It is common for him to have students in a required semester of chemistry who then change to the year-long course, and sometimes go on to do chemistry at

the university because of him. He has influenced students from Weatherford, Texas and Bozeman, Montana to Caracas, Venezuela, Stavanger, Norway, Doha, Qatar and finally, to Jakarta, Indonesia. There are probably a thousand or more people in a hundred or more countries around the world who would agree that he is a distinguished man and educator and thoroughly deserves this acknowledgement.

• John Merriss, Doshier, Perkins & Francis, LLC presented the audit for 2017-2018.

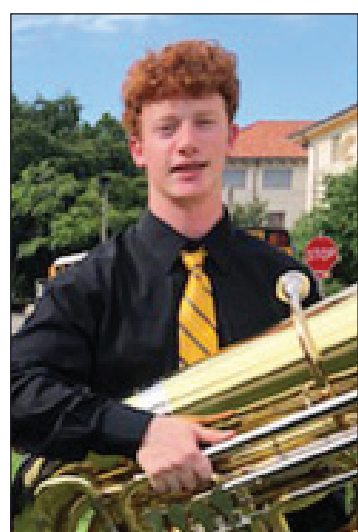
At 10:00 a.m. the court addressed the 17 items on the agenda.

Mac Means Reports on '18-'19 School Year

Editor's Note: Mac Means, recipient of one of the Ex-Student/Teacher Association scholarships for 2019 gave the following report on the 2018-19 Wheeler School Year at the reunion this past weekend.

Good morning ex-students, I hope everyone has had a wonderful time here today. I am about to present a report of all the activities and successes occurring at Wheeler High School. It feels quite odd being a member of the "ex-students" organization since I only graduated just a few weeks ago; however, I am honored to be delivering this report today.

First, I want to discuss all the success our athletic programs achieved. Football was extremely successful this year, being area champs and making it three rounds deep in the playoffs for the first time since 1999 which is 20 years ago from this fall. We also had 14 players on the all-district team. The boys cross

country team qualified for the regional meet, and the girls team had an impressive run as well. The boys basketball team was crowned district, bi-district, and area champs and advanced to the third round of playoffs losing to the state qualifying Gruver team after playing an impressive game. We had one member of the all-district basketball team, as well as 3 honorable mentions. We also had 7 academic all-district team members, one all-region academic team member, and two all-state academic team members, Angel Ontiveros and Logan Harris. The girls basketball team was the alternate to the playoffs and had an impressive amount of individual awards. Two members of the all-district basketball team, 3 honorable mentions, and 8 academic all-district team members. The boys track and field team found success as

well with 13 area qualifiers, 6 regional qualifiers, and two state qualifiers, Logan Harris and Hesston Marshall. The girls team had one regional qualifier. The boys tennis team had one regional qualifier, and both the boys and girls golf teams had an impressive run at district. Overall, the athletics here at Wheeler saw more success this year than they have in a very long time, and that is only the beginning of what Wheeler accomplished.

Next, I want to recognize our FFA organization and their many accolades this year. During LDE contests, the Greenhand Quiz team took home 3rd place, one radio team took home 1st, and our champion radio team took home 1st. This radio team advanced to the area contest to receive 2nd and qualified for state. In CDE contests, the Plant ID team placed at 4 different competitions and the wildlife team placed at one. The Range Team, Wildlife Team, and the Plant ID team all advanced to the state contest. Stockshowing was also very successful this year with 7 awards at the county show, one at San Angelo, one at San Antonio, and 3 at Houston.

Third, I want to recognize the success of our band. This year, the Pride of Wheeler mustang band received all 1st division ratings from every marching judge, and advanced to the area contest (which is regionals for every other competition). The band also received all 1st division ratings from the six concert and sight reading judges which allowed us to win a sweepstakes trophy. We were only one of two 2A bands in The Panhandle to receive a 1 from every single judge throughout the entire year. Some individual band members also found success in many different competitions. We had 28 kids make the 5-state band which is a band comprised of students from Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, and New Mexico; we had 3 kids make the SWOSU senior honor band; and we had 14 kids make the all-region band which is comprised of students from the entire Panhandle from 1A-4A. Four students qualified for the all-area band to audition for the all-state band and three of them received alternate positions. Four students also

qualified for the UIL state solo and ensemble contest in Austin, Mac Means, Nicholas Sparks, David Uribe, and Will Blackmon. They all received the highest possible rating in their divisions. Mac Means received a gold medal and Nicholas Sparks, David Uribe, and Will Blackmon received bronze medals. Furthermore, Wheeler was extremely successful in UIL Academics this year. The mathematics team won district as well as the computer science team. Two larger groups also won district and these are the journalism team which is composed of News Writing, Editorial Writing, Headline Writing, Feature Writing, and Ready Writing; and the speech team which is composed of Prose interpretation, poetry interpretation, persuasive speaking, informative speaking, and debate. We had one debate team advance to the state contest, Brady Bailey and Alex Davis and another placed as the alternate; we also had one student advance to state in prose interpretation, Mac Means. The UIL academic team won district overall thanks to these above mentioned wins and first place at the district one act play contest. We had 14 students advance to the regional UIL academic contest and three advancing to state. One act play was extremely successful this year winning district, as I said before, winning bi-district, advancing past area,

and performing at the regional one act play meet for the first time in many many years. The Wheeler one act play enjoyed receiving best actor awards, all-star cast awards, and honorable mention all-start cast awards at each contest. The technical crew also received the outstanding tech-crew award at every contest we attended.

All-in-all, this year was a tremendous success for the students at Wheeler, and I have no doubt that the students in school now will continue to push this momentum into next year. Thank you for allowing me to report on Wheeler school's activities this year, and I am proud to say that I graduated from Wheeler High School. Go Mustangs!

NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

AEP Texas Inc. (AEP Texas) publishes this notice that on May 1, 2019 AEP Texas filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) its Petition and Statement of Intent to Change Rates (the Petition), a copy of which is kept at AEP Texas' office at 400 W. 15th Street, Suite 1500, Austin, Texas, 78701. The Petition has been assigned Docket No. 49494. This notice is being published in accordance with Section 36.103 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and Commission Procedural Rule 16 Tex. Admin. Code § 22.51(a)(1).

AEP Texas currently maintains two separate divisions—the Central Division and the North Division. These divisions charge separate retail and wholesale rates. AEP Texas seeks to combine the rates of these two divisions and charge to all its customers a single combined retail or wholesale rate.

AEP Texas' Petition is based on the system-wide financial results for a 12-month test year ending on December 31, 2018, adjusted for known and measureable changes. Related to its distribution cost of service, the Company requests a rate increase of approximately \$38.3 million over its adjusted test year revenues, an increase of 4.2%. This amount is net of the Company's proposed Income Tax Refund (ITR) Rider, which refunds a total amount of \$83 million, over a four-year period, associated with changes in the corporate income tax rate resulting from the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (TCJA). The requested distribution cost of service increase without the ITR Rider is \$59.1 million, an increase of 6.5%. Related to its transmission cost of service, the Company requests a rate decrease of \$3.16 million below its adjusted test year revenues, a decrease of 0.7%, and proposes a one-time credit of \$29 million associated with the TCJA.

If approved and implemented through the Company's proposed consolidated rates for Retail Delivery Service, the impact on a residential customer in the Company's Central Division using 1,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) per month would be an increase of approximately \$4.75 or 9.8% per month. A customer with a retail plan that charges 12.5 cents per kWh would see their rate go to 12.97 cents per kWh, or a 3.8% increase in their total bill. The impact on a residential customer in the Company's North Division using 1,000 kWh per month would be a decrease of approximately \$5.01 or -10.6% per month. A customer with a retail plan that charges 12.5 cents per kWh would see their rate decrease to 12.0 cents per kWh, or a 4.0% decrease in their total bill. The extent to which these additional charges would be passed on by Retail Electric Providers (REPs) is a function of the competitive market.

The impact of the proposed combined rates for Retail Delivery Service differs for customers in the current North and Central Divisions, as shown by customer class in the chart immediately below:

AEP Texas' Petition seeks a reduction to the Company's transmission cost of service of \$3.16 million and a combined rate for the two divisions. The result of AEP Texas' proposal is to change the wholesale transmission service rate from \$4.036612/kWh for the Central Division and \$2.066591/kWh for the North Division to \$6.058035/kWh for AEP Texas combined.

In addition to new rates, AEP Texas requests a prudency determination on all capital investment made to its system for the period from June 30, 2006, through December 31, 2018.

AEP Texas' Petition also proposes to implement the ITR Rider that will be used to credit excess tax revenue resulting from the TCJA that has not yet been included in rates or refunded to customers. The total amount of income tax refund assigned to the retail delivery customers is \$83 million, to be refunded over a four-year period. AEP Texas is also proposing a one-time transmission credit of \$29 million associated with the effects of the TCJA.

AEP Texas' Petition seeks to reconcile its Advanced Metering System (AMS) deployment costs for the period from January 1, 2012 to December 31, 2018 (Reconciliation Period). Accounting for the actual costs, investment, and revenues associated with the Company's AMS deployment through the Reconciliation Period has resulted in Advanced Metering System Cost Recovery Factor Rider (AMSCRF) surcharge under-recoveries of \$30,157,739 (net of \$6,063,403 of cumulative interest expense) and \$12,923,589 (including \$283,307 of cumulative interest benefit) as of December 31, 2018, for the AEP Texas Central and North Divisions, respectively. In addition, AEP Texas proposes to eliminate the AMSCRF surcharge and roll future AMS capital expenditures and operations and maintenance costs into the base rates to be established in this case. AEP Texas will file a final AMS reconciliation to cover the time period from January 2019 through the final date the AMSCRF surcharge rider is billed prior to the implementation of new base rates from this proceeding.

AEP Texas' Petition requests Commission approval to continue its offering of facilities rental services, as described in tariff schedules 6.1.2.3.6, 6.1.3.3.6 and 6.1.4.3.6, for a period of three years commencing January 1, 2020.

AEP Texas' Petition seeks a determination that \$1,000,027 in rate case expenses incurred in prior dockets through February 2019 are reasonable for recovery. However, AEP Texas proposes to offset these rate case expenses collected with the \$302,051 over-collection that resulted from the rate case expense surcharge approved in Docket No. 34301. Therefore, AEP Texas will seek actual recovery of \$697,976. AEP Texas is not requesting approval of the mechanism for recovery of these expenses in this docket. Instead, to recover these prior expenses, AEP Texas will seek recovery through the mechanism requested in the future docket opened to address the recovery of rate case expenses incurred in this case. For rate case expenses in this case, AEP Texas has provided an estimate of such expense, but proposes that the determination of the reasonableness of such expense and their recovery be determined in a separate future proceeding.

AEP Texas is proposing revisions to most tariffs. Specifically, the Company is requesting to: (1) terminate the AMSCRF, (2) reset the baseline for the Distribution Cost Recovery Factor Rider, (3) collect all transmission expenses through the Transmission Cost Recovery Factor Rider, (4) remove energy efficiency costs from base rates to recovery through the Rider Energy Efficiency Cost Recovery Factor, and (5) continue Central Division-specific riders including the Transition Cost riders (TC2 and TC3) and the Nuclear Decommissioning Rider (NDC).

AEP Texas' Petition affects all REPs in AEP Texas' service area, as well as the retail electric customers of those REPs. The extent to which the REPs pass along to their customers the increased retail rates is a function of the competitive market. In addition, AEP Texas' Petition affects customers taking service under the Company's wholesale transmission rates.

AEP Texas has requested a June 5, 2019 effective date for its proposed rate change.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings, in Docket No. 49494, Application of AEP Texas Inc. for Authority to Change Rates, should notify the Commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. AEP Texas actualmente mantiene dos divisiones separadas: la División Central y la División Norte. Estas divisiones cobran diferentes precios minoristas y mayoristas. AEP Texas busca combinar los precios de estas dos divisiones y cobrar a todos sus clientes un precio único minorista o mayorista combinado.

La Petición de AEP Texas se basa en los resultados financieros de todo el sistema para un año de prueba de 12 meses que terminó el 31 de diciembre de 2018, ajustados a los cambios conocidos y medibles. En relación a su costo de distribución del servicio, la Compañía requiere aumentar el precio en aproximadamente \$38.3 millones con respecto a sus ingresos ajustados para el año de prueba, un aumento del 4.2%. Esta es la cantidad neta de la propuesta Cláusula Adicional del Reembolso de Impuestos Sobre la Renta (ITR, por sus siglas en inglés) para la Compañía, que le reembolsa un monto total de \$83 millones, durante un periodo de cuatro años, asociada a los cambios en la tasa de impuesto sobre la renta corporativo, resultante de la Ley de Recortes a Impuestos y Trabajos de 2017 (TCJA, por sus siglas en inglés). El requerido aumento al costo de distribución del servicio sin la Cláusula Adicional del ITR es de \$59.1 millones, un aumento del 6.5%. En referencia a su costo de transmisión del servicio, la Compañía requiere disminuir el precio en \$3.16 millones con respecto a sus ingresos ajustados para el año de prueba, una disminución del 0.7%, y propone un crédito único por \$29 millones asociado a la TCJA.

Si es aprobado e implementado el Servicio de Entrega Minorista a través de las tarifas consolidadas propuestas por la Compañía, el impacto para un cliente residencial en la División Central de la Compañía, que utilice 1,000 kilovatios-hora (kWh) al mes, sería un aumento aproximado de \$4.75 ó 9.8% al mes. Un cliente con un plan minorista que le cobre 12.5 centavos por kWh vería subir su precio a 12.97 centavos por kWh, o un aumento del 3.8% en su factura total. El impacto para un cliente residencial en la División Norte de la Compañía, que utilice 1,000 kWh al mes, sería una disminución aproximada de \$5.01 ó -10.6% al mes. Un cliente con un plan minorista que le cobre 12.5 centavos por kWh vería disminuir su precio a 12.0 centavos por kWh, o una disminución de 4.0% en su factura total. El nivel en que estos cargos adicionales sean transferidos por los Proveedores Minoristas de Electricidad (REP, por sus siglas en inglés), estará en función de la competencia del mercado.

El impacto de los propuestos precios combinados del Servicio de Entrega Minorista es diferente para los clientes en las actuales Divisiones Norte y Central, según se muestra por tipo de cliente, en la tabla que se encuentra a continuación:

La petición de AEP Texas busca una reducción en el costo de transmisión de servicio de la Compañía por \$3.16 millones y un precio combinado para las dos divisiones. El resultado de la propuesta de AEP Texas es cambiar el precio del servicio de transmisión mayorista, de \$4.036612/ kW para la División Central y \$2.066591/ kW para la División Norte, a \$6.058035/kW para el combinado de AEP Texas.

Además de los nuevos precios, AEP Texas requiere una determinación de prudencia en todas las inversiones de capital, efectuadas para su sistema en el periodo comprendido entre el 30 de junio de 2006 y el 31 de diciembre de 2018.

La Petición de AEP Texas también propone implementar la Cláusula Adicional del ITR que se utilizará para acreditar el exceso de ingresos por impuestos resultante de la TCJA, que no ha sido aún incluido en los precios o reembolsado a los clientes. El monto total del reembolso del impuesto sobre la renta asignado a los clientes de entrega minorista es de \$83 millones, que será reembolsado durante un periodo de cuatro años. AEP Texas también está proponiendo un crédito único de transmisión por \$29 millones asociado a los efectos de la TCJA.

La Petición de AEP Texas busca conciliar sus costos de implementación del Sistema de Medición Avanzada (AMS, por sus siglas en inglés) para el periodo comprendido entre el 1 de enero de 2012 y el 31 de diciembre de 2018 (Periodo de Conciliación). La contabilidad de los costos reales, la inversión y los ingresos asociados con la implementación del AMS de la Compañía durante el Periodo de Conciliación, ha dado como resultado un recargo debido a recuperaciones insuficientes de la Cláusula Adicional al Factor de Recuperación del Costo para el Sistema de Medición Avanzada (AMSCRF, por sus siglas en inglés) por \$30,157,739 (\$6,063,403 netos de gasto por intereses acumulados) y \$12,923,589 (incluyendo \$283,307 de beneficio por intereses acumulados) al 31 de diciembre de 2018, para las Divisiones Central y Norte de AEP Texas, respectivamente. Además, AEP Texas propone eliminar el recargo de la AMSCRF y transferir los futuros gastos de capital de AMS y los costos de operación y mantenimiento, a los precios base que se establecerán en este caso. AEP Texas presentará una conciliación final de AMS para cubrir el periodo de tiempo comprendido entre enero de 2019 y la fecha final en que sea facturado el recargo de la Cláusula Adicional de la AMSCRF, antes de la implementación de los nuevos precios base de este procedimiento.

La Petición de AEP Texas requiere la aprobación de la Comisión para continuar su oferta de servicios de arrendamiento de instalaciones, como se describe en las tablas de tarifas 6.1.2.3.6, 6.1.3.3.6 y 6.1.4.3.6, por un periodo de tres años a partir del 1 de enero de 2020.

La Petición de AEP Texas busca determinar que el gasto por \$1,000,027 en que se incurrió para el caso de los precios en expedientes previos hasta febrero de 2019, es razonable para recuperación. Sin embargo, AEP Texas propone compensar ese cobro del gasto para el caso de los precios, con los \$302,051 por exceso de cobro que resultó del recargo por el gasto para el caso de los precios, aprobado en el expediente No. 34301. Por lo tanto, AEP Texas buscará una recuperación real de \$697,976. AEP Texas no está requiriendo la aprobación del mecanismo para la recuperación de estos gastos en este expediente. En cambio, para recuperar estos gastos previos, AEP Texas buscará la recuperación a través del mecanismo requerido en el futuro expediente abierto con el fin de abordar la recuperación del gasto para el caso de los precios, incurrido en este caso. Respecto a los gastos para el caso de los precios en este caso, AEP Texas ha proporcionado una estimación de dicho gasto, pero propone que la determinación de la racionalidad de dicho gasto y su recuperación, sea establecida en un futuro procedimiento separado.

AEP Texas está proponiendo revisiones a la mayoría de las tarifas. Específicamente, la Compañía está requiriendo: (1) terminar con la AMSCRF, (2) restablecer la línea de base para la Cláusula Adicional al Factor de Recuperación del Costo de Distribución, (3) cobrar todos los gastos de transmisión a través de la Cláusula Adicional al Factor de Recuperación del Costo de Transmisión, (4) eliminar los costos de la eficiencia energética de los precios base para su recuperación a través del Factor de Recuperación del Costo de Eficiencia Energética de la Cláusula Adicional, y (5) continuar con las cláusulas adicionales específicas de la División Central, incluidas las cláusulas adicionales del Costo de Transición (TC2 y TC3) y la Cláusula Adicional de Desmantelamiento Nuclear (NDC, por sus siglas en inglés).

La Petición de AEP Texas afecta a todos los REP en el área de servicio de AEP Texas, así como a los clientes minoristas de electricidad de esos REP. El nivel en que los REP transfieran a sus clientes el aumento de los precios minoristas, estará en función de la competencia del mercado. Además, la Petición de AEP Texas afecta a los clientes que estén adquiriendo el servicio bajo los precios de transmisión mayoristas de la Compañía.

AEP Texas ha requerido que la fecha de entrada en vigor para su propuesta de modificación a los precios sea el 5 de junio de 2019.

Las personas que deseen intervenir o comentar sobre estos procedimientos en el Expediente No. 49494, Application of AEP Texas Inc. for Authority to Change Rates (Solicitud de AEP Texas Inc. para la Autorización de Modificación a los Precios), deberán notificarlo a la Comisión tan pronto como sea posible, ya que se impondrá una fecha límite de intervención. Un requerimiento para intervenir o para obtener más información deberá enviarse por correo a Public Utility Commission of Texas, P. O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326. from a small town. He makes it clear that Wheeler "punches above its weight" in terms of smart people and the excellent high school he attended. He always talks about his high school days and remembers his teachers and other influences from the community with huge fondness. TA has taken the very best of lessons from Wheeler and has spread them out around the world with great talent, but great humility.

TA has a fascinating history of professional achievement and career distinction. Service after teaching a few years in Texas, TA struck out for adventure in Montana. There, he organized his chemistry students to take water samples from

li+ remote streams to provide pollution data for the Environmental Protection Agency.

TA satisfied his urge to travel by accepting a teaching job in Stavanger, Norway (1996-2000). TA's Stavanger experiences outline both his educational achievements and diverse accomplishments. TA had to master IB Diploma Chemistry, A Level Chemistry and IGCSE (International General Certificate of Secondary Education) in one go while in Norway. On the artistic front, he played guitar on a recording with Norwegian blues star Bjorn Berge, and was a stalwart of the Stavanger Blues Club. To highlight the diversity of his achievements, he was also an avid hiker and mastered glacier climber and worked with youth organizations on both hikes and climbs. TA also developed his skills as a keen Telemark skier while in Norway.

TA was made an honorary member of the NHS after he transferred to Caracas, Venezuela (2000-2002) and was a regular with his band at the US Embassy and other clubs in town while he braved the serious political unrest in beautiful Venezuela. There he met the love of his life, a fellow international teacher from Great Britain, Rebecca Kinnersley.

TA was made Head of Department while teaching in

Bangladesh (2002-2004). Bangladesh is considered a hazard post but he managed it beautifully even while welcoming his first child, Ross. There were school closures for "hartals" (political strikes) and the SARS epidemic, but Tommie managed to stay positive and upbeat.

After Bangladesh, he returned to Stavanger, Norway (2004-2008) and was top of his class when he did his principal's certification at Drexel University.

TA was a brilliant principal but stood down from that hard-won position to support family when he and Rebecca adopted a young boy from China, Xiaolin.

TA's next assignment was six years in Doha, Qatar (2008 - 2014). Teaching in the Middle East was difficult, with rumors of coups and teachers getting locked up for political reasons. It was a tough culture, but he dealt with it all, maintaining high academic standards and volunteering in the community.

TA next moved his family to Jakarta, Indonesia (2014-now). He is the Head of Department for science in the extremely prestigious Jakarta International School (JIS). Recently he has begun an ambitious volunteer project with Roshan Trust. It has changed his life. Indonesia has its fair share of refugees and there are various ways for them to get a GED. He has been working with young men from Eritrea for some months now and is always blown away by what they have overcome. The Eritreans suffer from compulsory, permanent military service. Once you go in the army, you never come out again. Even though the war with Ethiopia is over, promises for change are being broken in a situation that is similar to that of Afghans trying to resist the Taliban. Families scrape together every, last penny and pick their brightest kids and try to get them out. Indonesia will educate them up to 18, but poorly, because

it's a poor nation. Once you've been a refugee in one country, you cannot claim that status in another, so often they are simply stuck in Indonesia with no money, no job. They are desperate for education and to work, but are just stuck in an awful trap. If they get a GED and apply to a college, there's a chance, a slim, desperate change, they might make it out of Indonesia on a study visa. TA has been tutoring a group of these young men.

TA's wife Bec, wrote me this about the experience: "At a dinner hosted by a colleague last week for all the students. TA was given a certificate of appreciation. They all wanted to shake his hand and thank him and get a photo with him. He came home almost flattened to the ground with humility that a few hours work a week could mean so much when so many kids take it for granted. He basically cried the whole evening. I get the feeling that once our boys are off to college and we are secure, TA might work full time for this agency."

TA has always kept his ties with Texas and either hosts or attends his Aggie Musters every year. He hosted one just a few weeks ago, entertaining thirty people he'd never met before - Indonesians, Indians, Americans and Filipinos. TA always wears his Aggie ring - he uses it to crack eggs when he's cooking his breakfast! He's got his entire family seriously into diving, which is one of the great pleasures in his life. TA is a successful educator and a successful father. He is raising good boys who often come to the panhandle and see themselves as half Texan (despite a British mom and a lifetime overseas).

Tommie Hennard reflects well on his alma mater, Wheeler High School. He definitely exemplifies the standards of career distinction and service to society and is eminently worthy of this award.
