

EMBASSY CELEBRATION

IT WAS a rare honor for us as tourists to be able to attend a formal event at the American Embassy in Rome. It happened like this: Lt. Col. Vince Freeman is U.S. Army Liason Officer to the Italian Army Headquarters, where he works with Italian officers, many of whom are graduates of either Italian and/or American General Staff Colleges. Vince (we can call him that because he's the Son-In-Law) conceived the idea of arranging a formal get-together evening (reunion) of Italian senior officers and American senior officers (also graduates of the Staff Colleges) for mutual fellowship and camaraderie as an effort to further strengthen relationships between the two countries. Italian officers traveled to Rome from all over Italy. His superiors and the Italian brass thought this an excellent idea, so he, with Amy's help, put together an elaborate catered event. We three tourists were just guests at the event, held at the Marine Hall at the Embassy on a given evening. (We were also encouragers, too because the kids were nervous about everything going off well). Think it was the only time I wore a necktie over there, because it was a coat and tie affair. A caterer and a band had been engaged; there were souvenirs, flags and remembrances for the guests of honor and their wives which included three fourstar Italian generals, as many American, the American Ambassador, whom Amy introduced us to as her boss. as well as the American Ambassador to the Vatican. and a number of officers and diplomatic persons. Amy arranged for the elaborate floral center piece, and I got to bring it in. During the reception time, there was the traditional decorated cake cutting by representatives of the two countries, and a general get-acquainted time. The young Marines, who are Embassy guards, assisted and served. The buffet meal included barbecued ribs (Vince thinks of everything) and other delicacies for the eat on-your-lap affair. Vince presided at the program and introduced the guest speakers which included U.S. Ambassador Melvin F. Sembler and R. James Nicholson, U.S. Ambassador to the Holy See. The the largest faith based social Commander of the Italian General Staff College announced that the joint session was so successful

it would be repeated annually in the interest of harmony between the two countries. (During Vince and Amy's first tour in Italy in the '90s, he attended the Italian Staff College and later the American Staff College in Fort Leavenworth, so he should know the material.) He also works with many of the Italian officers with whom he attended classes before, and the families visit socially...Oh, by the way, "after the ball," somebody has to tidy up so we sorta helped the young Marines get it back in shape.

In case you are asked, U.S. Ambassador to Italy Mel Sembler was appointed by President Bush in 2001, and had previously served as ambassador to Australia and Nauru. Prior to his appointments he was chairman of the board of the Sembler Co., one of the nation's leading shopping center developers, and has headed up the international association for that industry.

He is best known as a activist in the anti-drug campaign and as a stauch. long-time supporter of the Republican Party. He and his wife founded STRAIGHT. an adolescent drug treatment program, which has graduated over 12,000 young people. He has served as finance chairman for the National Republican Committee and been an avid fund raiser for campaigns and inaugurations. The ambassador's residence is the Villa Taverna wnich has been in existence since at least 955 A.D. Catacombs underneath the gardens date from 270 A.D., and was for years property of the Catholic Church, and was a seminary for some 400 years.

R. James [Nicholson, U.S. Ambassador to the Holy See is West Point graduate. As a Ranger in Vietnam, he earned multiple medals including the Bronze star. He retired as a full colonel. With a law degree, he practiced with a major Denver firm and became a partner, specializing in real estate, municipal finance and zoning law. He later founded a development firm of master planned residential communities, and later bought and operated Renaissance Home, a major builder of high quality custom homes. His social work included leadership in service agency in the Rocky Mountain States. As a Republican activist, in 1997 he was elected R.N.C. that he would guarantee that chairman, and breaking all

records for fund raising, is credited with helping win the party's Clean Sweep in 1997. He is credited with helping launch the party's national goal for public education efforts, and as Chairman, culminated in the history making victories of the 2000 elections: winning the Presidency, the Congress, a majority of governships and the state legislatures, a feat not done by Republicans in nearly 50 years. He has been awarded highest honored by the Roman Catholic Church, the Horatio Alger Award and other awards


Nichelson to head up the Veterans Administration by President Bush.

This visit at the Embassy was in late August, long before the resignations and Presidential appointments which are now moving forward.



Homeland Security Efforts Can be Improved,

Say Texans

After the 109th Congress is sworn in this January, it will grapple with many issues. including homeland security. How do we better protect our people from terrorists at the same time we uphold our vital civil liberties? This year's Listening Post survey gather d valuable comments from my fellow Texans which I will share with my colleagues when the Senate begins the next session.

Respondents provided feedback on arrangements regarding visas for foreign nationals, suggested our next priorities in transportation safety, named the most important goal to improve protection from terrorist attacks. and offered guidance about where additional homeland security funding would best be spent.

Over 400,000 people travel into the United States each day through Texas, entering through 11 border crossings. There is a great deal of concern that some of these visitors mean harm to our people. Presently, Canadians can enter the United States for a six-month stay on a tourist visa. while Mexican nationals, on the same type of document, are allowed to remain for just one month. A good number of respondents came up with a different idea. Thomas, of Bryan said, "The Canadian nationals should also be limited to a 30-day visa." Jon, from Brooks Air Force Base, says the solution is to split the difference and provide both Mexican and Canadian tourists 90-day visas, but posed this question: "How many Canadians or Mexicans really stay beyond 30 days just for tourism?"

In the Listening Post I solicited your opinions on what we should do next to protect the United States against more 9-11 type attacks: Most of you said we should apply the same standards to air cargo that are in place for passengers. Fortunately, my legislation calling on the Transportation Security Administration to improve aviation security by providing enhanced screening of air cargo was included in the recently-passed Intelligence Reform Bill. A close second in respondent ratings was to set up a computer database to check airline passenger names against criminal watch lists. Many expressed interest in overhauling security procedures for train travel, and the fewest number supported expansion of

who voluntarily supply cerand personal information to benefit from expedited security procedures. Davis, of Fort Worth, said any security decision involves, "a tough trade-off, but I want our children to live."

Spending on homeland security efforts has nearl; tripled since 2001, providing larger budgets for everything from aviation and port security, to vaccinations and training and equipment for firefighters and police officers. I asked what further changes Texans want to see in homeland security appropriations. Most opted in favor of altering present fund ing formulas to allocate a larger share of resources to those states and cities facing greater terrorist threats. Many others said we should seek better training and preparation for the firemen, emergency medical technicians, and police who are the first responders in our communities. A distant third replied that we should simply keep our current spending levels. Reid, who lives in McKinney, says that whatever decision we make, we must, "make sure that the money allocated is wellspent and the taxpayer gets what they pay for." I agree

one hundred percent. The attacks on 9-11 spurred Congress to take the anprecedented step of creating the Department of Homeland Security, a single government agency responsible for defending Americans on our own soil. Most of you suggested our next step should be to improve the security of our borders. Many also wanted government officials to address weaknesses in security at our scaports. "Security at ports needs to be addressed," said Keith, from Cedar Park. "This is probably number one on my list. This should include everyone on the ship along with the products and the shipping containers."

Wayne, from Greenville, said we need to watch our northern border with Canada, and suggested changing our policy of setting an upper age limit to those joining the Border Patrol. "This limits the valuable asset of retired military personnei and police,"

This survey showed national security is on the minds of many fellow Texans. It also showed, through your thoughtful answers, you take this issue seriously. I want to thank all of you who took the time to send in responses and help me do a better job of representing you in Washington.

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Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Remodelers are required by state law to register themselves and their remodeling projects with the Texas Residential Construction Commission (commission). As of March 1, 2004, any individual or entity that fits commission's definition of a builder, which encompasses some remodelers, is required to register with the commission.

A builder is defined by state law as "any business entity or individual who, for a fixed price, commission, fee, wage, or other compensation, constructs or supervises or manages the construction of: a new home: a material improvement to a home, other than an improvement solely to replace or repair a roof of an existing home; or an improvement to interior of an existing home when the cost of the work exceeds \$20,000."

Based on the definition. remodelers are subject to registration requirements if involved in any remodeling projects involving interior renovations exceeding \$20,000; and, material improvements meaning, a modification to a home that either increases or decreases the home's total square footage of living space. Material improvements do not include modifications to an existing home if the modifications are designed primarily to repair or replace the home's component parts.

If you do not currently fit the definition of a builder, then you are not required to register with commission. However, if you do any work in the future that fits this description, you

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Every vehicle on the road needs routine chassis greasing, such as the ball joints and tie-rod ends. According to Texas State Law, a child is eligible for enrollment in Pre-Kindergarten if the child is at least 4 years of age and is 1) unable to speak and comprehend the English language; 2) educationally disadvantaged; or 30 homeless. In order to qualify for the program based upon #2, students must meet the criteria of financial need as determined by a formula provided by the state (which is based upon eligibility to participate in the national free or reduced lunch program).

To complete registration, parents will need to bring copies of their child's certificate, shot records, social security card, proof of residence, and proof of income. (Proof of income is required therefore parents must bring either a statement from employers showing monthly wages or a paycheck stub.)

The pre-kindergarten program has limited spaces, so parents are urged to register their children as early as possible. The first 22 children that meet the requirements listed above will be enrolled in this semester's class. After the 22 spaces have been filled, those children meeting the requirements will be placed on a waiting list.
