

ARB to Begin Hearing Appeals Of Property Values on July 24

County Appraisal District will have an opportunity to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. Protest hearings by the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) begin on July 24,

When the ARB concludes its hearing and approves a final roll of property appraisals, local governments will levy their taxes against values from that

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser for the district, said that a taxpayer who wants to lodge a protest of a proposed value must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. The taxpayer must file the protest by July 24.

If the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records on the property, the owner has only 10 days to file a

According to Mrs. Fleming, the ARB is a group of appraisal district residents appointed by the district's directors to see that property values are equal and uniform and to consider claims for exemptions and agricultural

Property owners appear before only one review panel, the chief appraiser noted, instead of one for each taxing unit. "They may protest any of seven specific actions of the appraisal office,"

The seven protest areas are: -the appraised or agricultural value of the property;

-unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property in comparison to the median level of appraisals of other property in the district;

-inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;

funds are made available annual-

ly to recognize outstanding stu-

-denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;

-denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber productivity valuation;

-identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;

-and determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the

Taxpayers may also protest any other actions of the appraisal office that apply to and adversely affect them; however, Mrs. Fleming said that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear any protests of those

matters. Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal office: "But a letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as a notice," the chief appraiser said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property which is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office.'

Mrs. Elliston's body was found in the yard at her home northeast of Silverton about 2:30 p.m. Wednesday by a visiting health nurse from Panhandle Community Services in Amarillo.

An autopsy performed by Amarillo forensic pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann revealed that she had died late Saturday afternoon (July 5) of strangula-

Justice of the Peace James Edwards and Briscoe County Sheriff Dick Roehr conducted an investigation, and Edwards has ruled that the death was accidental. Edwards said she died of a

probably was crushed when she fell into a bannister on her porch. Her lungs filled with blood and she suffered cardiopulmonary arrest.

Sheriff Roehr said there was no indication that she had been sexually molested and most valuable items in the house, including about \$500 in a purse which had been hidden in a closet, were found intact. The house had not been ransacked and there was no indication of a struggle.

An alarm system to alert Panhandle Community Services was found in the house. "We've conducted a thorough investigation," Roehr said, "and while we're not absolutely positive, it's doubtful that it was a murder."

Mrs. Elliston, a life-long resident of Silverton, lived alone on a sparsely-populated back road. A housekeeper came twice a week and a health care representative came about twice a month. Investigators said an acquaintance of Mrs. Elliston had spoken to her on Saturday and that nothing appeared out of the ordinary at that time.



Bill Willis, a former resident of Silverton, is the new principal at Spur High School. He goes to Spur from Meridian where he has served as high school principal for the past seven years.



ings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of the hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled date.

Each protesting taxpayer may appear in person to offer evidence or argument but may also offer the evidence or argument by affidavit without appearing personally.

After the ARB decides on a protest, it will notify the property owner of the decision by certified mail.

After the ARB approves the records, it can hear a protest under very limited circumstances. If a property owner can prove that the ARB or the appraisal office did not deliver a required notice, then the board can hear the taxpayer's protest on any of the permitted protest topics. The ARB may also hear a late protest if the chief appraiser and the property owner jointly request correction of an error in the records that substantially affects the owner's tax liability.

A pamphlet issued by the State Property Tax Board in Austin and available from the appraisal office explains how to prepare and present an appeal. For more information about ARB hearings, or for a copy of the pamphlet, "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," contact the Briscoe County Appraisal District Office, Box 728, Silverton, Texas 79257, (806) 823-2161.




