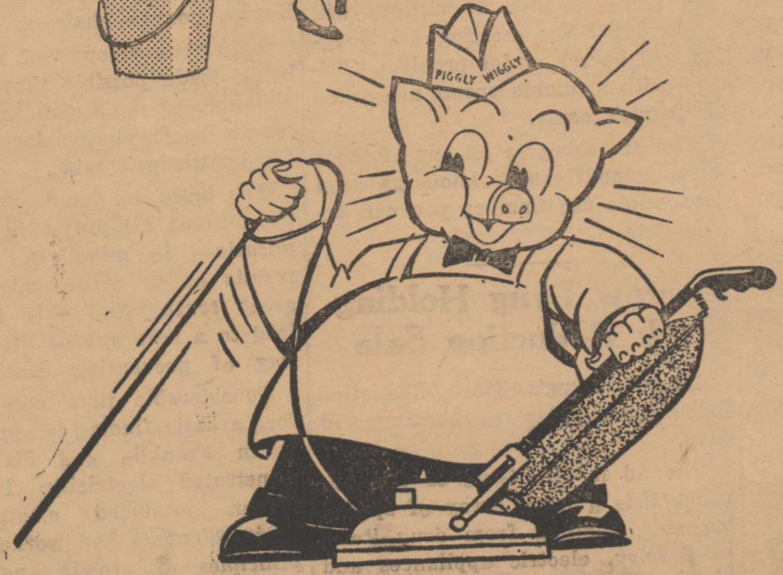

## NEWS from your \*\*\* County \*\*\* Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

Several Fisher County Farmers and Ranchers attended the Annual Field Day at the Experiment Station at Spur last Friday. Some of those attending from Fisher County were: Glennon and Estel Jamison, Kenneth Curry, J. O. Roberts, Glen Webb, and Jack Smith.

The Field Day consisted of tours of the wheat pastures, brush control work on range land, and the feed lots where research work is being conducted using some of the antibiotics and hormones in the feed rations.

Iron chlorosis, a condition of lawngrass and ornamentals characterized by yellow or bleached leaves due to iron deficiency, was favorably combatted with powdered iron chelate about 85 percent of the time of 78 demonstrations conducted by county agents last year.

Demonstrations were conducted in various areas of the state in soils ranging from sands to clays and from acid to alkaline.

"The problem is usually associated with soils high in lime, but sometimes occurs on acid soils," explained W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist. "Nitrogen deficiency symptoms are similar to those of iron chlorosis and homeowners should make sure nitrogen needs are met before treating for iron deficiency."

Mild cases of the deficiency may be corrected with dry applications of iron sulfate, Bennett said. More severe cases on lawn grasses usually require treatment with iron applied as a spray, since it is generally more effective in this form.

Iron chelates are generally more effective and give longer-lasting effects than iron sulfate. Manufacturer's directions for use of the chelates should be followed carefully. Suggested rates vary with the plant being treated and the condition of the soil.

Treatment about every four to six weeks may be necessary to maintain the desired color in areas where the problem is common or severe, Bennett said.

The first week after hatching is the most critical time in a chick's life. Since dead chicks return no profit, it is very important to take every step to make living conditions in the brooder as ideal as possible, advised Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman.

"The first step is to buy high-quality chicks from a reputable hatchery," Wormeli said. "Have the brooder set up and regulated when they arrive and you're off to a good start."

The brooder, all watering and feeding utensils, and the inside walls of the house should have been cleaned and scrubbed with a solution that will kill external parasites, he explained. The brooder thermostat should be cleaned and adjusted so it will operate within a three-to-five degree range. About 10 square inches of floor space per chick should be allowed under the hover and the temperature should be set according to the brooder manufacturer's recommendations.

Feed and water should be easily available to the chicks. One inch of feeder space per chick and a broadbase fountain of watering per 100 chicks is sufficient. The lip of the feeders should be no more than two inches above the floor and for the first week or so they should be kept full so the chick can eat easily.

A draft guard around the brooder will lower fuel costs and keep chicks from wandering away from the hover. The guard should be 1 or 1.2 feet high and should be located about 4 feet from the brooder.

Litter should be kept free of dust and mold. It should be about 3 inches deep. Wood shavings, peanut hulls, ground corn cobs and cane litter are four common materials.

"Observance of these few simple rules," he said, "can mean higher livability and more profit in the long run."

### CALLED OF GOD

Having the talent and opportunity and seeing the need is sufficient to go to work for the Lord.

### Another Example Of Red Cross Work

ABILENE, TEXAS — Two Callahan County brothers, made orphans by a tornado 21 years ago in Clyde, Texas, have made history for the Red Cross in the Midwestern Area.

Until a few years ago they received Red Cross assistance checks, and the help given them through their childhood and young manhood represents the longest deferred assistance record in the Midwestern Area.

Until they graduated from high school, Donald Rutledge, 23, of Baird, and his brother Darryl, 21, of Clyde, received Red Cross checks. It all started when Darryl was an infant in arms and Donald was there.

Ollie Lena Olsen, executive secretary for the Tylor County Chapter of the American Red Cross dug into Red Cross records and discovered the Rutledges' "record."

It all came about as the result of a tornado in Clyde June 10, 1938, which claimed the lives of the Rutledge brothers' parents and some 12 other people.

The boys' parents, an uncle, and a neighbor were killed when they drove their cars into the path of the tornado while trying to escape. Their abandoned home was untouched by the storm.

Donald and Darryl were thrown into a ditch by the impact of the storm. For two hours Donald, 3, held the head of his three-month-old brother above the water level in the ditch.

Finally rescued by three telephone repairmen, the boys were taken to a Clyde drugstore for treatment amid the wounded left

in the tornado's wake.

One of the linemen, W. E. (Red) George, described the rescue this way: "There was a little boy looking up at me. He was braced on his knee, his left arm and hand holding up an infant's head. The water was even with the baby's head, nearly even with its mouth. The little one had apparently been on its face. It cried when the light flashed in its eyes."

Rearred by their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Johnson, the boys began receiving monthly Red Cross checks which continued until they graduated from Clyde High School — Donald in 1952 and Darryl in 1955. In addition, all medical and hospital bills were assumed for the two children.

The Rutledge boys' aid has surpassed Red Cross assistance records in some 16 states from Texas to North Dakota, Miss Olsen said.

Donald now recalls hearing the voices of the approaching linemen. "I remember that the lineman spanked my little brother to get the circulation started," Donald said. "I know why now, but it made me mad then," he laughed.

He still remembers the name of the Red Cross nurse who took care of them, Donald said. Her name was Fay Anderson, he said.

Donald is a family man who works for the State Highway Department. Married to the former Mary Grace Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Medford Walker of Baird, he himself is the father of a 3-year-old, Donald Gale.

Darryl, who works for a wholesale florist in Abilene, was married to the former Jerry Gayle Barnett last June 6. Donald served as his best man.

## About Your HEALTH

Since 1954, when there were 3,037 cases of polio, Texas has seen a gradual decline in the number of polio cases. Credit for the decline is generally attributed to the advent of the Salk vaccine.  
 Last year there were only 610 cases of paralytic and non-paralytic polio reported to the Communicable Disease Control Division of the Texas State Department of Health.  
 The sad fact of the matter is that 76 percent of the paralytic polio cases occurred in persons who had not received any of the Salk inoculations.  
 Equally shocking is the fact that almost nine out of ten of the paralytic polio cases had not completed the basic series of three prescribed shots of the anti-polio vaccine.  
 A large segment of the school age children of young adults have taken advantage of the protection afforded by three-shot series.  
 However, many older people have been lax. But worse still is the number of families who have neglected to have their pre-school age children inoculated.  
 Last year, 65 percent of the cases of paralytic polio struck at small children in the birth-to-four age group.  
 These victims couldn't do anything about receiving the Salk shots themselves.  
 The burden of responsibility falls on those parents with pre-school age children who either don't care, don't know or don't believe that paralytic polio is still strictly down victims—monthly tiny children.  
 A steady decline in all forms of polio has been the reward received from the thousands of dollars spent for research to develop the Salk vaccine.  
 So much so has been the success of the vaccine that the principal private foundation which sponsored its development has shifted its activities of research to other diseases. There could be no better commentary than that.  
 But even more important are the thousands of victims who have been spared the pain, heartache and crippling after effects of paralytic polio.  
 Summer is coming with its usual rise in the number of polio cases. See your physician immediately so that he may start the series of three shots as soon as possible.  
 And by all means have your pre-school age children protected. (This is a weekly feature of the Public Health Division, Texas State Department of Health).

## Indigent TB Patients Need More Assistance

SAN ANTONIO, "Most obvious gap in TB-control in Texas is lack of help in communities for medical indigent TB patients," Dr. John W. Middleton of Galveston, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, pointed out to delegates of the association in concluding ses-

sions of the 51st annual meeting here Saturday. Dr. Middleton commented on better patient care now available in state TB hospitals but stated that a real handicap to tuberculosis control existed since there are only 36 public TB clinics in counties in the State. These serve a total population of 5,783,088. About three and a half million Texans, he noted, live in 230 counties which have no

TB clinic facilities for persons unable to afford private medical care. He explained that many patients discharged from state TB hospitals are given instructions to continue taking medicine, but they are unable to buy that medicine or to afford private doctors and the counties in which they live offer no clinic facilities.

Adopted was a 1959 program by the association which would work toward establishment of more clinics in Texas. Also adopted was a plan to form Texas' first "area" association on tuberculosis control program. These counties all have a high incidence of tuberculosis. A grant \$5,000 from the National Tuberculosis Association was announced to further work of this area group.

Dr. C. A. Selby of Sinton, reporting on rehabilitation efforts for former tuberculosis patients, noted that Texas ranked 49th in its per capita support of rehabilitation. said Dr. Selby, "We're not doing as good a job as we might do with ex-TB patients, or with others in need of rehabilitation. We are handicapped for funds. Texas annually turns back 1 1-2 million dollars of Federal funds because it cannot supply its comparatively small share necessary to receipt those Federal funds".

Dr. Elliott Mendenhall of Dallas spoke to the group on legislation now being considered by the Texas House of Representatives. Termed the "Tuberculosis Code," (House Bill 421), the bill was prepared by a group of people representing the Texas Tuberculosis Association and the Texas Medical Association and many other groups interested in control of this disease. Object of the bill is to bring all regulations regarding TB into a single bill and to make that bill modern and adequate.

Dr. J. Edward Johnson of Austin noted the need for a model general hospital TB control program, based on his study of exposure in general hospitals of nurses, doctors, etc., to patients with unknown tuberculosis.

Dr. Henry Hoskins of San Antonio urged that the Texas Tuberculosis Association stay resolutely in its field of tuberculosis control and only in that field despite the announcement that the National Tuberculosis Association's efforts would be directed to other respiratory diseases as well as tuberculosis. His recommendation was readily accepted.

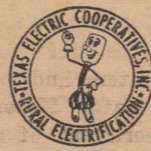
