## The Ayes Have It – Voters Approve Adopted Tax Rate For Schools And City

Knox County voters have had their say and the ayes have it. The majority of voters in all three school districts in the county voted to approve adopted tax rates, and the majority of voters in the City of Knox City voted to approve a sale and use tax in specially called November 6th elections.

Tax ratification elections were held for each school district in Knox County. In all three districts, Benjamin, Knox City and Munday, voters approved the ad valorem tax rate per \$100 valuation adopted by the Board of Trustees in their districts for 2007.

Louis Baty, superintendent at Knox City-O'Brien CISD, stated that district voters passed the adoption with 159 for and 44 against. Benjamin ISD district voters passed the adoption with 58 for and 3 against. According to Region 9 Service Center data gathered from the schools, Munday voters passed the vote 130 to 25.

In the election held by the City of Knox City, voters approved the adoption of a (1/4)one-fourth of one percent sales and use tax to help maintain and repair Knox City streets. The votes came in with 105 for and 11 against.



> **School district tests** hybrid bus

Austin Independent School District is trying out a new plug-in hybrid school bus the school district recently pur-

The bus cost \$225,000. Federal and state grants covered \$146,000 and funds from a 2004 school district bond issue covered the remaining \$79,000. The price of a typical new diesel school bus can run \$75,000 or more.

Austin ISD's 71-passenger diesel-electric bus meets the latest federal emission standards. It will get about 12 miles to the gallon.

Most school buses get about six miles to a gallon of diesel, school officials said.

This is the first plug-in hybrid school bus in Texas, and one of only 18 in the United States.

New manager for college fund

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on Nov. 7 announced OFI Private Investments Inc. will be the new manager of the state-sponsored college savings plan.

The slogan for our new and improved college savings plan is 'The Start of Something Big," Combs said.

The firm, a subsidiary of OppenheimerFunds Inc., will begin managing Texas' \$200 million 529 Plan on Nov. 19.


The estimated 20,000 current account holders will transfer automatically from Tomorrow's College Investment Plan to the direct-sold Texas College Savings Plan or the advisor-sold LoneStar 529 Plan.

For a child born this year, the projected cost of four years at a public university will exceed \$77,000 for tuition and fees alone.

Four years of tuition and fees at a private university are expected to exceed \$294,000. Room and board, books and other expenses will significantly increase the price tag, Combs said.



county fair, our mail box is filled with letters from 4-H kids inviting us to the fair and animals, i.e., "I'm in the 6th grade, my second year in 4-H in the beef project, and I love it! My steer's name is Chipper, come take a look at him. Sincerely,..."

copy of a Letter to the Editor, in another town that said, and I paraphrase, "...desensitizing children (emotional manipulation) to betray the animal's trust by raising it, then sending it for slaughter is animal cruelty and a sad commentary that we encourage that dichotomy of thought in young people."

I called the writer of the letter to the editor. She was a smart, articulate, animal rights activist and entrenched in her opinions (like most of us). It was very difficult for us to find any middle ground, except that we both favored spaying and neutering dogs and cats. She was a vegetarian; saw no reason to raise animals to eat in the first place. When I suggested that production efficiency was worthwhile, she said it was just to make money, besides, farmers are subsidized. I tried to make a distinction that the relationship of humans to pets and humans to livestock was different. It fell on deaf ears.

Just as her efforts to convince me that a pig's right to express their 'pigness' was for many nights." more important than my evaluation of their comfort, based on measurable production parameters. She actually said

pork should cost a lot more. In the month before our I'm sure a lot of pork producers agree with her, but she's not a consumer like most of us.

In her ideal world, everyone to take a look at their show would eat grain and greens. There would be no milk, no eggs, no steak, bacon, salmon, sushi, chicken enchiladas, cheese, ice cream or locusts consumed by humans. We would live the culinary life of mountain gorilla, Coincidentally, I received a while coyotes, chimpanzees, polar bears and sharks would scour the earth for meat on the



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

## PUBLIC NOTICE

On September 20, 2007, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each city within Atmos' service territory to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is October 25, 2007. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,428,700 residential, 122,600 commercial, and 960 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$\$50,946,000 or 3.5%, including gas costs, or 13.49% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the system-wide average monthly bill for each customer class within the incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percent shown in the table below:

In addition to the rate revisions in Rate Schedules R, C, I, and T, other proposed tariff changes include changes to Rider GCR, Rider WNA and proposed Riders for a rate review mechanism and conservation & energy efficiency program. The Company proposes to revise its weather normalization adjustment ("WNA") mechanism to exclude non-weather sensitive commercial customers and to modify the WNA mechanism to calculate the WNA adjustment based on weather stations at a regional level rather than under the current practice of associating all towns with a single weather location for purposes of determining the WNA adjustment. The Company proposes a change to its Rider GCR to allow the recovery of the gas cost component of uncollectible expense through the Rider GCR instead of through base rates and to update the Upstream Allocation (Factor D) to reflect the factors as proposed in the Company's Class Cost of Service Study. In addition, the Company proposes a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM"), Rate Schedule RRM, to provide for an annual review by the cities of the Company's expenses, revenues and rate base investment and a corresponding adjustment to the Company's rates to reflect annual changes (increases or decreases) in these categories. The Company proposes a gas conservation & energy efficiency program and tariff to authorize the program. Finally, the Company is asking for authority to make future filings with the regulatory authority on an electronic basis, rather than by paper copy.

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



# Knox City Greyhounds Ends Season With 73-6 Loss Against The Throckmorton Greyhounds



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
