The work of the stocking has begun, 200 quaits have already been releeased and according to Mr Ballard a number of wild turkeys were raised on this ranch last year and he has agreed to place enough bronze turkeys in the reservation to make at least 50 turkey hens which he says will soon become wild after they have been released. Paint Creek runs through this track of land and it will be stocked with fish just as soon as possible and other wild game will be added all of which will be closely guarded for the next ten years according to a contract with the Government. Mr. Ballard stated that in the settlement of this section that along the banks of Paint Creek on this ranch was the greatest retreat for wild game in all this country and he believes that it will soon become alive with game again during the ten years to follow. 


