'As It Looks From Here'

Omar Burleson, M. C. 17th District, Texas

WASHINGTON, D. C. — THIS COLUMN on several occasions has tried to point out that the Congress actually has he exercise of discretion over a relatively small amount government expenditures. Twenty percent is a fair estimate in each year's appropriations. This is true if the percentage for national defence remains the same as now recommended. This amounts to approximately sixty Arcent of the \$77,000,000,000,000 Budget.

A SIMILAR SITUATION EX-ISTS with reference to the general powers of government. The Federal Government has grown to such proportions that it is impossible for the Congress itself to keep absolute control over the committees, the bureaus and commissions which in recent years it has created.

THE CONGRESS PASSES THE LAWS, but under our system the Executive Department, headed by the President, administers those laws and the Supreme Court passes upon their constitutionality. The Congress does not attempt to spell out administrative procedures for the application of the laws is passes. It necessarily delegates the authority for the administration either to the Executive Department or these myriad bureaus and commission, the Federal Trade Commission, the Civil Aeronautics Administration, Securities and Exchange Commission, Interstate Commerce Commission, and a long list of others, at some time or other touch the life and business of most everyone in the Country. They make their own rules and procedures to carry out what supposedly is the intent of the Congress, and while a Congressman's duties may involve trying to assist a constituent in getting service from a bureau, a commission, a committee or a department of some kind or other, there come times when he must also protect his constituents against heir encroachment. Problems of this nature con-

if, during these last twenty-five years or so as Government has grown bigger and bigger, the Congress has created a sort of Frankenstein which is becoming bigger than the Congress, the Executive and the Judiciary, in control over the lives of our citizens. These accumulated agencies have powerful control over about everything we do — what we eat, what we wear, our travel, when and how we invest our money; over telephone, telegraph, radio and television communications; over the fires on our hearths and the gold in our teeth.

THIS SECOND - HAND TYPE government control can reach proportions dangerous to our system of government. The intent and purpose of this "fourth" branch of government is, I suppose, necessary. On the other hand, it should warn us that it can grow to the proportions that our nation will begoverned by people who were not elected and who are not directly answerable to the people. We should be warned against the continuous growth of Federal Government which makes more boards, commissions and bureaus necessary.

EACH TIME A NEW PROVISION OF LAW is enacted or a new service furnished, it becomes necessary that some agency of government administer it. If it is not under the direct jurisdiction of one already in existence, another is created. This suggests that bigness begets bigness, and that the Federal Government in Washington becomes the "central" government warned against by our forefathers who created the system.



How Will You Have Your Chicken

Texas is a chicken-raising and 1001 Crane St., Sweetwater, Texas province is in spiritual satatues, chicken - eating state. More than two million broiling or frying chickens are bought by Texas consumers each week, and the popularity of the budget-wise bird is ever-increas-

To determine just what sort of bird the Texas fryer buyer is looking for when he or she goes shopping, the Texas State Fair in Dallas was the site for comprehensive con-For the vast majority of Texans, sumer preference tests on certain

The tests, conducted among 2,000 men and women attending the State Fair, were directed by personnel This state of affairs developed from the Texas Agricultural Experi-

ment Station of Texas A&M College. Items on which Fair visitors were asked to indicate their choice included: skin "color" __ light, medium or dark yellow; method of precutting chickens ___ into 6 pieces (as in commonly done), 10 or 13 pieces; type of wrapping for prepacked birds __ conventional clear cellophane, colored cellophane or aluminum wrap.

Conclusions showed that most of those tested (57 percent of men. wide inspection law for poultry. 55% of women) preferred a medium yellow skin color for broiler chickens although a considerable number preferred a dark yellow color and very few (13% of men. low, almost white, skin color.

> Although most poultry offered for sale in Texas stores is packed with the carcass cut into 6 pieces, most consumers selected the carcass cut into either 10 or 13 pieces, with no significant preference between the two. This is probably because many housewives either do not know how to cut up a frying chicken or else have no desire to do so.

> In the test for wrap preference, groups of poultry carcasses cut into six pieces were packed in pulpboard trays and wrapped in clear, yellow or red cellophane or in wrapping paper with an exterior aluminum finish. Eighty-three percent of those expressing a choice took the transparent cellophane overwrap now commonly used. Only 8 percent expressed a choice for the alcminumwrapped package, probably because it would give better protection if the poultry were to be held frozen before consumption.
