From my perspective

In the course of the last month, I've talked to many of you about some major areas of emphasis for the 64th FTW. In general terms, these are our flying training mission, our people, our facilities, the environment and our relationship with Lubbock and the people of the South Plains.



Recently, I was made aware of a very important effort that relates to both our people and our relationship with our neighbors. This effort, which a number of you have been involved in, is the Mentoring Program in the Frenship Intermediate School. This program was established last year when approximately 40 people from Reese volunteered their time and their hearts to help fifth- and sixth-graders at the school who needed help with schoolwork or maybe just someone to talk to.

Betty Donaldson, principal at the school where a number of Reese children attend, began the program during the 1992-93 school year as part of an effort to reach the goals of the Goals 2000: Educate America Act. Briefly these goals are:

- All children ready to read.
- Ninety percent graduation rate.
- All children competent in core subjects.
- First in the world in math and science.
- Every adult literate and able to compete in the work force.
- Safe, disciplined, drug-free schools.

You can help accomplish these goals at the Frenship Intermediate School by donating just one hour of your time each week. The 1993-94 Mentoring Program will start with a volunteer orientation from 8 to 10 a.m. Wednesday and 2 to 4 p.m. Thursday in the Reese Family Support Center conference room. Mentors will be paired with students in mid-September. If you were part of the program last year, your student partner will be looking forward to seeing you again next month!

This program has my full support and liberal time-off and leave policies will be in effect. Civilian employees, with their supervisor's concurrence, may be allowed up to four hours per pay period to participate in the program.

This is a great opportunity to make a real difference in the life of a young person. That young boy or girl will appreciate your time and effort, and I think you'll feel pretty about it too. For more information, please call Cheryl Ortiz at family support, 3305.

Getting help when getting out

It's been said that time is money. If that's true, the four days I just spent in Reese's Transition Assistance Program seminar may be the best investment I could have made in my future.

After more than two decades of wearing Air Force blue, I was approaching my transition to a civilian career with the same state of mind as many of my peers — sheer panic.

The "self" questions were endless. What am I going to do? Can I get a job? Will it pay enough? Where do I look? How much am I worth in the civilian market? Can I afford to go back to school?

TAP to the rescue.

The first thing you get from TAP is a plan — a plan for the seminar and a plan for making plans.

Centered at your desk you'll find an agenda for the first three days of the seminar. It's an ambitious program developed by the U.S. Veteran's Employment and Training Service.

Day one deals with self-analysis — learning how to evaluate your skills, define work values and personal preferences and establish personal goals. Armed with this knowledge, the seminar begins to address the real issue — the job search.

By day two you are beginning to build confidence. You sense that just participating in this program gives you a distinct advantage over the average job searcher. From writing résumés and cover letters to learning how to interview, the

seminar covers every facet of the job search in detail. TAP even videotapes a mock interview to help you objectively evaluate your own interviewing skills.

Starting day three, TAP shifts gears. You've

been so wrapped up in worrying about getting a job that you haven't even considered whether the job offer you do get is the job you should take.

Another plan.

TAP outlines a formula for rating job offers. It is weighted to your personal needs and preferences. TAP

even covers how and if you should ask potential employers for extra time to consider their offers.

Day three also includes informative briefings on starting a small business and veterans' programs.

Perhaps the most beneficial element of the program is the employer panel. TAP brings in local administrators — public and private — to give practical advice on how to find and land the right job. This isn't textbook stuff; it's real people talking about what they want to see from prospective applicants.

For the first three days of TAP, the focus is looking for new careers. Day four looks at the separation process itself and outlines many of the veteran benefits — especially education.

They teach us in TAP that a great résumé won't get you a job — but just maybe an interview. TAP won't assure you a smooth ride into civilian life; what it will do is put you in the driver's seat.

What's the value of TAP? Let's just say you can't afford to miss it.

Tips tendered toward potential pet problems

Whether you are a new pet owner or have owned pets since arriving at Reese, there are responsibilities that you, as a resident of the base, should be aware of.

Air Force Regulation 163-5 states that only three pets (dogs and cats) are allowed in each base housing unit. Exotic pets, such as ferrets, are not allowed to be kept in base housing.

All pets residing on base are required to be registered at the veterinary treatment facility within 30 days of arrival.

Pets must be restrained at all times — either in quarters, on a leash or under direct control and supervision of a responsible person. Pets are not allowed to

run loose on base or in the housing area.

If your pet is picked up by the security police while running loose, it will be taken to the Lubbock Animal Shelter. The owner of the pet will be responsible for all boarding fees, and they must provide proof of rabies vaccination or the animal will be vaccinated there at the owner's expense. If you suspect your pet may have been picked up, you should call Law Enforcement at 3535.

Excessive barking, destruction of property, unprovoked biting of people or other pets, or failure by the owner to control their pets may result in a pet being barred from the base.

If you have any questions regarding pet control, please call the veterinary treatment facility at 3535.

In the 64th Operations Support Squadron, Quality Air Force is not just another phrase; it is the premise of work in our squadron and is intertwined with everything we do.

The OSS mission is to provide operational support for specialized UPT so that the end customer, the major commands, receives the best qualified pilot possible. While the MAJCOMs are the end customers, our immediate customers are the student pilots. The entire base exists to get them trained and ready for the MAJCOMs, and every step of that training is closely analyzed to see if it can't be done better.

A key aspect of that process is receiving feedback from the students themselves. Their feedback was essential in resolving an on-going academic scheduling problem. In short, it was too flexible; with very short notice, the students could be tasked for a test, a new block of study, or told to drop everything and go fly. Their bottom-line con-

cern was how could they be the best at anything if not given the opportunity to concentrate on the task at hand.

A process action team was organized to evaluate how the academic scheduling process worked. The team found there was minimal communication between the flying squadron schedulers and the academic schedulers. Thus, when it came time to build the academic schedule, the result was a poorly constructed program. The PAT made suggestions on how to improve the programming to satisfy both our customers and the instructor force.

Since their recommendations were implemented, schedules have stabilized and students have been able to make better use of their study time and their performance has improved.

This is only one example of how the 64th OSS has taken the QAF philosophy and put it to work to further enhance the product for our customers. QAF is never over; we continue to poll our customers and make refinements to the process, all aimed at developing the best aviators in the world.

52nd gets new commander

The new commander of the 52nd Flying Training Squadron leads a unit that handles one of the newest jets in the Air Force inventory, a fact he has not failed to take note of.

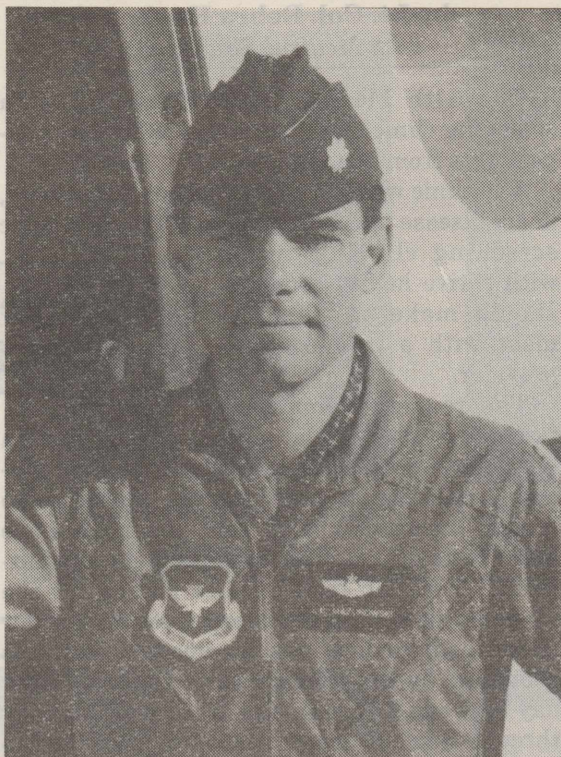
"It really is a beautiful jet," said Lt. Col. John Mazurowski. "After all that time flying T-38s and C-130s and other aircraft that are around 30 years old, it's nice to fly a brand-new aircraft."

A senior pilot with 3,400 flying hours, Colonel Mazurowski assumed command of the 52nd Aug. 20 from Lt. Col. Jerry Scroggins, who is now with the 64th Operations Group. Colonel Mazurowski brings to his new unit, which trains students in the airlift-tanker track of specialized UPT, 1,300 hours experience as an instructor in both the T-38 and C-130.

The colonel and his wife, Kaille, arrived at Reese in June after he completed the National War College. He spent several weeks getting "checked out" in the T-1A before taking command. Looking at the challenges that lie ahead, he plans to pick up where his predecessor left off.

"The unit is basically all set up — the first squadron commander had to start from scratch," Colonel Mazurowski said, alluding to the fact that the 52nd is a fairly new unit. "What we need to do now is take all that's been done so far and refine it, so that the pilots we produce will be that much better for their gaining commands."

A key part of meeting that challenge, according to the 16-year service veteran, is safety. That's

what Colonel Mazurowski wants to see in his unit.

"Zero flight and ground mishaps — that's one of our primary squadron goals for 1993," said the Air Force Academy graduate. "While our mission is to provide top quality student training, we want to make sure we do it safely. That's what I want to stress to our instructors and students."

Civilian personnel shifting to satellite operation Oct. 1

Reese civil servants may need to check their records at the Reese Civilian Personnel Office, as the CPO becomes a satellite civilian personnel flight with some services provided by Sheppard AFB, Texas, Oct. 1.

Debra Collatt, Reese civilian personnel officer, said that all official personnel folders will be sent to Sheppard Sept. 16.

"We're really stressing that," she said. "We'd like everyone who hasn't done so to come in and take one last look, just for their own security. If we have to bring records back for a hands-on review, and Sheppard is, for example, in the middle of processing one of their pay adjustments, it could take a couple of weeks to get it."

As another result of the change, the Reese CPO will go from a 13-person operation to a six-person staff, joining Altus and Vance AFBs, Okla., and Goodfellow AFB, Texas, in the Sheppard region. Collatt hopes the changes can be made with minimal impact on the civilian work force.

"We're hoping they won't feel the change at all," she said. "We've worked out a plan with Sheppard that if we need something done in a hurry, we'll make maximum use of datafaxes, phones and so on."

The change is the result of a streamlining study done by the Department of Defense, according to Collatt. The changes being made will place the Air Force servicing ratio in line with the Navy's, which was deemed more cost effective. The CPO worker—civil servant

ratio will be 1-60 once the change takes effect; it currently is 1-47.

The remaining CPO specialists will transition to "generalists," Collatt said, ensuring they are able to "do a little bit of everything."

"There will be more each of us has to do than what we were accustomed to," said Shirl Francis of CPO. "The biggest challenge will be in automation. We've had people in the past to do things that we'll now have to depend on automated systems to accomplish."

Collatt added that Reese managers who anticipate the need to fill slots, especially one-deep slots, should contact CPO as early as possible so that recruitment efforts can be handled efficiently.

MEDSQ plans retiree screening

The 64th Medical Squadron will host a screening clinic for retirees and their adult dependents from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sept. 24.

The clinic will screen for diabetes, glaucoma, heart disease and hypertension. This is a basic screening clinic; retirees with active health concerns should make an appointment with a primary care provider.

The required laboratory testing for this annual physical will include a blood test for cholesterol, triglycerides and glucose screening. In order for the physician to review the results with you, you must have these tests drawn prior to making an appointment. These lab tests require fasting for the 12 hours preceding the blood tests, except for prescribed medications as needed. Retirees should go by the primary care clinic any duty day between 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Monday through Sept. 10 to get a lab slip. Once the lab work is done, primary care personnel will schedule an appointment for Sept. 24.

We will be asking whether retirees have com-

pleted a third-party collection program insurance information form within the past year. If not, retirees will need to complete this form on the day appointments are made. Anyone who needs to fill out a form should bring insurance information, such as policy numbers and addresses. People with an independent insurance company will have their visit charged to the company.

Additional tests such as routine PAP smears (no other complications), EKGs, chest x-rays, mammograms, audiograms and pulmonary function checks may be ordered by your physician at the time of your appointment. Every effort will be made to accomplish these on the day of the screening. Also, efforts are being made to have the influenza vaccine available for the screening. If it is received in time, retirees who wish to receive the vaccine must bring shot records along with outpatient records. They will be asked to wait 15 minutes in the immunization clinic after receiving the vaccine.

On the day of the physical, retirees should arrive at the hospital one hour prior to their appointment. Call 3515 for details.

Legislators see 2.2 raise in pay as a 'done deal'

WASHINGTON — House and Senate Armed Services Committee officials believe a 2.2 percent military pay raise for fiscal 1994 is practically a "done deal."

However, they say things could change in September when lawmakers begin another round of budget debates and look at a final vote for the pay raise and other changes to President Clinton's proposed defense budget.

Officials pointed to the recent victory of Clinton's deficit-reduction plan as something that overshadowed and eventually delayed the proposed pay raise debate and vote.

"Unfortunately, our legislative schedule won't allow us to wait for resolution of many contentious issues — like military pay raises — that the reconciliation conference may grapple with for weeks. So, we are setting aside sufficient money in fiscal 1994 for either a full 2.2 percent pay raise or a substantial pay bonus," said Rep. Ronald Dellums (D-Calif.), chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, in a recent news release.

The final decision between pay raise or pay bonus will depend on the outcome of the

House-Senate conference on budget reconciliation, Dellums said.

At the same time, the president has proposed almost \$88 billion in new defense cuts by fiscal 1997, and a plan that would eliminate pay increases for all government workers in fiscal 1994.

Clinton's budget request for 1994 included no funding for the 2.2 percent military pay raise that, under current law, would otherwise take effect Jan. 1.

Nevertheless, Air Force budget officials say they're confident that the House-Senate action points to an across-the-board 2.2 percent raise, which would include a 2.2 percent hike in basic pay, basic allowance for quarters and basic allowance for subsistence. The raise would take effect Jan. 1.

Whether the administration likes it or not, it looks like Congress is going to give the military a pay raise in the next fiscal year, said Lt. Col. Doug Hart, a Pentagon spokesman.

As it now stands in the House-Senate, the action could raise military pay in fiscal 1994 but not in later years, Colonel Hart said.

In July, for example, Dellums said his committee "reluctantly agreed to the pay freeze" for 1994 through 1998

because it was unable at that point in the budget process to find money to satisfy the five-year reconciliation direction.

However, Dellums said the committee eventually did find the money and plans to earmark \$1 billion specifically for pay when the committee makes the final markup for the 1994 Defense Authorization Bill.

"We've collectively been scrubbing and re-scrubbing the budget looking for money," said Rep. Ike Skelton (D-Mo.), in a recent news release. "I'm delighted that we've found ways so the troops get cash in hand."

"In this time of great turbulence and uncertainty with the force drawdown, it is important to reassure the extraordinarily high-quality young men and women wearing the nation's uniform today that we haven't forgotten them or their families or the fact that they may be called — at a moment's notice — to serve in Somalia, Bosnia or some other hot spot in the far reaches of the globe," said Skelton, who also lobbied for a pay raise in fiscal 1993.

Depending on the outcome of new legislation, Department of Defense civilian workers would also receive an across-the-board 2.2 percent raise, officials said.

Kennedy speaks on "Our Environmental Destiny"

Global warming, the greenhouse effect, and water pollution — these are important issues during these environmentally conscious times. Robert F. Kennedy, Jr., a successful environmental attorney and compelling speaker, emphasizes the challenges that lie ahead for our world and offers practical suggestions for dealing with these issues. Kennedy will present his lecture on Thursday, September 16, 1993, at 8 p.m. in the Texas Tech Allen Theatre. The event is sponsored by Texas Tech University Cultural Events.

Kennedy serves as a clinical professor and supervising attorney at the Environmental Litigation Clinic at Pace University Law School in New York. He is also the chief prosecuting attorney for the Hudson Riverkeeper and senior attorney for the Natural Resources Defense Council. His faithful defense of the environment has led to several successful legal actions such as prosecuting governments and companies for polluting the Hudson River and Long Island Sound, winning settlements for the Hudson Riverkeeper, arguing cases to expand citizen access to the shoreline, and suing sewage treatment plants to force compliance with the Clean Water Act.

In an effort to share his knowledge with the public, Kennedy is currently writing a book with his longtime partner in environmental work, John Cronin. Cronin is a former commercial fisherman and defender of the Hudson River.

Due out in 1995, the book will deal with some of the legal cases Kennedy and Cronin have worked on together to prosecute more than 60 polluters, conversations with people who risked their jobs to talk to the environmental duo, and the adventuresome captures of conspicuous polluters. The book will be published by Houghton Mifflin.

During his earlier career, Kennedy served as Assistant District Attorney in New York City, worked on several political campaigns, and was state coordinator for Edward M. Kennedy's 1980 Presidential campaign.


Kennedy's love for nature also shows through in his personal life as he is a licensed master falconer and pursues a life-long enthusiasm for white water rafting. He has organized and led several expeditions to Latin America, including rafting on three little known rivers in Peru, Colombia and Venezuela.

Several of Kennedy's articles have appeared in publications including the *New York Times*, *Atlantic Monthly*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *Esquire* and *The Boston Globe*. Among his published books are *New York State Apprentice Falconer's Manual*, *New York State Department of Environmental Conservation*, and *Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr., A Biography*.

Enlistment issues studied

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Les Aspin has ordered a Department of Defense-wide study of first-term enlistment issues as a result of a recent Marine Corps policy to keep married people from enlisting in the service.

Secretary Aspin directed the Marine Corps to withdraw the policy Aug. 12, after it was issued by Marine Corps Commandant Gen. Carl E. Mundy Jr. The general had directed recruiters to stop enlisting married recruits after Sept. 30, 1995. He said "far too many" young Marines have failed marriages.

In reversing General Mundy's orders, Secretary Aspin noted, however, that the problems with young married recruits appear to be present in other services and "are not limited to finances or the operationally generated stress upon marriages."

He said that each service and department would be represented in the "comprehensive, systemic study of first-term enlistment issues." (Air Force News Service)

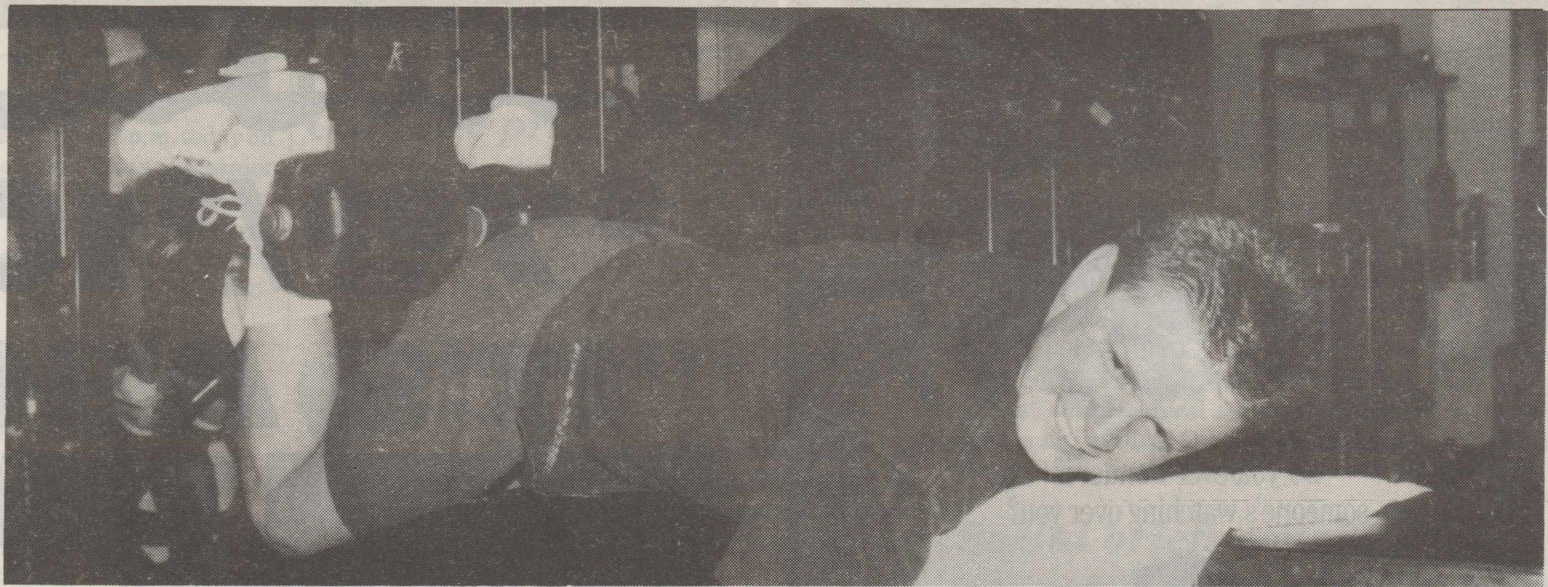
