Tickets are available at the high school office.


Head Start enrollment to be May 14

Anhydrous Ammonia, a chemical beneficial to the farmers, and tough on our sinuses. It is also a substance that is in great demand by those who seek to manufacture illegal drugs, then feed those drugs to our citizens who don't know better.

Through a process in which the anhydrous ammonia is one of the key elements, the illegal drugs are brewed along with several over the counter items, some of the currently popular items being certain battery components, Drano, Muriatic acid, some certain allergy medication, and so on.

Could you imagine putting those chemical into your blood, whether injected directly or inhaled into the system, is doing to you?

Not only this county, bet every surrounding county, has cases and instances where someone has taken anhydrous ammonia from tanks located in fields, tanks located in distribution locations, and even suspected of taking an entire tank.

There is no word other than crazy to describe these individuals who are determined to destroy the mental and physical health of our citizens.

On June 29, shortly after midnight, when most sane people are at home sleep, former Knox County Deputy Jesse Johnson noticed a suspicious vehicle in the Munday area. Through good investigation and experience, he stopped the vehicle and conducted an investigation. He was assisted by Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers and the Munday Police Department.

May is Motorcycle **Safety Month**

May is Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month in Texas, and DPS urges all motorcycle enthusiasts-both experienced and inexperienced-to attend a professionally taught motorcycle course to hone their skills.

"More than 700,000 people in Texas are licensed to operate a motorcycle," said Clifton Burdette, coordinator of the DPS Motorcycle Safety Unit. "Operating a motorcycle safely requires the use of special mental and physical skills. Riders can attain these skills by attending professionally taught motorcycle operator training courses, as well as through personal experience.

The DPS Motorcycle Safety Unit offers basic and advanced motorcycle operator training in 60 permanent locations and 7 mobile sites that utilize two selfcontained mobile training units. Last year, 23,557 Texans took either the basic or advanced

The basic motorcycle operator training course is for unlicensed or inexperienced riders, and the advanced course is for more experienced riders. The basic course may be used to waive the licensing road test and both of the courses may qualify for ticket dismissal and insurance discounts.

While Texas does not require all motorcycle riders to wear helmets, the DPS strongly encourages riders to wear helmets to increase safety and save lives. Texas law states that in order to be exempt from wearing a helmet, a person must be at least 21 years of age. In addition, they must successfully complete a motorcycle safety course or be covered by a health insurance plan providing at least \$10,000 in medical benefits for motorcycle-related inju-

KCHS senior wins ConocoPhillips scholarship

Former coach Don Haskins to speak

The Benjamin High School Awards Banquet will be held Monday, May 17, at 6:30 p.m. at the Benjamin Ex-Students Memorial Building.

All academic and sports awards will be presented. However, this year's banquet will be special as Don Haskins will be speaking to the students

the students.

Haskins's first job was coaching 6-man football and boys' and girls' basketball at Benjamin. He then coached at Hedley for four years and at Dumas for one year before taking the helm at Texas Western College in 1967. There he led what is now the University of Texas at El Paso Miners to 34 winning seasons of his 38 years there.

He is perhaps most well-known for changing college basketball forever when his unknown 1966 team (Texas Western) beat Kentucky for the NCAA title, starting five black players to win the championship. Two of his most famous players in his 38 years of college basketball are Nate "Tiny" Archibald and Tim Hardaway.

Some of his players at Benjamin include Jim Bateman, Johnny Tom Hudson, Sammy Pierce, Charles Griffith, Daisy Brown Roberts, Jan Duke Pollock and Mary Duke Sawyer, Glenda Cox Bearly and Linda Cox.

Coach Haskins grew up in Enid, Oklahoma, and played basketball at Oklahoma A&M under the legendary Hank Iba. In his autobiography, Haskins, The Bear Facts, as told to Ray Sanchez, published by Mangan Books and the El Paso Herald Post, Haskins recalls playing for "Mr. Iba": "Christmases were awful. During the two-week break ... we practiced from 9-12, 2-5 and 7-10 each day. No one eve sat down during Mr. Iba's practices. And no one drank water. As a sophomore Haskins made the All-College Tournament All-Star Team in Oklahoma City and notes that he was "benched the next three games. That's the way he was. There were no individual stars on his teams."

County Museum is one step closer

Groundbreaking ceremonies took place in Benjamin on Tuesday afternoon at the proposed site of the new Knox County Museum.

An interested crowd of local and county wide supporters attended the groundbreaking ceremony and watched the first shovels of ground turned by those who have worked so hard to make the museum a success.

Located on U.S. 82/State 114
Highway, the site is one block

east of the Knox County Courthouse and the intersection of State 6 and US 82/State 114, near and perhaps actually on the trail traveled by members of the 1841 Texas-Santa Fe Expedition.

Knox County was part of an east-west route from New Mexico and the Texas South Plains to Eastern parts of Texas for centuries before the Spanish touched the land with the white man's civilization. Texas frontier battalions members pursued raiding Indians up the Wichita and Brazos rivers often during the Civil War and many returned to settle the sandy, watered country in the south and the rough red canyons of the western portions. Others crossed the county heading to Texas' northwest, up over the Cap Rock.

The ceremony on Tuesday was the beginning of making this history real with a 5,000 square foot building holding artifacts, North Texas history, geology, genealogy and story telling exhibits.

VA plans changes in health care system

WASHINGTON - Creating 11 community clinics, evaluating the most appropriate means to care for veterans now treated at Waco and transferring acute care services from Kerrville to San Antonio are part of a comprehensive plan by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to modernize its nationwide system of health care facilities. The plan also calls for a study to examine closing the Big Spring facility and transferring inpatient services to a new facility in the Odessa Midlands area and renovating the Dallas medical center. "These changes will provide greater access to care for veterans," said VA Secretary Anthony J. Principi. "By strengthening our network of outpatient clinics, we will bring a greater quality

of care closer to where most of Texas' veterans live." About 366,000 of Texas' 1,700,000 veterans were treated last year in VA's health care facilities, up from 281,000 in 2000. In 2003, VA spent \$4.8 billion in Texas, an increase from \$3.7 billion three years before. Secretary Principi noted that about 80 percent of the health care provided nationwide by VA is outpatient care. He said the plan would allow the department to provide more of the outpatient care veterans want and use, while building upon VA's expertise in providing highly specialized inpatient care.

CARES is a plan to modernize and improve VA's health care system. Among the elements of the Secretary's CARES decision are

more than 150 new community based outpatient clinics, potential creation of four new - and expansion of five existing - spinal cord injury centers, two new blind rehabilitation centers, and expansions throughout VA's health care system that will enhance veterans' access to VA care. "I want to emphasize that no veteran will lose health care as a result of CARES, nor will there be any gaps in their health care services." said Principi. The CARES plan was reviewed by an independent commission, which received more than 212,000 comments and held 81 site visits to VA and Department of Defense medical facilities, and State Veterans Homes, 38 public hearings and 10 formal meetings.

Storm shelter funding announced

Temple, Texas - USDA Rural Development State Director Bryan Daniel announced today that the Agency is offering low interest Section 504 loans to help finance storm shelters for verylow income homeowners living in rural Texas.

"Severe weather can strike Texas unexpectedly, and with serious personal consequences. As Texans know, violent storms and the unfortunate loss of life underscore the need for improved home safety measures. The installation of an approved storm shelter can provide rural Texans added safety and security." said Daniel.

Eligibility requirements for this program includes a family income of less than 50% of the median income for their respective county, an applicant must live in their own home, and the family must reside in an eligible rural community. The USDA Rural Development financed shelters must also meet Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) standards in design, construction and installation.

State Director Daniel encourages individuals interested in USDA Rural Development's Section 504 loan program to contact their local office.

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
