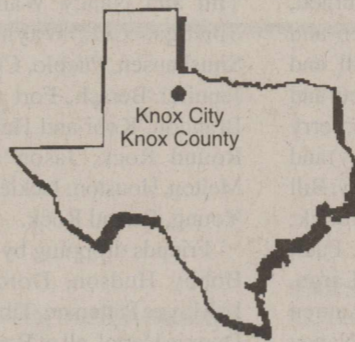

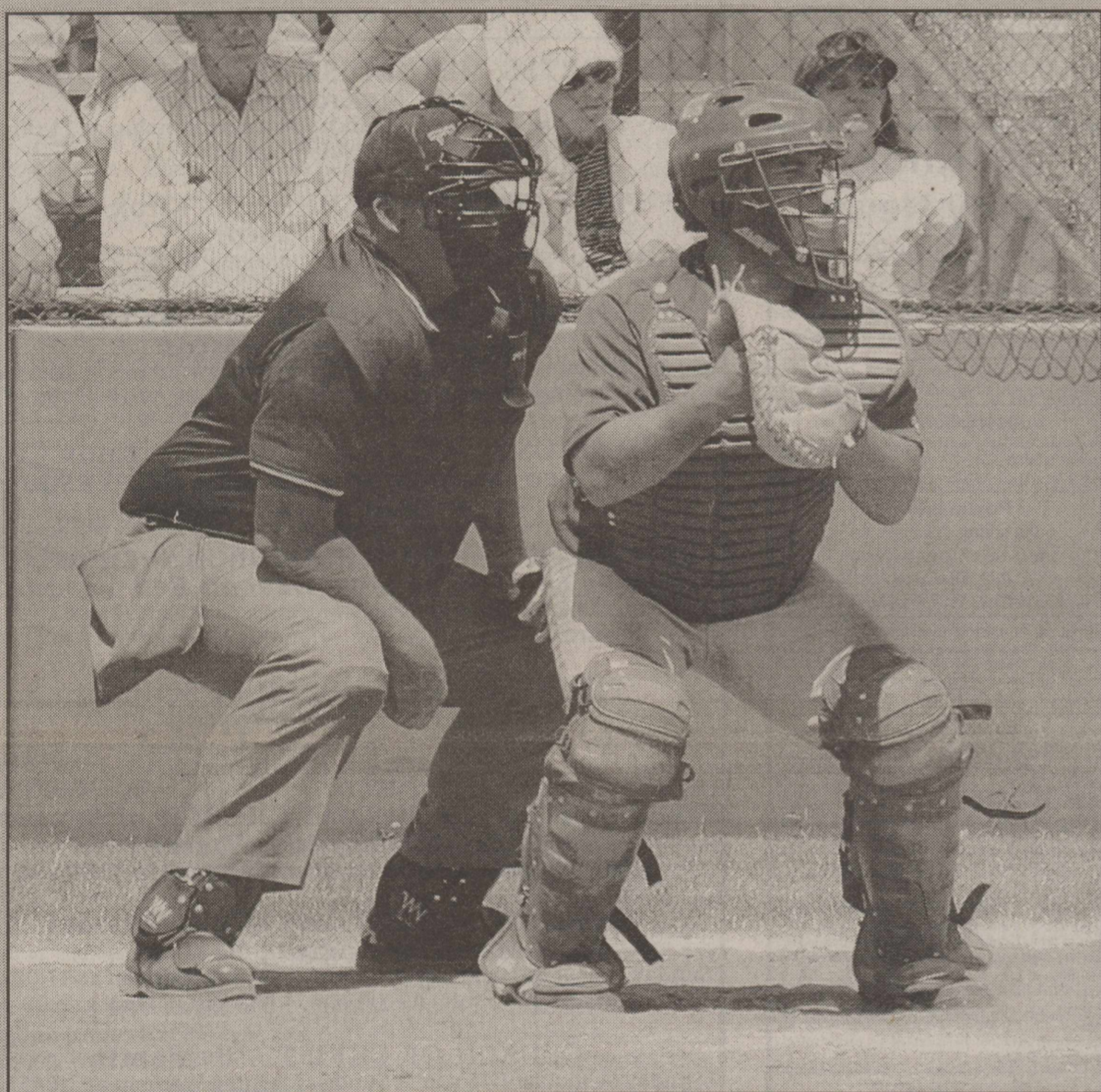

**Knox County among those eligible for emergency loans**

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by hail, high winds, lightning, and a tornado that occurred on March 4, 2004 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Vernon, FSA Farm Loan Manager, Kelley R. Boone, said.

Baylor County and Knox County in Texas were recently named contiguous counties by Administrator James R. Little eligible for loans to cover severe physical losses resulting from hail, high winds, lightning, and a tornado that occurred on March 4, 2004.

Baylor County, the primary county, along with Archer County, Knox County, Wichita County and Wilbarger County, contiguous counties, in Texas were recently named by Administrator Little to be eligible for loans to cover severe physical losses resulting from high winds that occurred on March 4, 2004.

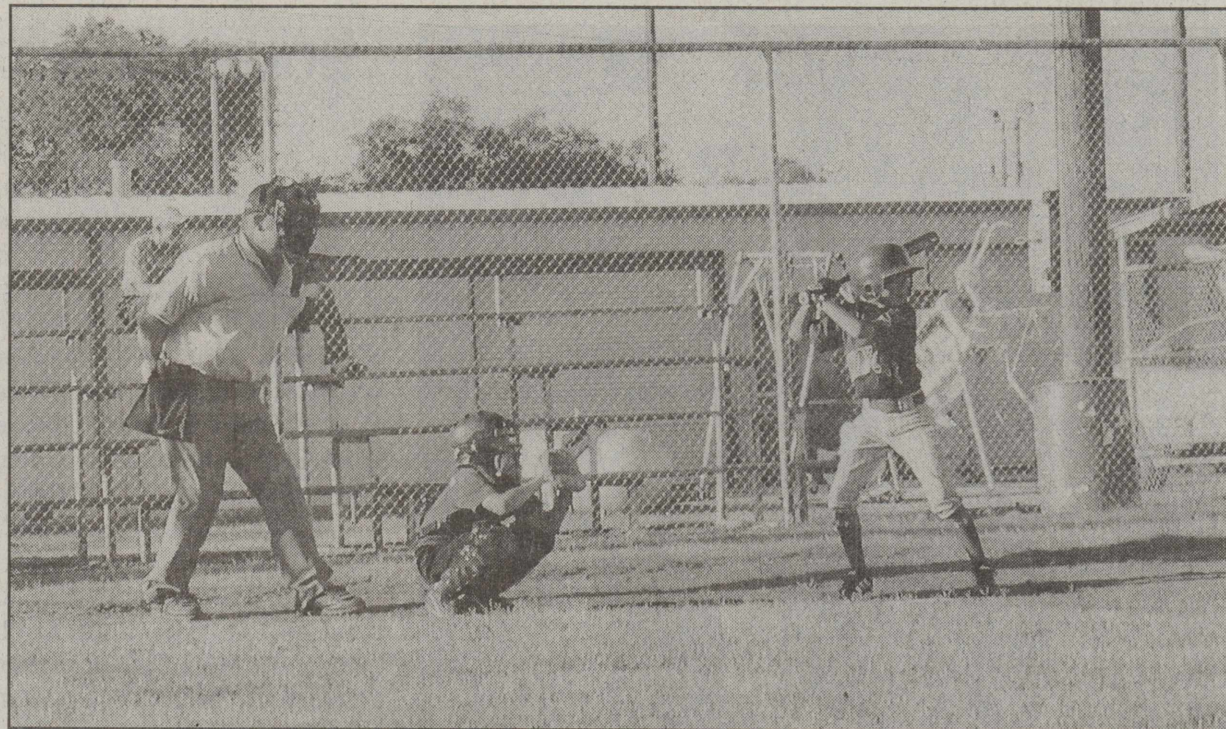
Boone said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate in 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered a severe physical loss to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Boone said. Farmers covered by property insurance will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 20, 2005 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season," Boone said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Vernon, Texas, is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

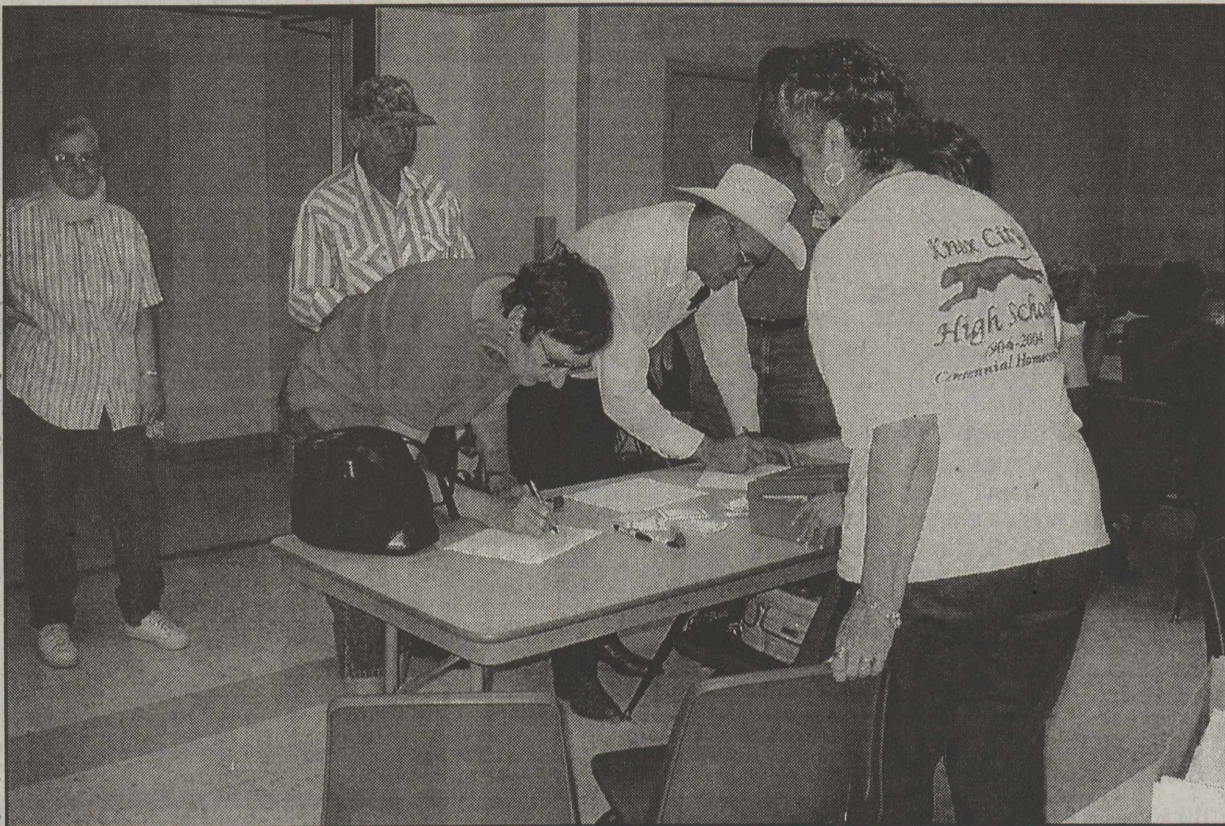
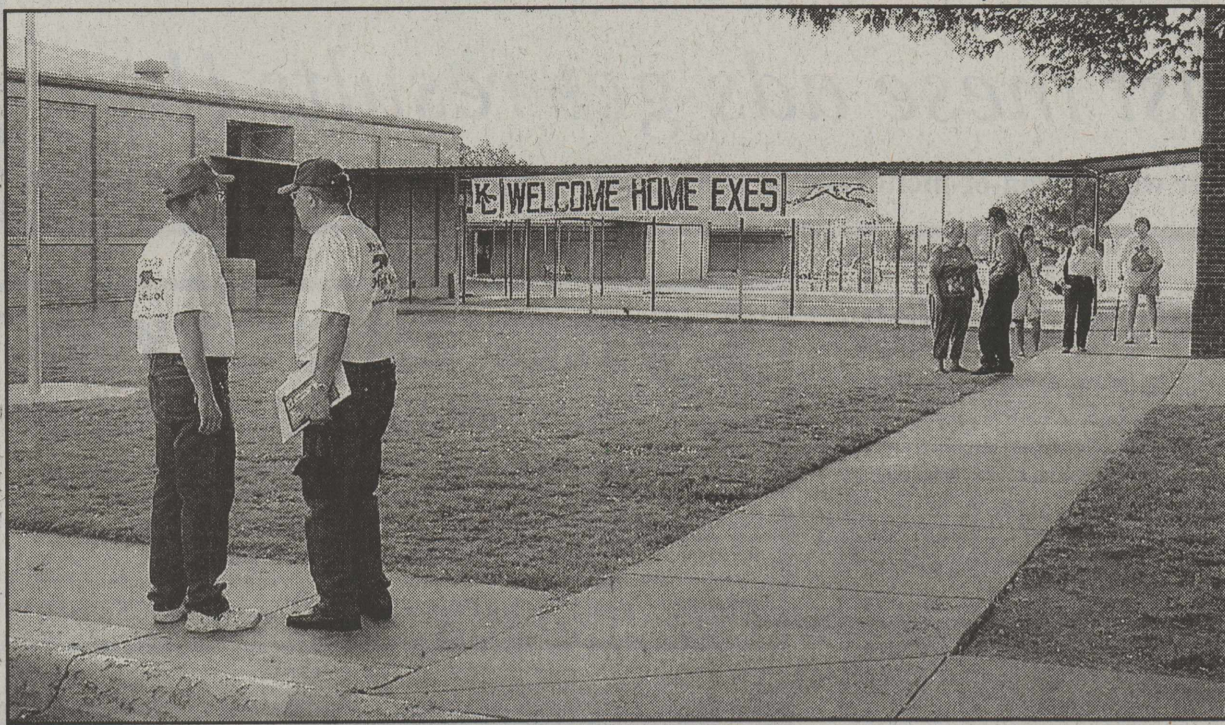
