The Mustangs returned to Nicholson Field on Friday night to face off against the Clarendon Broncos. The Mustangs entered the game with a 1-1 record, looking to right the ship after losing to Hamlin in Week 2. Wheeler and Clarendon have an extensive history of matchups—the teams have squared off in each of the past few seasons as well, with Wheeler losing some close games to Clarendon in the early season during non-district play. Thanks to Wyatt Adkins for setting me straight on the recent matchups with Clarendon, as I had not remembered correctly. A helpful chap, indeed.

It was a comfortable 81°, with a consistent but not overpowering south wind. Clarendon would receive the opening kickoff, with the Mustangs defending the south end zone. That meant the Broncos would be working against the wind for the first quarter, providing an advantage for the Mustang defense early. Daniel Rascon kicked the ball away and the Broncos began on their own 43 yard line. Faced with an early 4th down, the Broncos elected to go for a 1st down rather than punt, successfully converted their 4th down try. However, the Mustangs quickly put the Broncos in a hole with a tackle for loss on the next set of downs, and the Broncos couldn't recover and turned the ball over on downs. The Mustangs came out quickly with a couple of first downs in from a 17-yard pass and an 11-yard run, but were penalized a hold on a subsequent

Stangs (from Page 1) set of downs and couldn't emerge from the yardage deficit the 10-yard holding call created, and turned the ball over on downs back to the Broncos. Clarendon could get nothing going on offense and the Mustangs quickly got the ball back and capitalized on the opportunity, with Hess-ton Marshall receiving the pitch from Gustavo Andrade on a speed option play and carrying the ball into the end zone for a 47-yard Mustang touchdown and the first of what would be many touchdown carries by Marshall that night. Rascon kicked the ball through the uprights on the PAT and the score was 7-0 with a few minutes remaining in the first quarter. The next

drive saw the Mustang defense rise up and force Clarendon to turn the ball over on downs again- Clarendon didn't punt the ball at all in the first quarter, and it is quite possible the prospect of kicking into the wind made punting seem to not be worth it. The Mustangs moved the ball with success on their next drive, but fumbled the ball and Clarendon recovered. The Broncos attempted to capitalize on what they hoped would be a momentum opportunity, but the Mustangs forced yet another turnover on downs after a Bronco fake punt was unsuccessful. The Mustangs took over near midfield and methodically moved the ball down the field with their running attack, with Hess-ton Marshall ultimately carrying the ball into the end zone on a 9-yard run for his second touchdown run of the night. The PAT try was no good and the Mustangs then led 13-0. Clarendon had its best op-

portunity of the first half on the ensuing drive, set up by a 70-yard kickoff return. Hess-ton Marshall's effort saved a touchdown when he chased the Bronco ball carrier down deep in Mustang territory. Against a wall, the Mustang defense responded excellently, with a couple of tackles-for-loss that put the Broncos in a hole. Clarendon attempted a pass on 4th down but Nathan Rowley came up with an interception that gave the Mustangs the ball back with 1:11 to go before halftime. With a short time to go before halftime and a long distance to cover, the Mustangs put together their most impressive drive of the night, using a balanced and effective mix of rushing and passing, and keen situational awareness displayed by running out of bounds to stop the clock rather than allowing themselves to be tackled in bounds. The drive culminated in a 21-yard touchdown pass from

Andrade to fellow senior WR Brady Bailey. The extra point try was no good, and Clarendon could do nothing with the 18 seconds remaining before halftime, so the teams went to their locker rooms with the Mustangs leading 19-0, and the Mustangs no doubt feeling good about their hurry-up offense covering 83 yards in a mere 53 seconds on that final drive before halftime.

The Mustangs would receive the 2nd half kickoff and continued running the ball effectively, picking up several first downs. However the Mustangs were penalized for a chop block on the drive and were unable to overcome the penalty yardage. Clarendon was unable to do anything with the ball and the Broncos were forced to punt the ball away. A poor punt into the wind left the Mustangs with excellent field position and they continued to employ a pounding rushing strategy with the outcome being a 10-yard TD run by Marshall, increasing the lead to 25-0, which would be the score at the end of the 3rd quarter.

The Mustangs would put one more touchdown on the board in the 4th quarter, coming early in the quarter on another TD pass from Andrade, this time to Marshall from the 11-yard line. The Mustangs went for two following the touchdown, and #81 Joey Couch fought through tacklers to punch the ball over the goal line for two points, bringing the score to 33-0.

The Broncos were able to put together a sustained drive on their next possession and ultimately were able to run the ball into the end zone and convert the 2-point try to leave the score 33-8 with 4:48 to play. That would be the final score, as Mustang DB Gallardo intercepted a Bronco pass with 5 seconds left in the game to close it out for the Mustangs.

Shaley Goad Gets A-Am. Scholarship

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (July 8, 2019) – For the second straight year, Oklahoma Christian led the Heartland Conference with five players receiving the All-America Scholar award from the Women's Golf Coaches Association.

OC players honored included Alexandria Bennett, a freshman Math Education major from Plano, Texas; Elizabeth Freeman, a senior History/Pre-Law major from Edmond, Okla.; Shaley Goad, a sophomore Nutrition and Exercise Science major from Wheeler, Texas; Abigail Rigsby, a junior Mathematics major from Courtenay, British Columbia, and Felicity Wittenberg, a sophomore Nursing major from West Pymble, Australia.

OC's five women were among 1,097 players across all levels of college golf to receive the award. Among Heartland programs, only 18 players received the WGCA academic honor, including four from Dallas Baptist (Texas), three each from Rogers State and St. Edward's (Texas), two from St. Mary's (Texas) and one from Texas A&M International.

To qualify, players must have a cumulative grade-point average of at least 3.5, be of high moral character and of good standing at their university and have played in at least 50 percent of her team's regularly scheduled competitive rounds during the season.

Rigsby and Freeman each earned a third WGCA academic honor, while Goad and Wittenberg received the award for a second straight year.

On the course, OC finished as the Heartland runner-up, then placed fourth in the West Super Regional in Amarillo, Texas, to qualify for the NCAA Division II Championship in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla. The Eagles placed 12th nationally.

The Mustangs looked good on Friday night against the Broncos, and rectified several early-season losses to Clarendon from prior years. There were a couple of situations where the Mustangs' drives stalled as a result of penalties, but this was the best game in whole that the Mustangs have played so far this season. Without question the Mustangs' backs had the largest holes to run through that they've had thus far, and credit should be given to the Mustang offensive line for their part in the Mustangs' success on the ground against Clarendon.

The Mustangs' run defense also looked the best it has all year, making the defensive backs' jobs easier. Additionally, the Mustang JV team was suited up with the Varsity on Friday, and several of the JV players got in the game in the 4th quarter. Most of these players are freshmen, and simply suiting up and having the Varsity experience, from the locker room to the field, is an exciting opportunity for them, as the feel, sounds, and speed of Varsity games differ from those of JV games. In addition to valuable experience gained, a somewhat less obvious but possibly more important benefit of these situations is that when JV players enter a Varsity game and have success, it can be a large confidence builder for the players and provide them with a psychological boost that they can experience success at the higher level, which will lead to their expecting success, which tends toward achieving success. As in life, much of sports is a mental game,

and these "shots in the arm" (or psyche) of young players provide a benefit that can't adequately be measured. After defeating the Broncos, the Mustangs have a 2-1 record and will face the Highland Park Hornets next week at Highland Park.

Explanatory Statements for the November 5, 2019 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 72)

HJR 72 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time. Unlike an appointed municipal judge, an elected municipal judge may not concurrently hold another municipal judge office. This amendment would allow an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time, in the same manner as appointed municipal judges.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at the same time."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 79)

SJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds, in an amount that does not exceed \$200 million, for the economically distressed areas program. These bonds can only be used to provide financing for the development of water supply and sewer service projects in those economically distressed areas as defined by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas."

Proposition Number 3 (HJR 34)

HJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to temporarily exempt from ad valorem taxation a portion of certain property located in an area covered by a disaster declaration of the governor. The proposed amendment would allow the legislature to prescribe the method of determining the amount of the tax exemption and the duration of the exemption and also would allow the legislature to create any additional eligibility requirements for the tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain property damaged by a disaster."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 38)

HJR 38 proposes a constitutional amendment prohibiting the state

from imposing or collecting an individual income tax, including an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income. There is no current constitutional bar on imposing or collecting an individual income tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 24)

SJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would automatically appropriate the net revenue received from the portion of the state's tax revenue received on sales of sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and the Texas Historical Commission (THC). The legislature would maintain the authority to determine the specific uses of the funds and their allocation between TPWD and THC.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas' natural areas, water quality, and history by acquiring, managing, and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 12)

HJR 12 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase the maximum bond amount for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) from

\$3 billion to \$6 billion to be issued by the Texas Public Finance Authority. CPRIT was created in 2007 to promote and fund cancer research in Texas. CPRIT uses bond proceeds to award grants for cancer research and prevention.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount authorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 151)

HJR 151 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions from \$300 million per year to \$600 million per year to the available school fund and also allowing the State Board of Education, the General Land Office, and other entities that manage revenue from land or other properties held in the permanent school fund to distribute certain revenue to the available school fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school fund."

Proposition Number 8 (HJR 4)

HJR 4 proposes a constitutional amendment creating the flood infrastructure fund as a special fund in the state treasury, using money appropriated from the economic stabilization fund. The flood infrastructure fund would provide additional resources to implement plans to mitigate flood damage. The proposed amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to use money in the flood infrastructure fund for drainage, flood mitigation, or flood control projects. The proposed amendment also would authorize the creation of separate accounts in the flood infrastructure fund as necessary to administer the fund or authorized projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."

Proposition Number 9 (HJR 95)

HJR 95 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a property tax exemption for precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state."

Proposition Number 10 (SJR 32)

SJR 32 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow a state agency or political subdivision to transfer a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker in certain circumstances. Currently, the Texas Constitution prevents the transfer of certain public property, such as law enforcement animals, to a private person or organization at no cost. This amendment authorizes the legislature to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker at no cost, upon the animal's retirement or at another time if the transfer is determined to be in the animal's best interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances."

He was raised on the family ranch and graduated from Briscoe High School in 1960. He also served for several years in the Army National Guard. He married his best friend, Claudine Conner, on June 6, 1970 in Shamrock, Texas. They lived in Wheeler where they raised their three children, Kristi, Ike, and Roy. He was a rancher by trade but did a little farming on the side working the same land that his father and grandfather before him worked. He often helped others in the community as he had a true servant's heart. He was a man of few words but if he said it he meant it. He served the community as a member of the Wheeler ISD school board, the Wheeler County Appraisal District, and on the Board of Directors of the First State Bank of Mobeetie. He was the Wheeler County

Farmer/Rancher of the Year in 2003. He was a lifetime member of the Wheeler Church of Christ and especially loved his Sunday morning bible class. He loved to fish and hunt and often took trips with his best buddies to New Mexico and Colorado to do just that. He enjoyed a good road trip and would often never take the same path twice. He was preceded by his parents, Milton and Katie Finsterwald; his in-laws, Carl and Christine Conner; brother, Joel Finsterwald; and brother-in-law, Carl McInroe. 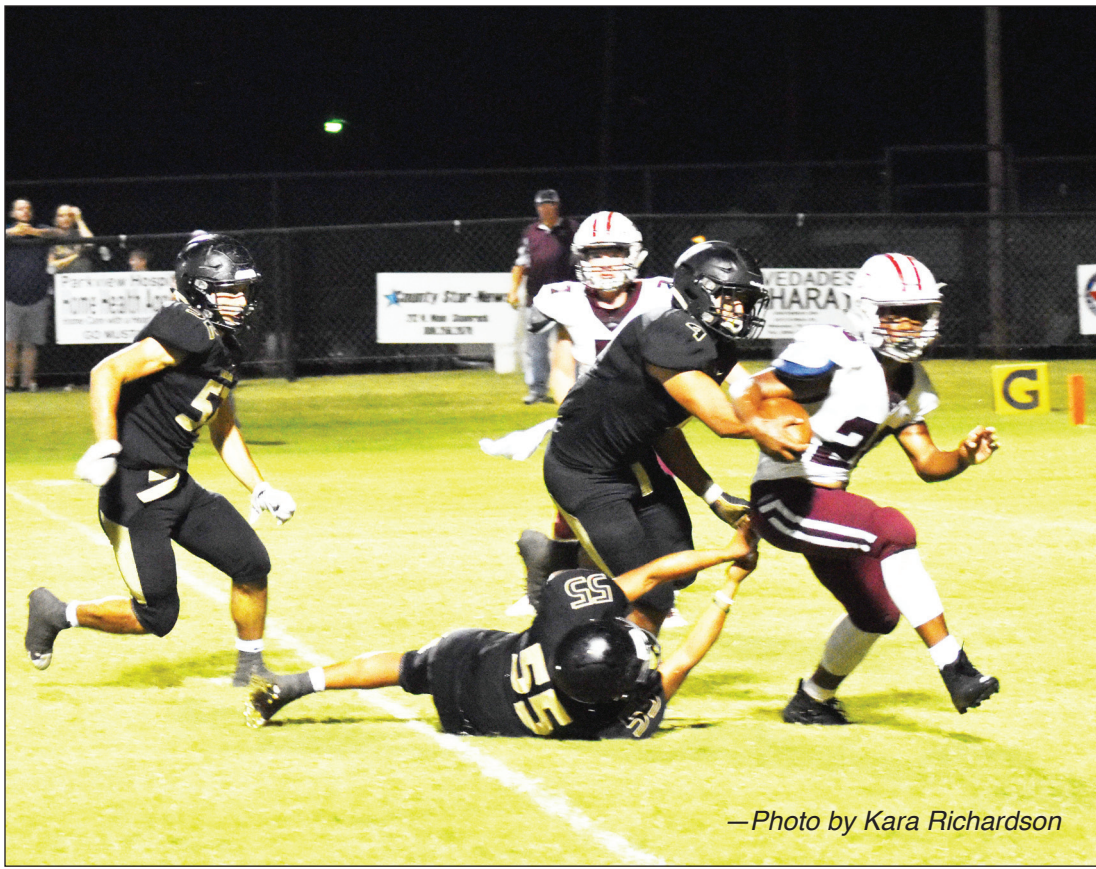

Lower Energy Costs With Help From Mother Nature

Lower energy costs with help from Mother Nature

Fall is the ideal time to plant trees and shrubs that help cool the home, reduce bills

AMARILLO, Texas (Sept. 16, 2019) – Before the memories of sweltering heat fade into shorter days and cool evenings, it's a good time to throw some shade at those

higher electric bills that summer temperatures bring about.

"We have a lot of options for reducing energy costs during times of extreme heat or cold, and one of the best is surrounding our homes and businesses with vegetation that helps keep us cool in the summer and blocks

cold winds in the winter," said Brad Baldrige, director of Customer and Community relations for Xcel Energy.

Carefully designed landscaping is one of the most cost-effective, long-term investments available to reduce energy costs, and can pay for itself in energy savings in seven to 10 years.

And the fall of the year is the best time to plant trees and shrubs that can provide shade for many hot summers to come.

Shaded surfaces may be 20 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit cooler than the peak temperatures outside of the shade. Planting the right kind of trees around homes and business-

es takes the edge off a hot day and prevents air conditioning units from cycling as often. Not only does this ease the strain on the equipment, it saves on monthly electric bills as well.

And while the grassy plains of Texas and New Mexico are

not known for an abundance of trees, certain trees and shrubs are ideally suited for the area's dry climate. Information on where to plant trees and which varieties thrive in this region can be found in the Sustainable Landscaping section of xcelenergy.com by selecting the Customer Support link and navigating to the Vegetation Management page. Among the tips customers can find are:

- Shade west walls and windows with deciduous (leaf-shedding) trees that create shade in the summer and, after leaves fall off, allow sunlight to warm the home in the winter.

- Plant vines and shrubs next to the home to create a blanket of air space that insulates outside walls in winter and summer. A trellis with climbing vines or a planter box with trailing plants can form screens that block the sun yet allow cooling breezes to flow through.

- Plant low shrubs and ground covers around the home to reduce reflection of solar heat from roads, driveways, walks, patios or water.

- Plant trees and shrubs to shade air conditioning units from the sun, helping them to run up to 10% more efficiently. Be sure branches and leaves don't restrict airflow.

Trees and shrubs should be planted 15 to 35 feet from utility lines, and never directly below overhead utility lines. Keeping utility lines free of tree growth helps to ensure customer safety, the reliability of service and could save on the cost of future tree maintenance.

And while customers are waiting for landscaping investments to pay off, they can also lower monthly bills in a variety of means that make homes and businesses more energy efficient.
