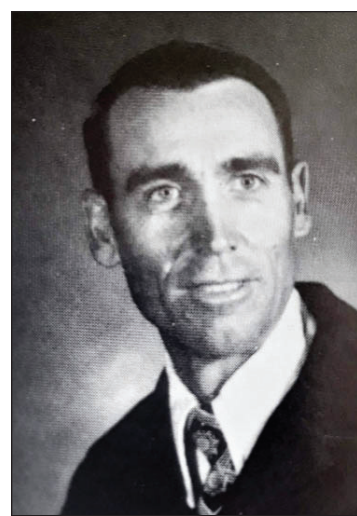

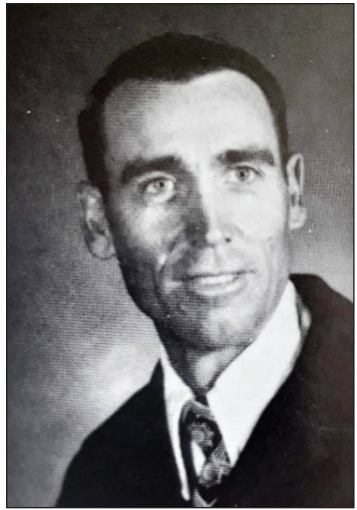

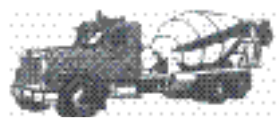

## TAKE A STAND WITH AN ARROW TO HONOR QUANAH PARKER SEPTEMBER 19

WHAT: Quanah Parker Day in the Texas Plains Trail Region

WHEN: Sat., Sept 12, 2020  
WHERE: Communities with Quanah Parker Trail giant arrow markers

TEXAS PLAINS TRAIL REGION — Quanah Parker Trail arrows will stand a little taller on Saturday, Sept. 12 — Quanah Parker Day in Texas. The statewide observance, which Texas Governor Greg Abbott decreed for the second Saturday of each September, commemorates the life of Comanche Chief Quanah Parker. In the Texas Plains Trail Region, one of the ten regions designated as part of the Texas Heritage Trails Program of the Texas Historical Commission, volunteer leaders launched a Quanah Parker Trail project in 2010, which has organized some regional events and avenues for participating in the statewide recognition.

About the Quanah Parker Trail

Every Texas student passing through 4th and 7th grade by now has learned the story of Quanah Parker; his mother Cynthia Ann Parker, who was kidnapped as a child and raised among the Comanches; and their lives as Texas Indians. The Comanches were called "Lords of the Southern Plains" owing to their superb horsemanship and prowess in hunting bison from horseback.

In the Texas Plains Trail Region (TPTR), we encourage you to honor Quanah Parker Day by paying a visit to a nearby steel arrow sculpture that marks a county's inclusion on the Quanah Parker Trail (QPT). Take a stand with Quanah Parker and the arrow. Share your photos with us on social media and be sure to tell your family and friends about your adventure.

Please share your selfie with your local newspaper by emailing before NOON on Monday, September 14th to The Wheeler Times—wtimes@windstream.net. Please give names and which of the three Wheeler County Arrows that is in your photo.

The QPT placed within the TPTR is conceptual in nature. Counties of the TPTR installed 88 steel arrows created by sculptor welder Charles A. Smith (1943–2018), to commemorate their inclusion in the Comancheria, the territorial range of the Comanches in the 19th century. The trail is named for Quanah Parker, as he is considered as the most renowned Indian leader who frequented this area.

The heart of the story is this: Every county's land within TPTR was once part of the territory of the Comanches, known as the Comancheria.

More about Quanah Parker and the Comanches

And the other part of the story this: At one time or another, Quanah crossed the lands where we live now. As a warrior, Quanah rode with the Kwahada division of the Comanche tribe. The Kwahada made their home on the southern High Plains of the Llano Estacado and as well traversed the Rolling Plains of Texas in the late 19th century. Under Quanah's leadership, the Kwahada remained the last Comanche holdouts who resisted the U.S. military's effort to force all Indians to move onto reservations.

After the Comanches moved to the reservation in Indian Territory by the end of 1875, Quanah continued as a leader, helping them adjust to a different way of life. He was appointed as a Comanche chief by Indian agents of the federal government. Quanah coordinated cultural and political activities felt to be necessary to aid the Comanche people in adapting to the challenges of modernism in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. In this capacity, he continued to travel through-

our region, by mule-drawn wagon, touring car, and train. He became a celebrity, and as a much sought-after representative of frontier history, in the TPTR alone he attended a funeral in Dalhart, addressed a crowd in Matador, attended a celebration in the town of Quanah named for him, and visited ranchers Samuel Burk Burnett in Guthrie and Charles Goodnight near Claude.

# Enrollment Open for Texas Tuition Promise Fund®

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds families that open enrollment in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund®, the state's prepaid college tuition program, began Sept. 1 and runs through Feb. 28, 2021. The Texas Tuition Promise Fund offers parents and loved ones the chance to prepay a child's future higher education at Texas public colleges and universities at today's prices, excluding medical and dental institutions.

"With everything that's going on right now, thinking about how to pay for college may not be at the top of many parents' minds," Hegar said. "Yet one day it will be time to enroll your loved one in a college or university, and a Texas Tuition Promise Fund account is an additional tool to help save for your children's future education."

Participants in the plan purchase prepaid "tuition units" that can be used later toward undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at most Texas public colleges and universities, excluding medical and dental institutions. Prices are based on 2020-21 academic year costs for the state's public colleges and universities.

Type I units, priced for undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at the most expensive eligible Texas public four-year university or college, cost \$151.64

Type II units, based on the weighted average cost of undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees across eligible Texas public four-year universities and colleges, cost \$108.35 per unit.

Type III units, based on the weighted average cost of in-district tuition and schoolwide required fees across eligible Texas public two-year community colleges, cost \$28.81 per unit.

Under the plan, 100 units equal roughly one academic year consisting of 30 semester hours of undergraduate resident tuition and schoolwide required fees at the eligible Texas public school that most closely matches the unit's pricing base. Participants can purchase up to 600 Type I units — approximately six academic years — or the dollar equivalent of Type II or III units.

The plan's flexible payment options include lump-sum payments, installment payments that include 6 percent

interest or a pay-as-you-go option that allows participants to gradually add more units as the family budget allows. Enrollment requires payment of a one-time application fee of \$25 and the purchase of at least one tuition unit of any type. Texas residency requirements apply. Future payments can be as low as \$15 if a pay-as-you-go account is established. An online calculator provides pricing estimates on the type and number of units currently needed for any eligible Texas public college or university.

you God?" to abide by definite opinions to something as subjective as interpretation of symbolic literature.

But that is an emotional reason for disliking introductions; there are practical ones as well. First, too often the writers of introductions prematurely reveal things about the book, spoiling certain aspects of the book, before it is even begun. Reading one is akin to reading a movie critic's summary of a movie, plot and character analysis and all, before watching the movie and making those determinations yourself, or at least not knowing in advance what is going to happen. The second practical reason I dislike introductions is that they are simply too long and too much effort to read. It is challenging enough to stick with a book long enough to complete it. Let's face it — many books simply aren't good enough to warrant the audience staying hooked. So if the effort level required to read a book is already great enough; why compound it by trying to read an attachment to the book that is: a) of questionable accuracy and pertinence; b) generally dry as a plaster print; and c) exceedingly and unnecessarily verbose? Is it not discouraging to hold a 900-page book, and also have the task of reading a 10-page introduction that isn't as well-written as the book itself? And is it not also discouraging when the pages are lowercase Roman numerals, and you don't get the satisfaction of chipping away at the total page count of the book until after you have made it from page iii to xvi?

So I tend to not read introductions to books that I read. There are exceptions to this — not too long ago I read a novel which came out around 40 years ago (can something 40 years old really be called a novel?), and the introduction happened to be written by the author of the book. It was not part of the original novel, but was written as a sort of retrospect some time after the novel achieved commercial success. I enjoyed the novel and was curious to learn the author's additional thoughts, or

background information that could not have been known by only reading the book. So I read the introduction, but not until after I had finished the book. It turned out to be a much better experience that way — otherwise plot and character details would have been spoiled by the introduction before I ever got to the meat of the book. It seems to be a good strategy to me — if I finish a book, and the book was compelling enough that I want to stay with it a few minutes longer, I may then read the introduction last, treating it more as an afterword, which is something you don't see much of anymore. For books that I finish that are marginal, I may not read the introduction, as the book barely justified itself. And for books that I abandon before finishing, the introduction gets dismissed by default. However, I do recognize that just reinforces the beliefs and prejudices I have about introductions. Perhaps to give them a fair shake I should check the introduction of those books I have determined to not be worth the time it takes to read them, and see if the introduction reveals as much. If I ever came across an introduction for such a book that read, "This isn't worth your time," my entire argument would be upended. Come to think of it, that could be a fitting introduction for this piece. And, true to my argument (or at least my practice), I now make such introduction as the piece concludes.

## Texas Comptroller Announces Revenue, August State Sales Tax

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today released totals for fiscal 2020 state revenues, in addition to announcing monthly state revenues for August.

General Revenue-related revenue for fiscal 2020 totaled \$56.98 billion, down 1.5 percent from fiscal 2019.

All Funds tax collections were \$57.38 billion, down 3.4 percent from fiscal 2019.

Sales tax revenue was \$34.10 billion, up 0.2 percent over fiscal 2019.

Motor vehicle sales and rental tax revenue was \$4.8 billion, down 3.9 percent from fiscal 2019.

Franchise tax revenue was \$4.42 billion, up 4.8 percent over fiscal 2019.

Oil production tax revenue was \$3.23 billion, down 16.9 percent from fiscal 2019.

Natural gas production tax revenue was \$925 million, down 45.1 percent from fiscal 2019.

All Funds revenue was \$141.58 billion, up 10.7 percent over fiscal 2019, primarily due to substantial increases in federal funding for pandemic-related assistance.

"Yearly revenues were slightly ahead of our projections in the revised Certification Revenue Estimate (CRE) released in July," Hegar said. "This was, in part, due to surprisingly strong July sales tax collections as Texans' spending for home improvement projects increased while they spent more time at home both for teleworking and staycations, in lieu of leisure travel. "Those July gains, however, were largely reversed in August, bringing actual collections closer to, but still ahead of, our estimate."

The Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF) and State Highway Fund (SHF) both receive funding from oil and natural gas severance taxes. In November, the Comptroller's office will deposit \$1.13 billion in each of those funds, down from the \$1.67 billion deposited in each fund in November 2019.

Hegar also said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.82 billion in August, 5.6 percent less than in August 2019.

The majority of August sales tax revenue is based on sales made in July and remitted to the agency in August. Rising COVID-19 infection rates in July likely suppressed economic activity.

"State sales tax collections from all major sectors other than retail trade declined significantly from year ago levels, with the largest declines in the oil- and gas-related sectors," Hegar said. "Collections from retail trade were up, as increased consumer spending on home improvements, home entertainment, distance learning and outdoor recreation in response to the COVID-19 pandemic spurred higher remittances from building materials, home furnishing, electronics and appliance, and sporting goods retailers. Retail trade tax collections were also boosted by online out-of-state vendors and marketplace providers who did not have tax collection obligations a year ago. Tax remittances from the information sector were depressed, as federal law in July began prohibiting sales taxation of internet service.

"Consumer spending was supported in July by enhanced federal benefits, which have since been reduced or expired. Consequently, further declines in sales tax revenue may ensue in the coming months."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in August 2020 was down 2.7 percent compared to the same

period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 59 percent of all tax collections. The effects of the economic slowdown and low oil prices also were evident in other sources of revenue in August 2020.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes in August:

motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$468 million, down 4 percent from August 2019;

motor fuel taxes — \$287 million, down 12 percent from August 2019;

oil production tax — \$219 million, down 39 percent from August 2019;

natural gas production

tax — negative \$15 million, down 115 percent from August 2019, due to substantial refund payments during the month;

hotel occupancy tax — \$31 million, down 49 percent from August 2019; and

alcoholic beverage taxes — \$69 million, down 39 percent from August 2019.
