He is graduate of Rotan schools and served two years in Germany with the Army. He was employed in Arlington by General Motors before and after his Army duty.

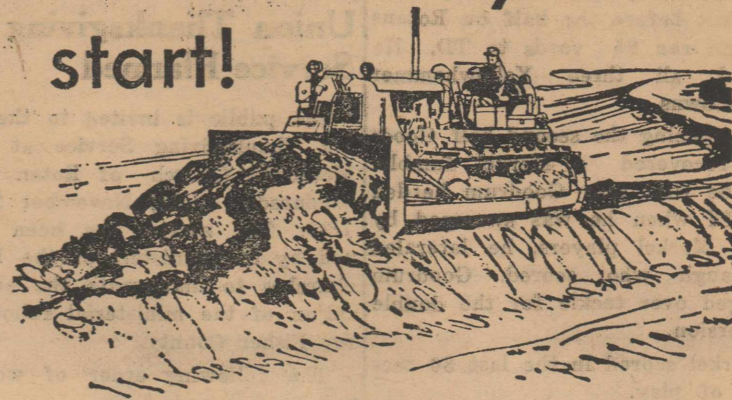

Do insecticides build up residues in the soil and then affect the production of subsequent crops? More and more people associated with crop production are asking this question, and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station decided to find the answer.

Two field experiments were conducted during 1955-59 to determine the effects of large amounts of insecticides applied to soil on the germination, growth and yield of several crops. One test was on Miller soil type near College Station and the other was in Denton soil type near Denton, Texas.

Insecticides applied at Denton were toxaphene, DDT, parathion, dieldrin and benzene hexachloride (BHC). Initial applications included two dosage levels, the equivalent of the calculated amounts that would be applied over periods of 10 and 20 years respectively. The above insecticides, with the exception of parathion, were included in the initial treatment of soil plots at College Station. Dosage, however, was the equivalent of the amount of insecticides normally applied during 5 years. No additional applications were made at Denton, but subsequent annual applications were made at College Station.

No reduction occurred in the yield of cotton grown on the College Station plots that were treated with recommended yearly doses. Also, the insecticides had no apparent effect on yields of grain sorghum and alfalfa grown 1 and 2 years after the cotton.

Germination and yields on the Denton plots were lower than that on untreated plots, but it must be remembered that the amount of insecticides applied were far greater than normal.

Moisture and poultry houses don't mix in any kind of weather, but

excess moisture is especially undesirable during the cold winter months.

One thousand laying hens give off nearly a barrel of water per day, and this water must be removed by good ventilation, says Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman. Where birds are over crowded, proper floor management of birds on litter will greatly reduce the problem of moisture removal, the specialist continues.

Because of the wide range of outdoor temperature conditions during the winter months, it is important that the sidewall construction of the house be of the type that will enable the poultryman to vary the ventilation conditions according to the weather. It is important that the house be closed slightly during a whistling "blue nother", but as soon as the temperature moderates the house should be opened. This opening will allow air movement

to remove the excess moisture and ammonia from the litter.

"Remember", he says, "the function of litter is to provide a dry, clean place for the birds to live and work."

The moisture which causes damp litter may come from sources other than the birds themselves. Inefficient water fountains and leaky roofs or sidewalls are common sources

of unwanted moisture. The basic precautions for keeping the litter dry are grading around the house to provide drainage, making sure the floor of the house is higher than the surrounding area and providing adequate roof overhang to carry rain away from the walls.

Providing housed poultry with dry, loose floor covering material re-

quires planning and regular attention, but the individual poultryman has a wide choice of litter material. Among the common litters used in Texas are wood shavings, bagasse, peanut shells, crushed corn cobs, cut straw and peat. The important thing is to use a sufficient amount of litter to form a good, loose, dry bedding.

A poultry flock that has been pro-

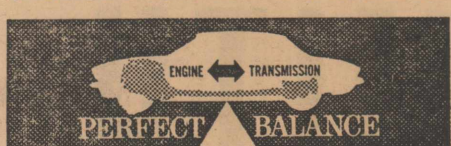

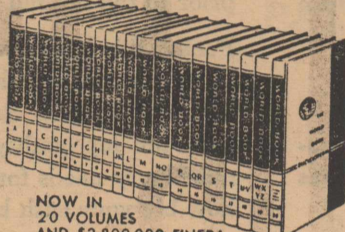

Your Health-

The thick complaint of statistics is entitled "Accidental Poisoning by Gases and Vapors." Published by the Texas State Department of Health, it shows there were 44 such deaths in Texas in 1959.

Some were caused by open gas jets which should have been closed tightly or capped when in prolonged disuse. Others were the result of inhaling certain toxic chemical substances.

But most poisonings by "gases and vapors" are the direct results of carbon monoxide-the silent killer.

During the chilling days of winter, hardly a week goes by that some one somewhere in Texas does not die from carbon monoxide poisoning.

Such deaths come under the broad heading of "accidental", but a more apt heading would be "careless".

The fact of the matter is that carbon monoxide poisoning is the end result of improperly adjusted heaters, leaky vents or none at all, and lack of ventilation in rooms where any kind of fire is burning.

Perhaps the greatest danger lies in the tasteless, odorless and colorless character of carbon monoxide. Unless you have complicated testing equipment and keep checking about every 15 minutes, there is absolutely no warning of the presence of the gas until symptoms appear.

Even these symptoms are masked. A seemingly mild headache, slightly watering eyes or a touch of stomach upset are easily mistaken for a cold; when they may really be early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning.

If sleeping in a closed room with a faulty heater burning death may come without waking or warning. In fact most carbon monoxide death follow this pattern.

Regardless of the heating fuel, precautions must be taken, since carbon monoxide is the result of incompletely burned fuel.

Proper venting should be installed with outlets leading outside the building and carefully checked for leaks. Under all conditions ventilation is a must, if nothing more than a "cracked" window.
