> The farm census questionaires are being mailed from Chicago, Illinois with the distribution timed so that the report forms will reach farmers about a week ahead of the date when census takers will begin the field canvas. The advance meiling is for the purpose of giving form operators time to consult their records before filling in the answers required by the questionnaires and getting them ready for the census takers ot pick up. This procedure is designed to insure greater accuracy of reporting and to save time both for the farmer and the census taker when the latter calls at the farm.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture questionaire is designed to provide information on the number and size! of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures ,farm values and mortgage debt. On the average, each farmer is asked about 100 questions, many of which can be answered by simply checking "yet" or "no":
