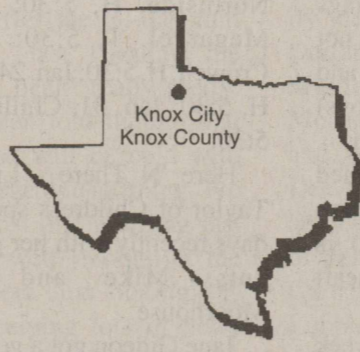

The 2004 football season for KCHS ended last Friday night when the Greyhounds were defeated by Haskell, 38-21. Playing for a playoff spot, KC

only picked up 96 rushing yards compared to 293 by Haskell. Riley Spells was the leading rusher with 73 yards. The Greyhounds did much better through the air, pick-

Knox County Veterans Day Activities

Honoring veterans on Thursday, November 11

The Student Council of Knox City High School will begin Veterans Day activities early on Thursday morning with a breakfast honoring veterans. Beginning at 8:30, the breakfast will be held in the KCHS school library. Later on in the morning, the Knox County Veterans Day program will begin at 11:00 a.m. at the Veterans Memorial in Benjamin.

The family of R. Otis Burnett, the Gold Star family, will be recognized and place a memorial

wreath at the arch, which is engraved with the names of Knox County veterans killed in the war. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. M.O. Burnett of Munday. He entered the U.S. Navy on October 31, 1942, and served in the Pacific Theatre during World War II with the rank of Chief Pharmacist. He served aboard the destroyer *Monogham* under Commander William F. Halsey; the ship went down in a typhoon. Otis was reported missing December 1944. His death was confirmed on Feb-

ruary 11, 1945. Otis has a marker in Arlington National Cemetery. Veteran's memorabilia will be displayed at the Courthouse from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. The featured speakers for the event will be two young students who will read their Veterans Day essays. A patriotic program honoring veterans is planned followed by a delicious hamburger meal at the Benjamin Ex-Students Center. The veterans's information binders will be available for viewing at the Center.

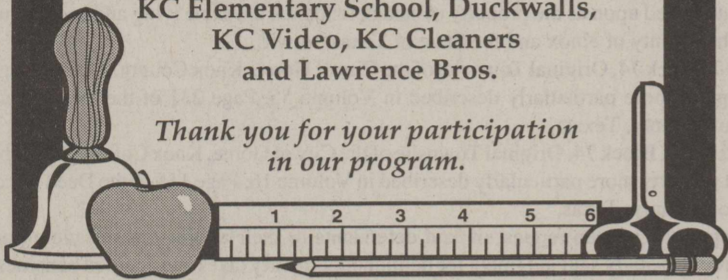

jority of voters across the United
States last Tuesday in re- electing

Badnarik received 5.

In Knox County races, Repub-
lican Travis Floyd had 855 votes
to Democrat Joe Lowe's 692 for

for Tax Assessor/Collector.

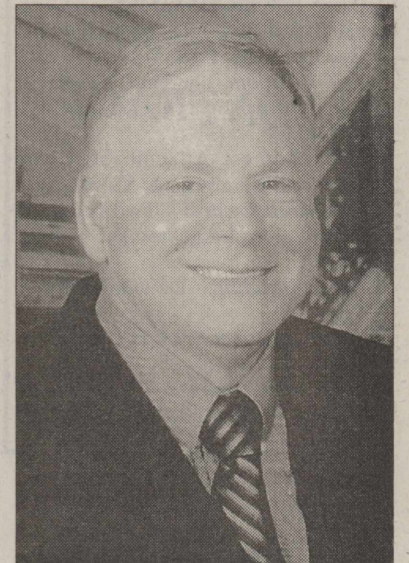
County Clerk Ronnie Verhalen

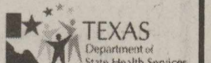

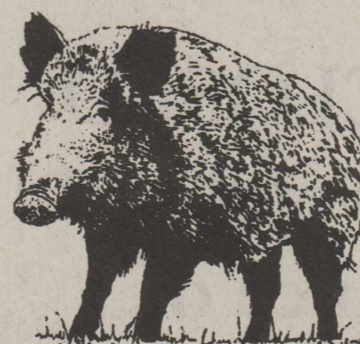

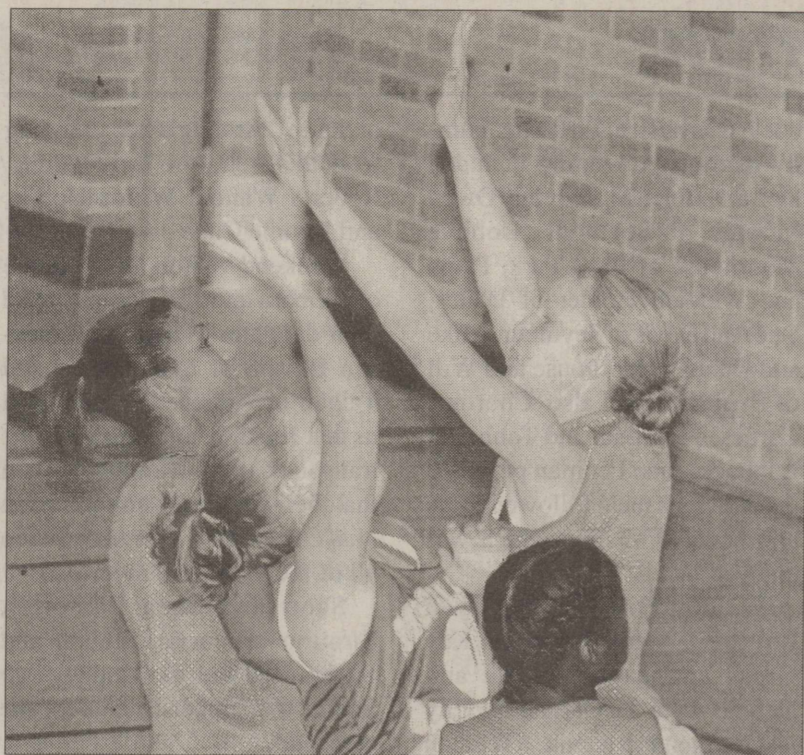
