MUSTANGS HANDLE INDIANS, 48-6

The Wheeler Mustangs traveled to Quanah last week, playing on the road for the second consecutive week, to face the Quanah Indians in district play. The Mustangs carried their six game win streak to Quanah, looking to continue their winning ways. The temperature was mild, around 50° at kickoff, but a strong north wind made it feel chilly, which turned to cold as the game went on. The Mustangs won the coin toss and

elected to receive the opening kickoff and had the further advantage of having their wind at their backs during the first quarter. A short kick gave the Mustangs excellent field position at the Quanah 41. For the first time in many weeks, the Mustangs failed to score on their opening possession, with Quanah's defense forcing the Mustangs into a 4th down which the Mustangs failed to convert, turning the

ball over to the Indians. Quanah picked up a first down on their possession before turning the ball back over to the Mustangs, who moved the

Quanah then had the ball at their own 4 yard line and on their first play of the possession, Daniel Rascon broke into the Quanah backfield and sacked the quarterback in the end zone for a safety, giving the Mustangs a 2-0 lead. Another short Quanah kick into the wind gave the Mustangs excellent field position at the Quanah 37, but again the Quanah defense forced the

Mustangs into another 4th down. This time, however, the Mustangs converted the 4th down with QB Gustavo Andrade breaking free on a 33-yard touchdown run with 11 seconds remaining in the

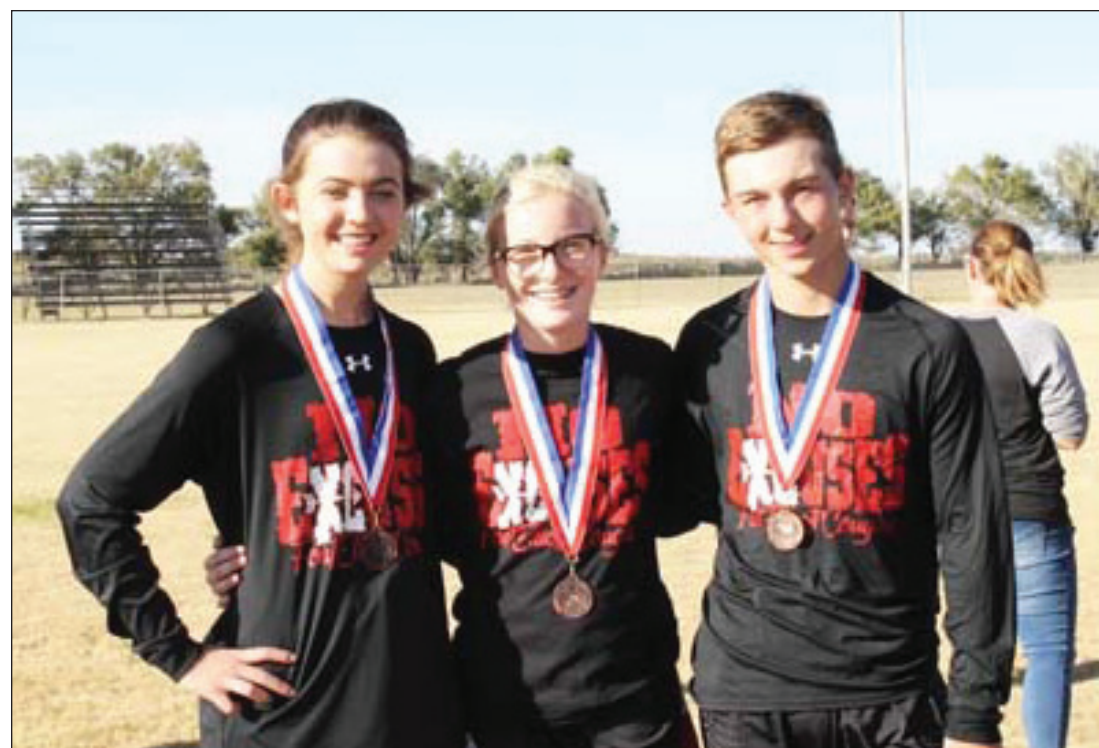

Apollo 12 Fiftieth Anniversary Approaching

Event To Honor Capt. Alan L. Bean & Apollo Mission Control

Dinner Tickets and Medals Limited

(UPDATED)

On November 14, 1969, Apollo 12 was launched on top of a Saturn V Rocket and began its four day journey to the Moon. Aboard the small Command Module were three "Navy Brothers", Charles

"Pete" Conrad - Commander, Richard Francis "Dick" Gordon - Command Module Pilot, and Lunar Module Pilot, Alan L. Bean. Seconds after launch from Pad 39A, Cape Canaveral, now Kennedy Space Center in Florida, it fell

to the quick minds and bold decisions of the young men of Mission Control to save the mission. John Aaron, born near Wellington, Texas, sent the initial instructions to the Apollo crew. On board, only Alan Bean, born in Wheeler, Texas, knew what to do. After completing the second

manned mission to the Lunar Surface, Apollo 12, returned safely to Earth November 24, 1969.

On Saturday, November 16, 2019 The Wheeler Historical Museum will host an all day celebration to honor Wheeler's Native Son, CAPT Alan L. Bean and the Heroes of Mis-

sion Control who made the APOLLO program successful. A stellar group will join the activities beginning with the

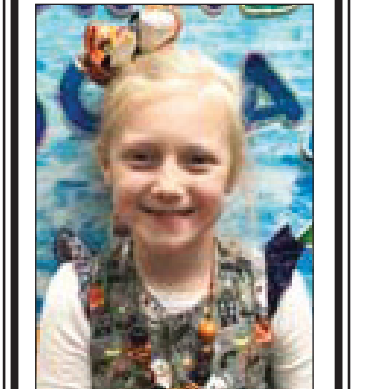

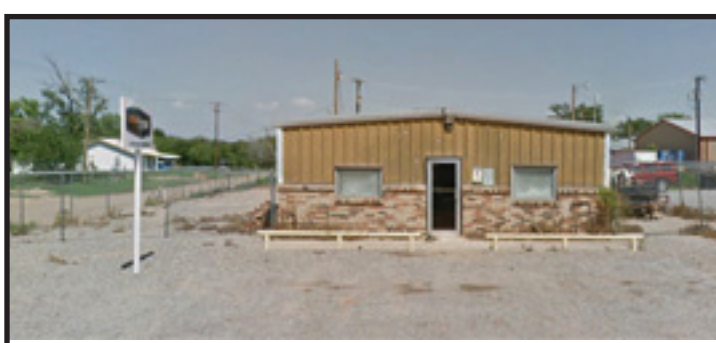
I can't wait for Friday night. The Mustangs will play the Wellington Skyrockets at home. Go Mustangs! That's it!

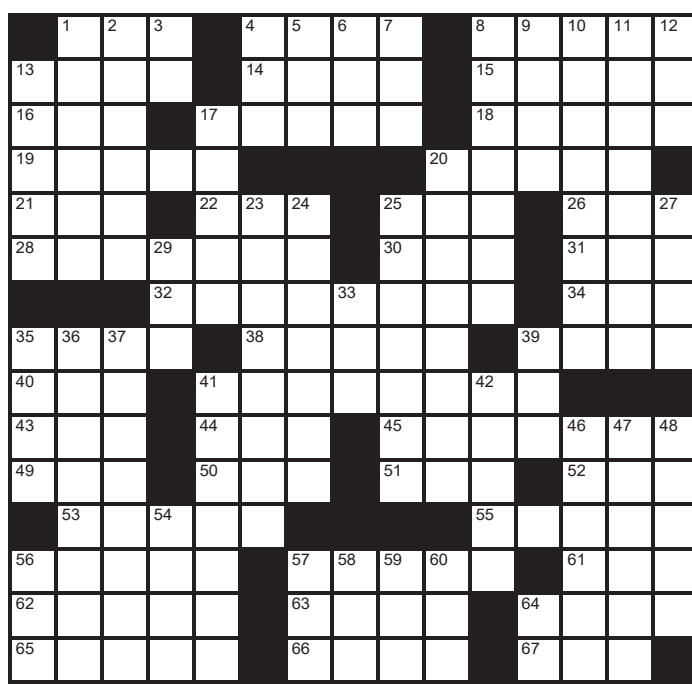

Vaccines Do Not Cause Autism

But Physicians Fight to Reassure, Immunize

The bottom line: Vaccines do not cause autism. Despite claims to the contrary, more than 25 scientific stud-

ies conducted over decades show no connection between the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine (or any other vaccine) and the neurological condition. However, phy-

sicians seeking to immunize patients to reduce the threat of a major measles outbreak fight an uphill battle against the debunked myth about vaccines and autism.

Physicians repeat it over

and over: Vaccines like the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine do not cause autism; they are safe and effective. Yet the decades-old false claim that vaccines do cause autism has convinced millions of parents not to give their children potentially lifesaving shots and could lead more to opt out, according to Texas physicians.

"There is no connection that we can find between vaccines and autism," said Jennifer Shuford, MD, infectious disease medical officer for the Texas Department of State Health Services. "There's been a lot of research that has looked at this question, because we want to make sure that something we are recommending for an entire population is not causing devastating health consequences."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends the MMR vaccine to protect children against measles, mumps, and rubella. Texas, however, is one of 16 states that permits exemptions based on philosophical beliefs, not only on medical reasons, from the vaccines required to enter school. Despite dozens of scientific studies showing no link between MMR and autism, antivaccine advocates have repeated the claim that a link exists, contributing to the spike in unvaccinated children since the exemption went into effect in 2003.

The MMR vaccine is a well-documented defense against infectious diseases including measles, reports the Texas Medical Association's (TMA's) Texas Medicine magazine. However, in 1998, British then-gastroenterologist Andrew Wakefield, MD, coauthored a study published in The Lancet claiming to have found a link between MMR and autism. The British Medical Journal later called Dr. Wakefield's report an "elaborate fraud," and The Lancet retracted the paper. It found Dr. Wakefield had skewed his research results, abused the children he was studying, and hid his financial reasons for the report. TM

first quarter to bring the score to 8-0.

The second quarter began with the Mustang defense forcing a 3-and-out punt by the Indians, which Mustang punt returner Andrade fielded at the Mustang 35 yard line and made his way through several narrow openings to advance the ball across mid-field and near the Quanah sideline, with Andrade paralleling it as if walking a tight-rope, somehow managing to stay in bounds in the midst of traffic, before cutting back toward the center of the field and scoring a touchdown on the 65-yard punt return to bring the score to 14-0. On the next Quanah possession the game was disrupted by a dispute between the Quanah coach and the officials- it appeared to fans of both teams that all through the game the officials missed several calls and had been inconsistent in their rulings, causing frustration on both sides, and frankly giving the appearance that the officials didn't have control of the ballgame. This frustration came to a head when a dispute between the Quanah coach and the referee led to the Indians' coach being ejected from the game. It appeared that a Quanah Indian was facemasked in the process of being tackled and the officials missed the call. The Indians' coach was livid and came on to the field to express displeasure with the referee face-to-face in close quarters. This went on for several seconds and the referee ejected the coach, who continued to speak his mind to the referee. The manner in which the coach went about it was excessive and inappropriate, but in my opinion his response to the missed call was respectable insofar as he was trying to stand up for his players when he likely felt the officials were not. This is relevant because if player-safety penalties such as facemasks, chop blocks, horsecollars, etc. are not enforced it jeopardizes the safety of players on both teams. I have heard that some say the coach made contact with the referee during the events but from my viewpoint he did not. In any case, the whole episode took several minutes and disrupted the flow and changed the feel of the game. The Mustangs did a nice job taking control of the outcome from there- the next Mustang possession saw Andrade connect with Jayton couch on a 24-yard touchdown pass. The PAT kick by #51 Gustavo Olivas was good and the Mustangs led 21-0 midway through the second quarter. The Mustang defense forced a punt from Quanah on the next Indian possession and the Mustangs quickly picked up about 55 yards before adding another score on a 27-yard touchdown by David Rascon, which with the 2-point conversion left the score 29-0 at halftime.

The second half went by more quickly than the first half did. On Quanah's opening drive of the half, the Quanah running back was bobbling the ball when Hesston Marshall stripped it from the Quanah ball carrier in the Indian backfield and carried it into the end zone for a Mustang defensive touchdown to increase the lead to 35-0. Then on the ensuing Mustang kickoff, Quanah fumbled the ball and Nathan Rowley recovered it for the Mustangs at the Quanah 33 yard line. Two plays later David Rascon broke loose on a 30-yard touchdown run to bring the score to 41-0. Another 3-and-out and punt into the wind by Quanah gave the Mustangs the ball back at the Quanah 46 and from there Hesston Marshall carried the ball into

the end zone for another Mustang touchdown. Olivas' PAT kick was good, leaving the score 48-0 at the end of the 3rd quarter.

The 4th quarter saw both teams' offenses chew up most of the remainder of the clock and trade turnover-on-downs possessions. The Mustangs got the opportunity to work some of the young players into the game for experience. Quanah got its lone score of the game late in the 4th quarter- the Mustangs were preparing to punt from deep in their own territory when the snap sailed over the head of Andrade, who chased the ball backward toward the goal line but was unable to recover the ball, with Quanah falling on it in the Mustang end zone for a touchdown and leaving the final score 48-6.

Overall the game at Quanah seemed sloppy at times, but the Mustangs did a good job keeping their heads in the game and overcoming the frustration and tension caused by inconsistent officiating. But no one was injured in the game and the Mustangs got their win, to set up a showdown with the Wellington Skyrocks this week for the district championship. The Mustangs were in this same position of playing for the district championship last year going into the game against Wellington but lost to the Skyrocks and are undoubtedly looking to make up for last year's defeat. The district championship will be Friday, November 8 at 7pm at Nicholson Field in Wheeler. Let's do it, Mustangs.

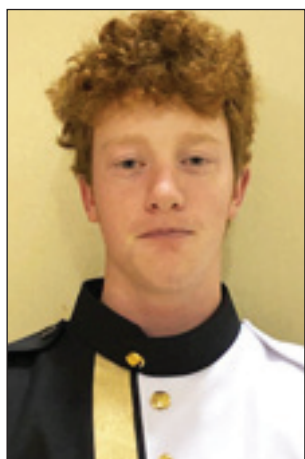

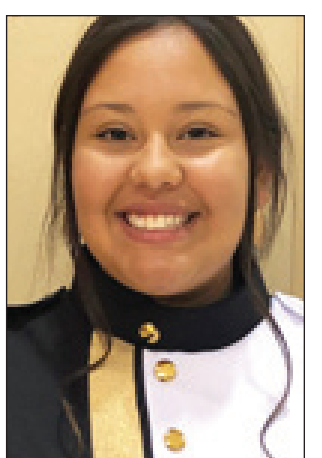
