

Knox County joined the majority of voters across the United States last Tuesday in re-electing incumbent George W. Bush to a second term to the presidency. Total votes for Bush-Chaney were 1079 to 464 for Kerry-Edwards. The Libertanian nominee Michael Badnarik received 5.

In Knox County races, Republican Travis Floyd had 855 votes to Democrat Joe Lowe's 692 for County Judge.

Democratic incumbent Linda Parker received 943 to Republican Wendell "Bud" Hogan's 596 for Tax Assessor/Collector.

County Clerk Ronnie Verhalen reported a total of 244 early votes which was 39% more than the early votes in 2000.


