First Primary Election Set For Saturday

First Democratic Primary will be held Saturday, with voting boxes 9, 10 and 11 voting at high school and south side box 12 at City Hall. Voting hours will be from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m.

Al Finch is precinct chairman of box 9, 10 and 11 and announces Precinct Convention at high school auditorium at 2 p. m. Saturday. W. B. McKimney, Precinct Chairman of No. 12 will hold Precinct Convention at the same hour at City Hall.

Under new election laws voters participating in the Convention must have voted in the first primary and have their poll tax receipt stamped "Democrat" on the reverse side. If you have lost, misplaced or left your poll tax receipt at home you may obtain an affidavit when you vote and get it stamped. All voters who wish to participate in the Precinct Convention may obtain an affidavit and get it stamped when they vote.

A fairly heavy vote is expected as several of the local races are causing considerable interest.

Years ago, Howard Davison wanted to be District Attorney. What did Jones County do? They refused to support him. Few votes for Howard in Jones County!

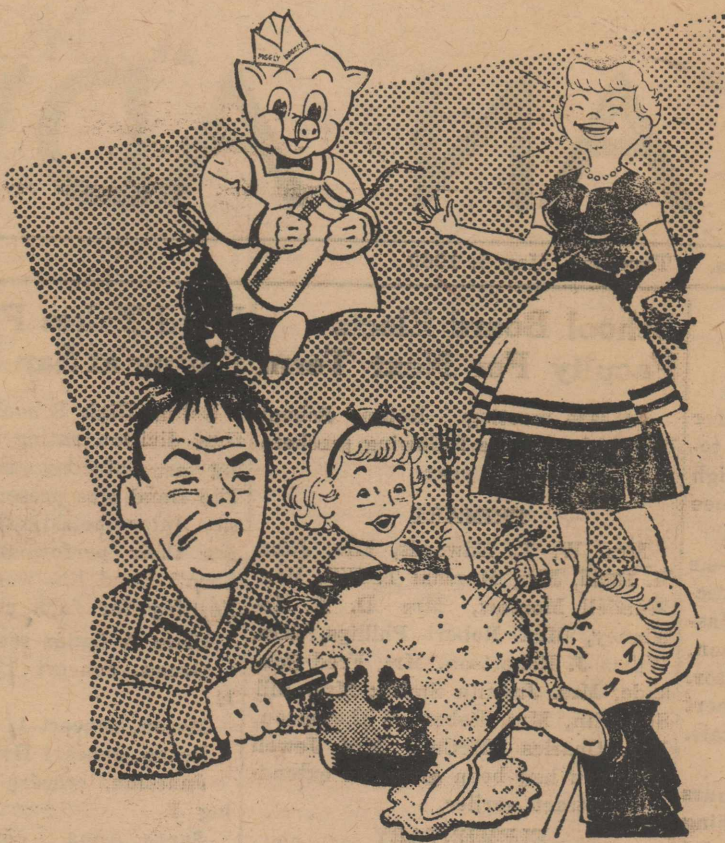
When Cecil Lotief ran for the State Senate how many votes did he get in Jones County? Not many; Jones County just couldn't vote for a Fisher County man.
