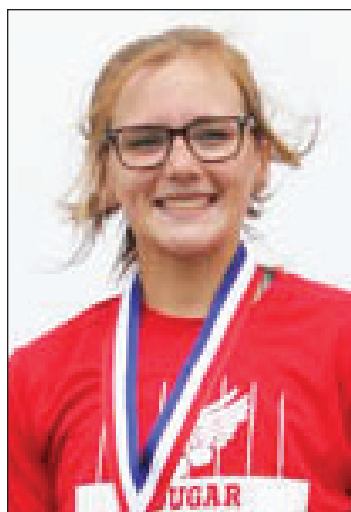

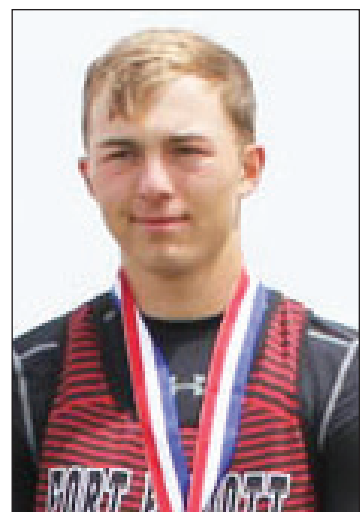

Fort Elliott C.I.S.D. Bond Proposal

This is the last in a series of articles concerning the proposed \$3 million bond election. Early voting will end on Tuesday, April 27 at 4:00 p.m.

at the Administration Building at Ft. Elliott CISD. Election day is Saturday, May 1 at the new gym foyer from 7:00 a.m. till 7:00 p.m.

This week I will respond to a few questions that are perti-

nent to this election.

Q: How does the passage of the bond benefit FECISD students?

A: By keeping more dollars in Ft. Elliott here locally the students and staff will ben-

efit by having more revenue to provide updated technology, improved facilities, and needed supplies to improve instruction. That means that 100% of each tax dollar raised to repay the bond will stay in Ft. Elliott to benefit students.

Q: Will the passage of the bond issue raise taxes?

A: The passage of the bond issue will not raise the current

Last week I set out to explore the theme of the resurrection of hope, in the midst of doubt and difficulty. I attempted to explain my belief, which is both shared by and has been influenced by others, that the culture's message to each individual is that we don't matter all that much, and can't effectively change our situations to a meaningful degree, or realize the dreams which have been planted within us. For anyone who would doubt that this is what the culture communicates, I would ask: who do you think spends more money, the person who is satisfied or the person who is dissatisfied?

The objective of marketing is to create a state of dissatisfaction which will provoke us to separate ourselves from our money in search of a salve from this dissatisfaction, and then the process is repeated as many times as possible.

Blt is an effective play-book, but it hinges upon a lie. It hinges upon creating a psychological state where the individual believes that he or she is wholly deficient and cannot hope for progress or elevation unless they hand their resources to another. Of course we all have our deficiencies; moreover, we all have the potential to

upgrade our tools, the items we use in our daily lives, etc.

(from Page 1) Some of this "gear" is even essential for realizing one's dreams, and the acquisition of such tools is not what I am describing. Rather, I am describing the general dissatisfaction that is peddled quite effectively, that confiscates our money, attention, time, and hope. Still doubt me? Turn on the next newscast and see if the broadcast is intended for your joy or for your dissatisfaction.

Unfortunately, I don't have the answer to the dilemma of programmed dissatisfaction, but I do believe it is worth shedding light on it, as it flows

through our society like an invisible undercurrent, sucking us into its vortex without our ever knowing, until we are spinning frantically, seeing the same things over and over again, becoming dizzy, and all of this at an ever-increasing pace. The point of my message is to try to revive the sense of hope, the sense of dream and vision, in the midst of this undercurrent. Each individual has been blessed with some gift or another. Perhaps we all have seen visions or had dreams of using those gifts. The culture and the events of life often cause us to discard those dreams and to put our gifts

back in our pockets, or to bury them. What I think we ought to do is to rediscover them. There are no age restrictions or limitations to this, and there are no qualifications other than an effort to keep the flame of hope alive. Just doing that will enable one to take some step, however small, toward the dream. One step often leads to another, and this is true whether the path is a good one or not. Therefore why not take a small step on the path of hope and the path of your dreams and your gifts? The alternative is to walk in the path of someone else's dreams for you, which involves their acquisition of your time, money, creativity, attention, and hope. The flame of hope will need to be tended and occasionally rekindled as it is buffeted by the storms of life, but I encourage you to do so anytime it is needed, and pursue that path of hope. It is an act of defiance against the mega-corporations, the computer banks, and the powerful elites who appear to rule the world, or at least its purse strings, and who want us to be as useful as possible to them. It is a modern declaration of independence against targeted marketing and the undercurrent of despair and personal insufficiency. It is carrying a flag, even if threadbare, and bearing it proudly in the face of all challenges and opposition, in the face of the puppet masters; a flag that signifies personal sufficiency and independence of thought; a flag that, as long as it flies, represents the sacred gift of freedom, and points to the entity of immeasurable value; a flag bears an expression that says: I.

Elliott has saved over \$90 million by using 100% dollars in bond proceeds to pay for capital expenses rather than M&O dollars. Of every M&O dollar Ft. Elliott only

keeps 25 cents to use locally. Q: How has previous bond revenues been used? A: Previous bond money has been used to upgrade technology, facility improvements, playground equipment, new security system, auditorium upgrades, replace buses, new roofs, new energy efficient windows, and general maintenance of facilities. Britt Field's \$200,000 Goal

The Wheeler Sports Association and the Wheeler Lions Club are working together to improve the playing fields and facilities at the Tom Britt Memorial Park, a Lions Club property.

5th Annual Clean-Up Day, April 30

There is something for everyone of all ages. We are tackling Clean-up a little different this year as we will be focusing on the weekend of Friday, April 30th (Wheeler ISD is out of school) through Sunday, May 2nd. If you are willing and able to do a project, but not during that time frame, let us know.

Here are a few of the projects we would like to see completed:

We always can use equipment like dump trailers, skid steers, trailers, and chain saws as there are several places around town that still need tree limbs/branches removed.

We also are looking for a sandblaster that would be willing to prime the (4) state signs that are located along our 4 highways into town. Once they are sandblasted, we can have them repainted.

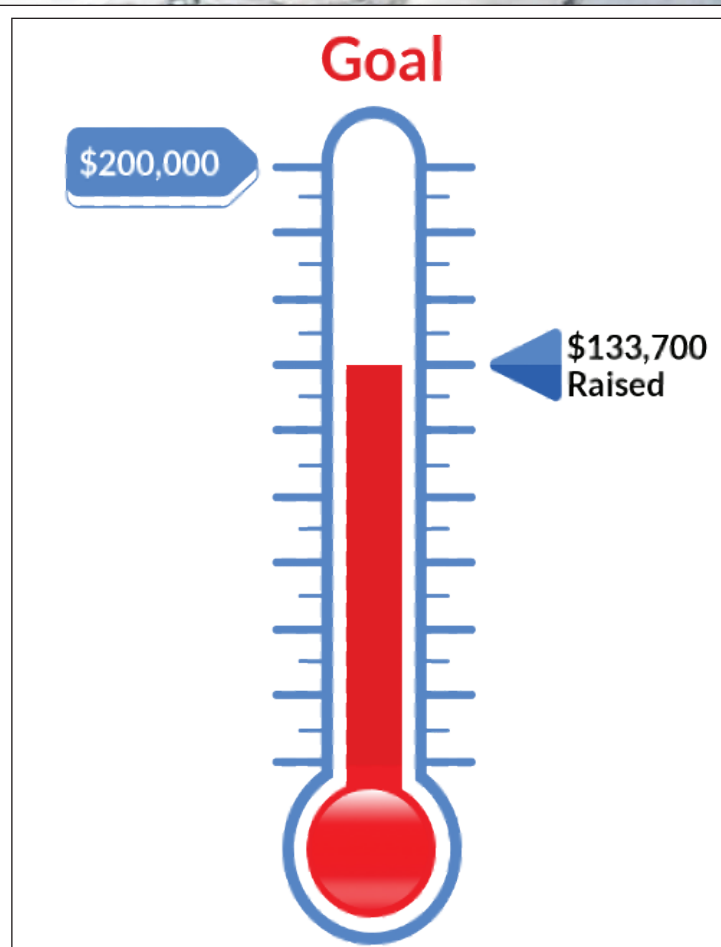
We are looking at planting flowers and plants in the downtown area. We also have the Wheeler County Veterans Memorial to clean and plant.

We need the paint removed and the windows cleaned in the downtown area.

We need trash pickers. We think having (2) start at each of the highways at the 4way and have (2) start at each of the city limits and work their way to meet in the middle. This would take (16) volunteers, along with a couple of drivers to help load and unload trash.

City Park trash pickers, as there is trash that gets caught on the rocks under the street, in the stream, in the fences, and around the park.

Wheeler Cemetery needs debris picked up along the perimeter fence and the inside of the cemetery.
