## Census Starts "Were You Counted" Drive

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder today announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census office by means of "Were You Counted" Form.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the district supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal Census.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed."

## Light Rain Covers Most Of Area Tuesday

Most of the territory around Rotan received one-half inch rain Tuesday night. No hail or wind damage was reported and indications at press time were favorable for more moisture.

Several towns in West Texas suffered hail storm during the afternoon, with heaviest damage at San Angelo, where some estimates ran as high as 3 million dollars.

Some farmers have "dry planted" but most of them are waiting for a good rain. Stockmen are needing more rain and pastures and stock tanks have suffered the high winds for the past few weeks.

## National HD Week Is May 1 to 7th

Some 30,000 Texas Home Demonstration Club Women will be among the 7 million homemakers throughout the nation who will observe their 15th National Home Demonstration Club Week, May 1-7.

During the week, most of the 1,700 home demonstration clubs in the State plan special activities to highlight their programs. Special exhibits, community programs, feature stories, radio and television programs and tours are planned to inform other homemakers and families of the purpose of home demonstration work and to show its contribution to family and community life.

Today's home demonstration program takes into account that today's homemaker—and her family—face increasingly complex adjustments to the world around them.

The program is planned by homemakers and carried on cooperatively by the Extension Service, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the land-grant colleges and county governments. New research information in all phases of home-making is brought to women and families through research home economists, specialists, home demonstration agents and local leaders. Club members also conduct special programs in civil defense and encourage and assist with local 4-H Club programs.

Get acquainted with the home demonstration club program in your own county . . . visit your local county extension agent's office and watch for announcements of special activities scheduled for National Home Demonstration Week.

## Soil Being Analyzed Over Entire County

Fisher County Standard Soil Survey is making steady progress as activity begins in the western part of the county.

Soil conservation Service Scientists, Willis L. DeLozier and Wesley E. Beckham, began activity in the farm by farm survey near highway 180 this week. These technicians report that in the areas surveyed, farmers and ranchers have been most cooperative. Interest has been shown in both the Great Plains Conservation Program and the programs of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District. This survey will speed up future farm and ranch plans as well as provide additional information for past plans.

Tabulations at the Soil Conservation Service Office reveal that 317,397 acres have been inventoried under Standard Soil Survey procedures. The remaining 263,083 acres are scheduled for completion in the summer of 1961.

As field work is completed, soil samples from various depths will be analyzed for each soil type. This information along with soil descriptions, yield data, copies of the soil maps and other information, will be published at a later date.

Robert Gordel, Soil Scientist from Aspermont will continue in the northeast section until the entire area has been surveyed.

Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Roach have been visiting their son Cecil Roach and family in Amarillo this week.

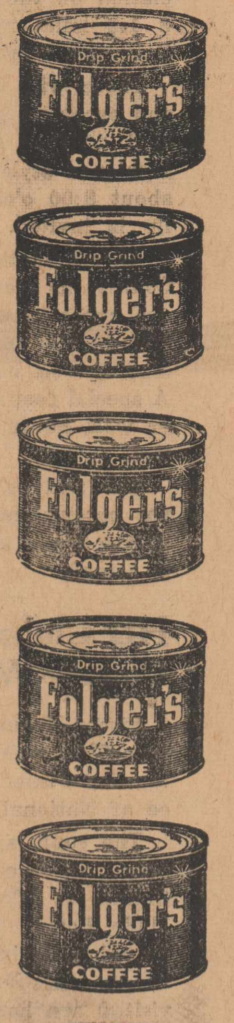

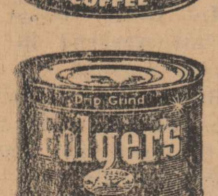

Total weight of the fifteen (15) bales was 7600 lbs. Price paid was .22c per lb. totaling \$1672.00. Date of this purchase was January 5, 1960.

On the 2-15-60, we purchased seventeen (17) bales and one bale of loose cotton. The weight of this loose bale was 470 lbs. Price paid was .21c per lb., making \$98.70. This was included in receipt No. 527. Total amount of check for the eighteen bales was \$2,155.42. These checks were made payable to the Hobbs Cooperative Gin.

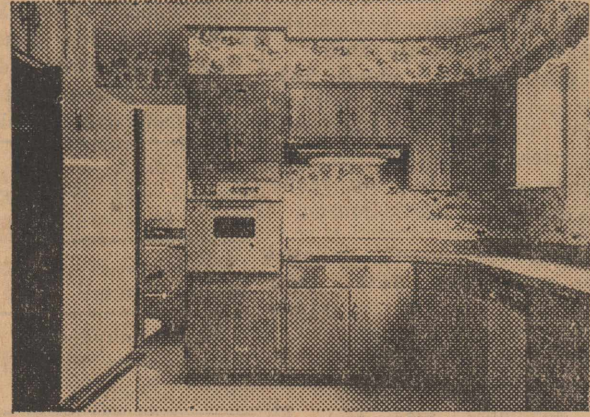

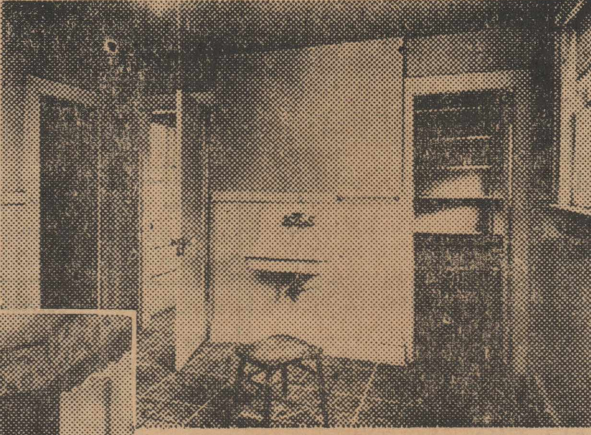

# DID YOU HEAR our Representative Speak Sat. Night April, 23rd, at Roby

It was TOO good. I wondered, along with many of the other listeners, who wrote it? In fact, it was SO good that if I did not know better, I might have swallowed it myself.

Mr. Carriker, for whom I have the highest regard as a fluent speaker, spoke to a predominantly Farmers Union audience, an organization of which he is a past State director, in the most forceful and hand-waving air that I have ever been forced to listen to. Specifically, I have attacked Mr. Carriker's voting record on AFL-CIO sponsored legislation. Even though he reads the "candy coated" version of this copyrighted official AFL-CIO publication and tells this predominantly Farmers Union audience that Jack McCain was off-beat, off-base, and practically insinuated that Jack McCain doesn't even know how to read this labor boss's "report card" on our Representative, I still stand on my original version of Mr. Carriker's political philosophy. He is obviously a "captive" of the AFL-CIO and I say any record he would make if he were re-elected would be as good or better for the labor bosses than the 95% perfect score he made in his first go-round.

Also, folks, another thing that is very amusing to me is this: some of Mr. Carriker's most ardent supporters are following me around trying to neutralize what I say. They say, "Give him another term and he will get his feet on the ground." I am one of those thinking fellows who thinks that by the time Mr. Carriker's voting records gets his feet on the ground he will have most of our feet off the ground.

Now, back to the original text of this letter. When Mr. Carriker was giving me, Jack McCain, the third degree, why did he omit, accidentally or otherwise, my question: "Why is it necessary for our Fisher County Farmers Union to have an AFL-CIO speaker at intervals to speak to our farmers?" Now folks I am absolutely not criticizing our people. I assume that it is a NFU national and state policy to have these fellows come out and attempt to "brain-wash" our Fisher County Farmers. I am a farmer myself, but I make no bones about it. All you have to do is look in nearly any newspaper and you will read about something the labor bosses are for or against other than labor problems, along with articles telling the American people of millions being exploited from our working people by the labor bosses.

So I ask now, why you omitted your explanation on the balance of the bills in question. You say they were of no importance. You say that many of them were NRC (not reported from Committee). Mr. Carriker, this same AFL-CIO publication that shows you voted for them 95% "good" calls them important issues and says you voted on them. Now, who is confused and ill-advised? Lets show the people what they were.

- No. 2. A bill involving worker's rights.
- No. 3. Minimum wage law.
- No. 5. Bus driver's rights.
- No. 8 and 9. The escheat bill on abandoned property.
- No. 10. Corporate profits tax.
- No. 17. Federal income tax repeal.
- No. 18. Truck load limit.
- No. 20. Legislative pay.
- No. 21 and 22. Party registration and party convention.

If the issues which you answered me on, in your version, were so important because they were things that are good political "footballs", then why did you not expound on the balance of the issues? Or did you accidentally omit them also? Why not get your professional advisers and ghost writers, to help you change the names of some and candy coat these bills?

Now, about the issues you did discuss so eloquently:

**Student fee increases:** Is it not better for the small percentage of college students, compared to the number of high school graduates, to pay for their own education rather than have our State schools lose money and the tax-payers pay the bill?

**Open beaches:** If private enterprise or an individual has owned and had peaceful possession of property for many years, should we confiscate his property and turn it over to the public when we already have plenty of public beachspace? Why not let the State buy it if they need it? Don't confiscate it.

**Old age assistance:** Isn't it true that this bill was only for the people who are over 65 and own a homestead? Isn't it true that this would have helped only a small segment of our senior citizens? Not allowing one bit of consideration for the aged who are not fortunate enough to have a homestead. This would have been fine if there could have also been an amendment attached helping the thousands who really need the help because they are having to live off their pitifully small pensions. I say we need to help all our senior citizens, not just a few.

**Legislative Representation:** In the eyes of the labor boys this is your one "bad vote." They call it bad because they are at a loss to explain why you did not vote with the Port Arthur, Houston and Beaumont labor representatives as usual. So they call it a bad vote.

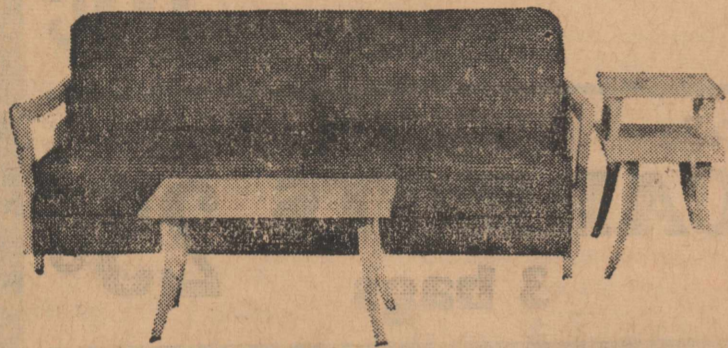

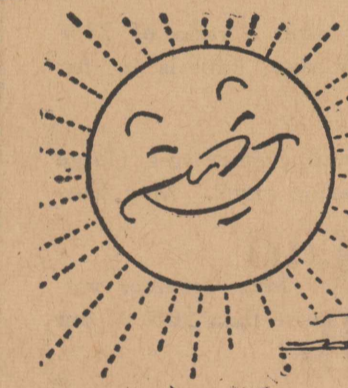

## Many Housewives Violating SS Laws

Some 100,000 housewives throughout the nation may be violating the social security laws by not making timely reports on the wages they pay their household help, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., of Abilene, district manager for the Social Security Administration.

Each employer who pays a household worker (including a baby-sitter) as much as \$50 cash wages during a calendar quarter must file a return with the Internal Revenue Service, giving the name, social security account number, and amount of wages paid. The law puts the sole responsibility for filing returns and paying the tax on the employer, even though the employee may have asked that no tax be withheld from the wages.

If not detected by the Internal Revenue Service through its routine enforcement procedures, those employees not filing reports may later be called to account in a number of different ways. Such could happen when a worker applies for at the social security office for retirement or disability benefits, or when a survivor of a household worker applies for payment after the worker's death. An employer found to be delinquent under those conditions would normally be liable for the entire tax for several years back, plus interest and penalties.

Any housewife who employs domestic help (cook, maid, yard-man, baby sitter, etc.) should ask the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration for the free booklet "Social Security for Your Household Employee", and when received should complete the post card form attached and mail it to the District Director of Internal Revenue. She will then be placed on the mailing list for the quarterly tax return forms. Returns for the first three months of 1960 are due by April 30.

## From State Health Dept.

A Megalopoe opercularis--for those of you who don't have an entomology textbook handy--is a moth, commonly called "asp" in the larval stage.

These brown or grey, semi-crescent shaped larvae may become extremely abundant, feeding on the foliage of a variety of trees and shrubs. They're making their annual appearance in Texas now, and will be noticeable until months of late fall.

Everyone should familiarize themselves with the appearance and medical importance of these stinging caterpillars. Children, in particular, should be warned to avoid them.

Individual reaction to the stings varies greatly, dependent upon many factors such as age, sensitivity status, size of caterpillar, area of skin involved, and the amount of pressure on contact.

A mature larva dropping from a tree into a person's shirt or blouse and mashed against the skin in several places before being retrieved would likely cause a much more painful condition than the simple act of brushing an exposed arm or leg against a small specimen.

A burning pain is felt almost immediately on contact. Small, raised, whitish spots appear, later becoming red. The inflamed area may spread for several inches, ac-

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companied by swelling.

The resulting skin reaction frequently lasts for days. Further systemic symptoms may arise of an allergic nature.

Hollow hairs are filled with poison supplied from poison gland cells opening directly to the hairs. The tips of the hair or spine can readily penetrate the skin and break off.

The "buck moth" is another stinging caterpillar common to oak trees as well as some other trees, often stepped on by barefoot children.

Leave the puss caterpillar and "buck moth" alone. For while they probably won't kill you, a disturbed system isn't something to be taken lightly.

A spray of lead arsenate (two tablespoons per gallon of water) or 50% wettable DDT (two teaspoons per gallon of water) will get rid of them for you.
