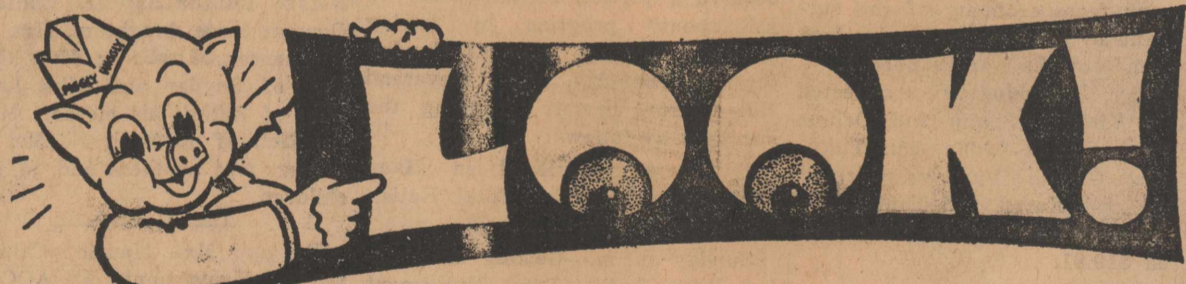

Grain sorghum producers and shippers in the Texas Plains are cautioned by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to be sure vehicles hauling grain are free of any other seed than grain sorghum.

A number of truckloads and carlots being shipped from Texas to the Western states have been denied entry after a few cotton seeds were found mixed with the grain.

Shippers are being required to fumigate these contaminated shipments—at a cost varying from \$50 to \$100 a load—before crossing the state line, reports D. M. McEachern of the Bureau of Plant Pest Control

at San Antonio.

The states have regulations affecting import of cottonseed and other agricultural products.

Indications are that the grain sorghum possibly was contaminated while still on the farm, due mainly to use of the same vehicles for hauling both cotton and grain sorghum.

Dairymen over the state are finding that the best way to handle the problem of calf crops and what to do with them is to control the breeding program.

material the year round requires planning and regular attention. Good litter management is practiced by many poultrymen with very good results, says Ben Mormeli, extension poultry husbandman.

Dirt floors are used for most poultry houses in warmer climates. There should be level and packed dirt fill several inches deep over the floor area. Then the area around the house should be graded and trenched sufficiently to keep surface rain water out of the house. Sidewall protection will exclude most of the wind driven rain.

A chicken or turkey drinks about two pounds of water for each pound of feed that it eats, notes Mormeli. A large share of this water is disposed of in the droppings. Good litter should quickly absorb this moisture and readily dry with good ventilation.

Select a litter that is free of mold and very low in dust. If mold spores are inhaled by the bird, they may start to grow in the air sacs and cause serious loss. Also, the litter should be porous and fluffy and cut into small pieces to keep it from matting.

Use sufficient litter to do a good job, advised the husbandman. This means litter should be three or four inches deep for started chicks or poults, and six inches or more for laying hens. Litter delivered to the farm may range in cost from \$10 to \$50 per ton, depending on the type bought. Among the more common litters used in Texas are wood shavings, sugar cane litter and peanut shells, Mormeli says. Corn cobs, cut straw and peat can also be used. One ton of litter should provide a four inch thick covering for 1,000 to 1,500 square feet of floor space.

An adequate amount of good litter is an essential requirement for floor type poultry production and should be included in the essential costs. The cost of gambling on insufficient litter can be hazardous, warns the husbandman.

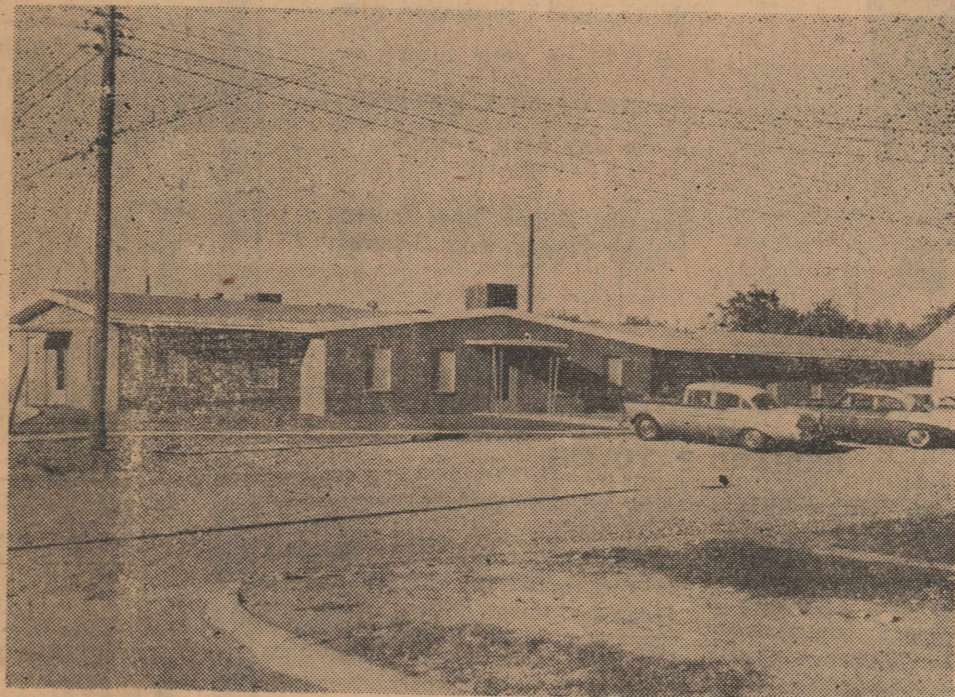

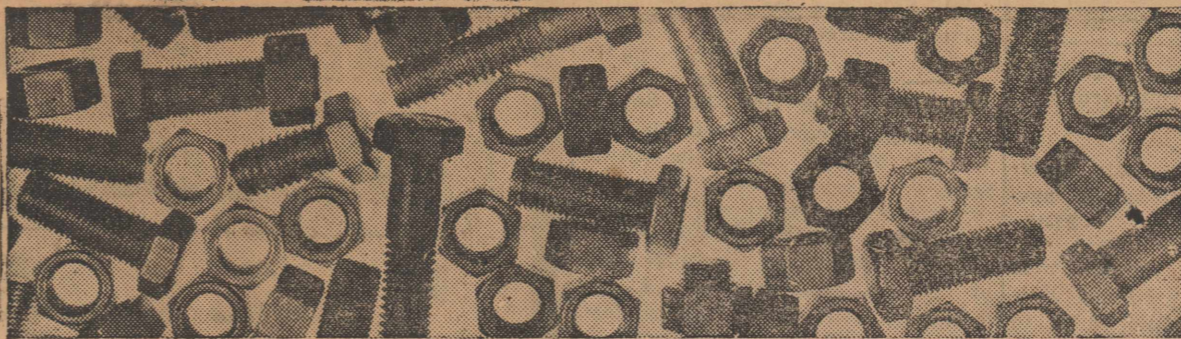

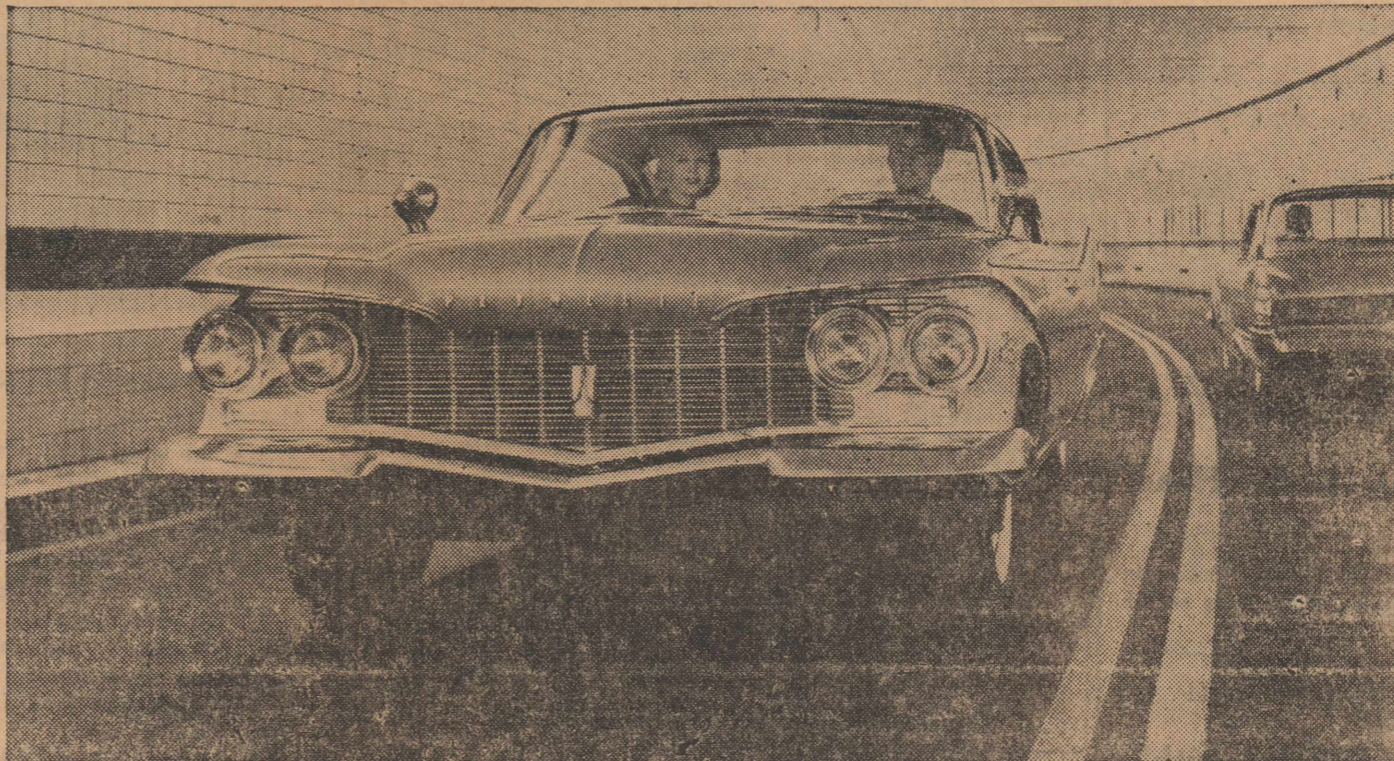

Deadline Date Near For NROTC

High school seniors and graduates have only until November 14 to apply for the Navy's Reserve Officer Training Corps, vice Admiral H. P. Smith, Chief of Naval Personnel, said today. Applicants will take nationwide competitive examination on December 12 as the first step toward an appointment as midshipman.

Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Academy, the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at civilian college of his choice which has an NROTC unit. All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an annual retainer of \$600 for four years. During the summers the student goes on interesting training cruises to many parts of the world. After completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty as a prospective career officer with the Navy's far-flung fleets.

High school seniors and graduates who have reached the 17th anniversary of birth and have not reached the 21st birthday on July 1 1960 may apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid physical exam early in 1960. From the pool of qualified young men remaining in competition, approximately 1600 will be selected to begin their naval careers next September.

The NROTC college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty with the Navy and Marines. Separate quotas are established for applicants within these services.

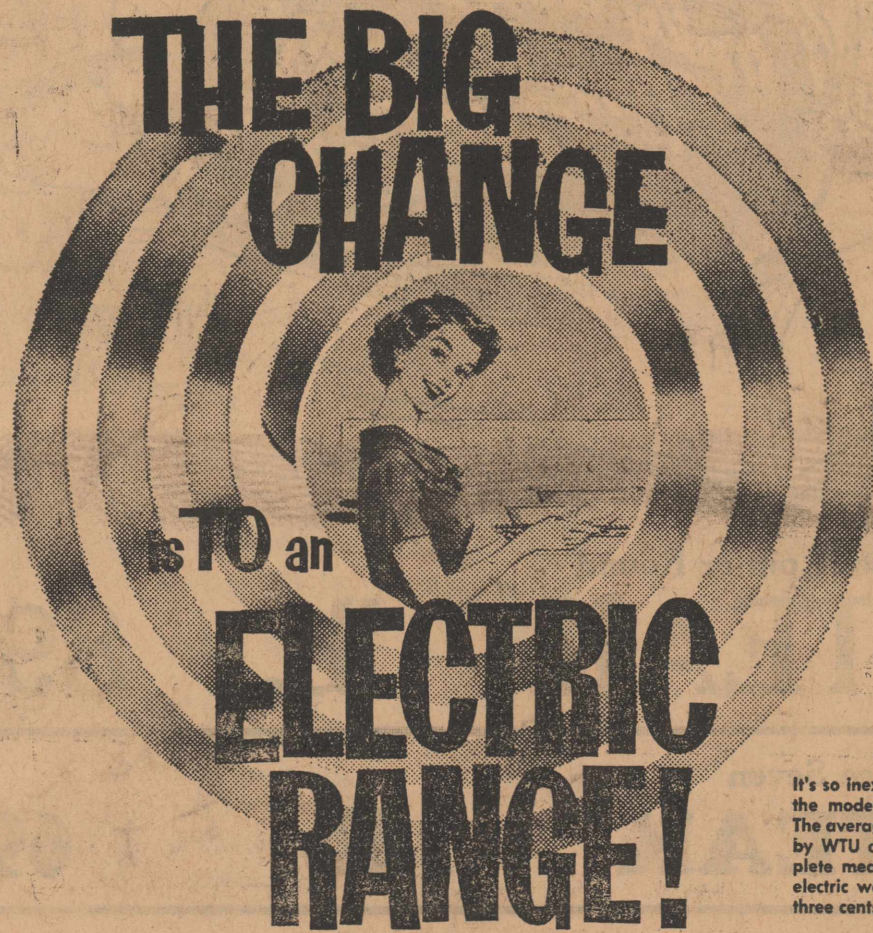

One thing about the "good old days" of yesteryear—people probably didn't have to put up with as much of the pang of indigestion as we modernists do.

There is evidence that the stresses and strains of modern life, the lack of exercise and improper diets, cause the stomach to over-secrete and bring on the aggravating gas and burning sensation of many types of indigestion.

One of the most common forms of stomach upset, physicians say, is caused by nervous excitement. You probably can recall days when an important business deal, an unexpected event, an accident or pressure of work set your stomach churning. The stomach is, of course, largely controlled by the involuntary nervous system.

Hasty eating, improper chewing of food is another common cause. Foods having an irritating effect on stomach lining are important sources of trouble. Among them are those which are highly seasoned with salt and pepper and spices.

Things were different in the old days. Life was calmer, less hurried and less hurried. And frugality will less indigestion.

Modern use of condiments and strongly flavored foods cause the stomach to over-secrete hydrochloric acid. In normal people the stomach tends to neutralize what it over-secretes, but people with ulcers suffer painful "indigestion."

Greasy foods are particularly troublesome for people with malfunctioning gall bladders or liver disease. Fats stimulate gall bladder action thus creating an outpouring of bile. Extra exertion of the defective gall gladder is felt as a painful cramp.

The degree of ripeness of a fruit or vegetable might be responsible for fermentation in the stomach, causing an unpleasant belching or more severe stomach upset.

Tannic acid is contained in three of America's most commonly used hot drinks. Nicotine, a product of

tobacco smoke, is known to be a powerful stomach irritant.

So called persistent indigestion should always be checked by a physician, since it can be caused by a stomach disorder, a diseased gall bladder, liver or pancreas, possible heart disease or many other conditions that only an alert medical practitioner can detect.

Calcium Arsenate Is Boll Weevil Killer

Resistant and non-resistant boll weevils finds it hard to escape the toxic effect of modern calcium arsenate. For many years calcium arsenate was considered only effective, in killing the boll weevil, when eaten by this scourge of the cotton farmer. Research has now proven that calcium arsenate is effective as a contact insecticide against the cotton boll weevil.

Robert Hunter of the Entomology Department of the University of Arkansas conducted extensive research to determine the effectiveness of calcium arsenate as a contact insecticide against the boll weevil. The results of Mr. Hunter's research proved that when boll weevils, with their mouth parts sealed, were dusted with calcium arsenate the insecticide was lethal to the weevil. The results of the work done at the University of Arkansas were later verified by research work conducted at one of the cotton insect laboratories of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Since calcium arsenate is not readily volatile it has a long residual and when combined with phosphates or chlorinated hydrocarbons the combination gives a rapid kill for existing infestation and remains on the cotton plant to protect it from further generation and migratory weevils. Modern low lime calcium arsenate is compatible with phosphates and chlorinated hydrocarbons. A formulation containing low lime calcium
