Simpson Named G-N'Six-Man **Player of Year**

Russell Simpson recently was named as the Six-Man Football Player of the Year by the Amarillo News-Globe.

In bestowing the honor, the newspaper wrote "Simpson sparked Silverton into the playoffs for the first time in school history. The Owls' 9-3 record was the school's third winning season. At running back, he gained 1,345 yards on 180 carries (7.5 yard average) and scored 22 touchdowns. At outside linebacker, Simpson recorded 97 tackles. two interceptions (one returne 27 yards for a touchdown against Higgins in bi-district play) and two fumble recoveries.

"In our last six, seven ballgames, he started running with a lot of determination,' Silverton Coach Jack Shely said, 'and he really carried us. He did a good job of blocking (teammate Todd Reagan gained more than 700 yards rushing this season). Defensively, he covered all over the field. Overall, he was our team pretty much offensively.' Simpson's season ended disastrously, as he suffered a cracked vertebra in a quarterfinal loss to eventual state champion Jayton."

Annual Irrigation Conference Slated in Amarillo January 9

The latest wrinkles in an old concern of area farmers and ranchers will be examined January 9 during the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference.

Farmers, ranchers, scientists and educators will share their experience and research on an issue which has been of vital importance to area producers for several decades: effective and

efficient use of water. The conference, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, in Amarillo. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m.

The conference is focused upon needs expressed by producers, said Leon New, Extension agricultural engineer and irrigation specialist. He is conference coor dinator.

"One of the high points of this conference every year is the panel discussion by a group of producers," New said. "They tell what they've been doing in irrigation, what has worked and what hasn't, and problems and needs they've found.'

This year's panelists will be Wes Spurlock of Stratford, Lyndon Wagner of Bushland, and Dale Coleman and Harold Grall of Dumas.

Paul Gross, Panhandle District Extension director, will report on field tests that help producers make sound irrigation decisions.

Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension economist and management specialist, will present economic evaluations of furrow and center pivot systems.

Shely Honored by **Amarillo Chamber Sports Committee**




