

Historical Background Of Insurance

Insurance, in simple terms, can be described as shifting the cost of a possible loss from a person or company to an insurance company, in xchange for a fee called a prem. Basically, insurance means he sprond of risk so that many pay smail cost, instead of a few unortunates suffering ruinous losses.

Records show that primitive sysems of insurance existed as long as 4,500 years ago.

Protection for owners of ships and cargoes was one of the earliest forms of insurance and was practiced by the Greeks and the Chinese. Ship and cargo insurance also developed rapidly in England as that country became a leading sea power.

It was in England, too, after the Great London Fire of 1666, that men like Dr. Nicolas Barbon and Charles Povey helped make the idea of insurance against loss from fire a reality. These pioneers were soon followed by companies that used the capital of a group of men, rather than a single individual, to pay policyholders' losses.

So began capital stock company insurance, providing sound protection backed by funds invested by stockholders who own the company and whose profits are paid in the form of dividends.

Fire insurance companies were organized in the United States in the time of Benjamin Franklin and were modeled in a general way after those in England. In succeeding years capital stock companies have become the outstanding type of insurer, providing about three-fourths of the country's needs.

From protection against fire, insurance developed to meet other needs for protection, such as protection against windshorm and explosion losses. As different perils to which people were exposed became general insurance stepped in to back up the individual or company by assuming the risk. Hail, earthquake, tornado, steamboiler, automobile, inland marine, liability and a host of other forms of protection came into

Property insurance companies became stronger as men learned from the bitter lessons taught by the great conflagrations and disasers. Fire prevention, strong municipal water supplies, wellequipped fire departments, better building practices and alarm systems-all were encouraged by capital stock fire insurance companies. These, combined with stronger financial reserves, the use of re-insurance between companies, careful spreading of risk-no company assuming too much liability in one area-have given the public sound and reliable property insurance.

Modern life, despite a broaded attention to safety, has created new hazards. But with increasing confidence people have turned to insurance for protection from these haz-

A Matter Of Climate

It can't be done, of course-but it would give us all an eye-popping realization of just how dependent we are on oil if, for just one day, oil products were delivered to the door, like milk.

That job would take a huge army of strong-backed delivery men and a vast fleet of trucks. For the average family of four, more than eight gallons of oil products would have to be delivered, to meet the needs of that single day. And this is only the beginning.

For instance, the year 1965 is just around the corner as Mistory goes. By that year there will be 18 million more people living in this country. There will be some 14 million more cars and trucks on the road. There will be 12 million more homes. Industrial activity is scheduled to increase by a mighty 33 per cent.

That means we will need more oil-almost incredibly large quantities of it. To provide that oil, the economists now say, the industry will have to invest close to \$80 billion. Yes, \$80 billion—to find oil, and to build the equipment for refining and distributing it.

Oil faces a Herculean job. But it's a job that will be done—if the industry can continue to operate in a free competitive market, and in an economic climate that spurs men to take risks and freely spend their energies and resources on progress, in hope of profit.





The law under which cotton farmers are now operating contains provisions for the voluntary release and reallotment of 1959 cotton allotments. Where the release is made, the released acreage is retained on the releasing farm as history and is used in figuring future allotments as though it were planted. But,

Cherry points out, it will not qualify a farm for an old farm allotment as having planted cotton in one of the three previous years.

It is very important that released allotments be reapportioned and planted on other farms in order to hold county and state planting history. The released and reapportioned allotments must be planted if they are to remain a part of the acreage history for the county and state, emphasized Cherry.

Released allotments may be realloted to any old or new cotton farm on which additional acreage is needed and will be planted. Any excess of released allotments in a county may be surrendered to the State Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Committee for releasing county has received all of the allotment he can plant.

Use of in-the-furrow fungicides at planting time may be an effective aid for controlling cotting seedling disease in some area, says Harlan Smith, extension plant patho-

Cotton seedling disease is one of the major diseases attacking cotton in Texas, Smith pointed out. Last year it cost Texas farmers a little over 4 1-2 million dollars.

Informaion concerning use of inthe-furrow fungicides at planting time, a relatively new seedling disease control practice, was first published by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in January of 1958. About 400 Texas producers used the practice on a total of 26,-523 acres last year.

Most of the treated acreage was centered in the High Plains and Lower Rio Grande Valley, Smith explained. However, there were small tests in several other areas. A Wharton county grower tried it on 50 acres and obtained quite favor-

FARMING COSTS - prices paid by farmers for wages, machinery and other necessary production items - are expected to increase this year over 1958 by a billion dollars or more. At the same time, income from farm produce is estimated to decline by about the same amount.

FARM PRICES HAVE gone down approximately 20 per cent. If farm products had risen by as much as the cost of things the farmer has had to buy since 1952, consumers would be paying at least 10 billion a year more for their food and clothing than they pay at the present time.

MR. BENSON WAS FRANK in telling the Congress that, with lower prices, many farmers would qui the farm and seek other means of making a living. If his advice is followed, it would bankrupt at least a million farm families and drive them into the cities where already there are almost five million unemployed. Already there is an exodus to the towns and cities, which calls for more public housing and other Federal Government spending. Figures show that the average farm income is less than one-half that of the average factory worker, and that the average city worker can buy 50 per cent more food now with pay for an hour's work than he could in 1940.

UNDER THE POLICIES PRAC-TICED during the last six years, the cost of Farm Programs incretsed from \$1 1-2 billion to the present \$7 1-2 billion.

THE GENERAL BREAKDOWN of the present Program makes it certain that the farmer is receiving little of the cost.

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

It contains a clip-ous registration card for employers of household workers to mail to Internal Revenue Service for tax reporting forms.

"Employers paying their maids. cooks, chauffers, companions, yardmen, and other domestic help cash wages of more than \$50 in a calendar quarter of the year must make quarterly reports to Internal Revenue", R. R. Tuley, Jr., said. "The report must be accompanied by the payment of 5% social security tax on wages paid. This tax is shared equally by employee and employer."
