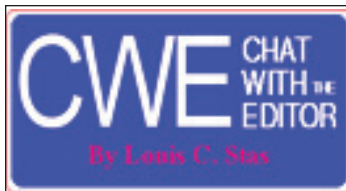

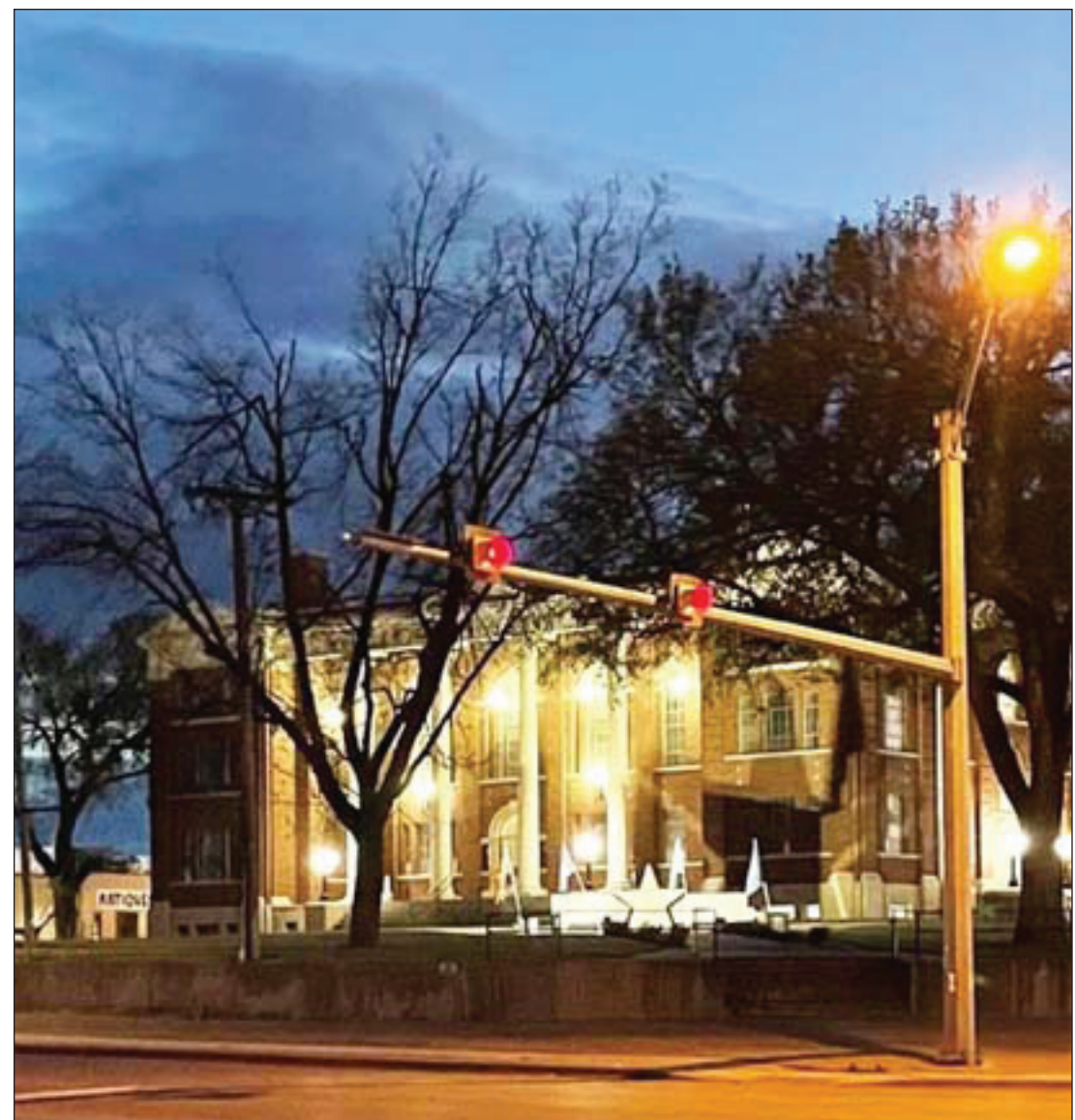

I would like to begin with a disclaimer: I have not looked at any "news", real or fictional, concerning Covid since late last week. However, the theme promoted during the last week I had followed the pandemic was clear: the vaccine must be promoted at all costs, with an increasing amount of pressure, blame, and accusation levied against those who have not taken the shot. A headline I read was something to the effect that currently the only pandemic

ongoing is among the unvaccinated, citing that 99% of Covid hospitalizations are unvaccinated individuals. Suppose that is true. My question would be, "How are those individuals acquiring Covid?" It is clear to me that the virus is circulating among both the vaccinated and the unvaccinated. I do not believe there are enough people in the U.S. who remain unvaccinated, to be the sole source of the spread of the virus to other unvaccinated individuals. It

isn't as though the exclusive pathway of transmission is unvaccinated people who are becoming ill and directly spreading it to other unvaccinated people – that unvaccinated people are infecting and being infected only by each other. It can't be – I don't see how the numbers could support that thesis.

What then would be left to explain the continued transmission? It is clear to me that the unvaccinated are also

We've had some of our college bound young folks come in and tell us bye; they are going out to change the world! Hope they can make it a better place for all of us! Our Lit-

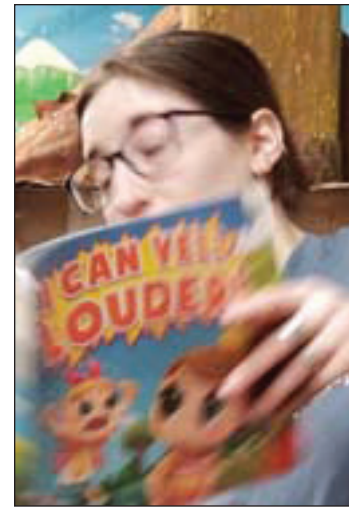

contracting the disease from those who have been vaccinated. It is the only thing that makes sense to me. Some people who have received the Covid shot remain capable of being infected with the virus — I know people who have been infected post-vaccination — and such individuals could also spread the disease, to both the vaccinated and unvaccinated.

Another interesting contradiction in themes, compared to last year, is the concern surrounding asymptomatic spread of the virus. The vaccine is supposed to lessen the severity of the symptoms of the disease, should one catch it after having been vaccinated. This sounds as though it could lead to a situation very similar to what was being described in the spring of 2020 as "asymptomatic spread", a phrase used to describe the transmission of the virus by an unaware vector who doesn't exhibit any symptoms of disease. This was the phrase used to encourage the wearing of masks, and the vilification of those who do not. Suppose that is going on and the vaccinated are unknowingly spreading the disease to the unvaccinated. But if so, the asymptomatic spreaders are no longer judged with disdain; now one could conclude by reading headlines that asymptomatic, vaccinated spreaders of the disease would be like heroes, advancing the cause, and administering the just punishment of disease on the unvaccinated, like the four horsemen of the apocalypse. I do not mean to ascribe any intent to any in-

Regardless, it does not contain all of my thoughts on the matter, but it contains enough for the time being. I believe each person should safeguard their own health as best as they can, and hope against hope that those in high places also desire health for all.

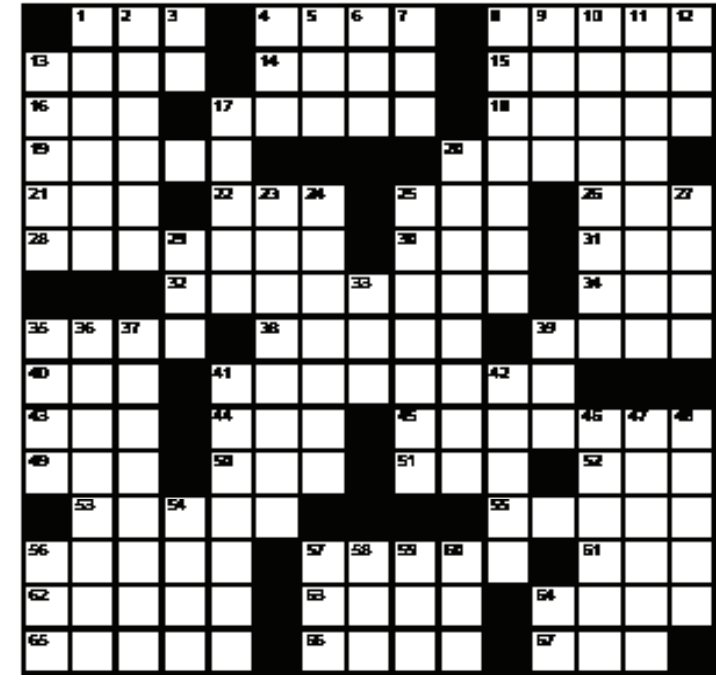

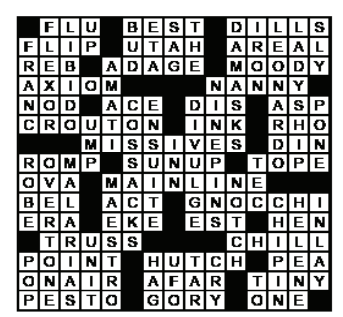
