## FU Condemns Benson In Fight Against Skip Row Farming

Denton, Dec. 15—Ezra Benson took another of his economic slaps at the farmers of this country this week when he slapped down the four row skip practice used by the West Texas Cotton farmers. This practice has been promoted and favored by the Department of Agriculture for its conservation and water rise value.

The dropping of this four row skip practice where the farmers allotment was not changed for this idle land will wreck many dry land cotton operations in West Texas.

Many cotton farmers have projected their 1960 program to include this practice. Their credit arrangements and cash rent have been made on this basis and the short notice of cancellation of this practice will put some more farmers out of business.

Texas and National Farmers Union is putting all the pressure it can exert to get a reversal of this decision by the USDA. They urge all farmers and interested people to write, wire and phone the Department of Agriculture, Congressmen and Senators to reverse this further farm depression move by Benson and Company.

## FB Fighting Stoppage Of Skip Row Planting

L. D. Singley, president of Fisher County Farm Bureau advises that on December 2 the USDA filed a proposed regulation that would eliminate skip row planting of cotton. A 15 day period was given to send written protests for their consideration.

Mr. Singley further states, "Texas Farm Bureau, along with C. H. Devaney, dist. 6 director, which includes Fisher County, Hub King, dist. 6 director which includes our neighboring counties, and Fisher County Farm Bureau have sent letters to the Department of Agriculture asking them to permit skip row planting as it has been in the past years.

A number of petitions have been circulated and signed by numerous farmers over the county which will all be a help in preventing this regulation being approved, but the greatest effort against the regulation would be for every farmer to wire or write a letter to: United States Department of Agriculture, Commodity Stabilization Service Director, Washington 25, D. C., giving their reasons for not wanting this proposed regulation to become effective. Also Sen. Lyndon Johnson, Johnson City, Texas; Sen. Ralph Yarborough, Austin, Texas; Cong. Sam Raburn, Bonham; Cong. Omar Burslem, Anson and Searcey E. Ferguson, State ASC Committee, College Station, Texas should all be asked to support you against the proposed regulation. All these addresses are posted on the window of Fisher County Farm Bureau so that you may get them at anytime.

These telegrams and letters should be postmarked not later than midnight, Dec. 17, so don't delay."

**FU Starting Annual Membership Drive**

Denton, Dec. 16—The Texas Farmers Union has started a vigorous membership campaign that it expects to add 10,000 members by March 1, 1960. Alex Dickie, Jr., Denton, president of this fast moving, liberal, farm organization, stated that this current campaign will be concentrated in 55 counties and will spread eventually to cover the entire state.

The Licensed Vocational Nurses Association met for their Christmas party Monday night in the beautifully decorated home of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Holcomb.

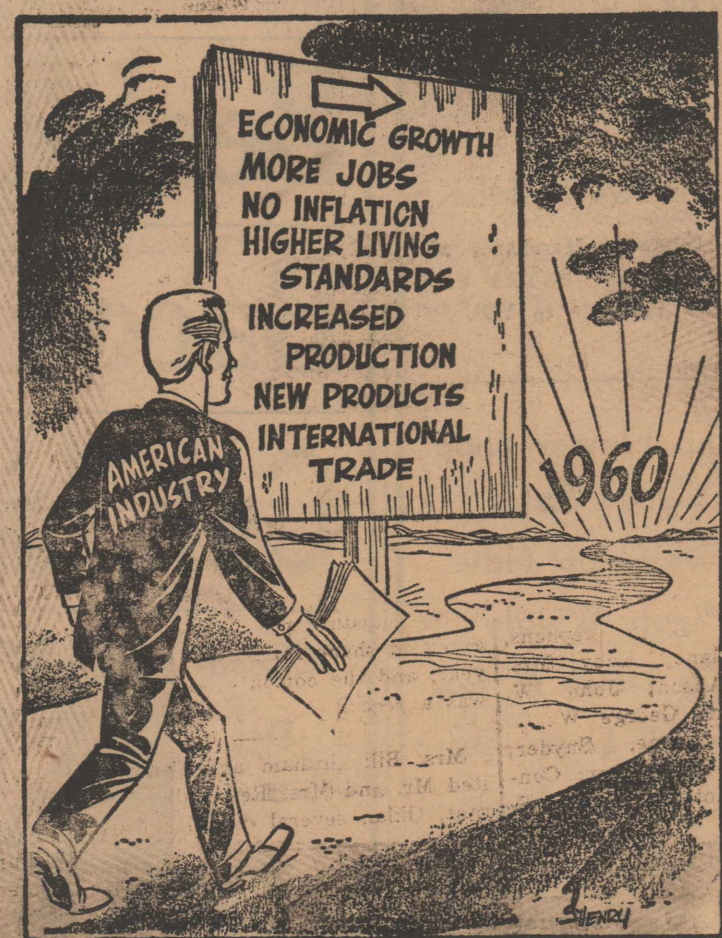
This year, husbands and children were invited as guests. Each person brought a gift to go on the Christmas tree.

**Heavy Traffic Toll Predicted By DPS**

One-hundred and eleven persons will die violently in Texas traffic accidents during the forthcoming Christmas-New Years holiday if predictions released today by the Texas Department of Public Safety hold true.

The ominous forecast came from Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Department of Public Safety, for a 12 day period extending from 12:01 a. m. Dec. 23, thru 11:59 p. m., Jan. 3.

The 111 predicted motoricides are included in an estimate made by Department Statistician N. K. Woerner, which indicates that 200 persons will die in violence during the period. The breakdown is as follows: Motoricides 111; homicides and suicides 47; accidental deaths non-traffic 42; grand total 200.

Colonel Garrison named several reasons for the prediction that this years holiday period will be one of the most deadly for Texas motorists in several years.

"This Christmas-New Year's holiday is expected to be one of the most dangerous for drivers that we have experienced in some time. Not only is the holiday period longer in the number of days it covers, but this has been a prosperous year for drivers and more cars are on the road.

"This year's accident rate is running considerably ahead of that of last year and we can naturally expect this trend to carry through-out the holidays. One other factor adds to our dim forecast. Both Christmas Day and New Year's day fall on Friday, making two extra long weekends within the holiday period.

"The best I can say is that I hope we are wrong. We can be wrong if Texas motorists will take common sense precautions in driving."

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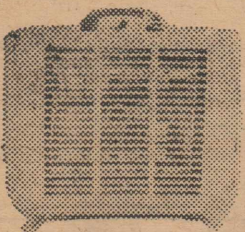

In the last-minute flurry before adjournment, Congress passed some important legislation, but none perhaps that directly affects more people than the bill to increase the interest rate on United States Savings Bonds. It was signed by the President on September 22, and made retroactive to all bonds bought since June 1. Farmers especially will be interested in the higher interest rate—now 3-4 percent when held to maturity, as compared with the previous 3-1-4. No change was made in the purchase price. E bonds now mature in seven years and nine months, 14 months sooner than before. H bonds continue to have a ten-year maturity. In both cases, Savings Bonds now earn about 2-1-2 percent in the first year and a half, and then 4 percent from that point to maturity. The

one out of four of us who owns bonds bought prior to June 1 also gets a windfall from the new legislation. But more about this in another column.

If you are planning to get your soil tested before planting next year's crops, now is a good time to get the tests made, according to Extension Soil Chemist, W. F. Bennett. Soil laboratories are usually not rushed at this time and recommended grades of fertilizer are readily available. Stop by your county agent's office for more information.

Are you leasing land for hunting or fishing, or do you have land to lease? If so, Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, says the lease should be in writing. A written lease will provide a basis for discussion of all the provisions that affect both hunter and landowner, and a signed copy should be kept by each. "Hunting Leases", a new extension leaflet, discusses the many provisions that may be written into leases and also samples of both hunting and fishing leases. Your local county agent has copies.

Mesquite is an aggressive, deep-rooted, undesirable woody, sprouting shrub that occurs on approximately 55 million acres of grazing lands in Texas. Where this pest thrives, no single method or practice will give effective and economical control under widely varying conditions.

Economical control of mesquite on grazing lands depends largely on selection of methods that will provide the greatest sustained benefits for the money expended. Good range and livestock management are essential to obtain maximum benefits from the control. The chief value of controlling mesquite is to increase the density, vigor and production of palatable range forage species.

"Control of Mesquite on Grazing Lands" is the title of a new bulletin released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Some of the factors influencing the effectiveness and cost of controlling individual plans, in thin, open stands by hand or power grubbing, oiling with kerosene and diesel fuel and basal application of 2, 4, 5-T and soil application of monuron are discussed in the bulletin.

Factors that influence the effectiveness and cost of controlling moderate to dense stands by chaining and cabling, use of heavy-duty brush cutters, root plowing and aerial application of 2, 4, 5-T are also discussed in detail.

The benefits of mesquite control include increased carrying capacity of grazing lands, reduced cost of handling livestock and more efficient use of other range improve-

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ment practices.

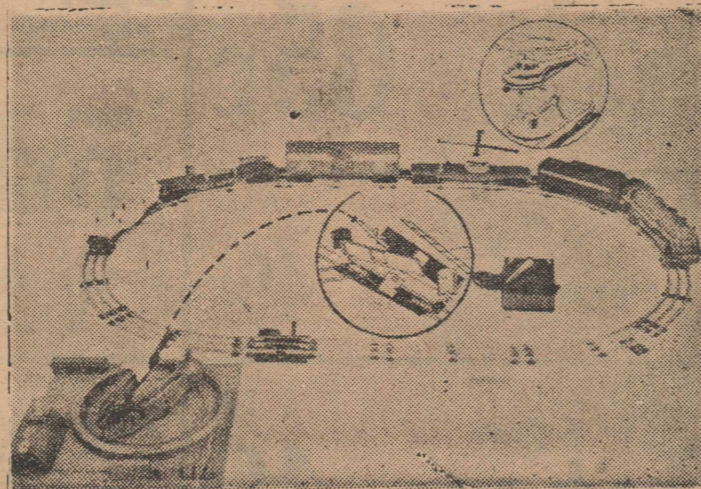

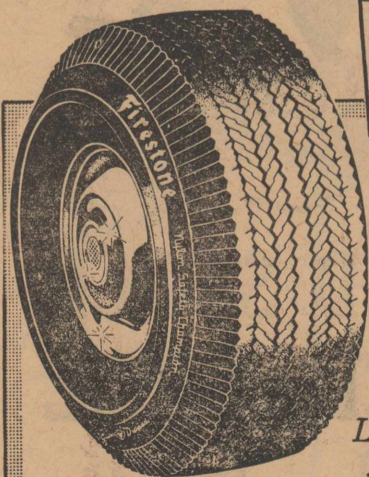

### Hiway Dept. Is 51 Years Old

Austin, December 15—The Texas Highway Department has just totalled its fifty-first year of operation. State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said that 80 percent of the funds expended during the past year were for construction, and 13 percent for maintenance.

"Less than two-thirds of one percent was spent for the administration of the Highway Department, and the remaining six and one-third percent went for the highway patrol and miscellaneous operations.

"The 80 percent expended for construction is the largest percent that has gone for this item since the few years soon after the creation of the Highway Department. Almost all of the expenditures went for construction in those early days, as the counties were responsible for highway maintenance at that time. The Department assumed maintenance of state highways in 1924.

"Over the 41 years, 70 percent of the funds have been expended for construction," Greer said. Greer stated that during the past year, 19 percent of the revenue of the Department came from license plates, 32 percent from the gasoline tax, 43 percent from the federal government, and the remaining 6 percent from miscellaneous sources.

In the 41 years of operation, \$3.3 billion dollars have been spent on the Texas Highway system. The system now consists of 60,374 miles.

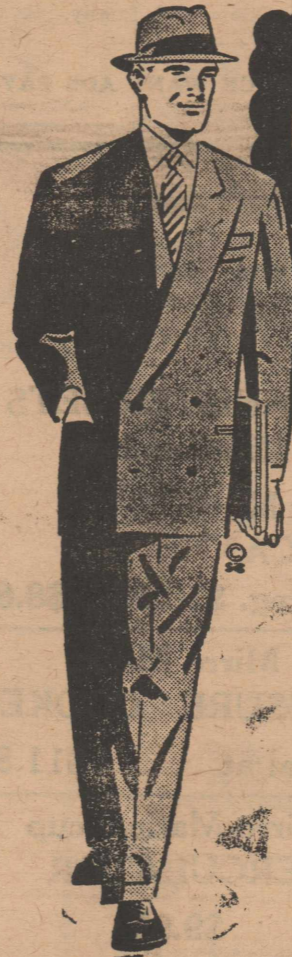
