**Nursing Home Bonds
Voted Tuesday**

Fisher County held its tradition of remaining in the Democratic column, Tuesday with a heavy vote of 2,656 voters turning out.
The Democratic ticket led with 1,968 against 681 Nixon-Lodge votes.
A separate ballot was used in the voting on a \$75,000 bond issue to build a Nursing Home in Roby. This carried 1,783 for to 710 against.
Sen. Johnson received an overwhelming 2,138 to his Republican opponent, John G. Tower who got 480 votes for Senator.
Incumbent Omar Burleson received 2,367 votes to Republican Max W. Mossholder of Abilene, 288.
Voters gave a majority vote to all four proposed constitutional amendments.

**FB Urges Cotton Burrs
Returned To Soil**

The Farm Bureau is the sponsor of an open meeting at the Rotan School Cafeteria at 7:30 p. m. next Tuesday evening, Nov. 15, to discuss the advantages of returning cotton burrs to our farms to increase soil fertility and at the same time eliminate the fire hazard and smoke nuisance which results from burning.
Ernest Williams, manager of the Co-op gin at Rule, will be the principal speaker. He will explain how the problem has been handled in that town at small cost and to the mutual benefit and satisfaction of all concerned through voluntary cooperation of the gins, the farmers, and A. S. C., through which payments are made to farmers who return cotton burrs, on their farms. Frank Mitchell, Fisher County A. S. C. Supervisor will be present and prepared to discuss this phase.
At Rule and in many other places the net cost to the farmer of returning a ton of cotton burrs to the land runs as low as 35 cents. Experiment station reports indicate that over a three-year period a ton of cotton burrs returned to a farm will result in an increase of in excess of 100 pounds of lint cotton. Fisher County is one of the few counties in this area where cotton burrs are still being burned and many of our more progressive farmers question the wisdom of continuing such willful waste.
All gin owners, managers, directors, farmers and interested citizens are invited to attend the open meeting to be held at the Rotan School Cafeteria next Tuesday evening Nov. 15, beginning promptly at 7:30 p. m.

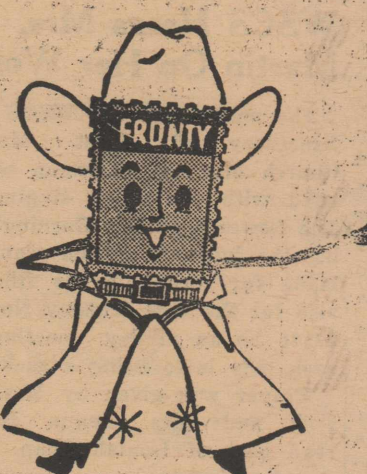

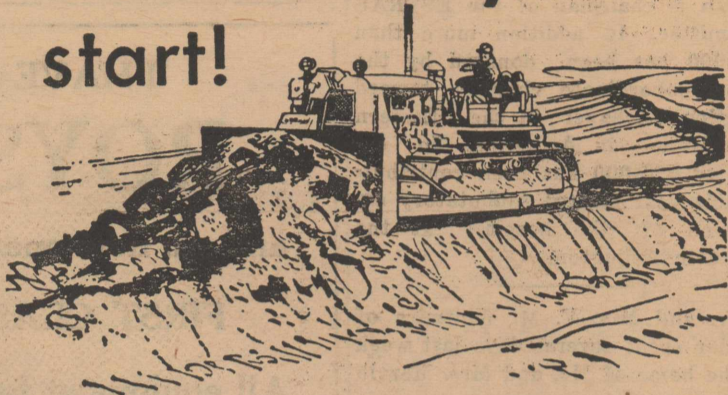

SKIN BLEMISHES MAY BE CAUSED BY DIET

A healthy skin requires a healthy diet. Teenagers with weight or complexion problems should take special note of the foods required for healthy bodies, according to extension foods and nutrition specialists of Texas A&M College. This applies for adults, too.

Needed foods include fruit juices and raw fruits and vegetables. These bulky foods stave off hunger, a thought that weight watchers should keep in mind. Fatty, greasy foods such as chocolate or rich cakes and pastry are definitely taboo, if you have skin problems or are watching calories.

Milk, lean meats, eggs and other protein foods are needed daily for healthy skin, bones and tissues.

Between meal snacks are important to all teenagers, even those who are reducing. Most teens do not get enough food to provide adequate energy when they eat only three times a day. Athletes especially need extra helpings of food and wholesome between meal snacks.

Appetites are not spoiled by between meal eating if snacks are appropriately spaced. They also prevent teenagers from gorging themselves at meal time.

If you have weight or skin problems, why not check your diet? "FOOD FOR FITNESS," a colorful leaflet available from your county home demonstration agent's office, gives an easy to follow plan for balancing your daily food needs.

B VITAMINS NEEDED FOR NERVE STABILITY

For most of us the tempo of living is pretty fast these days and sometimes pressures bring on an "edgy" feeling.

B vitamins are important for nerve stability, remind extension foods and nutrition specialists of Texas A&M College. Enriched corn meal and grits are important dietary sources of these vitamins. Other whole grain and enriched products provide variety and flavor change.

Thiamine helps prevent nervousness, depression, tendency to tire easily, poor appetite, poor digestion and slow heart beat.

Riboflavin helps to prevent red and pruned eyes, dim vision, sensitivity to light, skin disorders, sores at the corner of the mouth, the tendency to age early and improper growth in children.

Niacin helps prevent pains in the abdomen, skin sores, sleeplessness, depression, loss of appetite, nausea and vomiting and poor memory. It helps prevent pellagra.

The Texas Food Standard states that for a good diet each day, a person should have a serving of whole grain and other enriched cereal or bread . . . surveys show that many Texans do not get this needed food daily.

For information on buying and using enriched corn meal and grits, get a copy of MP-269, "Corn Meal and Grits—Selection and Use," from your county home demonstration agent.

Hunters Urged To Send Deer Hides to Hospitals

Dallas, November 5—Please, Mr. Hunter, don't throw away that deer hide!

That's the plea of volunteers in state-operated hospitals who annually sponsor the collection of these skins and have them tanned into leather for use by patients in occupational therapy.

Mrs. Frank O. Hamilton of Dallas, chairman of the Volunteer Services Council or all the state hospitals and special schools, said the patients fashion all types of small articles from the leather which provide gifts for their families, or if salable, "coke and cigarette" funds for themselves.

"The real value though," she pointed out, "is in giving the patients something to occupy his thoughts and his hands. Working with leather especially appeals to many men in our hospitals."

The hides should be lightly salted, drained and sent to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 Fredericksburg Road, Austin, where the owner L. M. Rathbone donates storage, curing and preparation of the hides for the tannery.

Most motor freight lines in Texas haul the hides without charge if the shipping tag is marked "charity". Many locker plant operators also will assist in adding the hides to the collection when the deer are skinned if instructed to do so by the hunter, Mrs. Hamilton said.

In addition to the Texas Motor Transportation Association, the buck-skin collection has the endorsement and active cooperation of Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, Texas Independent Meat Packers Association, State Game and Fish Commission, sports writers and radio editors throughout Texas, the Volunteer chairmen said.

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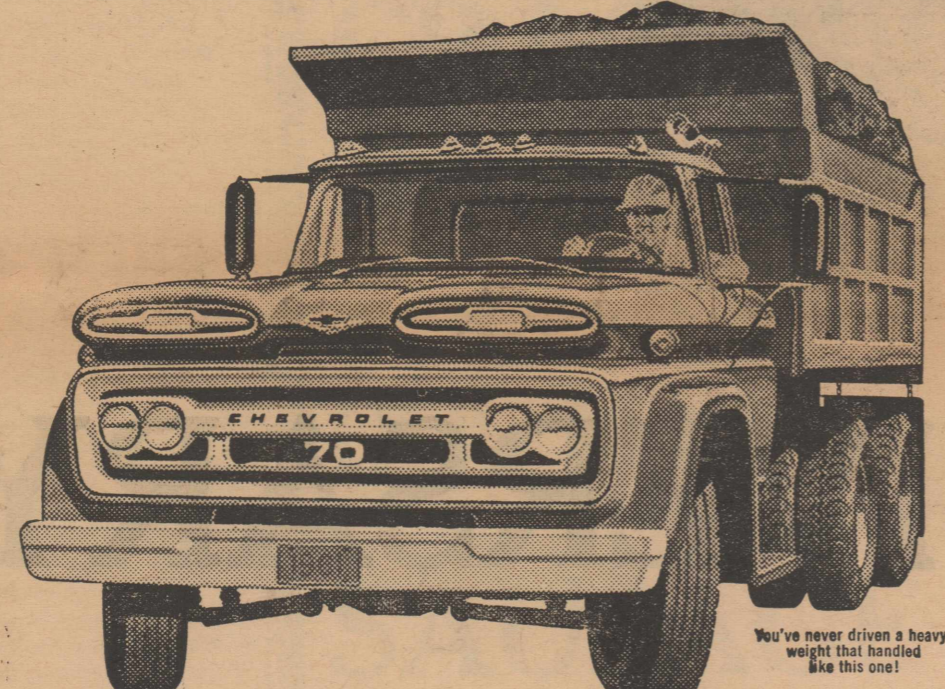
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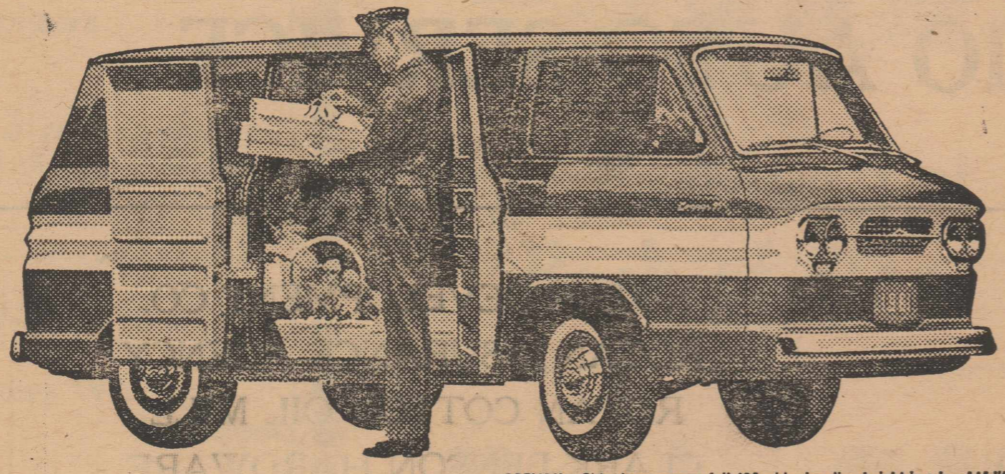
