Bangs Disease Meeting At Roby Next Tuesday

An educational meeting on the Brucellosis (Bang's Disease) program and the new law passed by the 56th Legislature is scheduled for Tuesday night, December 1, at 7:30 p. m. in the Agricultural building on the Fair grounds in Roby.

Dr. Wilson O. Boaz, Federal Veterinarian, from the USDA office in Fort Worth will discuss the new Texas Brucellosis law passed by the 56th Legislature and how it will effect livestockmen. Boaz will also discuss procedure for organizing Fisher County into a control area.

Some area counties having already started brucellosis control work are: Coleman, Howard, Shackelford, Jones, Stonewall and Kent.

Cattle infected with brucellosis suffer a 20 per cent reduction in milk production. They calve on the average every 1-2 years rather than yearly. A beef cow that loses 20 per cent of her milk production will wean a calf 10 percent lighter than normal.

The extra expense of shipping Texas cattle to certified states results in a steadily declining market for our tremendous crop of stocker and feeder cattle. The majority of competition from western states already has achieved a modified certified status.

This meeting is open to all people interested in the Brucellosis Program. It will afford an opportunity to see whether or not the people of Fisher County want to make it a modified certified Brucellosis County.

Farm Census Will Bring Statistics Current

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, now under way in Fisher County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following facts:

The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$5,127,568.

The value of all crops sold was \$3,831,756 and included \$3,880,000 for field crops, \$1,455 for vegetables, \$391 for fruits and nuts.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,295,812 and included \$255,701 for dairy products, \$79,898 for poultry and poultry products and \$960,213 for livestock and livestock products.

The current 1959 statistics will be released as soon as the census is completed and results compiled.

Boy's Ranch Program Headed By H. L. Davis

H. L. Davis has been appointed Fisher County Chairman for the program of Boy's Ranch of West Texas, which is located 17 miles west of San Angelo, near Ankersley.

The Ranch was organized in December 1947, and has helped meet the growing need for such Ranches, and has increased in size and number of boys accepted each year.

No worthy boy is refused at the Ranch, which is maintained principally by public subscription. Fisher County citizens will be given the opportunity to help the Ranch in the near future.

It is the goal and purpose of Boy's Ranch to offer a sound and constructive child caring program which will provide the boys with an opportunity to become productive citizens. Emphasis shall be placed on the needs of the boy and the program shall be planned to meet these needs. Adequate and constructive plans shall be made for each boy accepted at the Ranch.

Each boy shall be accepted on an individual basis according to his need for institutional life. Ages accepted are from 8 to 14 years. Any deviation from this age group shall have the approval of the Intake committee. No boy shall remain at the Ranch longer than necessary to work through his particular problem.

A sound financial program should be worked out to insure each boy proper care and guidance while at the Ranch.

When a boy is accepted from an area not included in the prescribed area of service, financial arrangements for his support should be worked out with the community referring him.

The Ranch will serve dependent, neglected, homeless and other boys who need and can profit from an experience at the Ranch.

The Ranch cannot serve chronic delinquents, physically handicapped, mentally retarded children and boys who cannot respond to Boy's Ranch Program.

A boy shall remain at the Ranch until he has received maximum benefit. A case file shall be kept on each boy and periodic reports of his progress shall be properly recorded. Constructive plans shall be made for a boy before he is released.

The Ranch will primarily serve West Texas; however boys can be accepted from other areas when advisable and practical.

Said Governor Daniel in his proclamation, "For hundreds of years man has battled against disease. For more than fifty years his battle against tuberculosis has been hard and rewarding. Today, tuberculosis as a killer is being curtailed in this country by modern drugs and improved patient care and rehabilitation facilities. But tuberculosis as a communicable, widely prevalent, expensive and long-lasting illness is still to be reckoned with. New cases reported in Texas the first nine months of this year were 3,375 and health authorities estimate there are more cases not reported than reported. The Christmas Seal Sale is the one annual appeal of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and affiliated local associations for funds to make possible year-round efforts to curb this needless waste of human life and resources. Therefore, I do hereby designate the period from Nov. 16 to Dec. 24 as Christmas Seal Days in Texas and urge that all citizens make a sound investment in their own and their fellow citizens' health by buying and using Christmas seals during the holiday season."
