Briscoe County Receives Disaster Designation

The ASCS office was officially notified Monday, January 5, that Briscoe County was one of several counties on the South Plains designated as a natural disaster area.

This designation makes farm producers eligible to receive some disaster pay if they produced less than 50% of the farm yield for a specific commodity on a farm.

Crops must have been adversely affected by drought,

excessive heat, excessive moisture or hail. Yield adjustments will be made for any other events and farming practices that were not conducive to producing the farm yield.

Producers must bring in production records AND records of all insurance receipts so that the processing of the red tape and other paperwork can begin. It is thought that all the payment computations must be made and the total amount of money needed for disaster payments transmitted to Washington by January 30.

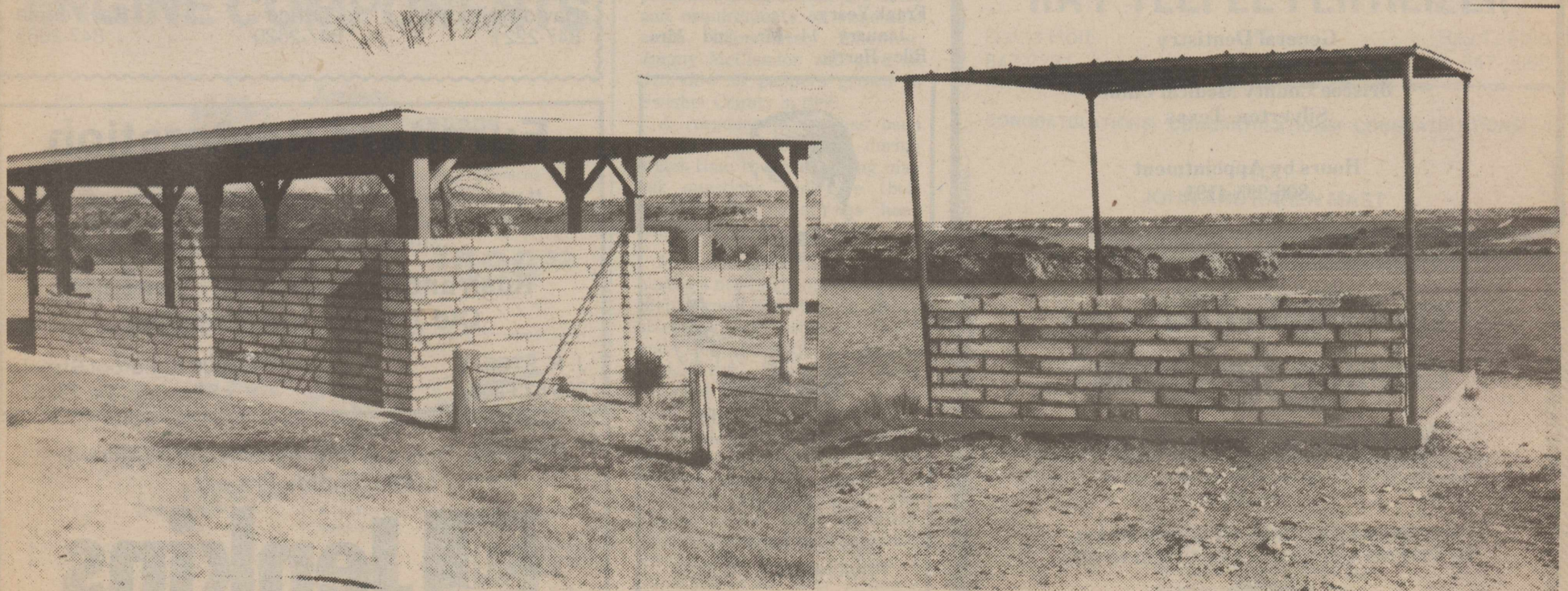

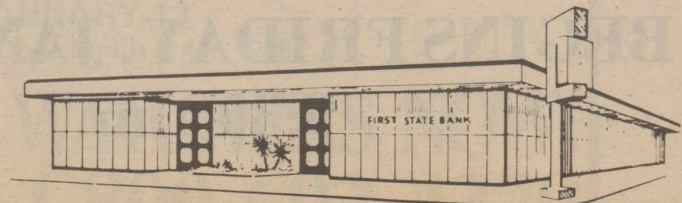

Fire Guts R Photography Studio In Floydada

The clock on the R Photography Studio reception room wall stopped at 10:11.

Approximately four minutes later, "about 10:15" p.m. Monday, December 29, according to Floydada Fire Chief Bobby Welborn, the fire alarm sounded. A fire in the photography studio, owned by Jack and Allison Robertson and located at 121 West California in Floydada, obviously had been burning "quite a while" before it was detected.

The blaze was "pretty much confined" to a darkroom, located in the center to back portion of the building; however, extensive heat and smoke damage was evident throughout the studio.

Welborn noted that there was "extreme heat" throughout the building.

City police and Dinks Eckert spotted smoke emerging from R Photography and several adjacent buildings and reported the fire.

"I came out of the alley and saw smoke coming from the roofs of all these buildings," said Eckert, a volunteer fireman.

Welborn said neighboring businesses sustained no apparent damage other than from "the smoke and smell."

Gutted by flames, the R Photography darkroom "had a lot of heat." A closed door helped prevent flames from spreading.

Out of town at the time of the fire, the Robertsons returned Tuesday morning and began inventorying their loss. Currency inside a cash drawer, which was located inside a desk drawer in the reception area or front (north) of the building, was tinged by the intense heat.

Fire Chief Welborn said the fire's cause was unknown, al-

though it was possibly electrical. "It's hard to tell when one (building) is burned this bad," he explained.

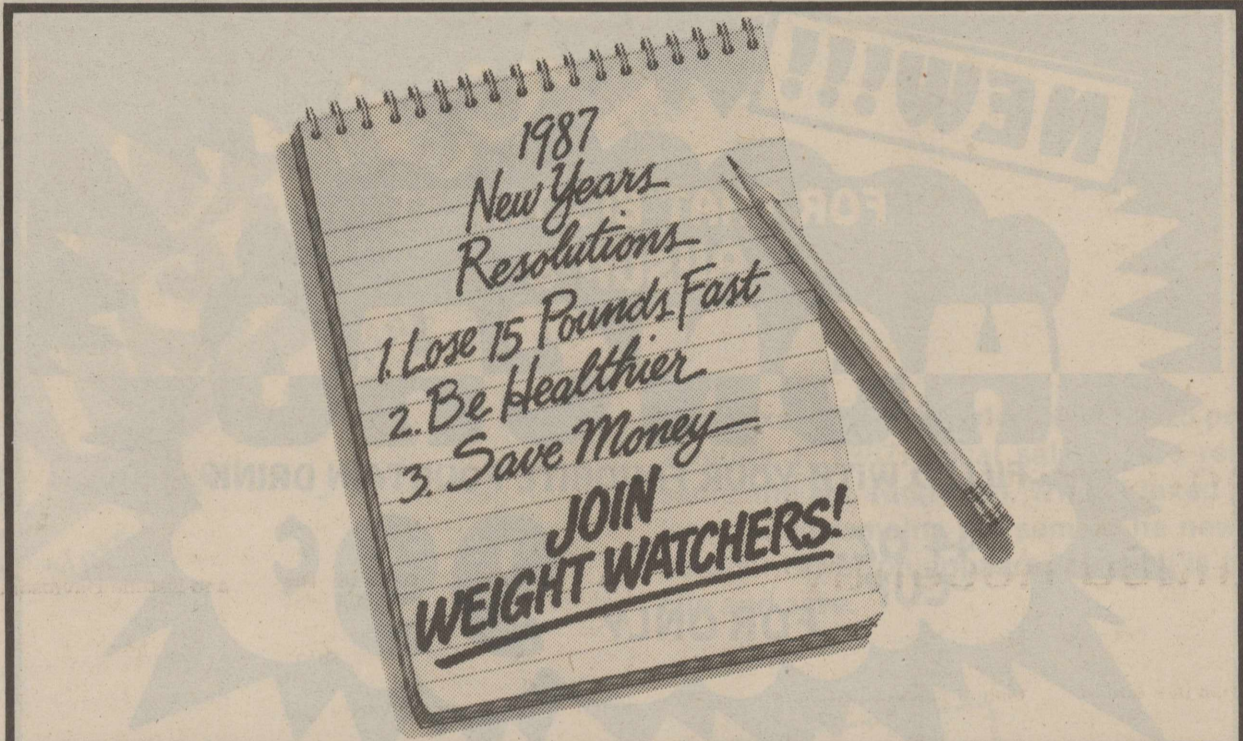

Hearing To Be Held On Herbicide Regulations

The Texas Department of Agriculture will be available at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, January 14, at the County Courthouse, to receive public response on the proposed changes in the Herbicide Regulations for Briscoe County, says Dirk Aaron, County Extension Agent.

The Briscoe County Commissioners Court recommended changes in December 1986 to Commissioner Jim Hightower on the following items:

1. The aerial application of any regulated herbicides is prohibited in Precincts 1, 3 and 4 from April 25 through September 20 of each year, and in Precinct 2 from May 10 through October 15 of each year.

2. The aerial application for brush control may be permitted under the direct supervision of the Texas Department of Agri-

culture.

3. The application of regulated herbicides by ground equipment is banned except for Dicamba products and 2, 4-D amine. Permits must be obtained from the Texas Department of Agriculture for ground application prior to the application of these herbicides during the regulated period.

4. No permit is required for the application of regulated herbicides from September 21 through April 24 of each year. This will be defined as the unregulated period.

All interested producers are urged to give their viewpoints on the changes.

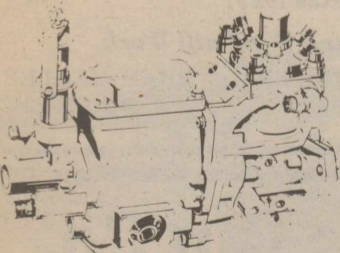

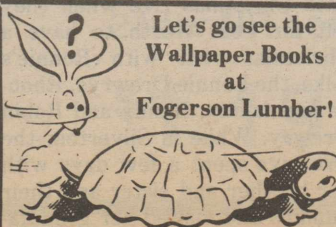
