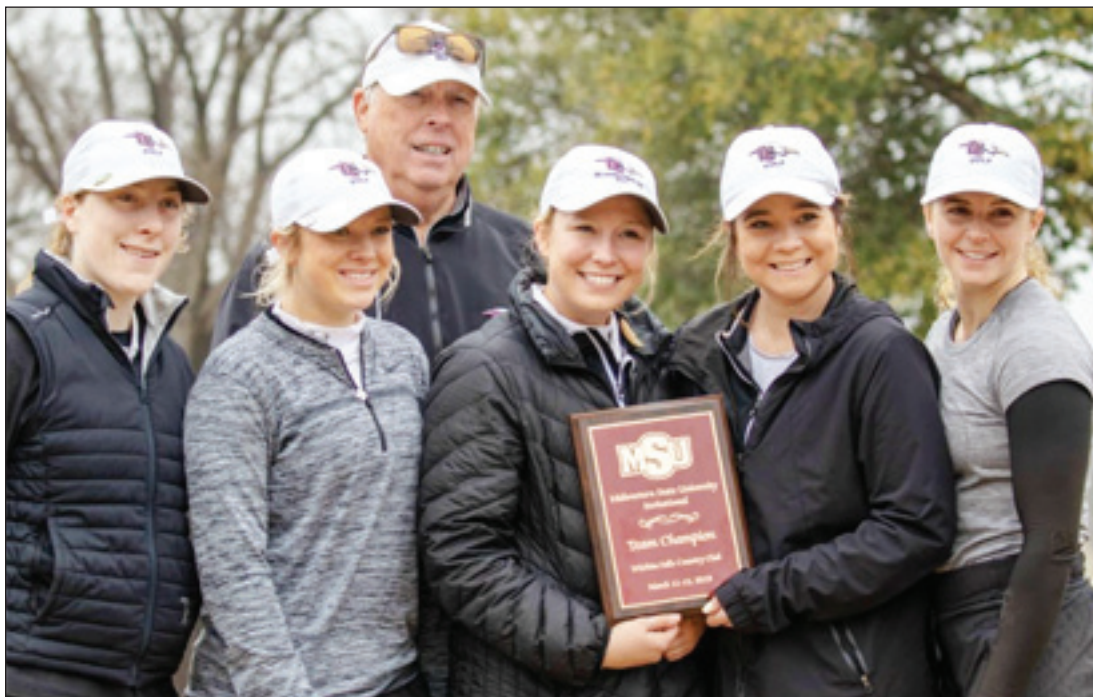

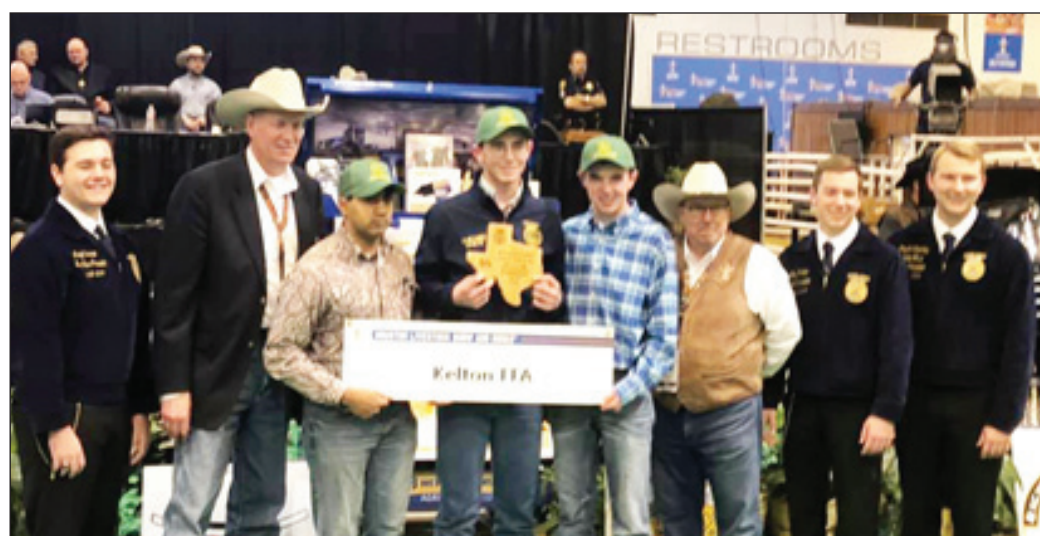

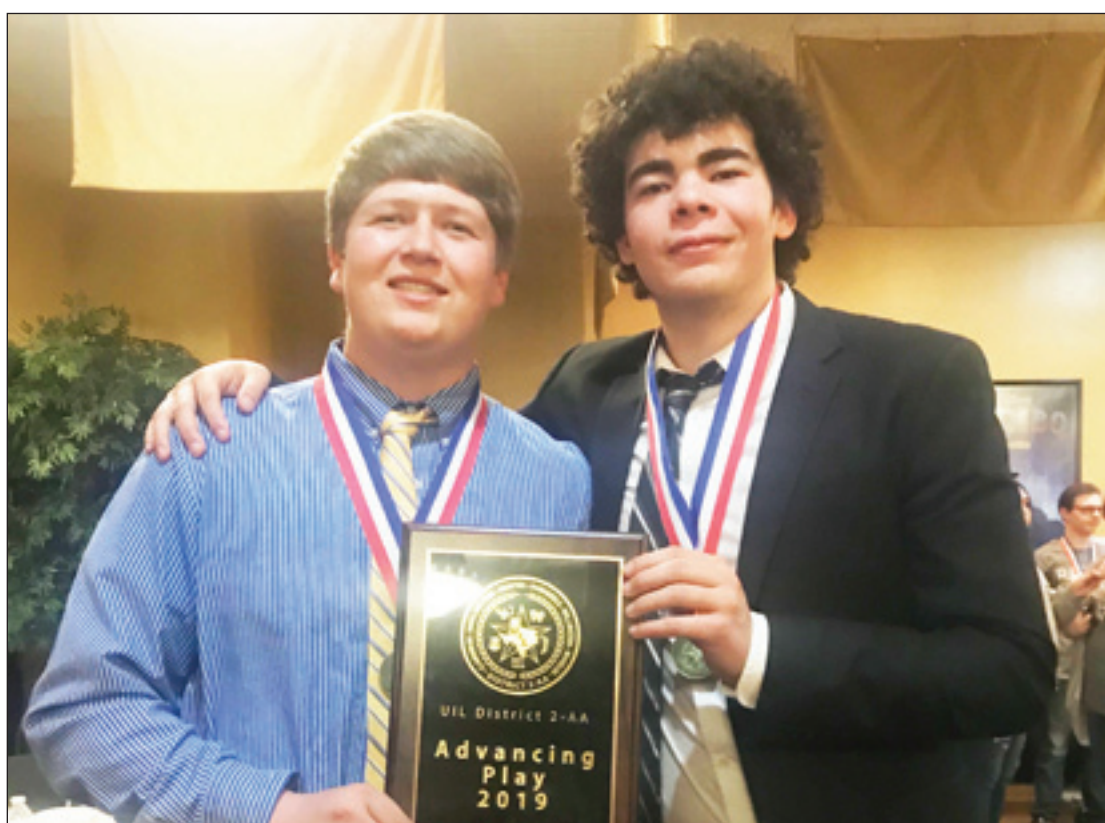

has challenged me far beyond the classroom. We have put a lot of time into this play and it has instilled in us the values of communication skills, responsibility, and time management."

the Eagles to pull away for a comfortable 16-stroke margin over Cameron at Wichita Falls Country Club. Host Midwestern State was third, 19 shots behind OC.

The Eagles posted a team score of 310 on Tuesday, giving them an overall score of 614. That total was the second-lowest 36-hole score in tournament history, just one shot higher than Dallas Baptist (Texas) posted in 2017.

The tournament win was the second this season for OC, which began the fall campaign by taking the title in the Northeastern State Women's Classic at Cherokee Springs Golf Club in Tahlequah, Okla., and the 11th in the program's eight-season history.

Goad, a sophomore from Wheeler, Texas, entered the final round tied for first in the 78-woman field and might well have posted her first collegiate win if not for an outstanding round by Imkeleen Meyer of Newman (Kan.).

Meyer posted a 1-under-par 71 on the 5,893-yard course, matching the second-lowest round in tournament history. She finished the tournament at 150 (6-over), one shot ahead of Goad, whose final-round 77 put her at 151, tied with Iona Roska of Cameron.

Two shots further back, at 153, was Rigsby, the tournament's defending champion. The junior from Courtenay, British Columbia, recorded two birdies and shot a 78, tying for fourth with Sarah Wongsinth of Texas A&M-Commerce.

Bennett, a freshman from Plano, Texas, had three birdies in a five-hole stretch near the end of her round to finish with a 77. Her overall score of 155 put her in a tie for seventh, her best collegiate finish and the second time in as many events she's landed in the top 10. She tied for eighth in the Oklahoma Intercollegiate at Lawton Country Club to close the fall campaign.

Senior Kate Goodwin of Tulsa rebounded from her first-round 84 to shoot a 78 on Tuesday, tying for 22nd at 162. Goodwin led the field in pars with 22. Senior Elizabeth Freeman of Edmond tied for 24th at 163 after a final-round 86.

The Eagles will be back in action next Monday and Tuesday in the Hillcat Classic, to be hosted by Rogers State at Bailey Ranch Golf Club in Owasso, Okla. OC is the defending team champion in that tournament.

February Sales Tax Revenues

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.796 billion in February, 7 percent more than in February 2018.

"Growth in sales tax revenue was led by remittances from the construction, manufacturing and services sectors," Hegar said. "Receipts from information services and restaurants also grew significantly. Receipts from oil- and gas-mining firms remained about the same as a year ago."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in February 2019 was up 5.9 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Property Tax Rendition Deadline

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds business owners that for many property types, April 1 is the deadline to file property tax renditions with their county appraisal districts. Different deadlines apply in certain appraisal districts and for certain regulated property.

A rendition is a list of the taxable inventory, furniture and fixtures, machinery, equipment and other property owned or managed as of Jan. 1 of each year. The appraisal district may use the information to set property values.

A rendition allows property owners to record their opinion of their property's value and ensures that the appraisal district notifies property owners before changing a recorded value. Exempt property, such as church property and equipment used for farming, isn't subject to rendition.

Owners whose property was damaged by storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report, which indicates their property's condition on Jan. 1, 2019. Filing the decreased value report could lower their final tax bills for 2019.

Rendition forms and decreased value report forms are available from county appraisal district offices statewide and can be downloaded at the Comptroller's property tax forms webpage.
