## F. T. SANDERS MAKES IMPROVEMENTS ON GIN

The F. T. Sanders Gin, one of the big gins of this section, has made considerable improvements during the summer with the view of helping handle the cotton crop that will be gathered in this section during the next few months. The Sanders Gin has a capacity of about 90 bales per day. It is an 8-stand gin so arranged to handle two bales at a time.

The entire plant has been thoroughly overhauled during the summer and considerable new machinery installed including another Rosemond & Loken ball extrator, which takes all the balls out of the cotton and delivers it to the feeder picker. New gin saws have been installed, also a new shed erected on the yard that will accommodate 15 bales at a time.

Mr. Sanders has spent more than \$5,000 on this gin plant in improvements and new machinery during the past two years.

Practically the same crew will be with Mr. Sanders again this season. John Freeland and William Viney will have charge of the engines and Joe Chapman and Mose Hays will be the gin stand men.

## RETURNS FROM A 6-WEEKS STAY ON PACIFIC COAST

Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Grissom returned from California last week after a six weeks stay on the Pacific coast. Mr. Grissom says he saw more of that great section of the country west of the Rockies on this trip than most tourists who go from here because of the opportunity available to travel over the country. He made headquarters at Long Beach and spent more time there than any other place during his stay. Only in a few places he found corn making a good yield, but most of the feed crop will be short this year south and east, according to Mr. Brown.

## G. S. MEDFORD RETURNS FROM TRIP TO EAST TEXAS

On last Monday G. S. Medford called at this office and gave a little sketch of a trip to East Texas. He arrived back home Thursday afternoon. He went through Fort Worth and Dallas to Cherokee county and returned by the way of Hillsboro. He stated that most of the sections of the state where he traveled through needed rain very badly and that crops were suffering badly in some sections. He says in some sections the tomato crop is the greatest money crop grown and that the crops were made and gathered before the drought became serious and that quite a lot of money was realized from the sale of tomatoes. The fruit crop was also good, according to Mr. Medford. He believes the ribbon cane crop will be a failure unless rain comes in a short time. He says Haskell county crops are as good as the best he saw on his trip. Cotton is the principal crop over the section visited by him and he thinks feed will be very scarce and high priced.

Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Robbins of Knox City were visitors to Haskell Monday. Mr. Robbins is connected with a Knox City Bank.

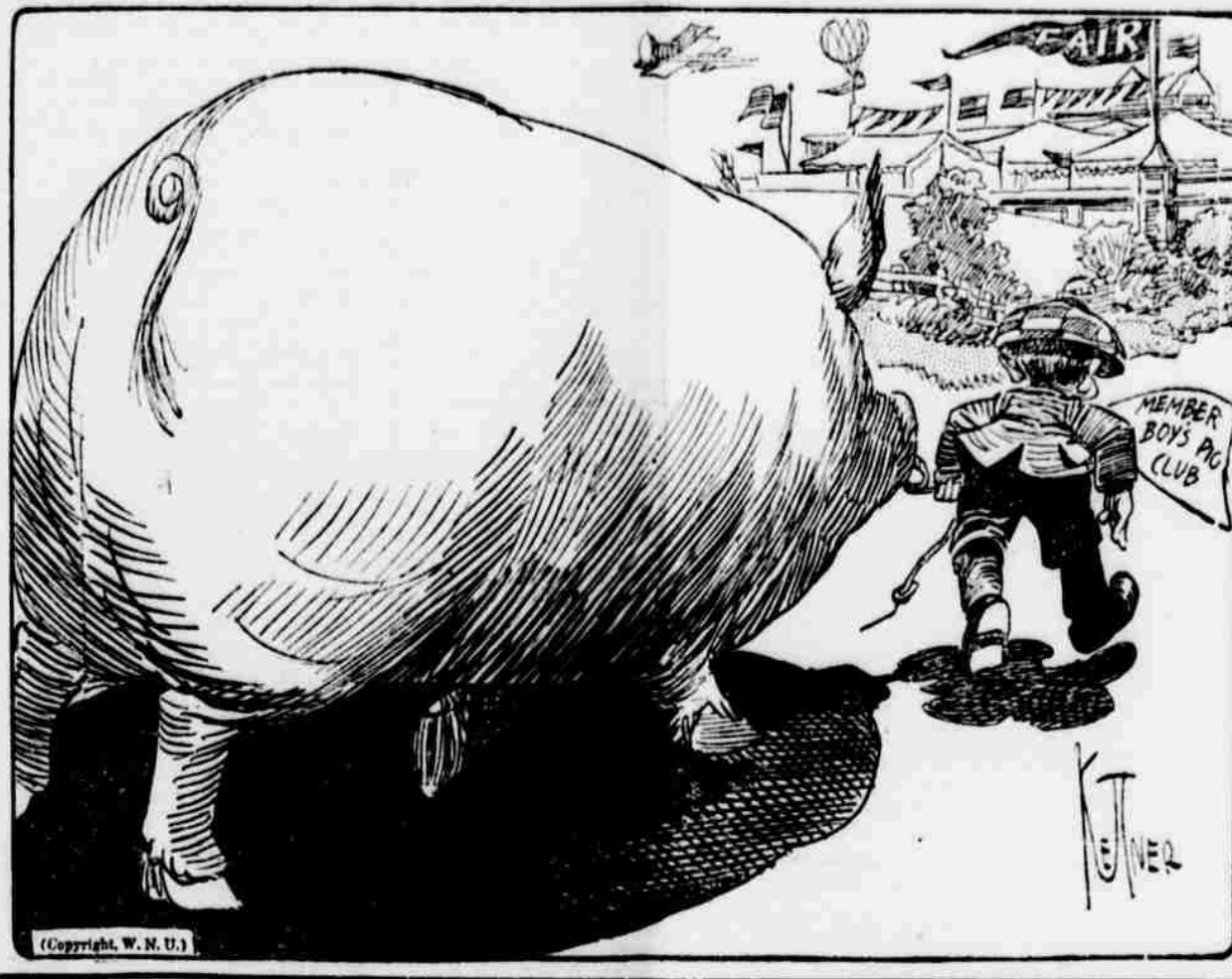
## BIDS WANTED ON LEASE FOR POSTOFFICE

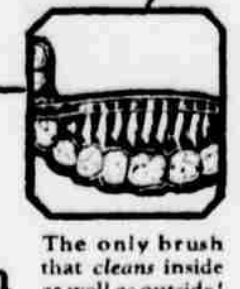
