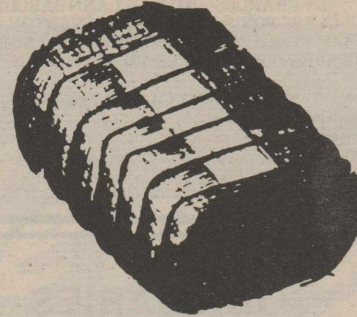

Briscoe County Leaders to Identify Most Critical Issues

County leaders will convene tonight (Thursday) in the Pioneer Room of First State Bank in Silverton at 7:00 o'clock to identify critical issues facing Briscoe County citizens in agriculture, family living, community development and youth.

These leaders were selected by the Extension Program Build-

ing Executive Committee for their interest and expertise in one of the four areas of concern. The leaders will be divided into the four major areas for discussion of county concerns that could be addressed through Extension educational programs.

A second meeting in June will bring back the group to prioritize issues identified in each task force group into the most critical concerns facing the county during the next four years.

Moderator for the study group meeting is Jimmy Burson, chairman of the Program Building Executive Committee. He will also be the leader for the agriculture task force, with James Griffin serving as recorder.

Lottie Garrison will lead the home economics task force with Janice Henson as recorder. The community development task force will be led by James Cathey, with Mary Ann Sarchet serving as recorder. Kathy Frizell will lead the 4-H and youth task force, and Warren Lee Merrell will be the recorder.

The issues identified will provide the basis for the long-range Extension program planning for the remainder of the decade.

The board of directors of Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority met in regular monthly session at the lake on April 8, 1986, and unanimously voted to give free gate entry passes to Mackenzie Water Authority taxpayers. The free entry permits will be given to current taxpayers at the Tax Appraisal Offices in Silverton, Tulia, Lockney and Floydada.

This applies to all who pay Mackenzie taxes, regardless of whether they live in one of the four towns or elsewhere. If the taxes are currently paid, the owner will be entitled to a free entry permit. This becomes effective April 19.

Mackenzie taxpayers who have purchased annual family permits already this year may pick up their free entry permits at their Tax Appraisal Office and receive a refund for the one they purchased. For 1987, free permits will be given when you pay your Mackenzie taxes.

Non-taxpayer annual entry permits will be honored for the rest of 1986, and will be eliminated for 1987.

Fees were adjusted upward, with the following scale of charges now in effect: non-taxpayer entry fee, \$2.00; boat fee, \$2.00; camping, \$2.00; RV hook-

up, \$7.00; annual boat permit, \$25.00.

Tax money is not used in the recreation area of the lake, reminded John Earl Simpson, lake manager. The fees paid are used to pay personnel, for road maintenance, trash hauling, liability insurance, electricity, general maintenance and to provide facilities. "Next year we hope to have some boat docks and additional picnic tables," Simpson said.

Report from Briscoe County Sheriff

Offenses reported to the Briscoe County Sheriff's department during the year of 1985 included two assaults with one cleared by arrest; three burglaries with value of losses of \$454.00 with two of these cleared by arrest or other means; thirteen larceny thefts reported with a loss value of \$4,994, six of which were cleared by arrest or other means. A total of \$908 worth of stolen goods was recovered.

There was a total of 65 arrests made of persons over 18 years of age. There was one arrest for each of the offenses of burglary, larceny theft, and vandalism. Two were arrested and convicted of sex offense charges.

Seven drug abuse violators were arrested, convicted and fined.

Of the 53 liquor law violations: 44 were arrested for driving while intoxicated; three were charged with transporting in a dry area; six were arrested for public intoxication.

Five juveniles (persons under 18) were arrested and charged with offenses of: two, burglary, two, larceny theft, and one, driving while intoxicated.

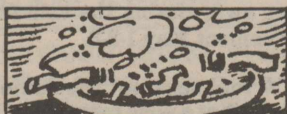
For the months of January, February and March of 1986, officers have investigated four burglaries with a loss of property valued at \$1,565 and three larceny thefts with a loss of property of \$2700, with the recovery of \$600 worth of goods.

Six arrests have been made for liquor law violations. Of these, four were charged and convicted of driving while intoxicated; two were charged with public intoxication, including one juvenile. There was one charge of transporting in a dry area and one drug abuse violation during the same time period.

Water temperature at a four-foot depth at Lake Mackenzie is now 59° and the water depth at the dam is holding at 113 feet.

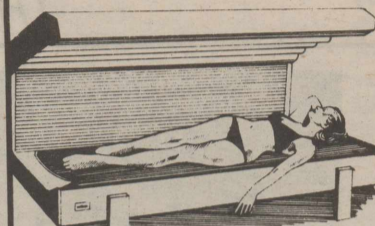
Crappie fishing is good. Several people are still catching nice size crappie using minnows in six to ten feet of water. Mark Brown

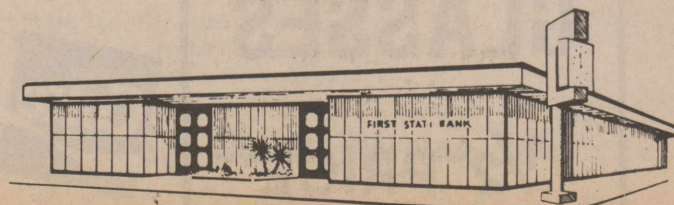

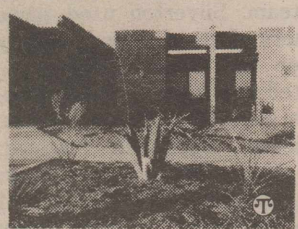

Historical Newspaper Goes on Sale Monday

A 64-page collection of clippings from The Turkey Enterprise (1925-1960) published under the name "Old Filings," goes on sale in Turkey Monday, April 21, San Jacinto Day. Copies will be available from Sybil Young, Box 415, Turkey, Tx. 79261, or from the Turkey Public Library, c/o Nadine Baisden, Route 1, Turkey, Tx. 79261, for \$5.00 per copy. (Copies cost \$6.00 each if they are to be mailed.) Proceeds of this sesquicentennial project will go toward cemetery improvement.

Included in this historical newspaper are stories about some of the oldtimers; the construction of business buildings and homes, and the disasters that destroyed some of them; the fun times that brought the cheers and laughter, and the

tragedies that gave the entire community heartaches and tears.

There is a part of it that is prepared in memory of the Turkey servicemen who made the supreme sacrifice for their country.

If you have ever lived in Turkey, you'll want a copy of this "scrapbook" which paints a picture of the settling of the territory and building of the town.

"Old Filings" includes several historical drawings by Otho Stubbs and a few reproductions of pictures as they appeared in The Enterprise.

It tells about the fire that destroyed much of downtown Turkey, the organization of the Fire Department and Lions Club, the 18-hour great blizzard, who started Dreamland Cemetery, how Turkey and Mt. Nebo got their names, how people celebrated on the day the first train came to Turkey, about the first

schools and some of the teachers, athletic teams, victories and defeats.

It is a terrific project of the Turkey Sesquicentennial Committee, and if you wait to look at someone else's copy, the first thousand will be gone and you'll have to wait for the second printing to get one.

**TEXAS REMEMBERS TRAGIC
MASSACRE AT GOLIAD**

Goliad, Texas, March 24—The aged, stone walls of Mission LaBahia near here, from which 390 Texas prisoners of war were marched on Palm Sunday, March 27, 1836, to be massacred on the South Texas Coastal Plain, will be the background for one of the most impressive of the state's Centennial year observances.

Solemn ceremonies at the Mission Friday, March 27, will commemorate the tragic event which decreed the independence Texas won less than a month later on the fields of San Jacinto.

The Goliad massacre came as Texas was waging its revolt against the tyranny of Santa Anna, the Mexican dictator, Colonel James Walker Fannin of Georgia was in command of the Texan force at Goliad when the order was received to evacuate the frontier post as Houston retreated from Gonzales to the east. The retreat from Goliad was started on March 19 but Fannin's force was engaged by the enemy at Colito. The battle lasted into the next day and ended with the surrender of the Fannin men as prisoners of war. They were returned to Goliad and imprisoned in the walls of the mission.

A few days later Colonel William Ward and a Georgia battalion, captured near Victoria, were added to the prisoner band.

At daylight on Palm Sunday, March 27, the Texans were roused from sleep and marched from the fort in three different companies, each guarded by a file of soldiers. They had been told they were going for wood, to drive up beeves, or to proceed to

Copano and were entirely unprepared for the assault made on them when they were mowed down by fire from their captors' guns. Only a few men were saved or escaped.

Colonel Fannin, wounded at Colito, and other wounded men were killed in the fort.

The commemorative observance will be opened Friday morning with a solemn pontifical field mass to be celebrated in the quadrangle of the mission.

The mass in the morning will be followed that afternoon by a colorful parade of historical floats and military and school bands. Later in Goliad State Parks, talks will be made by Governor James V. Allred of Texas and other state officials. Markers at LaBahia and San Rosario missions will be unveiled as part of the ceremonies.

Goliad's observance of the

Fannin massacre is one of the 175 events planned in all parts of the state this year in celebration of the Centennial of independence and progress.

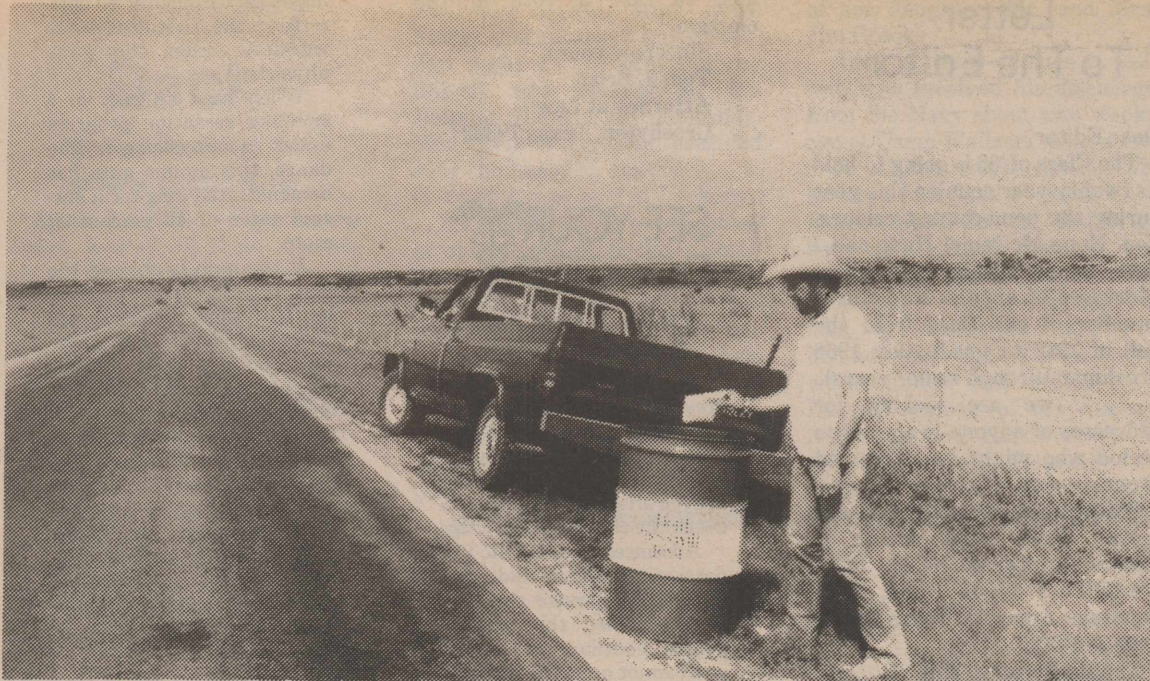

Many consumers believe range reflector bowls are only for decoration. But, according to home economists from Whirlpool Corporation, they are a very important part of any range.



Reflector bowls provide even cooking and help conserve energy by reflecting heat into the cooking pan.

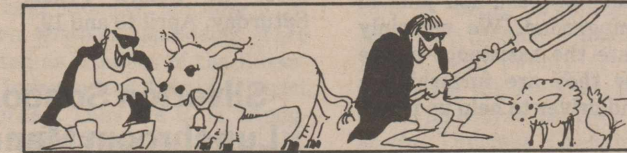

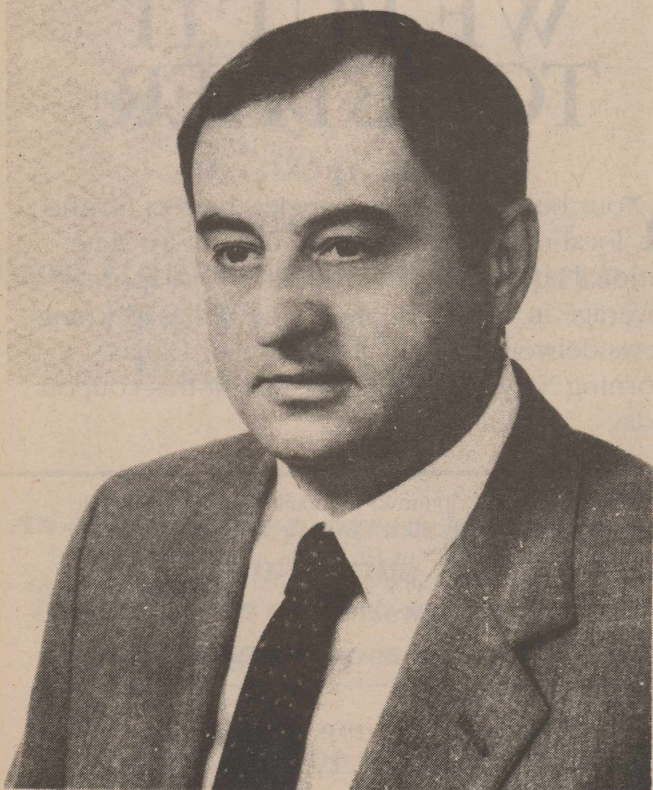

Dear Editor:

It has come to my attention that David Cave has placed an advertisement in your paper citing a Supreme Court holding in a case styled **Harrison vs. Parker**. In his enthusiastic efforts to unseat Judge Miller, Mr. Cave has overlooked some very significant matters in the information he has stated. In the interest of fairness to Judge Miller, I feel I must respond to certain implications made.

I was the attorney for the defendant's estate in the **Harrison vs. Parker** case cited by Mr. Cave. There were many equities against awarding Mr. Cave's client, the plaintiff, Mrs. Parker anything. But the key to Judge Miller's refusal to award her anything was the fact that **case law barred her recovery**. The judge was merely following the law as it stood when the case was tried. Judge Miller's findings in the case were reversed not because he ruled incorrectly, but because the case upon which Judge Miller based his ruling was overturned on appeal. It is the duty of a Judge to follow case law precedent, *Stare Decisis*. This is what Judge Miller was doing in the Harrison case. The reversal came not as a result of an incorrect decision on the part of Judge Miller, but rather because the Supreme Court changed the case law.

As a friend of Judge Miller, and as an attorney who has tried many cases in Judge Miller's court, I resent the unbased charges by Mr. Cave concerning Judge Miller's competence and judicial conduct. I have always found him to be fair and equitable in his rulings, thoroughly knowledgeable in the various aspects of the law, and willing to work hard at coming to a proper resolution of every case. I also know him to be a man of the highest integrity, a man I greatly respect.

I trust that your readers will be perceptive enough to realize that Mr. Cave's advertisement is so slanted and biased as to be totally unfair to one of the finest district judges in our area.

I would have hoped that as an attorney Mr. Cave would have directed his campaign with more integrity and class than this advertisement shows.

Thank you for allowing me to express my viewpoint on the subject even though I will not be

able to cast a vote in this election.

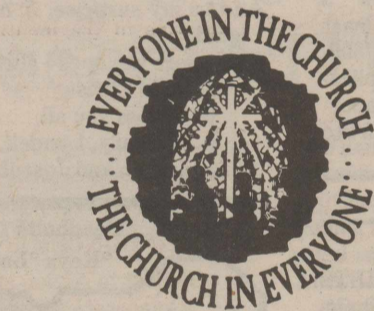

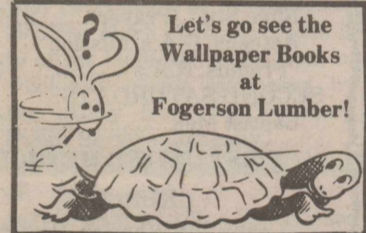
