

WHOLE NUMBER 1913

TAXABLE VALUES OF COUNTY SHOW INCREASE FOR THE YEAR

The total valuations given out by Tax Collector Jesse B. Smith for Hascell county for 1923 are in excess of last years figures. The Tax Rolls have seen sent in approved and returned for collection.

The total valuations for 1923 is \$5,805.783.00, as against \$5,675.485.00 for the year 1922, showing an icrease of \$220,298.00 in tarable values for the county.

Horses and mules in the county show an increase of 1.021 head over the rendition of last year and the cattle an increase of 2.010 head.

The State Tax due for 1923 is \$74.191.50; County Tax \$53.367.90; Special Road Tax \$15.559.28; and Disriet School Tax \$34,228.96.

The number of Poll Tax assessed for 1923 is 4.982 against 4.788 last year, making an increase of 194 poll taxes to be paid for 1923.

There is considerable increase in the number of vehicles of all kinds and more hogs are reported on the tax roll than previous years.
