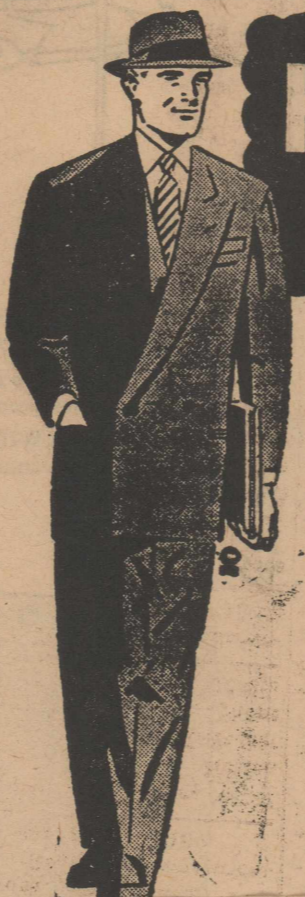

**41,000 Texas 4-H Cooks in Kitchens**

Texas girls who are learning to cook nowadays "never had it so good." What with packaged, frozen, canned, pre-cooked and dehydrated foods aided and abetted by modern kitchen appliances, making a meal is considerably less of an ordeal than it was in grandmother's youth.

Last year nearly 41,000 4-H Club members in the state were enrolled in a food preparation program, reports the Extension office, Texas A and M College. The 1960 program is well under way and the young cooks are learning all about modern foods and ways to serve them.

As a matter of fact, eating habits of the American family are quite different than they were 50 years ago, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. People are eating more meat and poultry, eggs and milk products, and less grains and potatoes. Calories per day per persons are down to 3200 from 3600 provided by foods in 1909, says the USDA.

Under the guidance of local volunteer club leaders and the county Extension agents, 4-H'ers plan balanced menus, figure food costs, and learn the importance of nutrition in the daily diet. Club members who live in rural areas are encouraged to grow the fruits, vegetables and other food products needed year round for the entire family.

Food preparation, like many other 4-H projects, offers annual awards for superior achievement. Betty Crocker of General Mills, Minneapolis, Minnesota, is the award's honor.

Six national \$400 scholarship winners will be selected from among 50 state winners next November by a committee of Extension personnel. The records will be judged at the National Committee on Boys and Girls headquarters in Chicago.

Last year's state and national winner was Miss Ada Lou Hartman, 18. Miss Hartman is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Hartman, Corpus Christi, Nueces county.

Both state and national winners will be named locally. The state winner's award is a trip to the National 4-H Cub Congress in Chicago.

## Much Cancer Research Money Spent in Texas

Three Texas scientists and one institution received American Cancer Society grants totaling \$81,613 it was learned here today by Mrs. Bill Hardy, president of Fisher County Unit of American Cancer Society, Texas division.

Two of the scientists are at the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, Houston. Dr. A. Clark Griffin received \$12,846 "To Isolate Factors from Malignant Tissue Affecting Metabolism" and Dr. Saul Kit received \$13,900 to study "The Nucleic Acids of Normal Tissues and Tumors."

Dr. William C. Levin of the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston was awarded \$39,767 to investigate the "Methods for the Diagnosis and Management of Dys- and Paraproteinemias Associated with Malignancies". An institutional grant of \$15,000 went to the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School and is under the direction of Dr. Jack A. Pritchard.

Mrs. Hardy revealed that these new research grants brought to \$1,839,736, the amount allocated

for cancer research since 1945 in the state of Texas as part of the American Cancer Society's nationwide research program.

Currently, he stated, 13 grants totaling \$228,356 are in effect in Texas, including M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Clinic, Baylor University College of Medicine, Houston; Southwestern Medical School, Dallas; and the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. These, he stated, are part of the \$15,409,353 in ACS research projects now in effect throughout the nation.

Mrs. Hardy stated that these recent grants and others in effect are funds returned to Texas from the annual April educational fund raising Crusade conducted by the Society in each Texas community.

In addition to the 60c of every cancer dollar which stays in Texas, practically 30c is returned to the state in the form of cancer research grants Mrs. Hardy said.

Texas, she stated are very fortunate indeed to share so largely in the cancer control dollars, being able to support a year round educational life saving program of cancer control as well as conduct vital research activities, which may one day find the answer to the disease.

The research approach to the cancer problem, Mrs. Hardy stated, is complex and diversified because cancer is a complex disease. For example, she stated:

Is leukemia caused by a virus? Dr. Leon Dmochowski at Baylor University and Dr. John Trentin, also at Baylor, are conducting research to answer this important question.

How does malignant tissue differ biochemically from normal? Research into this problem is under way in the laboratory of Dr. A. Clark Griffin at M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, and Dr. Robert Hurlbert, also at the Institute.

What changes in cell chromosomes take place in cancer tissue? Dr. T. C. Hsu and Dr. Saul Kit at the Anderson Institute are pursuing different aspects of this question.

What new effective chemotherapeutic agents can be synthesized? Dr. Darrell Ward at M. D. Anderson Hospital is attempting to find new chemotherapeutic agents that are less toxic than those presently available.

Institutional research grants, Mrs. Hardy stated, are currently in effect in the three medical schools in Texas. These grants are administered by a local committee of University scientists and physicians.

If a student-graduate, graduate or medical—or a busy physician or an inexperienced investigator, she stated, wants to try out a new research idea, develop a tangential idea to his main line of endeavor, or engage in research on a part-time basis, he may apply to his local Institutional Grant Committee for funds. These universities are among 56 institutions in the country receiving this unique type of grant which seeks to encourage new minds and new ideas to enter cancer research.

Seeding disease is one of the major cotton diseases of Texas. Yield losses from the disease each year average about 2 to 2.5% of the potential crop.

Proper seed treatment with an approved chemical is one of the measures used in helping to reduce losses to this disease. Such treatment helps prevent seed decay and damping-off from both seed and soil-borne organisms. It has been found that treated seed has about 5% better germination than untreated.

Eight materials are recommended for cotton-seed treatment in Texas. These materials are: Ceresan 200, Cersan 100, Panogen 15, Dow 9B, PMAA, Captain, 75%, Agrox and Ceresan M. It is important that the recommended rate of the chemical be applied to the seed. A smaller amount would give ineffective results while a larger amount could damage the seed. A poor job of seed treatment is often little better than no treatment at all.

Dr. J. C. Gaines, head, department of entomology, Texas A and M College, reports cotton growers can get about \$8 from better yields and quality for every \$1 they spend for recommended insecticides.

Most snakes are not welcome, even as visitors, in yards and homes. This is true, points out Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, despite the fact that most snakes are beneficial to man because of the number of rodents and other pests they eat. But he adds because of the fear of poisonous snakes, most folks just don't care to see them around.

Cooper points out there is no sure way to keep snakes from moving into the yard or even on occasion the home, but offers suggestions which tend to discourage this happening. The best solution is to make the premises unattractive to snakes by the removal of food and cover they like. Since most snakes feed on rats and mice, a good rodent control program will help. Maintaining rodent-proof buildings, rodent trapping or baiting programs and removal of rodent food supplies not only discourages rats and mice but snakes as well.

Closely mowed lawns and fields are much less attractive to snakes than are areas of tall grass, weeds and brush. Eliminate trash piles, leaves, boards, flat rocks and other materials which attracts snakes and should be removed if snakes are a problem.

If the proper 'housekeeping' job around the home is done, Cooper says the few snake visitors can be controlled by persistent killing.

To keep snakes from entering or crawling under a house, all possible points of entry should be blocked and this could be a costly operation, says Cooper. Snakes can pass through very small openings and they usually enter a building near or below ground level. He says to make sure cellar doors, windows and screens fit tightly; that walls and floors are free of cracks and that foundations, fireplaces and chimneys don't offer points of entry. Spaces around pipes, drains or ventilators must be plugged or screens.

Snake-proof fences can be built around homes or children's playing areas. Cooper can supply information on such fences.

At said time and place all such persons, firm, corporations and estates, and their agents and attorneys shall have the right to appear and to be heard and to offer testimony as to the said assessments, and to the amount thereof, proposed to be assessed against said property and the real and true owner or owners thereof, the lien and charge of personal liability to secure payment of said assessments, the special benefits to accrue to each abutting property and to the owners thereof by virtue of said improvements, or concerning any error, invalidity, irregularity or deficiency in any proceedings with reference to said improvements and to the said proposed assessments, and concerning any other matter or thing as to which a hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of assessments, proceedings and improvements, and on which they are entitled to a hearing under the laws of the State of Texas and the proceedings of the said City Council.

Following such hearing, assessments will be levied against each and every parcel of property abutting upon Lee Street, within the limits herein defined, and the real and true owners thereof, for that portion of the costs determined by the said City Council to be payable by such abutting properties and the real and true owners thereof, and said assessments shall constitute a first and prior lien upon said abutting property from April 25, 1960, the date said improvements were ordered by the said City Council, and a personal liability and charge against the real and true owners thereof as of said date, whether or not such property be described or correctly named in said proceedings, and no errors or mistake or discrepancy in the names of any owner or owners or in describing said property in this Notice or in any of said proceedings with reference to said improvements, shall invalidate any assessment or certificate issued in evidence thereof, but nevertheless each parcel of abutting property and the real and true owner or owners thereof shall be charged with, and be liable for, said assessment, which shall be valid whether or not such owner or owners be correctly named, or such property be described or correctly described, all as provided for by Article 1105-b, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended, as the Act under which said improvements, proceedings and assessments are being conducted, performed and levied.

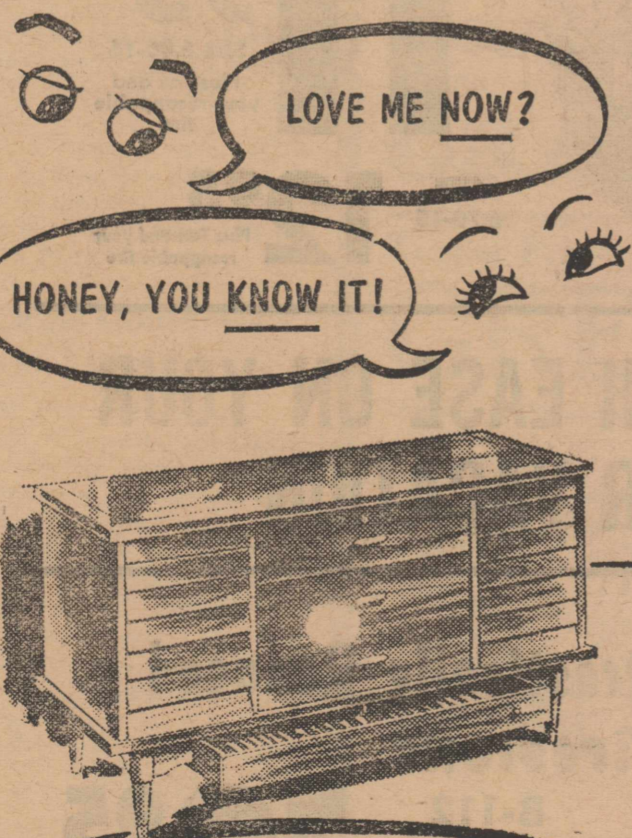
