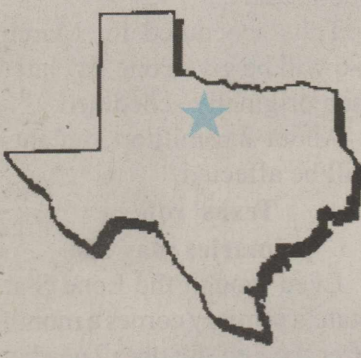

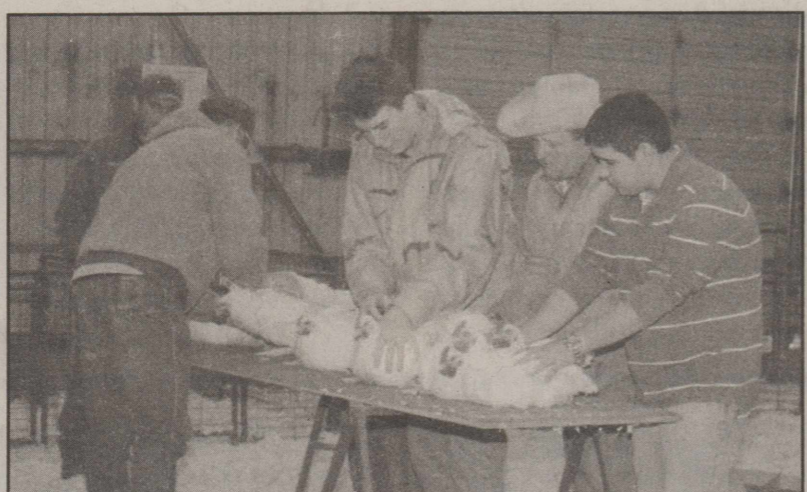

Annual KC Museum Fundraiser Marks 10 Year Anniversary

On February 3rd, the first Sunday in February, the annual Knox County Museum fundraiser at the Benjamin Ex-Students Building, will mark its 10th year. Besides being the day for the delicious home cooked meal and silent auction, people can visit the almost completed Museum from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. It has been a long march since the first Museum barbeque. After fifty or sixty thousand dollars had been accumulated, some board members began to say, "Let's build as far as we can with what we have. When people actually see something, they will be more willing to help".

away his family made a \$5,000 gift to the museum building, along with a request to "don't let it just sit in the bank".

Along with the fundraising being done, floor plans were drawn, questioned, and revised. A site was voted on. Grants were applied for and turned down. A loan was even considered, which the board agreed not to pursue. Publicity about Knox County efforts for a museum was reaching residents, and beyond.

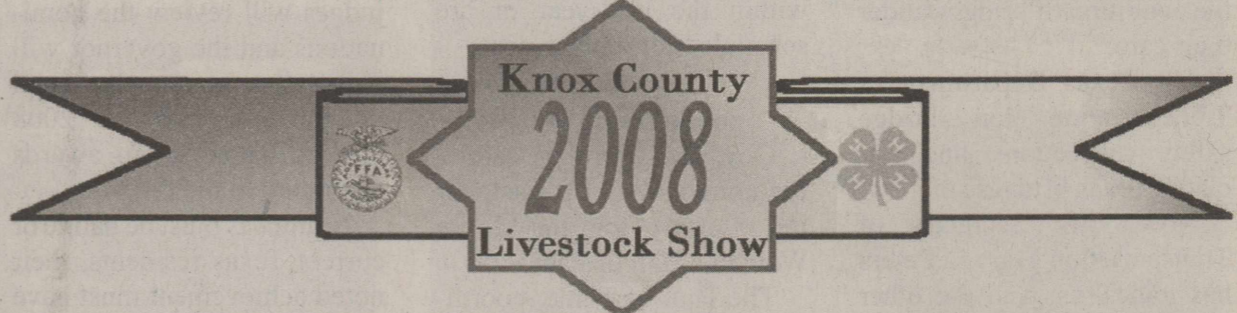
The Bisbee family came to Knox County years ago, and for a long time operated the Benjamin paper. The family still owns land in Knox County. This inspired more fund raisers, and more donations. It inspired one Benjamin resident to talk about the museum to another customer in a Wichita Falls beauty shop where both were getting their hair done.

Then Jeff Jordan of Olney read a story in the Wichita Falls paper about efforts for a Knox County Museum. He volunteered to provide the labor for pouring the foundation. That made it easier to build "in the dry". The building committee began pricing materials. Steel had started up, but the committee "stepped out in faith" and bought steel based supplies early, saving thousands of dollars over what the purchases would have cost a few months later. The lot was leveled and the foundation poured. The money in the bank was growing due to efforts by the KCHC, the Friends of KCHC, and just about everybody who lived in Knox County, or had ever lived in Knox County.

The other customer was connected with a Wichita Falls foundation, and urged the Benjamin resident to apply for a grant. As a result, the Museum was awarded a \$30,000 grant. Later a \$15,500 grant was received from a Texas foundation based in Dallas. Getting grants is not easy; many questions must be answered, both for planned use of the money and specific use of the money. Displays need to be planned, built and installed, before a formal dedication of the museum building can be held, but anyone who wants to visit the building from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m., on the day of the museum barbeque, is welcome to drop in.

The silent auction is also an interesting and intriguing part of the day, plus the recipient of a beautiful hand quilted quilt will be named. Those wishing to contribute any item for the silent auction, please call 459-2229 or 459-2205. We are very proud of the Knox County Museum and thankful for all the support. Appraisal District Board Set

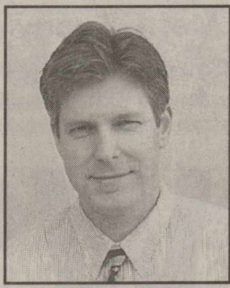

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Last summer, the Interstate 35 West Mississippi River bridge collapse in Minneapolis woke people up.

Inspection crews fanned out across each state and assessed the condition of bridges under their care.

The Texas Department of Transportation ran bridge safety inspections and declared Texas bridges safe.

Now, U.S. Secretary of Transportation Mary E. Peters has told Texas and the other states to address how changes

in bridge weight, capacity and bridge conditions might affect "gusset plates." Gusset plates and girders hold up certain bridges. They work like a hub and spokes. Peters' directive suggests inspectors should take a closer look at gusset plates when calculating load capacity on the nation's 13,000 steel truss bridges. Texas has more than 300 of them.

According to TxDOT, there are only six bridges in Texas like the one that collapsed in Minnesota and all of them have either been inspected within the last year or are scheduled for replacement.

Guv calls for nominations to hall

Gov. Rick Perry is calling for nominations of outstanding women for the Texas Women's Hall of Fame.

The Hall of Fame, coordinated by the Governor's Com-

mission for Women, includes among its many inductees Lady Bird Johnson, educator and lawmaker Barbara Jordan, Gov. Ann Richards, rancher Hallie Stillwell, Pulitzer Prize winning newspaper reporter Caro Crawford Brown, musician Lydia Mendoza, and newspaper publisher and presidential cabinet member Oveta Culp Hobby.

This year's categories for nominees are leadership, historic preservation, health, physical fitness, education and performing arts.

An independent panel of judges will review the nominations and the governor will induct the women the panel recommends into the 2008 Hall of Fame at an awards ceremony in the fall.

Nominees must be native or current Texas residents, their noted achievement must have significant ties to Texas, and

they must have been involved in the noted achievement during the past 12 months.

In related news, a 1986 Texas Women's Hall of Fame inductee, former State Rep. Wilhelmina Delco of Austin, has been named by House Speaker Tom Craddick as a member of the Texas Ethics Commission. Her term, effective immediately, will end in November 2011.

AG withdraws benefits opinions

Attorney General Greg Abbott withdrew two letter opinions released in 2006, disqualifying certain veterans from receiving college tuition exemptions available under the Hazlewood Act.

The San Antonio-based Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund filed a federal lawsuit on behalf of six Gulf War veterans who are now U.S. citizens.

The veterans were denied the Hazlewood exemption because they were legal residents but not U.S. citizens at the time they entered the military.

After Abbott vacated the opinions, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board adopted temporary rules to provide that qualified veterans are eligible for the Hazlewood exemption whether they were U.S. citizens or legal resident immigrants at the time they entered the military.

Student testing is rescheduled

Education Commissioner Robert Scott moved back the state testing calendar so Texas school students will not take the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills exams on the March 4 statewide primary election day.

"By moving testing dates, we can preserve schools as

polling places and maintain a calm, quiet, secure testing environment for our students," Scott said.

Tests scheduled for March 4-6 will be given one day later than originally scheduled.

About 2.6 million students will be affected.

Texas' role in primaries may rise

Even though the Lone Star State's primary comes a month after the Feb. 5 Super Tuesday primaries or caucuses in 24 other states, a general sense of the importance of Texas in the presidential primaries seems to be improving.

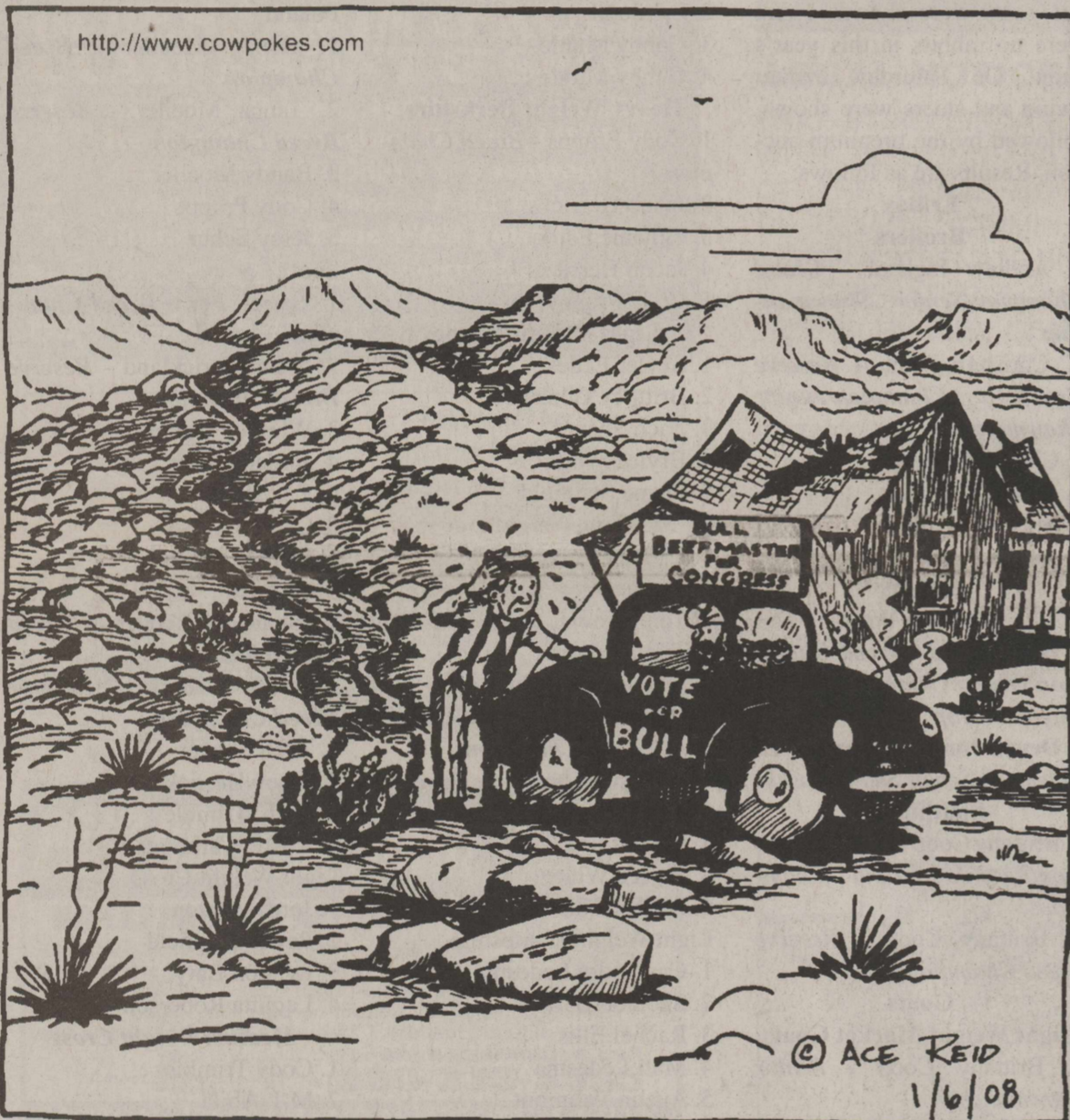
This may be attributed to the fact that no clear frontrunner has emerged for the Democrats or the Republicans.

Texas, second in population among the states, has 34 electoral votes, and may emerge as a key to victory for any of the campaigns.

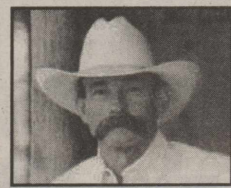

Remelle Farrar Named Knox County Community Development Director

Remelle Farrar was recently named Community Development Director by the Knox County Visioning Committee. Farrar took the position on January 1st. Farrar was raised in Crowell and currently resides there.

Farrar will work closely with the Knox County Visioning Committee, the chamber's of commerce in county, businesses and other organizations. She will, however, report only to the visioning board. She will be available for meetings with chambers and others who are interested.

"Through our work (visioning committee's), we realized that in order to get the results we needed, we had to get a full-time person. She is way over qualified...but she wanted to get closer to home and she has been interested in our group for some time," said Knox County Judge Travis Floyd.

The vision of Farrar and her team is to "provide a road map so that our friends and neighbors in Knox County can come together, plan for and take action to insure that our future on the Knox Prairie is what we want it to be."

Farrar plans to tell the county's story, get the message of commitment out and help people to understand how urgent it is to do the necessary work, with

their help, to leave a "thriving, sustainable" home and future in Knox County.

Farrar has stated that "this is not a sad and desperate last chance for survival reaction, but a great opportunity to decide for ourselves, who we are, where we are now in Knox County, what we want Knox County to be like, what we want to see happen here and what are we willing to do about it".

While this is still all in the planning stages, according to Judge Floyd, "we want a lot of folks involved."

"This is an ongoing effort," stated Floyd.

Farrar's salary will be funded from local economic development corporations, the cities, county and businesses. Additional funding support is also being sought.

Currently, Farrar is sharing an office with the Knox County Veterans Service Officer at the Knox County Courthouse, but will move into the Knox County Historical Commission's office when that office is moved to the new county museum.

The visioning committee has been working together for about 18 months.

Plans are to host a job fair and business technical support center kick off in February. The News will pass along more information as it become available.

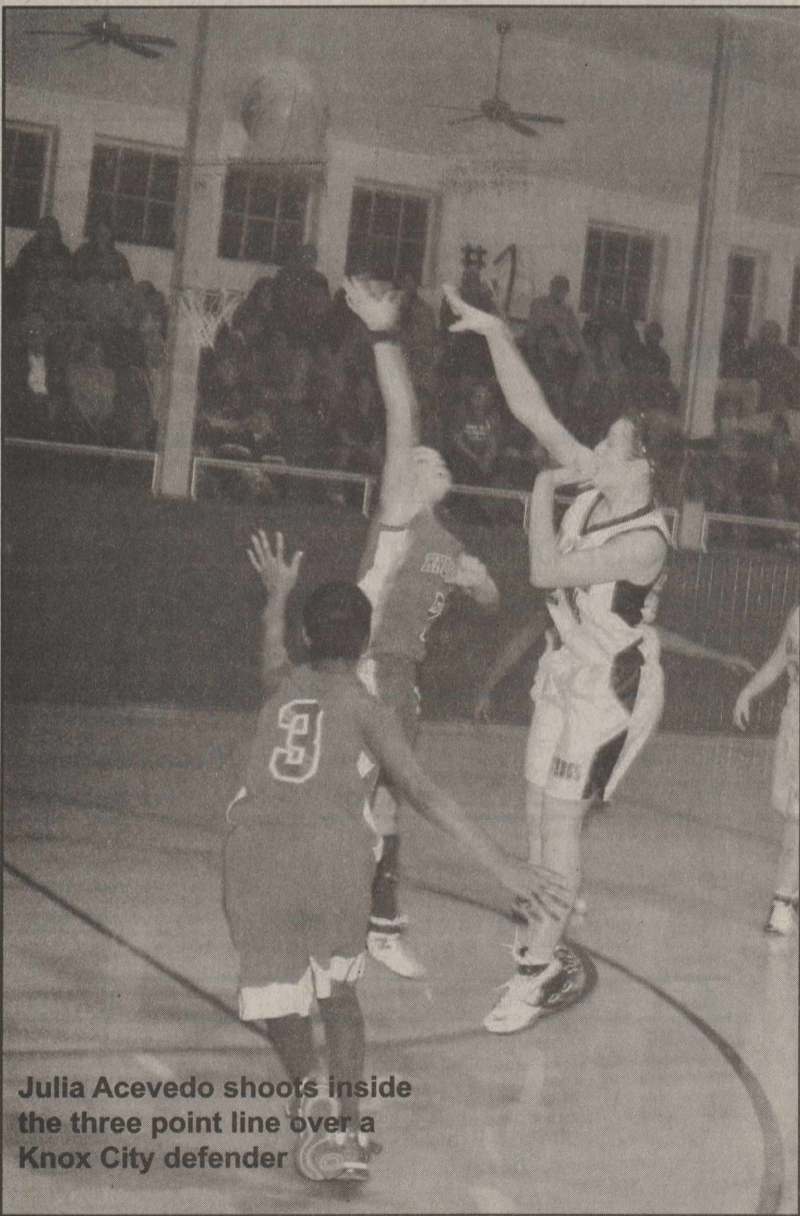
