

**W.I.S.D. Offers Learning Opportunities**

We will move forward with a 3-Tier System approach that is based on # of positive cases in and around Wheeler County prior to the 4th to de-

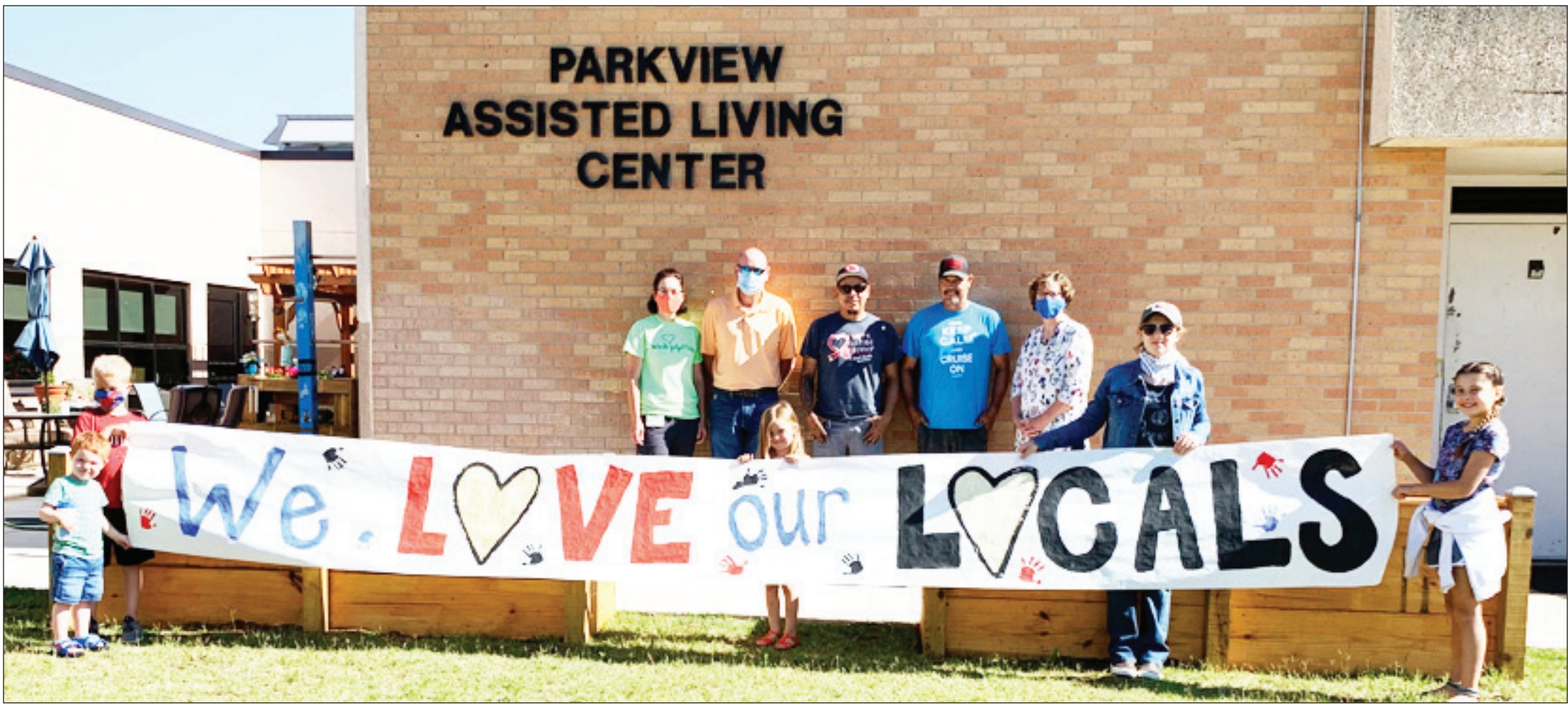
termine which tier we will follow. As of now, we have the following activities planned with respect to guidelines and suggestions of our leaders.

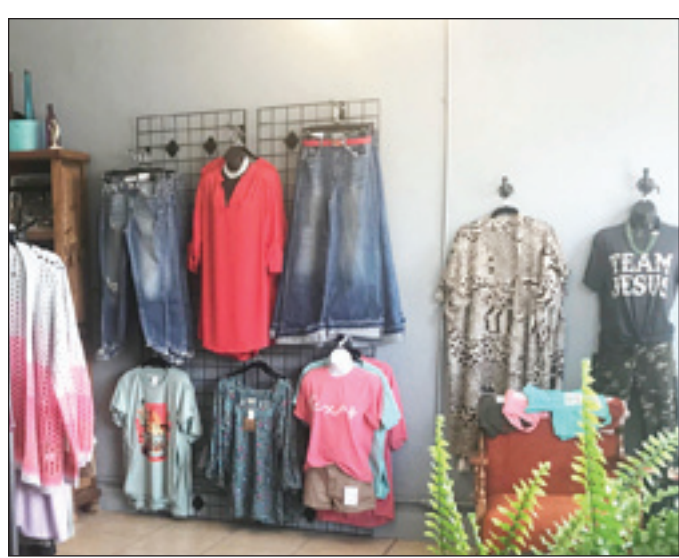

**Merely** (from Page 1) busyness did not include writing. The busyness may have been a result of mismanagement on my part, and omitting writing from my plans may well have been a mistake, but it is not surprising that it happened; it is not the first time I have made such a mistake. In fact, it is an interesting phenomenon that often the things we cull from our lives and schedules are the things that produce joy and verve, or, to use a phrase that isn't quite derived from both of those words (verve being the deal breaker there), but which could appear to be, the things that lead to our experience of joie de vivre. Why do we cut these activities? Essentially, I suspect it is because we have deemed them, or allowed others to deem them, unimportant, insignificant, or superfluous in a way, or at least, expendable. I believe this is a fairly large mistake that arises from the "get more done" undercurrent that pervades our society and our lives. I am not an historian (and I hope you don't fault me for using the word "an" prior to "historian"; though here we tend to pronounce the "h" in the word "history", I am merely trying to emulate English gentleman who was a far better thinker and writer than I), but my theory is that the "get more done" philosophy could have originated from, or be a carry-over of the Industrial Revolution. That concept may have worked well for the Industrial Revolution (although that depends from which perspective the question is examined), but it does not work so well for humans who are not machines, and need things like down time, rest, rejuvenation, play, joy, and other hard-to-describe intangible things that machines don't require, in order to continue to perform at a good level, or simply to get anything done.

But that is a matter for another day. Today I intended to write about margin. Off the top of my head (and I hope you will pardon me for not putting a higher level of thought into this column than that, although a strong argument could be made that the top of the head is about as apically dominant a position as can exist for a human), margin seems to be something that would be good to have, regardless of what category to which it applies. I feel the need to clarify that sentence since it did not come out as well as I would have liked, but what I mean is that maintaining some degree of margin is good in a variety of areas. It is nice to have margin with respect to time, to allow for unexpected delays, or simply to be free from the anxiety that accompanies a very tight schedule. Margin is helpful with respect to money, for obvious reasons. It is also nice to have some margin related to sleep (which could be considered a sub-category of time, since it is basically time allotted or spent for the specific purpose of sleeping). I also tend to believe margin would be nice in the spiritual realm, but I don't think I have put sufficient thought into that particular question, and spiritual truths seem to frequently be the opposite of what appears to be true using human reasoning. That said, I would prefer my spiritual status to possess some margin, and not be on 'redline', to borrow a word from the mechanic realm. In fact, redline is a good metaphor to illustrate the concept altogether - living life without sufficient margin is like running an engine with the tachometer in the red. You can do it for a while, but you had better not do it for long, or you will be in for a disappointing wakeup call, figuratively. Which reminds me of something pertinent to the here and now - I have an early wakeup call literally tomorrow, and I think if I hope to maintain or improve any measure of sleep margin,

I had better conclude this than I expected, and some piece and make the requisite thing altogether unplanned preparations to do so. After all, things may take longer could arise as well.

U.S.D.A. (from Page 1) cal industry weather the current pandemic so they can continue to plant and harvest a safe, nutritious, and affordable crop for the American people," said Secretary Perdue. "We have tools and resources available to help producers understand the program and enable them to work with Farm Service Agency staff to complete applications as smoothly and efficiently as possible and get payments into the pockets of our patriotic farmers."

In the first six days of the application period, FSA has already made payments to more than 35,000 producers. Out of the gate, the top five states for CFAP payments are Illinois, Kansas, Wisconsin, Nebraska, and South Dakota. USDA has released data on application progress and program payments and will release further updates each Monday at 2:00pm ET. The report can be viewed at farmers.gov/cfap.

FSA will accept applications through August 28, 2020. Through CFAP, USDA is making available \$16 billion in financial assistance to producers of agricultural commodities who have suffered a five-percent-or-greater price decline due to COVID-19 and face additional significant marketing costs as a result of lower demand, surplus production, and disruptions to shipping patterns and the orderly marketing of commodities.

In order to do this, producers will receive 80 percent of their maximum total payment upon approval of the application. The remaining portion of the payment, not to exceed the payment limit, will be paid at a later date nationwide, as funds remain available.

Getting Help from FSA New customers seeking one-on-one support with the CFAP application process can call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a USDA employee ready to offer general assistance. This is a recommended first step before a producer engages the team at the FSA county office at their local USDA Service Center.

Producers can download the CFAP application and other eligibility forms from farmers.gov/cfap. Also, on that webpage, producers can find a payment calculator to help producers identify sales and inventory records needed to apply and calculate potential payments. Producers self-certify their records when applying for CFAP and that documentation is not submitted with the application.

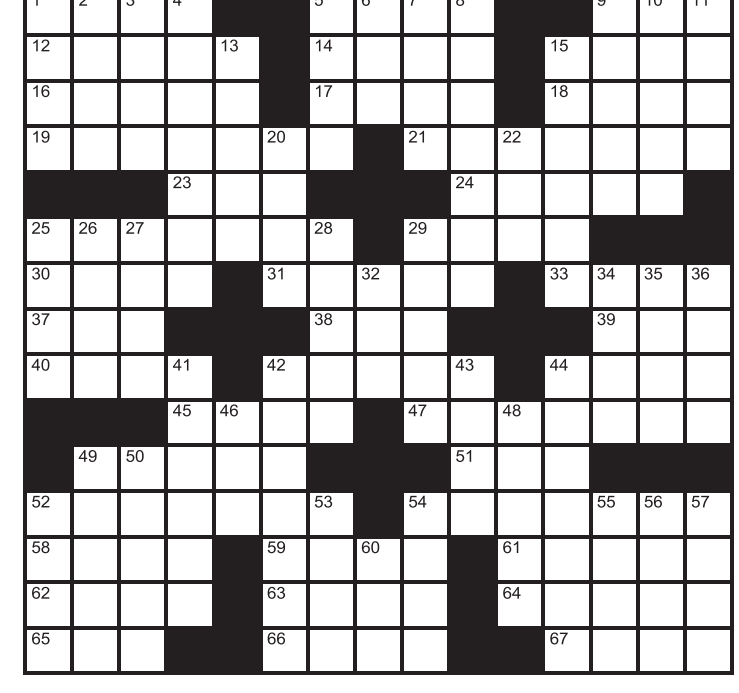
