Apollo 12 Fiftieth Anniversary Approaching

Event To Honor Capt. Alan L. Bean & Apollo Mission Control
Entry Form & Reservation Information

On November 14, 1969, Apollo 12 was launched on top of a Saturn V Rocket and began its four day journey to the Moon. Aboard the small Command Module were three Navy Brothers, Charles "Pete" Conrad - Commander,

Richard Francis "Dick" Gordon - Command Module Pilot, and Lunar Module Pilot, Alan L. Bean. Seconds after launch from Pad 39A, Cape Canaveral, now Kennedy Space Center in Florida, it fell to the quick minds and bold

decisions of the young men of Mission Control to save the mission and possibly the lives of the men on board the spacecraft. After completing the second manned mission to the Lunar Surface, Apollo 12, returned safely to Earth

November 24, 1969. On Saturday, November 16, 2019 The Wheeler Historical Museum will host an all day celebration to honor Wheeler's Native Son, CAPT Alan L. Bean and the Heroes of Mission Control who made the APOLLO program successful. A stellar group will

ver Greyhounds. Gruver has been enjoying much success in recent years, and was the state runner-up last season. This would be a good test for the Mustangs before beginning district play, and the game was much-anticipated. The weather was excellent, with comfortable temperatures and a south/southeast wind which was gentle at kickoff, but would gradually increase speed as the game went on.

The Mustangs were to receive the opening kickoff and would be working from north to south, defending the north end zone in the first quarter. The kick from Gruver went through the end zone, resulting in a touchback, causing the ball to be spotted at the 25 yard line. It was suspected that the Mustangs' coaching staff would make good use of the extra week to scout and scheme against Gruver, and that was made evident on the first play from scrimmage, on which senior QB Gustavo Andrade connected with a wide-open David Rascon for a 75-yard touchdown pass to put the Mustangs on the

Oreta Graves, 87 Rites In Shamrock

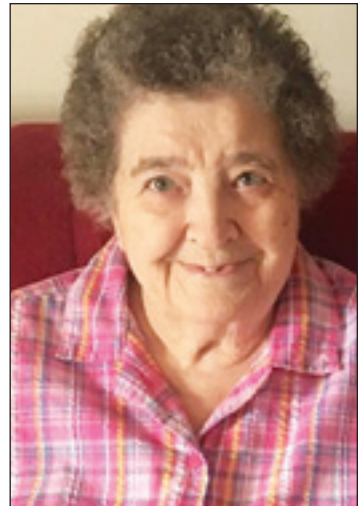
Oreta Graves, 87, of Shamrock died Wednesday October 03, 2019 in Memphis, TX.

Kelton Freshman Share Experiment

On September 24, 2019, students at Kelton ISD conducted an experiment involving the dissection of owl pellets. Each of the 9th grade chemistry students paired up with a much younger student in 1st grade. It was the 9th grade's job to be an example for the much younger kids. This included reading direc-

tions diligently and wearing the appropriate lab safety. Each 1st grader along with their 9th grade instructor was provided a list of bones that belonged to each animal and an owl pellet. From there on, the students needed to gather the right materials for the experiment and dissect the pellet using tweezers, gloves, and goggles. When examining the pellets, the kids would find multiple bones which belonged to different animals and it was the students' job to indicate which the animal each of the bones had come from. From this experiment our older and younger students got an opportunity to

learn a lot. The older students got a chance to educate the future generation and the younger students learned to the correct methods to correctly perform an experiment.

Electricity Conduction Experiment

Kelton students conducted an experiment in chemistry class this week. Nicholas Benson was in charge of the lab for the week. Nicholas wanted to test which substance would conduct more electricity. Kelton students tried three different types of substances: copper, zinc, and aluminum.

First the students gathered the materials: copper, zinc, aluminum, a beaker, mortar and pestle, activated charcoal, multimeter and saltwater solution. Second, they made sure that the copper, zinc, and the aluminum were all touching. Third, the students put a napkin and the

saltwater solution on top of the metals. Fourth, we had to crush the activated charcoal and put it on top of the napkin that has the saltwater solution. We added a little more of the saltwater solution on top of the charcoal. Fifth the student used a multimeter to measure the amount of electricity the experiment was putting out. From this the Kelton students recorded the data onto a chart.

After the students checked their data, they concluded that copper was the best conductor. This means that copper would be the best metal to use for wiring.

Gruver (from Page 1) scoreboard immediately. The PAT try was blocked and the Mustangs led 6-0 only fifteen seconds into the game. Gruver would begin their possession on their own 45 yard line and used a mixture of passing and rushing to move the ball effectively against the Mustangs, advancing all the way into the end zone for a touchdown. The two point conversion try failed and the

score was tied 6-6. The Mustangs could get nothing going on their next drive and were forced to turn the ball over to Gruver, who primarily used a rushing attack on their second drive to advance the

ball down the field and into the end zone for their second score of the game with a little more than six minutes remaining in the first quarter. This time Gruver's two-point conversion try was successful and Gruver led 14-6.

The Mustangs would begin their next drive on their own 34 yard line. Wheeler needed a score to quell the momentum Gruver had captured, and the Mustang offense quickly delivered, with Gustavo Andrade carrying the ball 66 yards on a quarterback keeper for a Mustang touchdown to close the gap on the scoreboard. The two-point conversion attempt failed and the score was then 14-12 in favor of Gruver. Bolstered by the counterpunch the Mustang offense had just delivered to the Greyhounds, the Mustang defense got their first stop of the game during the ensuing Greyhound possession, with a tackle-for-loss and a sack helping to force a three-and-out and causing the Greyhounds to punt for the first time of the night. The Mustangs' next drive was plagued by penalties and the Mustangs were unable to keep the momentum going on offense and had to punt the ball away to the Greyhounds. Gruver would begin on their own 38 yard line and quickly picked up a couple of first downs, at which point the Mustang defense stiffened up by forcing a couple of incompletions, followed by a big sack on 3rd down by senior defensive linemen #58 Paden Markham and #65 Alex Davis to force Gruver to punt. The next two possessions would see the teams trade punts, with the Mustangs regaining possession on their own 31 yard line about midway through the second quarter. On this drive the Mustangs would keep the ball on the ground, effectively marching down the field against the Greyhound defense, with five minute drive culminating in a 25-yard touchdown carry by Andrade. The Mustangs' two-point try failed but they had regained the lead, 18-14, with 2:15 remaining in the half. Again the Mustang defense

put a stop to the Greyhounds on the following possession and the Mustangs got the ball back on their own 30 yard line with little time remaining on the clock. In need of a big play due to the shortage of time, the Mustangs connected on a 55-yard pass play, but it was called back due to a penalty. That didn't stop the Mustangs from moving the ball effectively, with a 35-yard run followed by a 25-yard run right before halftime, during which junior RB Hesston Marshall made every cut imaginable on the protracted play, trying to punch the ball into the end zone and aided by some good downfield & perimeter blocking by the Mustang receivers. Ultimately he was not able to get past the last Greyhound defender and was stopped short of the goal line, but the drive was not without effect- the Mustangs, already in possession of some momentum since regaining the lead, delivered a message to the Greyhounds that they could move the ball against the Greyhounds and that Gruver could expect more of the same in the second half. The Mustangs went into the locker room leading a surprised Greyhound team, 18-14, and clearly fired up- the whooping and hollering could be heard from the bleachers.

The Mustangs would kick off to begin the second half, and the Mustang defense picked up where it had left off and forced the Greyhounds to punt. The Mustang offense picked up a first down but the drive stalled and the Mustangs were forced to punt. The Mustangs' punt try was hampered by a low snap and the Greyhounds took over in excellent field position, on the Mustang 41 yard line. Again the Mustang defense came up big, preventing Gruver from gaining any yardage and forcing the Greyhounds to punt. The Mustangs got



the ball back on their own 20 and lost yardage on their first play of the drive, but that loss was negated on the next play, during which Hesston Marshall carried the ball and cut upfield through a hole his linemen had created, got free in the open, and raced to the end zone on an 86-yard touchdown run. Daniel Rascon's PAT kick was good and the Mustangs extended their lead, 25-14 with 4:31 remaining in the 3rd quarter. The Mustang defense would come up big on the next drive again, forcing Gruver into a 3rd & 4, where defensive lineman Diego Pichardo narrowly missed sacking the Gruver quarterback, who threw the ball away. The Mustangs took over on the Greyhound 25 yard line and immediately capitalized on the excellent field position, with Andrade carrying the ball into the end zone aided by excellent blocking by the Mustang offensive line, particularly #58 Paden Markham and #55 Marcos Herrera on this play. The Mustangs' two-point try failed and the Mustangs led 31-14, which would be the score at the end of the 3rd quarter.

The Greyhounds had the ball to begin the 4th quarter and for the first time in the second half began to move it effectively against the Mustangs, ultimately running it into the end zone and converting the two-point try to shrink the Mustangs' lead to 31-22. The Mustangs desired a score on their next drive to put a stop to any momentum Gruver hoped to attain, and moved the ball near the Greyhound 20 yard line, where it appeared the drive was in danger of stalling, but The Mustangs were able to deliver on a big play where Marshall found #4 Baldemar Gallardo on a 27-yard touchdown pass with 4:57 remaining in the game. The Mustangs' two-point try failed and the score was then 37-22.

At this point the game quickly got very tense- Gruver began their drive on their own 30 yard line and connected on a 70-yard pass TD to quickly strike back. Their two-point try was good and Gruver drew within seven, 37-30. The Mustangs were unable to move the ball on their next drive and had to punt it back to Gruver. The drive was not without effect though, as Gruver burned through the remainder of their timeouts while the Mustangs had the ball. Following a Mustang punt the Greyhounds would regain the ball on their own 34 yard line, with the Mustangs leading by 7 with 3:10 remaining in the game. Gruver ran an exclusively passing offense on this possession, picking up a couple of first downs and then a big pass play to advance the ball uncomfortably deep in Mustang territory. Gruver moved the ball down to the Mustang 10 yard line where the Greyhounds had a first & goal to go. In desperate need of a stop and with their back to the wall, the Mustang defense rose to the occasion with some crucial pass deflections in the end zone on first and second down by Gustavo Andrade and Baldemar Gallardo, setting up a nery 3rd & goal, which saw Gruver attempt a pass over the middle to a receiver in the end zone, but Mustang sophomore DB Jovany Gallardo jumped and snagged the ball

out of the air to intercept the pass with 18 seconds remaining in the game, ending the Greyhounds' chances. It is not possible to praise the Mustang goal line defense enough on that possession, or to overstate the excitement felt by the entire Mustang bleachers when Gallardo put a dramatic end to the drive on that interception. Out of timeouts, the Greyhounds could not stop the clock and Andrade knelt the ball down on the next play, ending the game, with the final score Wheeler 37, Gruver 30.

The Mustangs deserve much credit for the way they played against Gruver. Gruver was expected to be a challenging opponent, being the state runner-up last season. The Greyhounds have a large, athletic quarterback who is capable of extending plays and who has a powerful throwing arm. The Mustangs kept him under control with a strong pass rush throughout most of the game, and, more importantly, by swarming pursuit from the entire Mustang defense. Without question this game was the best game the Mustangs have had this season in terms of defensive intensity and pursuit. Many times a Mustang defender would pressure the quarterback who would then run away from the pressure or sometimes try to reverse field. Many of these times when he reversed he ran into another Mustang defender who was able to corral him. The Mustangs were relentless in pursuing the ball carrier all the way until the whistle blew to end the plays. Defensive pursuit was crucial to the Mustangs' ability to keep the Greyhound offense in check, and is a critical component to any successful defense. Additionally, the Mustangs were clearly prepared for the Greyhounds and were able to answer the Greyhounds, especially when they needed it most. Credit should be given to the coaching staff for getting the Mustangs ready to play and face this tough opponent, and the Mustang players deserve much credit as well for the way they prepared and executed the game plan on Friday. Games like this can help teams develop their identity and can cause them to jell as a unit. 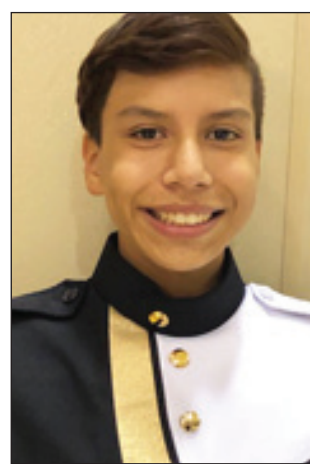

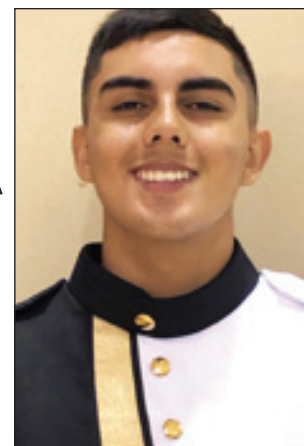
