### WWI Vets Dist. Convention Here Sun.

Huckaby, local farmer-stockman and leader in veterans affairs for the past forty years, was one of the organizers of the Fisher County Barracks Nov. 9, 1958. His first district post was that of Sr. Vice Commander. He served in the Navy during World War I.

R. Q. Evans of Baird, State Commander of World War I Veterans, will be principal speaker at the afternoon business session of the District Convention. John Jackson, local Quartermaster, will be Convention secretary.

### Lions Hear Talk On Crippled Children Camp

The Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville was honored Tuesday with a special program at the Rotan Lions Club meeting.

Rev. Earl Hord paid tribute to the members of the Lions Club and the other Lions of Texas who are providing the handicapped children of Texas with a camp of their own.

The camp was opened in 1953 and accommodated 236 crippled blind, deaf and mute youngsters the first year. Since then, the camp has grown steadily until it is now serving up a summer filled with fun to 720 children each year.

Since it was opened, the unique camp has given 4,284 youngsters the thrill of a lifetime as they learn to swim, to camp out doors under the stars and develop new skills in various handicrafts.

The camp represents an investment of \$600,000 in 16 permanent buildings. It is financed by dues of Lions and by gifts from members clubs and friends of crippled children everywhere.

For the past three years, the camp has been in operation the year around. During the other months, the camp is used as a training center for the adult blind.

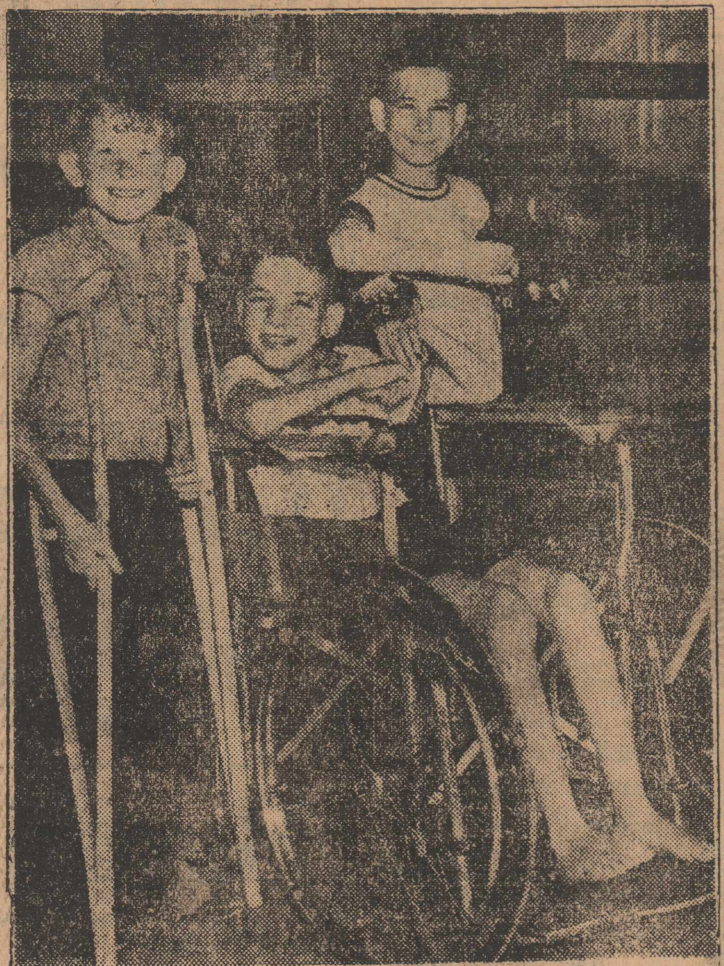

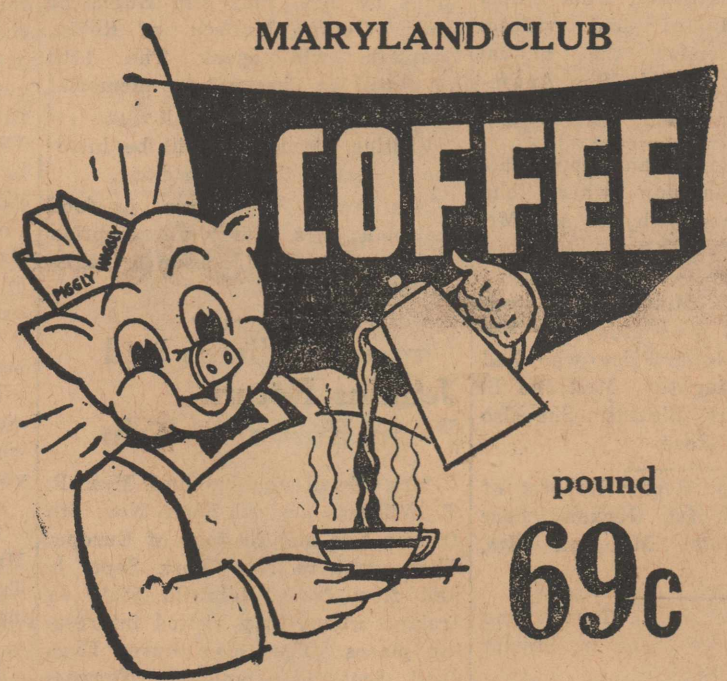

Not so very long ago, as the American Meat Institute recalls, it was widely believed that night air was dangerous for small children.

This, of course, was an old wives' tale without foundation in fact. And there used to be many other commonly held ideas which were equally foolish and dangerous.

One was that pork was an unhealthy food. Indeed, in the old days it was a common practice to totally eliminate meat from the diet in cases of illness.

Nutritional science has banished that notion. Pork, we now know, is one of the most valuable food sources of thiamine and is rich in other B vitamins and in various essential minerals.

And meat of one kind or another, the scientist tells us, is needed by virtually everyone, every day, and in substantial quantities. That is true whether a person be ill or the picture of health. Meat's high

protein content makes it invaluable, in fact, in convalescence. It is a prime source of both physical and mental vigor.

Old wives' tales often die hard. But like all superstitions and illusions, the sooner we rid our minds of them the better.

### Long Way To Go

During his American visit, Soviet Premier Khrushchev made it clear that one of his primary goals is a Soviet economy which will out-produce that of the United States. And the intimation was hat this will be accomplished in the foreseeable future.

If the Premier is correct, he will have produced a miracle of the first water.

U. S. News & World Report has summed up comparative data, based on official sources, concerning pay and output here and in the Soviet Union. Highlights:

Average U. S. factory pay is \$4,700—in Russia it is about \$1,000 based on buying power. The average American farmer produces enough for himself and 20 others, with much to spare as the huge farm surpluses prove—while the average Russian farmer produces enough for himself and only four others, with nothing to spare. And the output of the U. S. factory worker is 2 1-2 to three times that of his Soviet equivalent.

The magazine says: "So the Khrushchev problem boils down to this: inefficient farming, meaning a limited supply of workers for other jobs . . . a shortage of modern equipment, as well as manpower, for nonfarm production . . . low productivity of the work force . . . defenses needs that strain the country's capacity to produce."

Capitalism, with its competitions, its incentives, its freedoms and opportunities for all, has done more good things for more people than any other system ever devised by man.

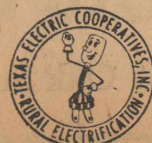


This lineman is stacking a portion of the dollar crop produced by Electric Cooperatives for the merchant on Main Street.

## Texas Hunting Season Getting Underway

Austin, Nov. 10—Two major hunting seasons will get underway in Texas within the next few days, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The duck hunting season will open noon, November 13. The bag limit will be 4 ducks daily, but not more than one can be a canvas-back or redhead. The duck inventory in Texas at the present time is very good, according to waterfowl biologists, who have been making surveys throughout the State. Many of the ducks are young ones, however, indicating the late hatch in the nesting grounds.

Goose season already is underway, having opened at sunrise, October 26. The duck season will end January 1, and the goose season will end January 8.

Waterfowl hunters are required to have a \$3 Federal duck stamp, which can be bought at the Post Office.

The whitetail deer season will open in most counties in Texas November 16. The mule deer season will open December 1 west of the Pecos. There will be deer seasons in many other counties in Texas under regulatory control. It is advised that you check with your local game warden on these areas.

The basic limit is on two bucks. However, doe shooting will be permitted in a number of Texas counties again this year, which will permit hunters to take either bucks or doe.
