Hammers Lose To Roscoe Here Last Friday

Rotan's Yellowhammers lost the district game here last Friday night to Roscoe Plowboys, 12-6.

The Plowboys opened scoring in the first quarter when QB McLeod took a pitchout and skirted left and for 12 yards. Their other TD came in the third on a 10-yard drive over left tackle.

The Yellowhammers got going in the fourth quarter and drove almost the full length of the field for TD. HB Steve Herron carried from the 10-yard line on a play around right end.

The Hammers made 8 first downs to 12. Gained yardage by rushing 127 to 172. Passed 35 yards to 6. Completed 2 out of 10 pass attempts, to Roscoe's 1 out of 3. Punted 3 times for 22 against 5 for 9 yards. Penalties, 4 for 30 yards for Hammers and Roscoe 2 for 10. In fumbles Rotan was charged with 4 against Roscoe 2.

The Hammers play their last home game of the season Friday night, a highlight of Homecoming events.

Their time was good enough to ordinarily win first, but they lost by narrow margin.

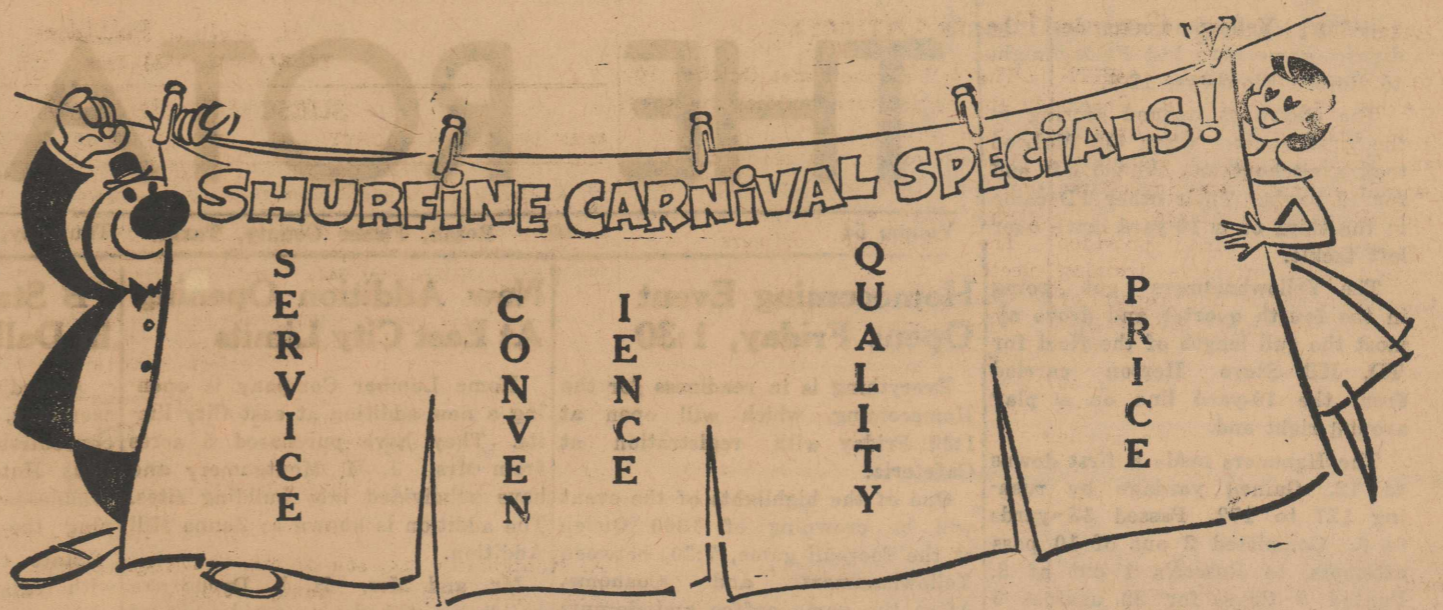
Chief Parker said he was proud of the boys, they made an excellent showing and the contestants knew "Rotan was there."

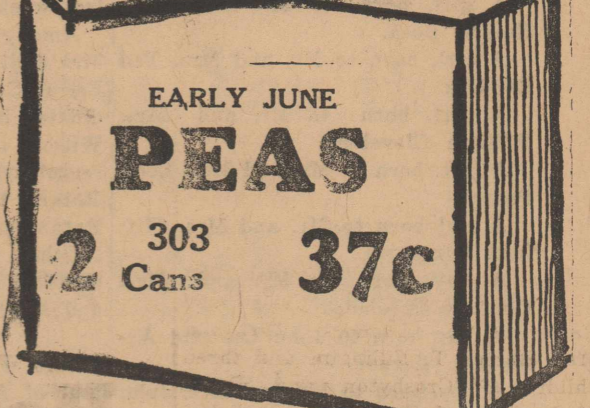
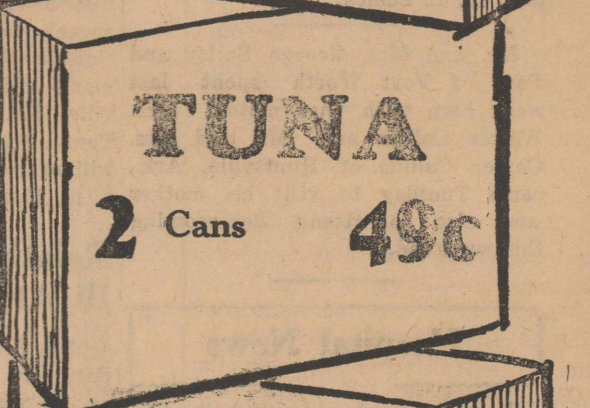
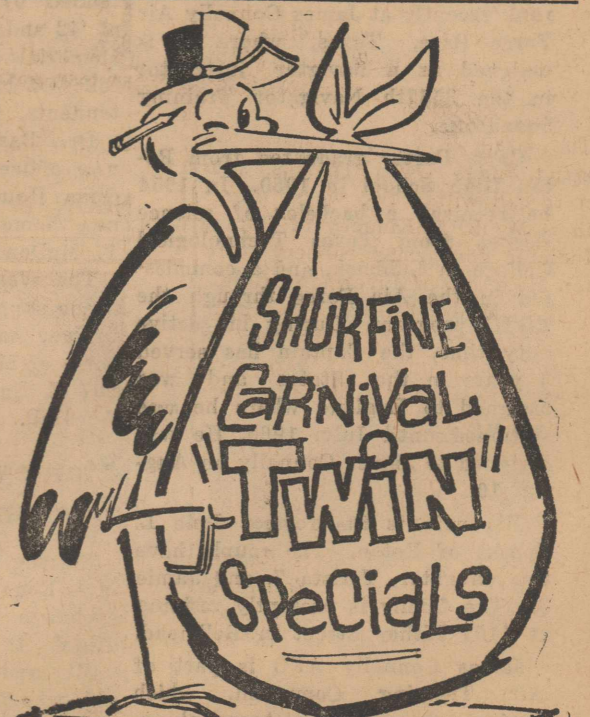

Dollars and Sense

MANAGING FOR CLOTHING FOR THE FAMILY

1. The objective of clothing management is to further the physical, social and physiological well-being of each member of the family.

2. Help each family member to appreciate suitability and quality of clothing.

3. Learn how to recognize adequacy of clothing to avoid excess purchases.

4. Decide on the amount of money the family can afford to spend for clothing.

5. Make plans for the best way to meet clothing needs with the money available.

6. Help children develop pride in their clothing to stimulate the desire to take care of clothes. Learning to "pick-up" can be a contribution to the family chores as well as an asset to their training for adult life.

7. Select and buy clothing that will be durable, a pleasure to wear and appropriate for many occasions. The things we buy and do not wear are the expensive items in our wardrobes.

8. Consider difficulty or ease of caring for items of clothing and make the best use of storage.

MANAGING FOR THE HEALTH OF THE FAMILY

1. A homemaker's responsibility for the health of her family consists of doing whatever is possible to prevent and cure ill health and to provide healthful conditions under which the family will live, work and play.

2. Health is a state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being not merely the absence of disease or infirmity.

3. A health measure for which the homemaker is almost entirely responsible is adequate nutrition. Actually providing food may be easier than helping family members to develop good eating habits.

4. Well-planned family recreation will relax strain and tension, release energy and pent-up feelings and contribute to good health of family members.

5. Protective measures against illness and disease may be taken by the family at home and protective insurances may be needed to provide a feeling of security in the event of ill health.

MANAGING FAMILY RECREATION

1. Planned family recreation should fit the family time-and-work schedule as well as the family plan

for spending.

2. Every member of the family should have a part in making plans for family recreation.

3. Recreation activities should provide plenty of fun. Family fun enriches family life and influences mental health.

4. Recreation should include elements of creativeness to add to its educational value.

5. TV and radio programs as well as movies should have an overall desirable effect and should be sincere and constructive, encouraging decent human relations.

6. The amount of money spent for recreation is no indication of the value received. Be sure that the

dollar invested contributes to the well-being of each family member.

EXAMINE FOOD BUYING HABITS

1. Buy to get the best dollar value. The amount of money spent for food is no indication of good or poor nutrition.

2. Buy at the best time considering all factors at home and in the market.

3. Buy in optimal quantity. A bargain is no bargain if food is wasted because it cannot be used before quality is lost.

4. Use an economical method of paying for food.

5. Get quality for the money you

spend.

6. Choose sensible quality for each use and not necessarily the highest grades for all purposes which may be extremely wasteful.

7. Use a guide when buying. This guide should be a market list made at home based on planned menus that will provide good nutrition for the family.

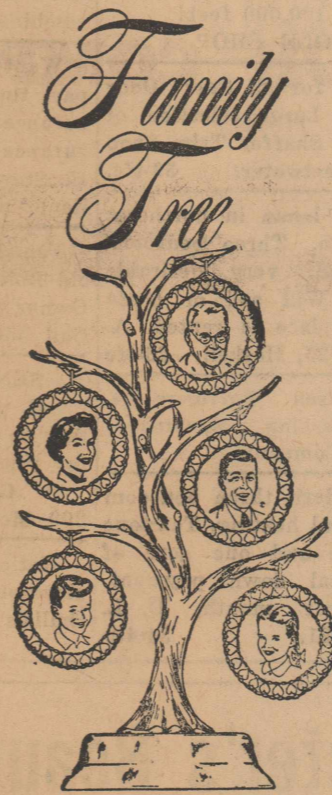

Sheriff Bus Rollans went to California last week to obtain signed statements from both suspects admitting the June 2 robbery. The statements, taken by Texas Ranger Bill Hensley, who was in California at the time the two men were arrested, were turned over to the Grand Jury Monday.

Hale and Minor in their statements admitted that they used a red light to stop Mrs. Bernice Silver, 46, of Augusta, Ga., her children, Nancy 14, and Gerald, 9, and her mother, Mrs. Sam Berlin of Charleston, S. C.

After allegedly taking \$186 in cash and \$1280 intraveler's checks from the two women at gunpoint, the bandits chained them and the young girl together and threw the key to the chain locks outside the car. Mrs. Silver was hit on the head with a gun by one of the men. The boy later found the key and freed the women. The four victims caught a ride into Snyder and notified officers.

Indicted by the Grand Jury for DWI second offense were Thomas L. Fraser, 43, of Abilene, and Dorman Dodson, 29, of Tennessee. Bond was set at \$1500 for both, who remained in jail.

To the resident qualified electors of Fisher County, Texas, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

- Jerry Crowley, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2;
- T. R. Underhill, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3;
- Thurman Terry, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4; and among other proceedings had were the following: Commissioner Thurman Terry, introducing the following election order:

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas deems it advisable to submit to the resident qualified taxpaying voters of said County, who own taxable property in said County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County for the purpose hereinafter stated; therefore

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF FISHER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said County on the 8th day of November, 1960, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxpaying electors who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:

"SHALL The Commissioner's Court of Fisher County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the principal sum of SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$75,000) to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY (20) years from the date thereof, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5 per cent) per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, for permanent public improvements, to-wit: to establish a county poorhouse in and for Fisher County, Texas, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 2, Title 22, revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and particularly Article 718, R. C. S. of Texas, as amended?"

If the proposed bonds are authorized at the election called herein the proceeds of said bond issue will be used to establish a county poorhouse to care for a minimum of thirty-five (35) patients and to be located in the City of Roby, Texas.

ALL VOTERS who are legally qualified voters of said Fisher County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election; and said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapters 1 and 2, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THERE-OF."

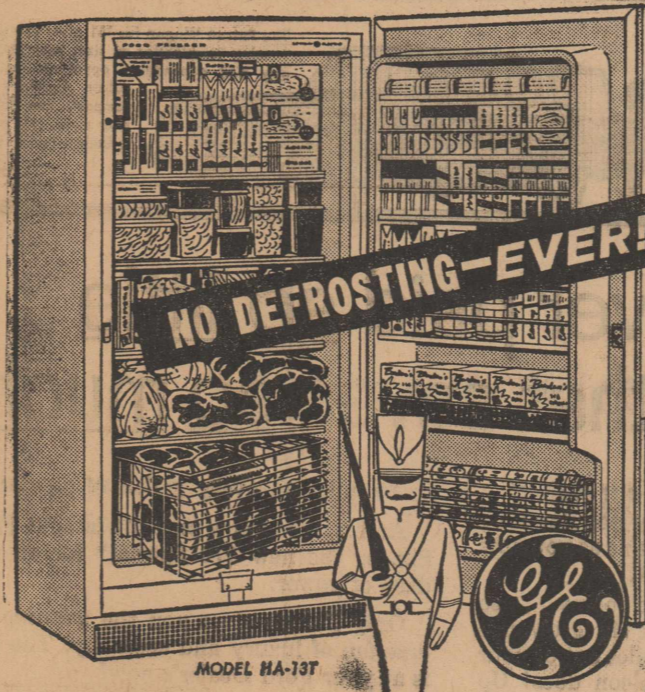

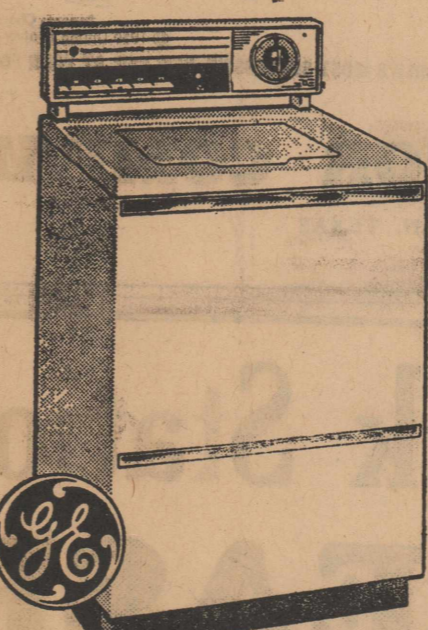

With favorable egg prices this fall, every poultryman is interested in getting every egg possible from his birds. One way to do this, according to Dr. John H. Quisenberry, head of the poultry science department at Texas A & M College is to lengthen the day through use of artificial lights.

1. Give 14 hours of total light per day.
2. Give the equivalent of one 60-watt bulb per 200 square feet of floor space, 6 feet from the floor.
3. Keep bulbs and fixtures clean.
4. Make sure the lighting time is regular and consistent. Use time clock.
5. Use morning lights only for floor birds, but both evening and morning light for sage birds.
6. Grow pullet replacements without artificial light, to obtain maximum response from light in the laying house.

10th ANNIVERSARY BANKERS' SCHOOL TO BE HELD AT TEXAS

A & M COLLEGE

"What will be the most profitable farm loans for bankers in 1961" is the keynote of the 10th anniversary Texas Farm and Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers to be held at Texas A & M College, November 28 through November 30.

Bob Cherry, Extension Economist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that he hopes every bank will be represented as this year's forward looking program is of paramount importance to all Texas bankers.

A group of bankers, economists, farmers, distributors, scientists, tax specialists and even demographers will give facts and opinions on such subjects as "How Prosperous Will We Be in '61?"; "How Will Farm Programs Effect Farm Loans in '61?"; and "What Kind of Farm Products do the Large Supermarkets Want in 1961?"

Banquet speaker for the school will be Earl Coke, Vice-President, Bank of America, Los Angeles, California. He will speak on "The World's Biggest Bank Agricultural Program."

The Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology headed by Dr. Tyrus R. Trimm coordinates the sponsorship of the Texas Farm and Ranch Credit School for Bank-

Cotton should be produced, harvested and handled so that it reaches the gin as dry, loose and clean as possible. Fred Elliott, extension cotton work specialist, says that mishandling of seed cotton can reduce lint quality of the bale by as much as a grade. This means dollars out of the farmers pocket. A little care could prevent these needless losses.

More and more farmers and ranchmen in Texas are reporting successful experiences with chemicals for controlling mesquite and other pasture brush. Diesel oil or mixtures of diesel oil and 2, 4, 5-T have generally proven effective, reports G. O. Hoggman, extension range specialist.

Last year 850 persons died in the United States in farm fires. Fires also caused an estimated 174 million dollars loss in property. Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council says lot of these fires happened in Texas and there will be

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others today, tomorrow, next week and next year; that is unless rural Texans do a much better job of fire prevention. The Council believes that most fires can be prevented and that losses can be greatly reduced if all Texans will make it impossible for "Fire to find a place to start."
