GRAND JURY FINDS 73 INDICTMENTS

W. G. Boothe charged with theft of Automobile, on conviction was given a two year sentence.

Cus Christopher, charged with theft was dismissed on motion of District Attorney.

The case of Alvie Ferguson vs. Joe Lee Ferguson contest of will was tried before District Judge W. R. Ely of the 42 Judicial District last Thursday. Judgment in the case was held by the court and will be rendered later.

Terracing demonstrations are taking the greater portion of the time of the County Agent in the county at the present time according to his statement. Three terracing demonstrations have been given in different portions of the county during the past week with more than 40 people in attendance.

Terracing machines are being sold by the local hardware firms for the first time in the history of the county.

SANTA FE RAILWAY COMPLETING SURVEY

The following article concerning the survey of the Santa Fe Railway was taken from Monday's Star-Telegram, and is self-explanatory:

"A Santa Fe surveying crew of 15 engineers and assistants Saturday began running lines from Graham direct to Fort Worth via Perrin and Saginaw, according to information received from Graham by The Star-Telegram, this survey being the last leg of the Post-to-Fort Worth route.

"The survey from Post to Graham was concluded five weeks ago, and no attempt was made at that time to run lines further eastward, it having been understood that the Santa Fe was negotiating for trackage rights over the Rock Island from Graham to Fort Worth.

"The line as surveyed runs from Post through Haskell and Throckmorton. The survey out of Graham to Fort Worth would shorten the distance between the two towns by about 15 miles, and follows the announcement several months ago by W. B. Storey, president of the Santa Fe, that the system would construct as short a line from this city to the Plains as possible to build.

"Only a week ago, Story in a message to The Star-Telegram said that it had not been decided just when he would apply to the Interstate Commerce Commission for permit to build the survey followed closely the applications of the Fort Worth & Denver and the Texas, Panhandle & Gulf for lines to the Plains. The Interstate Commerce Commission has not indicated when it will decide on the applications of these roads.

"The Graham advices reported that survey orders had been issued to the Santa Fe to go as direct to Perrin, if the difficult terrain in lower Texas Young counties will permit. Graham is 100 miles from Fort Worth and Perrin is 50 miles. It is the announced intention of the Texas, Panhandle & Gulf, should it obtain a permit, to build its own line from here to Perrin, so the Santa Fe survey running thru that town to Fort Worth at least indicates a paralleling of interests.

"All three of the proposed lines would greatly reduce the travel time from here into the South Plains. At present travel is routed either via Sweetwater or via Amarillo."

DOMESTIC SCIENCE CLASS ATTENDS DEMONSTRATION

of the Board of City Development as the question might be. Also, of the Haskell folks, like folks in other cities, get the wrong conception of labor and intentions and duties of organization.

There are many matters the body cannot handle. There are many things for which its funds should not be used. That is the main reason, in fact, that the body must raise funds to take care of various matters as they arise.

For example, the City Council has to take care of nine months of the Manager's salary. The Haskell Fair Assn. takes care of it for the next months, this being the main reason when most of the Manager's salary goes towards the Fair preparations presentation. However, in the time the Board of City Development matters are not allowed to lag in meetings and correspondence and are looked after.

The Chamber of Commerce unit of organization is that financed by citizens who pledge each year to contribute quarterly, or when called upon, in amounts. This fund goes for rentals, lights, telephone, office supplies, stationery, etc., and the salary of the Band Leader, Prof. Collum is out of this special fund also. The quarterly payment is now being made by Chairman N. L. McCollum, the Finance Committee. This will be the care of the entertainment necessary at the hands of Haskell citizens held here December 14-18. 300 teachers will be Haskell's guests.

At the closing of the year makes necessary to start new pledges next year, about January 1st, and the funds being collected will have to be taken care of the Chamber of Commerce until the first quarter collections of the New Year are collected.

Our Chamber of Commerce office equipment speaks for our City," said Mr. Clifford, "if we don't make an impression, if we don't handle matters properly, meet guests in keeping with our station as City Representatives, we have missed one of the main reasons for our being on the job, our purpose, so to speak."

The Chamber of Commerce receives many letters addressed to the organization because the people of the country understand any live town or city supports a Chamber of Commerce to represent the citizenship in general matters. The old practice of addressing the Mayor, the City Marshal and the postmaster, has been discarded, and 87 per cent of the commercial organizations of the United States, representing cities and towns, are designated Chamber of Commerce this has been great help to the public in general in all counties of the world.

With the beginning of the new year Manager Clifford expects to have each standing committee fully made up and special committees acting and just as usual as the usual new year work has been set aside or is in condition to permit the workers to get away from the city, the movement looking to better streets, more sewerage, street lights and general development with such new matters as might arise, the Board of City Development and Chamber of Commerce forces will be found at work on the job.
