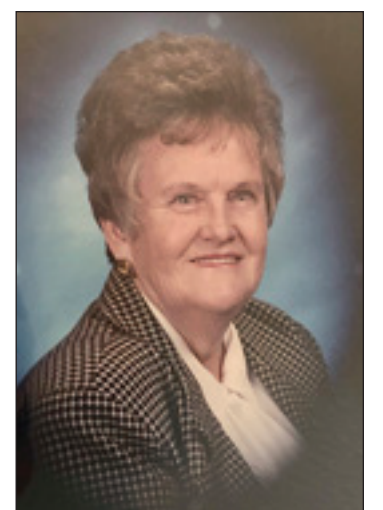
## Joyce Ford Perkins Services Dec. 5

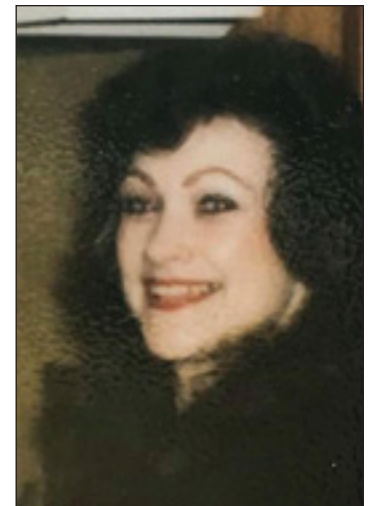

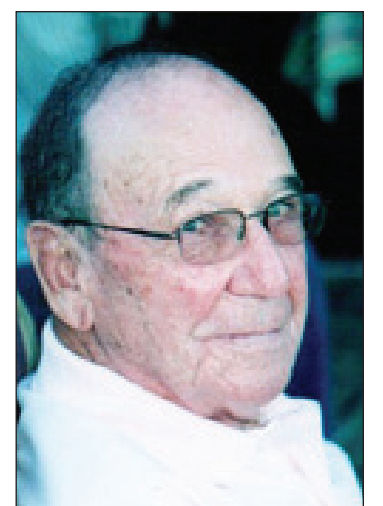
## Richard ‘Dick’ Hefley Services Dec. 10

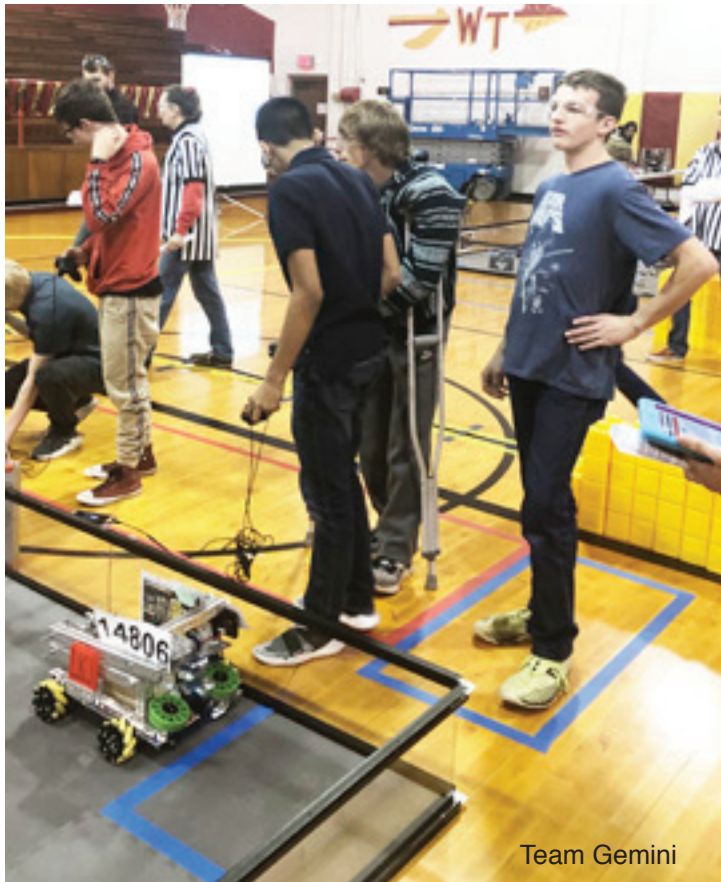
Team 16799 Robotic Wookies is participating in their

After attending this contest, the students have received an experience they will never forget. The students have learned important character traits like cooperation, hard work, and passion for what



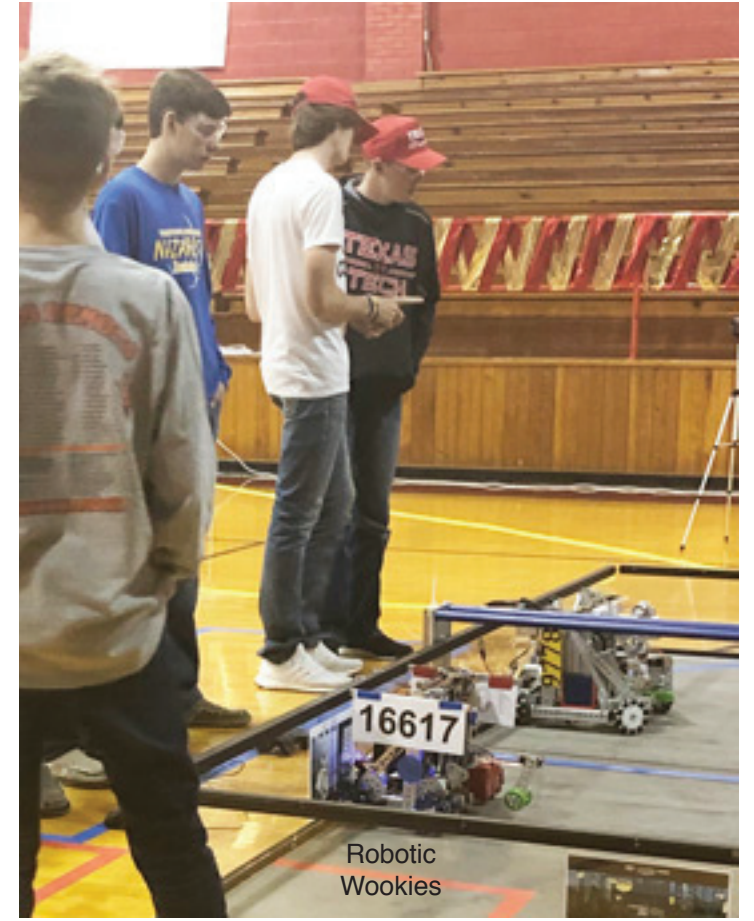

## November State Sales Tax Revenue

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.18 billion in November, 6.2 percent more than in November 2018.

"November state sales tax growth was led by collections from the wholesale trade, construction and restaurant sectors, while collections from

the oil and gas mining sector declined since last year," Hegar said. "Texas realized an increase in the state's sales tax revenue collections from remote sellers and online marketplace providers, pursuant to new collection requirements resulting from the implementation of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision, Wayfair v. South Dakota, and passage of House Bill 1525 during the 86th Texas Legislature."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in November 2019 was up 4.8 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

In November 2019, Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes:

motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$422.3 million, up 4.2 percent from November 2018;

motor fuel taxes — \$327.3 million, up 5.1 percent from November 2018;

natural gas production taxes — \$119.6 million, down 33.1 percent from November 2018; and

oil production taxes — \$344.4 million, down 1.8 percent from November 2018.

## Kelton Class Visits Local Metallurgist

Chemistry students at Kelton ISD visited a well-known metallurgist in the area. He taught the students the fundamentals of shaping metal and even informed them of the chemistry involved in the complex world of metallurgy. Metallurgy is a branch of science that is concerned with the properties, production, and purification of different types of metals from a variety of ores.

Students enrolled in Mr. Herndon's chemistry class traveled to the workshop of a well-known metallurgist named Josh Bryant. He briefed them with a quick video on safety in the workshop and the students quickly began absorbing the knowledge that was presented to them. He first introduced them to the basics of metallurgy through

a video that explained what happened as different types of materials are heated and how the chemical reactions take place. As soon as the video was over, Mr. Bryant introduced the students to the different grades of metals and how different factors influence the finished products. Before the students arrived, he preheated some high-carbon steel in one of his designated metal ovens. He removed the metals with extreme precision and accuracy and let them cool. Mr. Bryant then explained the different ways metals can be cooled such as air cooling, submerging in oil, and dipping in coffee. Finally, he showed all the students his array of knives that he made over the years.

Many of them glistened in the light and were satisfying to observe. He dipped some in oil so the students could see traces of carbon in different parts of the metal and noted how the metal was an alloy, or in some cases, a heterogeneous mixture.

From this experience, our students learned a lot about a concept some of them had never even heard of. They were taught the principles and chemistry behind the intricate art of metallurgy. The students hope to use this knowledge in their chemistry class and will implement it in the future. It is another great day and Kelton ISD where kids are striving to learn things and explore new branches of knowledge. GO LIONS!!!
