Drought and high temps wreak havoc on local economy



Usually the later months of September into October and November, the edges of hwy 6 and 222 are riddled with cotton bulls that have flown from the constant trucks hauling back and forth from the O'Brien Coop gin to the expansive cotton crop all over the landscape of Knox County. Yet, this year, one can safely foreshadow the absence of the snowy looks lining the roadways, as the cotton crop is being scraped by many a farmer as not even worth harvesting because of the severe drought that has riddled most crops point, no dry land cotton can be found. Only the irrigated lands will be harvested, and only a handful of that is even slated for harvesting at that. of dry-land cotton to 1 acre of irrigated. That means only a fourth of the planted cotton could even be considered for

harvest... and some of that cotton is being plowed up too. Terry Utley, the Director of the O'Brien Co-op Gin, which processes all the local cotton production, told Knox County news that the numbers are down and dropping. Normally at this point in the year, 26,000 acres would have been committed to the gin. As of now, only 4,500 are committed. Utley has had to cut the number of seasonal staff too.

This comes off the heels of a pitiful wheat season. According to Hiram Whitaker who has worked at Benjamin Fertilizer for 22 years, he's never seen to the brink of death. At this a drought so bad. Whitaker says that no dry land wheat was even harvested this past wheat harvest season, rather the farmers all plowed it up, realizing the extreme financial The difference in the amount loss that harvesting would of dry-land cotton versus create. 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ask for Mitch Lee... I am sure he will apologize for his wayward golf shot.


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Well, to change things up a little each week I get the same question, are your boobs real? It is time to disclose the real answer: No.

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
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### SAMMIE'S KNOX CITY CORNER AND FINAL THOUGHTS

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
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## Hey world, change your attitude!

## Downgrade Should Remind D.C. Politicians They Are Mere Mortal

The political class in Washington got a wake up call late Aug. 5 — they are just as mortal as the rest of humanity.

For some strange reason, many of the political elite were astounded that Standard & Poor's would downgrade the U.S. credit rating. What seems so obvious to so many people, appears to be a foreign concept to those in D.C..

When a nation has over \$14 trillion in debt, and increases their borrowing limit by over \$2 trillion over a year and a half, and only vows to cut about \$1 trillion over a decade, it's no wonder that a credit ratings agency would downgrade the U.S. credit rating.

But what is most important here is the lesson that some politicians might finally learn from this incident — and that is that the political elite in Washington have to abide by the same rules as everybody else.

Politicians on the campaign trail have long felt a need to proclaim that America has some sort of exceptional advantage over the rest of the world. This is commonly believed to be true, but when a believer is asked to explain, they usually point to a flag, a politician, or some sort of government building as evidence of such claims

But what has made America great is its relatively free market economy — not politicians and government meddlers who are ever increasing the government's size and scope.

Many elected officials have fallen prey to the belief that because America is exceptional, they as the leaders of the government must also be exceptional. And that is why the responses from these people when their credit rating was downgraded came as no surprise.

Some seemed shocked that S&P would point out that over \$14 trillion in debt is slightly high. Others claimed that S&P is in no position to pass judgment on credit ratings.

Have our politicians forgotten that they racked up such massive debts that have no realistic way to be repaid at this point in time?

Washington politicians need to look at the credit downgrade as a wake-up call, a reminder that they have to abide by the same spending laws that everyone else abides by. But as Obama indicated Monday, he is content on continuing to live in the fantasyland that the U.S. still has a AAA credit rating, and will completely disregard the lessons from this downgrade.

Liberal talking heads such as Michael Moore, taking a page

from Fidel Castro, suggested on Twitter yesterday that Obama should arrest the CEO of Standard & Poor's suggesting that their action of downgrading U.S. credit was aimed at taking down the economy.

Paul Krugman weighed in suggesting that S&P's is trying to murder the economy, stating in the New York Times, "If there's a single word that best describes the rating agency's decision to downgrade America, it's chutzpah — traditionally defined by the example of the young man who kills his parents, then pleads for mercy because he's an orphan."

It would appear that the nation's leaders have no appetite for learning their lessons. Instead, Obama and his cohorts in Washington plan on continuing to live in the myth that you can borrow and spend as much as you please, with no possible repercussions.

If only they would come to the realization that they are mere mortals, and can't repeal the basic economic laws that govern every household in America and every other country in the world just because they are the temporary custodians of power in Washington, our nation would be a better place.



## **DISPOSABLE TAILGATES**

Our regular goin'-to-the-pasture rig, a one-ton 4-wheel drive '97 GMC diesel with 256,439 miles, was in the shop. So we brought out the ol' standby; a 1969 Ford F-250 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> ton 4-speed with split rims and a manual choke. It has a B&W turnover gooseneck ball made during the civil war, I think.

My son hooked up the old Ford to the gooseneck trailer, loaded the horses and went to check the cows. They came back, unhooked the trailer and took a load of trash to the dump with the Ford. I returned from the shop with the Jimmy and backed up to the trailer. In the rear view the trailer's electric hook-up looked different? On closer exam I could see the male plug was gone and the wires had been stripped! Oh, no. I silently prayed that he'd at least dropped the tailgate before he drove off.

year). In Knox the amount of dry land wheat outweighs the irrigated wheat by 8 to 1. Yet, for those farmers who did harvest wheat, although the production was down 50% or so, the price of wheat was up. One farmer commented, "Because wheat prices were \$6 to \$8.50 per bushel, even though I only had half the production, I still made the same amount of money as a normal year."

The drought is not only effecting Knox County, but all the surrounding areas as well. According to John Rector the director of the FSA in Knox City, "This situation is serious. It is not only affecting crops directly, but cattle and means of irrigation." Rector explains that wells are getting weaker and weaker for both irrigation and residential water.

The whole Knox County economic landscape is reeling from the effects of this drought, too. During wheat harvesting, restaurants, stores, motels and RV parks are usually packed with custom harvesters from out of town. Where a normal year brings at least 8 custom

harvesters with enough people of Stanfield Hunting Outfitters to operate 3-4 machines and several grain trucks, this year only four custom harvesters reported to the Knox City gin... and with them, each harvester only brought 1 or 2 machines with them, reducing the "tourist heads in beds" significantly. Local diners prices are going up, others are closing several days a week.

On another economic staple in Knox County, the drought is killing wild life faster than hunters can get out and do their thing. Jeff Stanfield, co-owner

candidly speaks about the decline in hog and deer in the wild. For Stanfield's though, the main bulk of their business comes with migratory bird hunts. Stanfield predicts the numbers will be down on the hunts simply because of the decline in local agriculture. For geese hunts, would-be hunters lay in wait for their prey in peanut or milo fields, where the birds gather for food. Yet, because the apparent lack of peanuts or milo fields, the less places for the birds to graze,

the less migration, which will go through this area. Stanfield notes, though, that can all change with a good amount of rain by the end of September.

As of Tuesday, August 9, 2011, Knox County has endured 64 consecutive days of over 100 degree weather; that is not a total of over 100 degree weather in 2011, that is just the consecutive days. All in all, in the 221 days that have passed in 2011, 76 of those days have seen 100 or greater temps. (Weather stats according to the weekly NRCS local weather don't foresee an end in sight.
