Improvements Underway At Britt Field

By Wheeler Sports Assoc.
As many of you are aware, the Wheeler Sports Association and the Wheeler Lions Club are working together to improve the playing fields and facilities at Tom Britt Memorial Park, a Lions Club property. A notice was released announcing that we have been awarded grant money by the Bivins Foundation (through the Amarillo Area Foundation). The grant money is to be used in providing electricity and lighting to the baseball/softball fields. They will match every dollar we raise up to \$37,500, which could result in a grand total of \$75,000 between our funds and theirs. Through the incredible generosity of members of our community, we have already received donations totaling \$35,000 of our \$37,500 goal.

We are now asking for donations for the other expenses

associated with the project. Although electricity and lighting represent the largest expenses by far, there are other expenses to be taken into consideration, such as

dirtwork, fencing, new dugouts, and establishing grass in the outfields, to name a few. The \$75,000 can not be used for purposes other than electricity and lighting, as per

the terms of the grant.

If you would like to donate financially, please make checks payable to the Tom Britt Memorial Park account under the Wheeler Area Ac-

tivities and Improvements Council (you may abbreviate it WAAIC). The check can be dropped off at Charles Kuntz's office or mailed to PO Box 489 in Wheeler.

We understand that it is difficult to try to fundraise in the middle of a historic pandemic in which many members of our community may have been furloughed, laid off, or struggling to find work. However, that very situation could also provide us with an abundance of manpower and volunteers to help the project reach completion more quickly. Even if you are unable to donate financially, but would like to donate your time and labor, that would be welcomed also.


It is also important to inform the public of an outline of the project plan, time frame, costs, and phases. Improvements on the baseball/softball

fields have been discussed for several years now. The ideas and plans have changed and evolved over time for one reason or another due to a lack of funding, manpower, and/or inopportune timing. We

So, movement. It is what it sounds like – the human body is designed to move. It is quite an intricate and elaborate structure, but amazingly durable and resilient. Its effectiveness and lack of required maintenance causes us to overlook its magnificence, like a car that just works and doesn't give trouble until it really is in trouble. But if you think about it, it is obvious we are designed to move. A problem is our lifestyle discourages movement, in a way, by virtue of so many mechanized devices that make our lives easier by

This is a cop-out, as the reality is we all have time for whatever our greatest priorities are. But there is a real temptation to think that I lack the time to engage in movement. Part of this is my subconsciously not wanting to go through whatever degree of discomfort I would encounter in movement, because there is always effort and discomfort in moving. If that were not so, the machines that move for us would probably have never been invented, much less sold. But the other part is feeling like there isn't adequate time to do anything worthwhile. I won't discuss the factors that may have led to a deprivation of time, other than to merely mention that often for me I would have had more time if I had managed my time and commitments better, but to one degree or

another there is often a reality of lacking time to do a full-on "workout", and many times this has stopped me from doing anything at all.

And that is a false dichotomy which I wish to expose – just because I may lack the time (for whatever reason) to do a full-length workout does not mean that I can do nothing. There is always ample time to do something. I have recently become convinced of the benefit of doing some movement activity for even as little as five minutes. Five minutes is sufficiently long to enable you to do something that will increase your pulse and respiration, making your heart and lungs more capable and efficient. I believe five minutes can be enough to stimulate a release of the neurotransmitters dopamine and serotonin, which affect mood and motivation, among other things. And most importantly, five minutes is enough time to start a habit of movement, or keep such a habit ingrained. It is too easy to shrug off the opportunity to move because there isn't sufficient time to complete the optimal, planned session, but that doesn't help us move down the road at all. Instead, why not do something brief, keep your habit in place (or start, or restart it), and try to make the time for the planned session the following day?

Whatever the case, the point is to find something you enjoy that involves movement, and do it, even in small portions, which have potential to become recurring patterns. A final point I would make is that for me, if I am able to complete this as one of the very first things I do in a day, I am better off than if I waited until a later time in the day. For one thing, it gets it out of the way early, and even if the rest of the day goes off the rails, I will still have gotten done what I need to. But the magic of it is that it also helps me stay on the path for the remainder of the day (or at least further in to the day than if I

didn't move in the morning), which protects against the day going haywire at all.

I am reticent to sound preachy and I hope that is not how this comes off, although to the extent being exceedingly verbose tends to be an attribute of preachers, I admit

believe that we now have a solid plan, funding, availability of manpower, and the COVID-19 pandemic presents us with a unique opportunity to get a head start on the project.

The plan involves reorienting the baseball/softball fields, or "flipping" them, so as for the home plates to be more centrally located within the park complex, radiating outward from the center. The west field will be expanded to 312 feet to be regulation size in order to accommodate the possibility of hosting high school baseball, while the east field will be 250 feet to accommodate Little League baseball and softball. Both fields will also be used for adult co-ed softball. In the process of flipping the fields, larger and better dugouts will be built, there will be an alley-



way between the fields, lighting will be improved, and the outfields will be sprigged with bermudagrass and greatly improved over the existing ones.

A rough estimate of the different phases of construction can be found below. It is not the final or all-inclusive plan, just a rough outline.

Phase One
Estimated Time Frame: 4-8 weeks

Take down all existing fences

Dirtwork to level both fields and prepare the surface

Set home plate and field dimensions, both fields

Set new poles and lights, both fields (if possible)

Phase Two
Estimated Time Frame:

4-8 weeks

Sprig bermudagrass in both outfields

Construct dugouts, both fields

Put fence up around both fields

Set up scoreboards, both fields

Phase Three
Begin construction on press boxes, both fields

Begin construction on centrally located concession stand/restrooms

UPDATES:

Last weekend (May 8th-10th), all of the fences were disassembled and moved off to prepare the fields for dirtwork. Dirtwork is expected to take place over the next several weeks.




