

In our neighborhood, we are having a problem with kids with B-B guns. They are killing robins, mockingbirds and other protected species, which is against state law, and if their parents don't educate them as to what kind of birds they can and can't legally shoot, they could find themselves with problems with one of the game wardens. Monday they killed a bull-bat.

The only birds that are not protected by state law are European starlings, English sparrows, feral rock doves (pigeons), grackles, ravens, redwinged blackbirds, cowbirds and crows. To avoid possible prosecution, hunters should not shoot at or kill any species not listed in the 1986-87 Texas Hunting Guide as a game bird. (The hunting guide is available at the County Clerk's office.)

The kids who are killing the songbirds have been asked not to do this, several times in fact. Sometimes they shoot into the yards of those who have asked them not to shoot the birds.

If you have a kid running around town with a gun, you'd better sit down and have a talk with him about this. It could save some problems down the road.

High School To Register Friday

Students in grades 9-12 will register Friday, August 29, in the school library, with the following schedule announced by Silverton School Principal Leonard Morgan: seniors, 9:00 - 10:00 a.m.; juniors, 10:00 - 11:00 a.m.; sophomores, 11:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon; freshmen, 1:00 - 2:00 p.m.

School will open Tuesday, September 2. New students will need to register in Mr. Morgan's office before 8:20 a.m. that day for grades one through eight. You will need to bring your birth certificate, immunization record and permanent record from your previous school. All students should be in their classrooms at 8:20 a.m. and will be counted tardy after 8:25 a.m.

Kindergarten through grade three will be dismissed at 3:00 p.m., and all students who live in town must be picked up at that time. There will be a bus recess only for the students who ride a bus. Buses will run at 3:45 p.m.

In order to have a perfect attendance record for the school term, you must not miss more than 25 minutes of any one school day. Three tardies also equal an absence.

Teachers are expected to be at school at 8:00 a.m. each day. Please do not allow your children to arrive at school before 8:00 a.m.

Remember the traffic law as it applies to school buses. You must stop anytime a bus is loading or unloading students.

Free lunch applications will be available in the classrooms. If you were on free or reduced-price lunches this past school year, you may eat a few days on last year's application. All applications must be turned in by September 8, or students will have to pay for their lunches.

The Silverton Public School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75c and breakfast for 35c

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the accompanying scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

To apply for free or reducedprice meals, you may fill out an application that is available in the school office, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: 1. The total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps. 2. Names of all household members.







Drivers Cautioned As School Opens

Last year in Texas there were 1,228 accidents involving school buses, with seven fatalities and 323 non-fatal injuries. Schools are about to open again, and drivers are once more being cautioned to be unusually attentive in and around school zones and school buses.

An increasing problem in recent years has been drivers who either ignored or were unaware of the law restricting vehicles from passing a school bus while the bus is loading or unloading children. Children often cross the street in front of the bus, and a car that's trying to pass may not see them coming.

The problem became so bad two years ago that the Texas Legislature considered requiring buses to have mechanical arms at the driver's window that would extend into the traffic lane while the bus is stopped. At present, buses in Texas have flashing lights at the front and back of the vehicle when stopped, as well as signs noting that vehicles are required to stop for the buses.

To emphasize the importance of stopping for these buses, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has produced public service announcements with Texas singersongwriter Jerry Jeff Walker as its spokesman.

Walker, the 44-year-old author of the classic, "Mr. Bojangles," believes in the message he offers in the television commercial.

"It's important to note that stopping for those flashing red lights is not just a courtesy, it's the law," Walker said. "That means stopping whether you're behind the bus or approaching it from the other lane."

The law states: "The driver of

a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose

of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus a visual signal such as specified in Section 124 of the Act, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer activated. A violation of this subsection is punishable by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200."

said, "Every year as school starts we have a rash of accidents caused by drivers not watching out for children on their way to and from school."

"When you see children walking on the side of the road or waiting for a school bus, reduce your speed in case a child darts into the street in front of you. When children get together they tend to get excited and even though they know better, will run into the street without looking," Major Cawthon explained.

Whether meeting or following a school bus, state law requires all drivers to stop and remain stopped when the bus has activated its alternating flashing red lights while loading or unloading children. You cannot start again until the flashing red lights are no longer activated or the bus driver signals you to proceed.

"Be especially watchful in school zones as this is where students will be congregated. Extra effort on a driver's part will pay off in preventing traffic accidents in these areas," advised Major Cawthon.



Larry Todd, executive director of the Texas Tourist Develop-

ment Agency, agrees with Taylor. "People I've talked to from other states really like the "Don't Mess with Texas" approach. They feel like only Texans can get away with such a bold, brash
