R: 35th FTS facility improvement will enhance unit effectiveness

The 35th Flying Training Squadron is putting the finishing touches on the new addition to Bldg. 76.

The project is one of three facility improvement projects on base, totaling \$1.5 million. The addition was originally designed to be a new life support shop. However, due to new Air Education and Training Command sight picture guidance, the squadron duty desk, operations officer and operations flight were also to be moved into the new addition along with life support.

The 35th FTS commander put together a process action team to design the office layout for the squadron incorporating the operations and life support function into the new addition. The team used inputs from squadron personnel directly assigned to the operations flight and life support shop as well as the building contractor to develop and plan the layout of the squadron. This included an entryway/reception area, relocation of the administration section, a squadron lounge and mass briefing room, new life support and operations sections, coordination for furniture for each flight, and layout of the duty desk.

These changes are helping the squadron meet the recommendations of the sight pic-

The new addition will streamline the life support and flight operations by centralizing them in the squadron. The life support shop will reap the greatest benefits from the addition. In January, life support shops were decentralized command-wide, which put each shop in the individual flying squadron's chain of command. The new addition moves all of the 35th FTS life support functions into one building allowing all life support operations for instructors and students to be completed in the squadron instead of having to do helmet construction and pour in the 64th Operations Support Squadron. The new plan incorporates this into the new addition and also incorporates lockers above each parachute which keeps all of the pilot's flight gear in one central location.

The addition and reorganization of the 35th FTS will bring the squadron in line with the sight picture and make it one of the first squadrons in the command to do so. The use of the process action team was instrumental in designing the squadron's functions under one roof, thus allowing the squadron to continue to produce the world's best pilots well into the 21st century.

A sound you can live with Smoke detectors save lives

Most people have a natural fear of fires and burns, but feel relatively safe in smoke. The Reese Fire Department warns that smoke is the real killer in a fire. About eight out of every 10 fire deaths are due to breathing poisonous smoke and gases. Some victims never even see the flames.

Since smoke is lighter than air, it rises. In a building, it will wind up stairs and down hallways. To prevent smoke inhalation, stay low and crawl to the nearest exit as quickly as possible. Once out, stay out.

Although you can't see it, smoke is filled with toxic gases. Plastics in particular give off a highly poisonous gas when burned. Since most homes have large amounts of plastic furnishings and most offices use many items made of plastic,

fire in these places can be deadly. In addition, smoke contains carbon monoxide — a tasteless, odorless gas — that causes confusion, reduced mental capacity and eventually death. It is important to stay low to avoid breathing these poisons.

It is important to install and maintain smoke detectors to provide an early warning of fire and smoke. Exposure to smoke, even for a few seconds or minutes, can be fatal. Smoke detectors give you the extra edge you need to escape safely. The beeping sound of your smoke detector is your warning that fire or smoke has been detected. This is the time to follow the steps in your pre-fire plan:

- ☐ Alert everyone in the building.
- □ Call the fire department.
- ☐ Take action to extinguish the fire only if the fire is in its starting stage.
- ☐ Show the first arriving fire fighters the location of the fire.

Air Force, Navy aircraft fly in support of **United Nation's Operation Deny Flight**

United Nations ban on military flights in the airspace of Bosnia-Herzegovina continues into a sixth month amid speculation of a peace agreement to end the war.

As of Aug. 29, U.S. Air Force F-15, F-16 and KC-135 aircraft have flown more than 1,800 sorties in support of Operation Deny Flight—the U.N. backed action to enforce a no-fly zone

The fighters use Aviano AB, Italy, as a staging base, while tanker aircraft are flying out of Malpensa and NAS Sigonella,

WASHINGTON — The Italy. U.S. Navy F/A-18 and F-14 aircraft are supporting Deny Flight from the USS Theodore Roosevelt, which has been operating in the Adriatic.

> In addition to U.S. Air Force and Navy assets, France, United Kingdom, Spain, Turkey and the Netherlands have sent a variety of fighter, tanker and surveillance aircraft to support the operation.

> U.S. involvement in Deny Flight began April 12 when the U.N. deemed it necessary to ban all non-U.N. fixed-wing and rotary-wing aircraft in the airspace of Bosnia and

NATO aircraft have been "invincible" in Deny Flight operations, and are also capable of the close air support air-toground role, said an Allied Forces Southern Europe report on the operation.

In addition to on-going negotiations to end the war, there is renewed talk from Washington and U.N. headquarters for the allies to send more troops to Bosnia so a cease-fire will

without certain guidelines for decision-making. "When we decide that force needs to be used, we must and will retain the freedom to act as necessary to protect our interests."

VA urges home refinancing

HOUSTON (AFNS) - The Department of Veterans Affairs is urging people to consider refinancing their VA-guaranteed home loans to take advantage of today's lower interest rates.

Veterans can refinance their loans with private lending agencies by either regular refinancing or through an interest rate reduction refinancing loan.

The latter requires no out-of-pocket expenses, providing the lender absorbs all closing cost, say VA officials here.

Closing costs on VA-guaranteed loans are lower than rates on regular loans because the VA doesn't require credit checks or appraisals,

More than 1.5 million veterans have outstanding VA loans at interest rates of 9 percent or higher.

If homeowners refinanced these loans which average \$90,000 — at a rate of 7 percent, they would save \$254 million per month, officials said.

Air show

Blue Angels highlight Reese Community Appreciation Day activities.

The U.S. Navy's Blue Angels will perform at Reese Sept. 18.

The Blue Angels are the Navy's renowned flight demonstration squadron. They will be helping the wing celebrate the forty-sixth anniversary of the creation of the U.S. Air Force as a separate service on Sept. 18, 1947.

"This year's Air Force birthday celebration will also be a Community Appreciation Day," said Col. Roger Brady, 64th Flying Training Wing commander. "We in the U.S. Air Force can offer thanks to area residents for more than 50 years of cooperation and support between the base and its personnel, and the citizens of the Lubbock area community.

"Over the years," Colonel Brady explained, "there has been no change in the primary mission of Reese which has been 'to train pilots' since its establishment. With the arrival of 40 new T-1A Jayhawks during the past two years and the beginning of specialized undergraduate pilot training this past year, Reese is now the Air Force's premier pilot training base ready to lead the Air Education and Training Command into the 21st century."

Although the Blue Angels will be the featured flying attraction, there will be a number of other aircraft performing flyovers and flying capability demonstrations. The remainder of the aircraft will be on static display on the flightline parking ramp.

Off-base visitors will be admitted from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. During that time there will be a variety of continuous flying activities. Static display aircraft will be available for public inspection on the aircraft parking ramp.

More than 30, and possibly as many as 40 military and civilian aircraft will be on static display when the gates open. The display will include fighters like the Air Force's F-15 Eagle, the F-16 Fighting Falcon, and the F-111 and the Navy's F-14 Tomcat and A/F-18 Hornet. Attack aircraft like the Air Force's A-10 Thunderbolt II and AT-38 Talon, and the Navy's AV-8B Harrier will have cockpit viewing ladders available.

Transport aircraft such as the C-130 Hercules and possibly the C-141 StarLifter will be open for walk-through visitors. Both the giant KC-10 Extender and the KC-135 Stratotanker refuelers can be seen, as can a large variety of Air Force and Navy training aircraft. A few helicopters and a number of vintage aircraft historically significant to Reese will also be displayed.




