



#### **CHECK SMOKE DETECTOR**

Smoke detectors are an inexpensive and reliable way to protect your family and home from fire. But without proper maintenance, you can't rely on a smoke detector to do its job, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Peggy Owens.

To test the detector, hold a lit candle six inches under the unit, she says. Let the flame burn if you have an ionization detector. If you have a photo-electric unit, extinguish the candle and let visible smoke drift into the detector. Most photo-electric models have a test button that similates smoke in the detector which can be used in place of the candle test. In either case, the unit's alarm should begin to sound within 20 seconds.

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# Rules to be Discussed Regarding Auto Dealerships in Texas

A public hearing to discuss proposed rules regarding car dealerships has been scheduled for January 28 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The rules outline the implementation by the highway department of House Bill 1953, which was enacted in 1985 by the 69th

Texas Legislature.

"This legislation ensures that dealer licensing is no longer an optional provision of the law," said Dian Neill, assistant director of the highway department's Division of Motor Vehicles. "Our understanding is that the intent of the law is to provide a degree of administrative control of car dealers by a state agency, and to maintain their accountability to the public."

The 13 proposed rules include several key changes to the former law, Neill said. Prior to the new law, dealers or individuals that regularly sell or exchange vehicles. Persons or firms selling fewer than five vehicles a year are exempted from the law.

"Another key change addresses the location of the dealership," said Neill. "The proposed regulations require a dealer to either own or have a 12-month lease on the sales lot." This will eliminate the one-day or weekend rental of a parking lot to sell a large volume of vehicles without providing a continuing office of sales should the consumer have a problem, she said.

The hearing will begin at 2:00 p.m. in the first floor conference room of the Dewitt Greer Highway Building, 11th and Brazos, Austin, Texas.

# Sesquicentennial Moment

A year to remember—1986 the year of the Texas Sesquicentennial.

From the beginning of 1986 to the end, articles in your hometown newspaper will remind citizens that the State of Texas this year is celebrating 150 years of independence from Mexico.

The Texas Wagon Train left Sulphur Springs on January 2, with a total of 100 wagons. The route for the month of January is taking the Wagon Train through Longview, Nacogdoches, Lufkin, Conroe and on to Giddings on January 31.

Other events and activities during this Sesquicentennial year will include the Texas Trail Rides, the renovation and restoration of the 1986 State Fair of Texas, Texas Independence Express and the Texas Air Show to be held in Waco.

Briscoe County was organized March 15, 1892. Before, it was a part of Donley County, originally a part of Jack County.

The first officers of the county were J. N. Stalbird, County Judge; Minor Crawford, Sheriff; T. L. Anderson, County and District Clerk; O. T. Reeves, Tax Assessor; R. J. Hanna, Treasurer; N. J. Waller, County Attorney; J. A. Northcutt, Commissioner, Precinct 1; J. M. Honea, Commissioner, Precinct 2; H. W. Savage, Commissioner, Precinct 3; W. L. Malone, Commissioner, Precinct 4.

T. L. Anderson was County and District Clerk for 24 years nine months and fifteen days. J. E. Daniel was the second Clerk, J. M. Oaks was the third, Frank Gerdes fourth, T. L. Anderson fifth and R. E. Douglas the sixth. He took office January 1, 1927.

The steering committee, made up of residents from both Quitaque and Silverton, met recently in Quitaque to hear reports on plans for observances during the Seaquicentennial year. Meetings are planned for the first Monday night of each month to formulate plans.

Judge Fred Mercer reported to the group that special trees which have grown for the past three years will be set out in Quitaque and Silverton at an Arbor Day program on March 2, which will observe Texas Independence Day. O. R. Stark gave a report on efforts that are being made to secure a museum at Caprock Canyons State Park to house the extensive artifact collection of Otho Stubbs.

There will be celebrations and observances in each community during the year leading up to the "Sesquicentennial Celebration Briscoe County Style" on August 9. This will be a joint celebration with many activities planned for the day.

It is expected that every person in Briscoe County will be involved in some way throughout the year in projects and events to commemorate Texas' 150 years of independence.

# 4-H Clubs to Meet Here January 30



Some medications can affect the way your body uses foods or cause dangerous reactions to certain foods.

Long-term use of diuretics or "water pills" can lead to serious potassium depletion. In heart patients taking digitalis, the heart may become more sensitive to the effects of the drug if the potassium deficiency is not corrected. Foods high in potassium are most fruits-tomatoes, oranges, cantaloupes, bananas, raisins, prunes, etc.-potatoes, sweet potatoes and winter squash.

According to the Food and Drug Administration one of the most hazardous food-drug interactions is that between MAO inhibitors, drugs sometimes prescribed for depression and high blood pressure, and such foods as aged cheese, Chianti wine and chicken livers. MAO inhibitors can react with a substance called tyramine in these foods and force the blood pressure to dangerous levels, sometimes causing severe headaches and other serious complications.

To prevent a possible reaction, those taking MAO inhibitor drugs should avoid aged and fermented foods, including pickled herring; sausages, such as salami and pepperoni; sharp or aged cheeses; beef and chicken livers; yogurt and sour cream;

Informal Survey Made By Parks and Wildlife Department

Results of an informal survey by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department to determine the best lakes for certain species of fish did not include any lakes in this region of the state. The reason was because of the nine species of fish named in the survey, smallmouth bass and walleye were not included. Sunfish were included.

Regardless of their absence from the survey, smallmouth bass and walleye provide good fishing and good eating for many Panhandle-South Plains anglers. To attempt a rating of the quality of smallmouth and walleye fishing locally, Joe Kraai, TP&WD fishery biologist based in Canyon, was contacted.

Kraai said the Panhandle-South Plains region of the state provides good to very good fishing for walleye and very good to excellent smallmouth bass fishing. The best lakes for both species are Greenbelt, five miles north of Clarendon, Meredith and White River.

"Meredith is the best in the state for smallmouth bass," Kraai stated. "It's the best lake by far for the number of smallmouth, not necessarily size." He added that the walleye at Lake Meredith are strong and thriving.

Lake Mackenzie, near Silverton, has experienced an astounding turn-around as a fishing lake, according to the fishery biologist. "It is becoming an excellent lake for crappie," Kraai stated. "The crappie at Mackenzie are impressive in individual size and number, and there should be exceptional results this spring." He added that there had been "An incredible spawn of largemouth bass" at Mackenzie.

"I'm really pleased with the striped bass growth at Buffalo Springs Lake," Kraai said. "Their numbers and size are looking very good." He noted an additional stocking of stripers is scheduled for this spring. And while a remnant population of walleye is few in number, net surveys indicate all of the fish are lunkers.

## **Anti-Litter Program** To Be Enforced On Texas Rights-of-Way

Better think twice next time you start to trash the highways. The eyes of Texas are upon

And it just might mean a fat fine as Texas law enforcement officers focus keen attention on litterers under a new highway department program.

The new antilitter enforcement program invites municipalities to enter into year-long contracts whereby they are reimbursed for issuing citations to persons who dump trash on state highway rights-of-way. The amounts awarded for contracts are based on populations, and will be approved on a first-come, first-served basis until the \$1 million set aside for the program is depleted.

The enforcement effort is part of the department's \$4 million antilitter "Don't Mess With Texas" campaign that was launched last fall to reduce litter along Texas highways by 20 percent. Litter cleanup cost taxpayers \$24 million in 1985.

The antilitter enforcement program will reimburse a city \$20 per citation. "We have to get tough with these litterers, and that's exactly what we're going to do through this program," said Craig Steffens, head of the department's landscape section.
"There is nothing more effec-

tive than to have a police officer stop you and give you a ticket," said Steffens. "We especially want to ticket persons who create illegal dump sites by the side of the highway.

The program is intended to provide an incentive to increase enforcement of existing litter laws. During the first six months of 1985, 237 citations for litter violations were issued statewide.

The department will provide reimbursement for the ticket, not for the conviction. The maximum penalty for littering has been raised to \$400.

"Our goal is to reduce the overall litter in the state, but we know from research and past experiences that you don't reduce it by picking it up. You reduce it through public awareness," said Steffens.

In addition to the \$1 million enforcement program, the campaign includes a \$2 million public education and media program, a \$300,000 subsidy for the statewide Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. organization, and \$700,000 in landscaping projects for winners of the annual Governor's Community Achievement Awards for Clean Communities.

Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. will be contacting cities and furnishing contract documents to solicit participation. City officials interested in the program may contact Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. at (512) 478-8813 or they can call their local highway district

Reimbursement for litter citations will be made quarterly. The population of a city will determine the total amount of the contract.


