



Lieutenant Randolph, a Virginia native, chose an F-15 assignment at Tyndall AFB, Fla. She was the first to choose among her classmates and third overall in the command.

Quality Air Force

We all regularly make jokes about the high-tech world we live in. What was a \$2,000 computer system five years ago is now not much more than a boat anchor. Equipment upgrades are occurring at a phenomenal rate, and this really struck home 12 months ago in the Operations Group Learning Center. What had been ATC's best locally-produced audiovisual flight training videos during the last inspection cycle became the worst in the command, all because of technology upgrades.

For the Air Force to maintain its "world's greatest Air Force" status, quality training products are essential. Once our basic problem was recognized, we resolved to identify the scope of the problem and find solutions.

The first step in our problem-solving process was to build a team of experts from throughout the base. After extensive

consultation with both the operations and support group commanders, a core team of individuals — consisting of telecommunication and flying training experts — was assembled; they took the initial steps to resolve the problem.

What were the problems, real and perceived? Who were the customers? What was the desired end product? What agency appeared to have the answers? These were the kinds of questions being asked. The basic end product was easily defined: upgraded training products. So the team began to focus on one key area: how to get the high-tech equipment necessary to begin production of these high quality training videos.

The goal established, the team undertook a massive research effort, both to determine what equipment was needed and where the money would come from. Eventually 60,000 unfunded dollars were spent purchasing computers, software, stereo equipment and video recorders. At the same time, a massive self-help project began. A new multi-purpose production room was built; a tele-prompter

was designed and built from scratch; limited facility space was reallocated for better utilization. This provided the hardware and facility space necessary to do the job, but not the technical expert to put it all together.

That's when the personnel system went to work finding the right person for the job in managing all this high-tech gadgetry. Once identified, this individual went to work developing scripts and building production schedules designed to produce our new training videos.

The real test, had we hit the mark, was two-fold. First, our customers, the instructors and student pilots, evaluated the initial products as being far superior to the older videos they replaced. Second, the IG came in, reviewed the work, and rated the work as "Outstanding."

The process is not over. More videos are being produced weekly, the material is constantly being upgraded and continuously being evaluated by our customers, the student pilots, and ultimately the "world's greatest Air Force."

Reese doctor 'flies high' in ATC


A doctor in the 64th Medical Squadron is "flying high" following recognition from ATC as being the best in his field.

Maj. (Dr.) David Armstrong was recently named flight surgeon of the year for the command. His selection was due in no small part to what squadron officials described as "turnaround in both quality and morale" in the hospital thanks to his "dramatic" caliber of leadership.

Major Armstrong came to Reese 16 months ago, having worked in both private civilian practice and as a flight surgeon on KC-135s and B-52s at Barksdale AFB, La. He then flew as a flight surgeon throughout U.S. Air Forces in Europe for four years before coming to Reese. His performance here as chief of aeromedical services led to his selection as chief of hospital services.

A seven-year service veteran, the major's efforts were credited with allowing the hospital to continue its support of the wing mission undiminished despite "massive" cutbacks in funding.

Hospital details new rules for filling prescriptions

Active-duty personnel treated at a local civilian hospital emergency room and given a written drug prescription must be seen the next day in the primary care clinic. Enough medication will be given to the member by the civilian ER until the primary care clinic reopens. Active duty members may **not** fill a civilian prescription from a local civilian source.

Non-active-duty members treated at a civilian hospital

(St. Mary of the Plains, Methodist Hospital or Highland Medical Center) emergency room and given a written drug prescription may fill it from a civilian pharmacy under CHAMPUS.

However, the member will be liable for the deductible and cost share.

They also may choose to obtain the medication from the base pharmacy. To fill a civilian ER prescription at the base pharmacy on the weekend or holiday, an appointment must be made (3245) with a medical provider. To fill a civilian ER prescription during a weekday, present the

written prescription at the base pharmacy.

The prescription will be filled if it is available. If not available, the member may choose to fill the prescription at a civilian pharmacy under CHAMPUS or make an appointment to be seen at the primary care clinic. Enough medication will be given to the member by the civilian ER until the primary care clinic reopens.

The following pharmacies accept CHAMPUS: L & H Pharmacy, Walmart Stores, K-Mart Stores, United Supermarkets, Eckerd Drugs and Caprock Drugs.

Environmental appraisal aims to keep Reese clean, help members

Most people try to be responsible for the environment to some degree, but at the end of this month the entire base will be involved.

The base is committed to protecting the health of its personnel, their family members and the environment around them. This is currently being done through a base wide environmental appraisal, otherwise known as the Environmental Compliance Assessment and Management Program or "ECAMP."

The primary objective of ECAMP is to find and address environmental problems that could impact our mission, jeopardize our health or erode the public's confidence in the Air Force as an environmental pacesetter. The 1993 ECAMP will be conducted at Reese May 24 through 28.

The purpose of the ECAMP is to allow Reese to evaluate itself on the basis of federal, state and Air Force regulations. Results of this assessment will allow Reese to correct areas of weakness internally before outside agencies such as the Environmental Protection Agency or Texas Water Commission become involved. Though this may appear on the surface as another IG-type inspection, it is nothing of the sort. The purpose of the evaluation is not to find problem areas and bring the law down on those who caused the problem.

Instead, the team will be looking for areas

of non-compliance, whatever the cause, with the sole purpose of fixing them in an expeditious manner. In order to accomplish this goal successfully, the ECAMP team will need the cooperation of everyone on base in order to identify any problem areas. Those being assessed are encouraged to ask any questions or voice any concerns they have about existing laws which may have an environmental impact. Wing members should remember the ECAMP assessor is there to help them do things the way the law says.

This year's ECAMP team chief is Lt. Col. Frank Shealy. The team will be comprised of personnel from the environmental flight, bioenvironmental engineering, Lockheed, civil engineering, fire department, supply, transportation and fuels maintenance. The assessment will target the following areas: air emissions, hazardous materials, water quality, solid and hazardous waste, petroleum oils and lubricants, pesticides, natural resources and noise management.

Is an ECAMP successful if it finds nothing wrong? Probably not, because there are bound to be some problems. Is it successful if it finds a lot wrong? Since Reese's environmental compliance has been good in the past, this probably will not be the case. But with the environment becoming more and more important every day, it is necessary to maintain our efforts to comply on a continual basis. To make Reese an environmental leader will require the work of everyone on base. One way wing members can contribute is to help the ECAMP team to their job this year.



CE shop lights up Reese ball fields

New lamps conserve energy, provide more illumination

Play ball!

Thanks to the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron, local community ball teams can now play ball safely at night.

Just recently, a team of base

civil engineers completely revamped the lighting systems to the Reese ball fields. With a little initiative and ingenuity from SSgt. Rudy Almonte, NCO in charge of exterior electric in the infrastructure section, his team of electricians completely redesigned and upgraded both the Little League baseball and

women's softball fields.

They replaced 16 utility poles with new aluminum fixtures and installed 46 high intensity discharge light fixtures with new and more efficient 1,500 watt halide lamps. These new fixtures improved area lighting, and helped reduce electrical demand to the base power system.

Additionally, eight old, inefficient transformers were replaced with state-of-the-art new ones. Because of this team's efforts, CES also expects to see signifi-

cant savings. For example, for every hour of use, the Air Force will save eight dollars. This may not sound like much, but when three games are played each night, four nights a week for 10 weeks, that figures to be a savings of \$1,280 each season.

Another significant achievement was to mesh these new lighting systems into the existing overhead primary and secondary electrical distribution. The result: no more ricochet foul balls!

With help from fellow engineers in our heavy repair sec-

tion, the fields now have underground wiring.

There are no overhead cables to get in the batter's way. Batters can swing for the fence, fielders can catch those long fly balls, and Reese members can enjoy playing ball in the hours of darkness.




