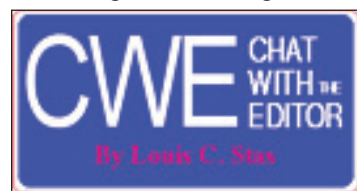

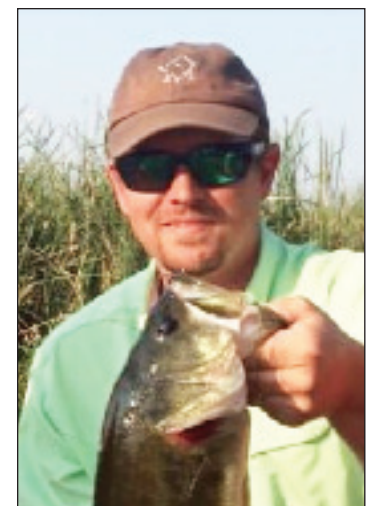

# Merely Mustard

Last week I continued the topic of how our lives are interconnected, and recounted the phenomenon of needing help, describing the occasions where there was none to offer help except the people who we believed were our adversaries, and how those events often can change the status of these individuals, transforming them from adversaries into, if not friends, at least ones toward whom we wish no ill, and who we remember gratefully for their intervention. I suggested these encounters sometimes gave the appearance of having been arranged. What I mean is I tend to view these

situations as sort of divinely arranged, where in my time of need I had to accept help from those individuals against whom I held some animosity in my heart. It is the concept of karma at work.

I am not educated in the official meaning of the term karma (if there is an official meaning - being a religious term there are probably a multitude of meanings of the word, and the adherents of each perspective probably fight, or at least argue with, each other over which is true and correct, not to mention which meaning is "official"), but I tend to believe in the concept on a basic level. I

have heard some say that karma demands that if you accidentally step on a bug, you will have to make up for it. I do not believe that, so that is not what I am referring to when I mention karma. I view it more like a divine balance, where if one does good, or at least tries to do good, or at least intends to do good, good will redound to the individual, whereas, if one does bad, or tries to do bad, or intends to do bad, that will redound to the individual in a negative way. Some people call this "the universe" sorting things out. That seems a bit new age and needlessly esoteric for me to assent to; nonetheless

I have spoken to too many people who have too much life experience and who believe that things tend to shake out favorably or negatively based on one's actions and/or intentions, to discredit the concept of karma.

The simple description of karma is "what goes around comes around." I believed this in my youth and then gave rein to a cynicism that stated the balance was a zero-sum arrangement, and if one did good, it was offset by another doing a commensurate amount of bad, and the do-gooder was not enhanced or otherwise assisted

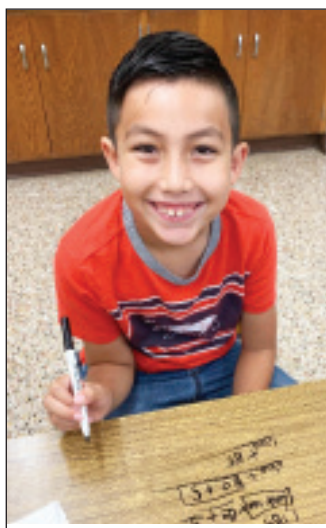

**Merely** (from Page 1) by doing good (other than the inherent benefit of doing the right things for the right reasons, but that is sometimes an insufficient reward for the doer of deeds, and besides, it is another topic I do not wish to explore here, especially after having already criticized being needlessly esoteric). But if karma is a return of good for good, and ill for ill, what I am suggesting is a bit more. Because I was tying it to the phenomenon of having to deal with an adversary from a compromised position, and even having to rely on an adversary for assistance. I believe these encounters are sometimes divinely arranged, because if left to ourselves we might not ever get over ourselves enough to allow a change of heart toward those adversaries. Think about it – how many times has it been that the person you run in to is the last person you want to see, or the person you had some quarrel with or otherwise just dislike (I recognize this can read as though those are different individuals, which they can be, but they can also be three different ways to describe the same individual.)? Perhaps that is God trying to tell you some-

thing. Perhaps that is karma helping level things out. Perhaps those are opportunities, which purposely fell into your lap, to go beyond yourself and take the initiative of being kind, or at least open to kindness, surprise, or some other unexpected re-assessment of the situation. Or, if you are as dense as I, you could refuse to view things this way and carry on with a grudge. I've been there. A word of caution though: you may wind up on the side of the road some winter night with a flat tire.

Afterword: I didn't intend for this piece to take this shape today, but it did. And I am feeling at risk of having gotten preachy, which I do not desire at all. First, there are far too many words here to be effective preaching. Preachers have maybe a couple hundred words to get it done before they run the risk of losing their audience's attention, not to mention their audience's consciousness (ever wonder why churches often offer coffee after the services?). But mainly I don't wish to suggest I am learned in these

matters, or that I abide by my own suggestions. In fact, my writing can be interpreted as speaking to myself in the second person point of view, as though the wiser me were trying to give the real me advice and perspective. Regardless, a summary of my thoughts over the past three columns can be expressed as follows:

Despite our independence, and our striving to attain self-reliance, we inevitably rely on others from time to time, and much of our life is reliant on others we never realize or encounter. But sometimes we find ourselves relying on those toward whom we feel animosity or harbor a grudge, and their assisting us out of the bind(s) we were in can cause a lasting change of heart toward those people, for the better. It has led me to conclude: a) some of these encounters, though apparently inconvenient at the time, are for our good, and, b) they often seem divinely arranged; c) some call this phenomenon karma; and d) Paul Simon was wrong about his being an island.

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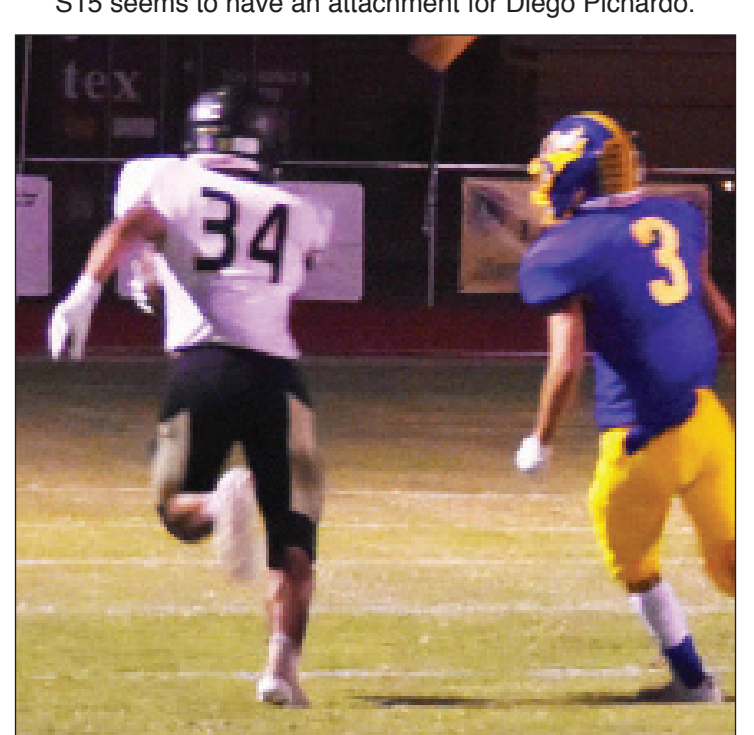
