Texas Cattle Raisers Urge Senate Stop Clean Water one time, Knox City was the **Restoration Act**

FORT WORTH - The Senate Environment and Public Works Committee today passed a bill out of committee that would give the federal government regulatory authority over stock tanks, drainage ditches and any water features found on fam- By Tamara Smart ily ranches despite large opposition from cattle raisers across the country.

S. 787, the Clean Water Restoration Act, would achieve unprecedented expansion of federal authority by removing the word "navigable" from the Clean Water Act definition of waters in the U.S. and replacing it with "waters of the United States." The new definition would grant the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Army Corps of Engineers virtually unlimited regulatory control over all wet areas within a state.

The proposed legislation would require cattle producers to manage around puddles in the middle of pastures, drainage areas, road ditches and more. If cattle producers are unable to demonstrate proper management of these areas to the federal government, they could be required to get a permit, which would be

far to impractical and expensive. Additionally, the legislation would result in a major decrease in authority from state governments and private property owners all across the United States.

"All waters are not equal in terms of their environmental function and value, and they should not be regulated in the same way," TSCRA President Dave Scott, a rancher from Richmond, Texas, said. "If this bill passes in Congress, ranchers across the U.S. will be forced to get a permit to continue everyday operations on their own land."

"The federal government already struggles to handle the backlog of 15,000 existing permit requests; how it plans to deal with the massive amount of new permitting requirements and liti-

The Reality About Newspapers

John F. Sturm, president of the Newspaper Association of America has good news for the

The reputation of the newspaper industry has been damaged because of the failings of some of the The bottom line is that largest newspapers in the country. As with the banking industry, the bad news about the failings of a few has given the entire industry a black eye.

"In the past two years, the newspaper business has faced unprecedented financial challenges," municipalities and government according to Sturm. "The economic meltdown and advertising recession have hit our industry hard. But make no mistake about this: newspaper media – print and digital – remains strong and will emerge from the current environment an even stronger multi-platform force.'

Sturm uses facts to illustrate the reality about newspapers today:

1. Myth: No one reads newspapers anymore.

Reality: More than 104 million adults read a print newspaper every day, more than 115 million on comprehensive, executable plan Sundays. That's more people than watch the Super Bowl (94 million), American Idol (23 million) or in place are the best ways to that typically watch the late local news (65 million).

2. Myth: Young people no longer read newspapers.

Reality: 61 percent of 18-24 year olds and 25-34 year olds read a newspaper in an average week and 65 percent of them read a newspaper or visited a newspaper website in the past week.

3. Myth: Newspaper readership is tanking.

Reality: Average weekday newspaper readership declined a mere 1.8 percent between 2007 and 2008, and about 7 percent since its peak in 2002. Compare that to the 10 percent decline seen in the prime time TV audience in 2007 alone. Meanwhile, newspapers' Web audience has grown nearly 75 percent since 2004, to 73 million unique visitors a month.

4. Myth: Many newspapers are going out of business.

Reality: Newspapers, as individual businesses, by and large remain profitable enterprises - with operating margins that Wall Street analysts estimate will generally average in the low to mid teens during 2009. While that may be down from historical highs, such margins would be the envy of many other industries today. As consultant John Morton said in a recent American Journalism Review article, "Overall, the beleaguered newspaper industry's financial health has been weakened but remains healthy by most measures. In this environment, that is an achievement."

5. Myth: Newspaper advertising doesn't work.

Reality: Google's own research shows that 56 percent of consumers researched or purchased is they saw in a newspaper. Google also says that newspaper advertising reinforces online ads:

52 percent are more likely to buy products if they see it in the paper. 6. Myth: There are no creative options in newspapers.

Reality: Newspaper advertising options have exploded and now include shape and polybag ads, post-it notes, "we prints," shingle spadeas, scented ads, taste-it ads, glow-in-the-dark, belly bands and temporary tattoos, as well as event and database marketing, behavioral targeting, e-mail blasts, e-newsletters and more.

7. Myth: If newspapers close, you will still be able to get news from other sources.

Reality: Newspapers make a larger investment in journalism than any other medium. Most of the information you read from "aggregators" and other media originated with newspapers. No amount of effort from local bloggers, non-profit news entities or TV news sources could match the depth and breadth of newspaper-produced content.

"This is not a portrait of a dying industry." Sturm continues. "It's illustrative of transformation." Newspapers are reinventing themselves to focus on serving distinct audiences with a variety of products, and delivering those audiences effectively to advertisers across media channels."





OVER-PREPARED

When we talk about someone being 'over-prepared', we think of a person who is very thorough and able to handle all possible contingencies. It is a good habit to have especially if you are someone who regularly messes up and therefore must be ready to respond when you over-mess up! A case in point; my friend Robin qualifies as this particular trip illustrates.

A push from her mom is all it takes for Rylee to take off with elan. She pedals in big circles and figure eights. She makes U-turns on a dime. Impressive. When she stops, she crashes.

Veering into semantics, Rylee's cycle-stopping antics are more inevitable than intentional. Even so, she's getting quite good at the crash routine, adept at landing on one foot and emerging relatively unscathed with her bike sprawled beneath her, it more akimbo than she. Yep, there's an art to her style of stopping. Rylee makes braking look like it's for sissies.

Of course, by the time you read these words, she will have mastered either the hand brakes or the coaster brake, and stopping by crashing will be nothing more than a memory, if she even remembers that part of the learning experience. I don't. Do you? I just remember the triumphant feeling of that first successful ride when I put my foot on a pedal, took off and went about the same distance as Wilbur and Orville's plane at Kitty Hawk, or so it seemed. I'm sure I wobbled and crashed at the end, but so what? The rite of passage was over. Life would never be the same. I was a newly minted bicycle rider, and I ran in the house to tell my

It's fitting that we learn young when skinned knees are as natural as tooth loss.

Riding a bicycle, like walking, is a natural part of growing up. Eventually we abandon bikes for cars, the great American way to get around. But if there's an inalienable transportation right in this country, it's not the right to drive. It's the right to ride a bike.

Think about it. Drive drunk a time or two, and what happens? You lose your license. But they don't take your bike. Sober or not, as long as you stay out of jail, you can keep pedaling. It's life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness in its purest form. Maybe it's even a way to overcome an addiction and earn back the right to drive

Do I ascribe too much therapeutic value to bicycling? I think not. Even a one-gear bicycle optimizes energy. The one-to-one steering ratio keeps you unquestionably in charge. Add momentum to the gyroscopic effect of turning wheels and you get more stability and balance than you deserve. (I never had physics; don't take me literally unless I'm right.) Bottom line, bicycles make us better than we are and take us places beyond ourselves. Bicycles empower.

Don't scoff just because you've never lost your license and been forced to pedal. I haven't either. But live long enough and it'll happen, right about the same time as the second round of tooth loss.

The good news: Wheelchairs are much like bicycles. That's how I plan to think of mine.

MUSEUM NEWS

The eight Communities of Knox County are digging into their local histories to prepare exhibits that reflect the development of each town for the grand opening of the Wichita Brazos Museum on June 27,

Knox City, Munday, Rhineland and Goree are mostly farm oriented country today, with oil fields also contributing, but once wild horses roamed there. Wild Horse Prairie is still a location many recall.

Vera, Gilliland, Benjamin and Truscott in the northern part of the county have farmland also, but many fields are on the edge of the Wichita and Brazos River breaks where ranching replaces the plow.

In the 1860's no one lived in what is now Knox County. Even the Indians just passed through hunting buffalo, but not making permanent homes.

In 1861 all Federal Troops left Texas to fight in the Civil War. Volunteer ranger companies from the frontier counties in danger of attack made "Scouts" into Indian Country that now makes up Archer, Baylor and Knox. The rangers of the 1860's will return to Knox County on June 27, 2009 and make camp near the Wichita Brazos Museum. At least a couple of the re-enactors will represent them.

They will discuss with every one who visits them what the rangers of 1860 did to protect the frontier counties.

Visitors can search through the musty rolls of several different counties at the June 27 camp site. Ray Cragar, a civil war history buff, will help anyone look through the rolls or seek the name of an ancestor listed in the Index of Applications for the Texas Confederate Pensions.

Taking Knox County from Indian times to modern times is the story woven into the exhibits as each community tells a story at the Wichita Brazos museum at Benjamin, June 27, 2009. Visitors are invited to seek out their ancestors in the exhibits and maybe even find their own faces in the school exhibits.

The program will begin at 10:00 A.M. After the program the museum will be open until 5:00. Members of Friends of the Knox County Historical Commission will guide visitors on a tour of the museum after the 10-11 A.M. outdoor program. A hamburger lunch will be served at the Benjamin Memorial Building by the Benjamin Senior

Every one is invited to attend, come out and learn about our history. There are too many stories to mention here.

Governor vetoes 35 bills before June 21 deadline

AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry signed the 2010-2011 state budget and vetoed 35 bills two days before Sunday, June 21, the deadline for approving or vetoing legislation passed by the 81st Texas Legislature.

The budget leaves the state's \$6.7 billion rainy day fund untouched but includes \$12 billion in federal stimulus

Perry said the final outcome of all bills would "move Texas

in the right direction."

Now, here are samples of a few bills the governor vetoed: • & #8194; HB 130, creating a pre-kindergarten education grant program. In his veto statement, Perry said a similar grant program already exists, and the new state budget contains \$25 million earmarked for HB 130, so the Texas Education Agency should use those funds to bring 21,000 more students into the

existing program. • HB 821, television mandating that manufacturers collect and recycle a quantity of televisions to be determined annually by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

• & #8194; HB 1293, creating disclosure requirements and consumer education standards relating to the sale and marketing of life insurance and annuities. "Although the bill establishes

standards of transparency and improvements that are important, I believe it will do more harm than good" because it would create more opportunities for frivolous lawsuits, Perry said.

• HB 3481, authorizing the expunction of criminal records, including law enforcement case files, 180 days after an arrest if no formal misdemeanor or felony charges have been filed.

• & #8194; HB 3485, relating to certain county, municipal, district, and other governmental functions, procedures, powers, duties, and services, including certain criminal procedures. "The bill's provision regarding physician liability was neither debated nor discussed, but rather amended onto this bill late in the session.

"It risks unraveling the progress we made in curtailing excessive liability and ensuring that patients who need physicians will be able to find them," Perry

• SB 1440, clarifying guidelines on how the Department of Family and Protective Services takes children into custody. Perry said he vetoed the legislation because it could infringe on the rights of parents and guardians.

• & #8194; SB 2558, allowing beer and malt beverage tastings to be held in a branded vehicle on the premises of a retailer with a permit to sell alcohol, therefore allowing alcohol consumption in a vehicle.

"The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission would be required to increase its on-site inspections to ensure the proper precautions are taken to prevent serving to minors and overconsumption," Perry said, in explaining his veto. And, here are a few samples of bills the governor approved:

• HB 4586, the supplemental appropriations bill that includes \$150 million in funding to help the University of Texas Medical Branch

•   HB 4409. reforming the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association ultimately reduce the burden of catastrophic storms on the state and eventually establish TWIA as an insurer of last resort," Perry said.

•   HB 4765, tripling the small business franchise tax exemption from \$300,000 to \$1 million. thereby lowering the tax burden for more than 40,000 small businesses across Texas.

• HB allowing public schools to purchase electronic textbooks. Perry backed up the bill with an executive order that underscores the State Board of Education's role in the electronic textbook approval process.

U.S. labor statistics show Texas recorded a net loss of 222,600 jobs in the past 12 months, compared with job losses of 5.4 million nationwide during the same period.

Although the Legislature took steps to reduce diversions in the budget, the governor emphasized the need to continue to reduce and eliminate additional diversions in future budgets to ensure that Texas taxpayer dol-
