



Riboflavin helps to prevent red and pranulated eyes, dim vision, sensitivity to light, skin disorders, sores at the corner of the mouth, the tendency to age early and improper growth in children.

Niacin helps prevent pains in the abdomen, skin sores, sleeplessness, deppression, loss of appetite, nausa and vomiting and poor memory. It helps prevent pellagra.

The Texas Food Standard states that for a good diet each day, a person should have a serving of whole grain and other enriched cereal or bread . . . surveys show that many Texans do not get this needed food
